

U.C. Regents Adopt Liberal Arts Plan For Santa Barbara

The Regents of the University of California, at their meeting at Los Alamos, N.M., on Sept. 26, accepted a joint report of its Committee on Educational Policy and Grounds and Buildings, including a statement of policy for the future of Santa Barbara College, and a final plan for the development of the Goleta campus.

The policy statement adopted unanimously by the Regents includes the following items:

a. The major objective of the college should be instruction and activities worthy of a liberal arts college of the highest quality, enabling it to become a distinguished unit of the University. Undergraduate instruction should be dominant in the College; fields of study should be restricted to fundamentals; and graduates should be properly prepared through completion of a sequence of courses of sound value, to engage in professional studies or graduate work and research elsewhere, or to enter upon their careers with disciplined minds and a broad understanding of basic subjects.

b. Instruction in home economics and industrial arts and the training of teachers should be continued on page three

COUNCIL VOTES ON BY-LAWS CHANGE

At a meeting of the Legislative Council, final action was taken on three new by-laws to the constitution. The new by-laws going into effect declare:

That at all athletic events sponsored only by the ASUCSBC, students are admitted free with a student body card; that *La Cumbre* will be given free to students who show two student body cards, the fall and the spring. A charge of \$2 will be fixed if only one student body card is shown.

The third law states: "The Scholarship Cup shall be awarded each calendar year, using September to June as the standard. To receive the award the student must have met the following:

24-55 units and carried not less than 24 units during the year;

55-80 units and carried not less than 24 units during the year;

80-110 units and carried not less than 24 units during the year.

The cups will be titled first-year scholarship award, second, third, etc."

MAKE-UP TEST

Make-up proficiency tests are to be held on Oct. 21, from 7 to 11 p.m., in NH 101 and 103. Students deficient in any section of any division of the test must re-take the entire division, and will be held responsible for any part taken whether passed formerly or not. Each student must present evidence of having prepared for his particular make-up divisions. This statement of study, signed by the department chairman or adviser, must be presented for admission to these tests.

PARADE PLANS SET FOR FLOATS

Final plans have been set by the Homecoming Committee for entering floats. With the these of "3-D Hits UCSBC," Parade Chairman Chappy Bortz reminded organization chairmen of the regulations. Floats may be no taller than 16 feet to clear the wires on State Street, and a maximum of 12 feet in width. Those floats not adhering to these regulations will be disqualified.

Floats must be in position at noon. Fire inspection will take place from noon to 2:15. Parade route is down State Street and starts at 2:15. Judging will take place from the steps of the Art Museum.

Floats will be on display at La Playa Stadium during the game. They must be removed by noon Sunday.

Rooter's Buses Leave Saturday For Cal Poly; Rally, Barbecue, Game and Dance For Gauchos

Santa Barbara opens 2C2A conference play this Saturday night at San Luis Obispo against the Cal Poly Mustangs. The Gauchos will

go into this game as underdog. The Cal Poly team is definitely the best team on the schedule this season.

The Mustangs have an imposing record this year, having beaten Fresno State 27 to 7, and San Diego 33 to 13. Cal Poly is living up to all pre-season expectations. Colliers picked the men from the north as the outstanding small college team on the coast. The Mustangs were the conference champions last year, and were picked to repeat again this year. Last year when the two teams met, in favor was a lopsided 13 to 0, in favor of the Mustangs.

This game will use the T formation against the single wing. Running the T for the Mustangs will be Neil; backing him up will be Lawson at fullback, Bravo at right half, and Jeter at left half. The Gaucho defense has held very well in the two previous games, but will be tested when it tries to stop Alec Bravo and the fast and tricky backs of the Mustangs. The Gauchos looked better on offense against the Oxy Tigers, and the passing attack also looked better. The combination of Padilla and Powers could hurt the Mustangs.

