MANY SOCIAL EVENTS ARE SLATED FOR BIG WEEKEND HONORING ALUMNI

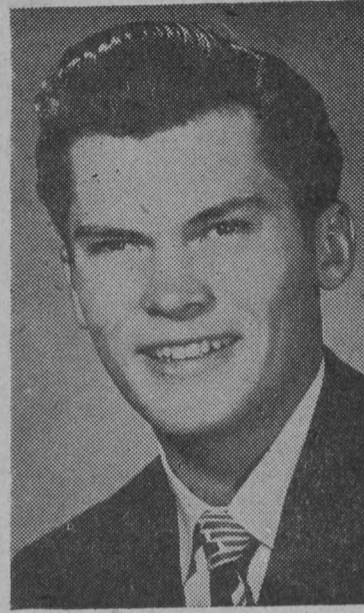

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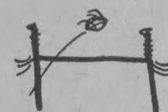

The big game was held at Bartlett Field in Montecito against Cal Poly. The students themselves had to build the bleachers.

In 1918 the Alumni Association was established, when the campus was a school of "Manual Arts and Home Economics." Five years later the Homecoming began to assume the form and shape of the kind now known.

23 Skidoo

Celebrations in 1923 began with a banquet for the Alumni, a parade, a review of "Homecoming Queen and Her Court," and a pre-game bonfire held on the beach.

Football competition during the first two years was provided by Oxnard, Lompoc, Ventura and Santa Barbara high schools.

In the late '20s and '30s the Homecoming celebration gradually became an annual affair.

Blackout for War

The war caused a suspension of activities for four years. In 1946, when they were resumed, every Alumni class was represented. That was the year the Gauchos were defeated by a heartbreaking score of 9-7 by San Diego.

"Rolling Home at Harvest Time" was the theme for the 1947 celebration, the year that present seniors were freshmen. Barbara Balthis was crowned queen that year and the big game was won by the Gauchos over the Cal Poly Mustangs, 53-14.

The Silver Homecoming, held in 1948, had a "Forty-Niner Centennial" theme. Donna Douglas was queen and another heartbreaking score was taken by the Occidental Tigers over the Gauchos, 8-7.

Last year, with the theme, "The Campus With the CAL-ossal Future," Joy Ritter was crowned queen after spirited campaigning by all candidates for the title.

Heaven to Hell

Tragedy struck Alpha Theta Chi's float, "Cal-Heaven," when a flare ignited it and caused a flaming spectacle. No one was injured, however.

The parade was the longest in the history of the school, with a total of 27 floats entered. Sigma Alpha Epsilon won the Sweepstakes Prize. The celebration ended with the main event of the weekend, the big football game, won by the Gaucho team, 33-12, over Pepperdine.

'Circus Daze'

For the fifth time under the banner of Santa Barbara College, University of California, the 27th Homecoming is being celebrated this week. With a theme of "Circus Daze Hits the Hilltoppers" a large number of alumni are expected for the numerous events that will occur.

Events include a gigantic parade, a pre-game rally, the "Galloping Gaucho Revue," and other events that will be climaxed when the Gauchos play the Cal Poly Mustangs Saturday night.

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FROSH FLOAT

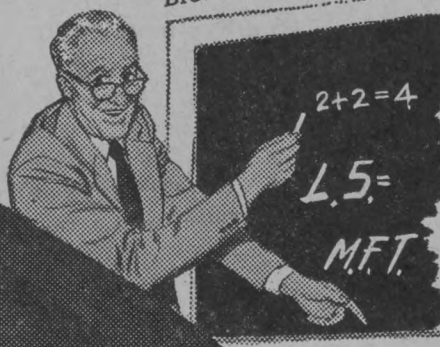

In the first panicky moments of the Korean war, Americans realized that their sword arm had shriveled in the years since the Great Demobilization. They also realized that they would have to revise the comfortable old practice of skeletonizing the armed services in time of peace.