If the Gauchos can get started early in this game, and the backfield combination clicks, strange things may happen in San Luis Obispo Saturday night. This will be the toughest game the Gauchos have had or may have all year, and the support of the students will be appreciated by Stan Williamson and the players.

According to Dick Canada, Rally Committee Chairman, there will be transportation to the game and "the boys from Cal Poly would like to have as many of us up there as possible." There will be buses leaving the Riviera campus at 2 pm on Saturday, and the students are urged by Dick to travel in this manner if they are going to the game. Tickets may be obtained at the Graduate Manager's office this week. Since the roundtrip ticket is \$3, Dick urges those with dates to go Dutch.

There will be a rally and barbecue in the afternoon before the game. The Cal Poly students will act as host to the Gauchos at a dance afterwards. Hours have been extended by the Dean of Women's Office to 2 am to allow the girls to attend. The buses will leave the stadium at Cal Poly at 11:30 pm.

"Let's support the Gauchos in their first game away from home," said Dick Canada. "The spirit shown at the two home games has been great and the players appreciate this. Last year Cal Poly came down here and beat us, not only on the field but also in the stands. Those of us who were there said it would not happen again this year. So get your rooter's caps, pom-poms, horns, bells and let's go up north and give them h---!"

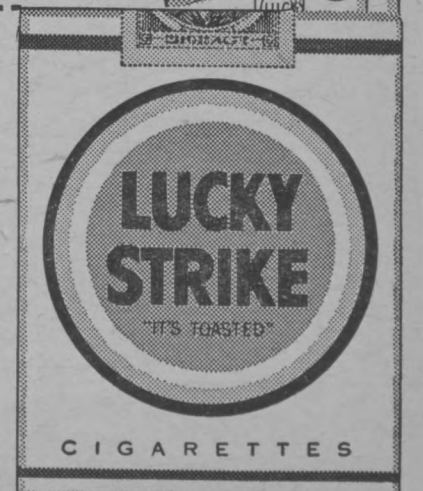

 . . . continued but with gradually decreasing emphasis, and with better adjustment to the objectives and standards of a liberal arts college, including the transfer of certain parts of the present instruction in these fields to other state institutions over a reasonable period of time. As this change takes place, the faculty of Santa Barbara College should be strengthened by the addition of more men of recognized competence in the liberal arts and sciences.

c. Research and other creative activities should be encouraged to the extent necessary to attract and hold brilliant men and women for the faculty of the College and to enable them to improve the quality of their teaching, but any effort to match the facilities for such activities on the major campuses should be prevented. Graduate instruction leading to the Master's degree is essential to the attainment of this research objective. Preparations for the General Secondary Credential, for teachers, in subjects other than education, is a natural concomitant of such instruction.

UCSBC Conform To University
 d. The College should conform to the practice, although not to the exact pattern, of other units of the University with regard to the admission and transfer of students, and to the maintenance of academic standards.

e. The decision of the Regents to move the College to the Goleta campus is reaffirmed and the general plan for the development of that campus presented by Pereira and Luckman, Supervising Architects, is approved.

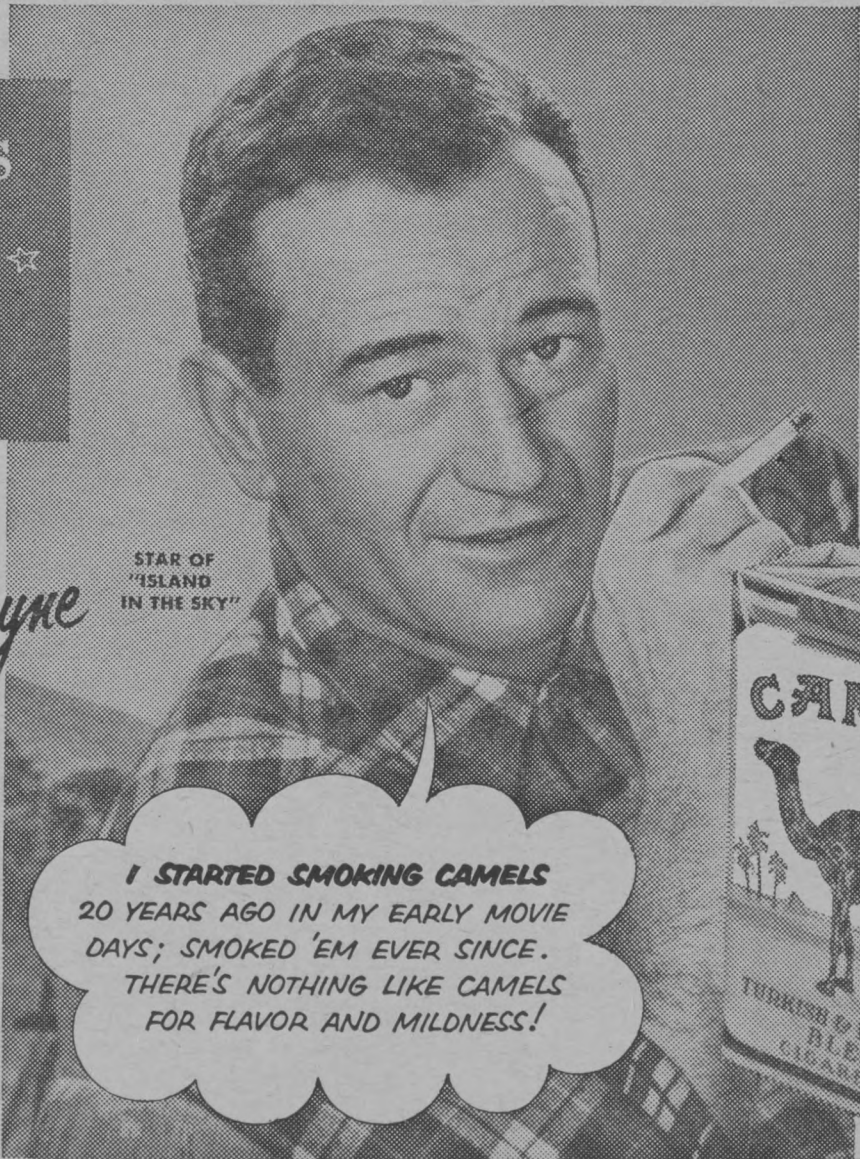
Statements From Sproul, Provost

In a statement from the Provost, Dr. J. Harold Williams, he said: "This would seem to settle the controversial issues concerning the introduction of work beyond the bachelor's degree and the retention of the Industrial Arts as a part of the program."

GAUCHOS RESIST OXY; LOSE IN LAST 6-0

Haunted by a fog of doubt, the SBC Gauchos were tripped in the last five minutes of the game for six points by the rival Oxy Tigers at La Playa Stadium for their first season defeat last Friday night.

But Stan Williamson's men put up a great defense throughout the game and were no easy losers to the visitors. It was only when a Gauchos back defender slipped on the soaked turf that the Tigers connected for a gain deep in Gauchos territory, from where the inevitable score came.

As the fog cleared, the second period got under way and so did the passing offensive. Twice each side was stopped in its running attack. On their second running offensive the Tigers went 20 yards and, on a Tiger pass, Bobby Shoup intercepted and returned the ball to the Gauchos 25. From there Chava Padilla, playing left half, tagged Right End Lee Powers for 10 yards. On the next play, Chava and Lee repeated for ten more, from the 35 to the 45, still in Gaucholand. Norm Stelle, Gauchos quarterback, climbed to the 48 over center and, unable to go any further, the Gauchos lost the ball on a fourth-down punt.

On the next two times Oxy held the ball, the Gauchos line crashed into the Tiger backfield to keep them in Oxy yardage. Chuck Miller, Bill Lowe, Bob Wallander, Marv Ashby and Jack Dayton, the Gauchos mainstays, never gave an inch unless they were out of reach of the ball carriers.