The draft law is a giant bellows to blow draft-age men into the Army (with a sixty-four chance of landing in the Infantry), or to nudge them into some other military service.

Only the college group—a third of a million men each year—are able to delay the date of actual service.

Finish Year

The college student getting an induction notice after he has started a school year can finish out that year before being drafted. A "suggestion" from Selective Service Director Lewis Hershey to the local board can win him a "postponement" to start the next year if he is in the upper half of his class. Moreover, he can probably fit himself into a reserve officer training program which virtually assures him a deferment for his four college years.

The picture for the young man with a couple of college years under his belt is much rosier. He has a rackful of possible commissions to pick from. With the Army officers corps expanding rapidly (according to rough estimates, 50,000 new officers will be needed next year), it offers more opportunities than the Navy or the Air Force.

As the unanimous backfield choice, Halfback Doug Gorrie really put a new page in the ball-carriers' handbook as he proved that "it's hard to get a good man down." Doug uncorked several greased-hip jaunts that could be the spectators' thrill of the season.

Other mentionables were Lloyd McCollum and Bill Davis who showed up well throughout the game.

Army ROTC: The average college man can get his second lieutenant's bars with the least inconvenience via the Reserve Officers Training Corps, the "royal road to commission." If he keeps his grades up to a "C", behaves himself and agrees to serve two years after graduation, he is virtually assured of a four-year deferment. In 218 colleges, 92,000 men enrolled in ROTC last year and the figure is shooting up this year.

Much Supplied

Men who go into Army ROTC are supplied free uniforms for all four years, and 90 cents a day, plus \$75 a month for six weeks of summer camp the last two years. In return, they put in three hours a week of drill and the study of military subjects during freshman and sophomore years, increasing this to five hours during the last years.

Other deferment possibilities are the Air Force ROTC, Pilot and Navigator Cadets, the Navy "Holloway Plan" and Navy "ROC" and "Nav-Cad."

HUGHES, HERWIG, HARDIN MENTOR MUSTANG GRIDS

Beginning his first season as Cal Poly head coach, Leroy B. Hughes has won much popularity with Mustang players and rooters alike.

Coach Hughes formerly guided the grid fortunes of Menlo Junior College, compiling a five-year record of thirty-two wins, five losses and three ties.

He played his first football for Polytechnic High in San Francisco. His first college ball was played at San Mateo; he then transferred to Oregon for his final competition.

Navy Service

During the war Hughes entered the Navy in 1942 and served until 1946 when he returned to Menlo.

Assisting Hughes as line mentor is former All-American Bob Herwig. This is the second season that Bob has worked with the Mustang forward wall and the tackles and guards look better than ever.

Herwig achieved grid fame at California where he played varsity ball from 1935 to 1937. He made most of the All-American selections in 1937, and topped off his career by playing sixty minutes against Alabama in the 1938 Rose Bowl game.

Stayed at Cal

Herwig stayed at Berkeley after graduation, coaching the Frosh, until 1942, when he enlisted in the Marine Corps. With a discharge in 1947 he coached prep football at Burlingame High.

Celebrating his third year at Poly is Assistant Coach Sheldon Harden. Harden has gained quite a reputation locally for having his Poly men in top shape for their early-season games.

Harden played collegiate ball at Santa Clara until entering the service in 1942. He finished his eligibility at COP and then played pro ball with the Sacramento Nuggets.

CIBA Affiliation Is Possible, Says Harder

There is a strong possibility that the Gauchos will join the California Intercollegiate Baseball Association, an affiliate of the PCC, in time for baseball season next spring.

Director of Athletics Dr. Theo (Spud) Harder recently attended a meeting of the CIBA in Paso Robles and indications are that the Gauchos will be admitted to the conference, which includes the southern division of the PCC plus two independents, if difficulties can be ironed out in our relations with the 2C2A conference of which the Gauchos are now a member.