The third time, the Cats started from the Gauchos 33. Vince McCullough hit Don Yokaitis in the middle for 18. Then, when a Gauchos

back defender slipped and fell in front of Yokaitis, two plays later, McCullough passed to Yokaitis on the one-yard line, from where two center plunges did the trick for six points. The Tiger conversion went low.

During the first half, Jim Hagey, Roger Gartland and Bucky Baird, Gauchos runners, tested the Oxy defenses and found strong opposition at all times. As for passing, the fog provided enough resistance.

The Gauchos line appeared to have developed very well and Coach Williamson found time to put reserves like Doug Bass and Bill "Pat" Patterson in several times.

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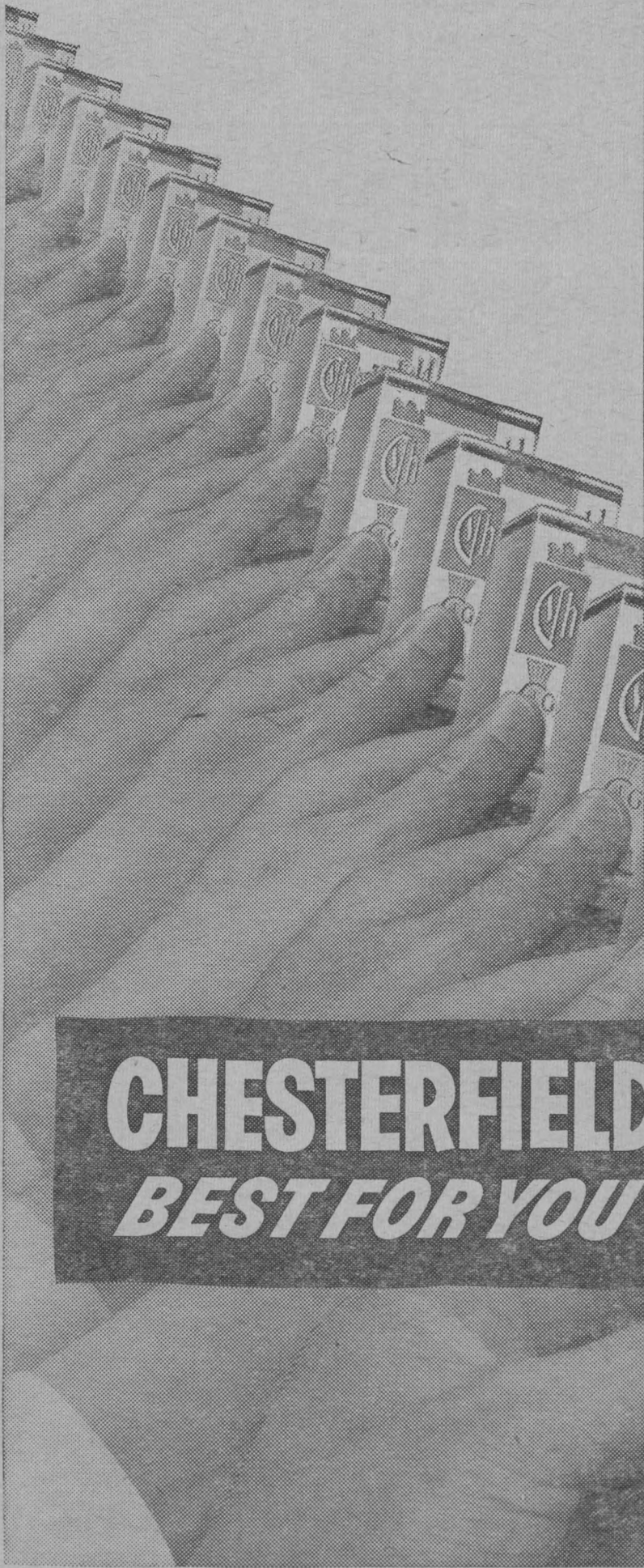
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