In joining the CIBA the baseballers would be competing with "big time" opponents for the first time, officially. Last season they had games with California, Stanford, Southern California and UCLA, all of whom are in the CIBA. The two independent teams which the Gauchos would play are St. Mary's and Santa Clara.

One of the big problems which may prevent the Gauchos from joining the CIBA is the fact that the Gauchos, as a 2C2A member, are required to participate in every major sport. If the 2C2A will waive the rule and allow the Gauchos to withdraw from baseball competition, while remaining a competitor in all other sports, the way will be clear.

Another problem which will have to be solved pertains to scheduling. The CIBA has a 21-game schedule. Eleven of the games would be played here weekends and the use of Laguna Park would then be at a premium.

No final decision can be made until the 2C2A meets in December. Dr. Harder stressed the fact, however, that if the 2C2A will not release us, and if we cannot play in both conferences, due to scheduling difficulties, then we will definitely remain in the 2C2A conference.

Currently leading the 2C2A conference, the Golden Gauchos, hampered by injuries, will meet their traditional rivals, the Cal Poly Mustangs tomorrow night in a game that the Gauchos must win in order to retain their conference leadership.

The Homecoming contest will be an affair that is always unpredictable as both squads get fired up for the contest and while the Gauchos have a four and one record and the Mustangs are still seeking their second win, anything can happen.

Favorites

Needing a win in order to stay ahead of powerful San Diego, Coach Roy Engle's squad will be awarded an edge in the predictions, though injuries may give Cal Poly a good chance to pull an upset.

Coach Leroy Hughes will field a fighting team led by left half-back Don Sims, and Bob Newman, top pass receiver and candidate for All-Conference halfback.

Sick List

With the Gaucho sick list resembling the Korea casualty figures, Coach Engle has had to once again juggle the starting lineups. Missing from the lineup will be the outstanding back of last week, Doug Gorrie. Doug came up with an injured knee and will be sorely missed. Don Steere will move up from defense to take over from Gorrie. Bill Davis will once again perform as Russ Bertell is still out with an ankle injury.

To Guard

Minor Rootes has been moved over from tackle to fill the weak guard spot, made still weaker by the injury last week of Jack Allen. Gene Bynum is also expected to miss most of the game. Clyde Francisco will once again start at right end in place of the injured John Juday.

A big blow to the Gauchos was the announcement that Ron Terquist and Frank Dominguez would definitely be out for the rest of the season.

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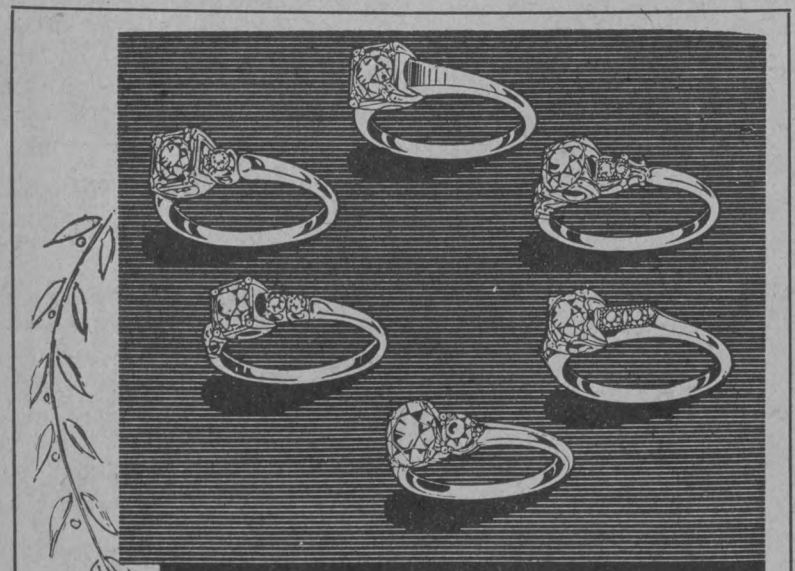
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
