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Gauchos in the Giving Mood at Utah St.

UCSB Commits 29 Turnovers, Shoots 35 Percent, Loses 70-54

The UCSB men's basketball team made its annual visit to Utah State's Dee Glen Smith Spectrum Saturday, and decided to give the Aggies a little housewarming gift — the

The Gauchos, lethargic and out of sync from the opening tip, committed a season-high 29 turnovers in losing for the seventh time in nine years in Logan, 70-54, before 7,218 fans. The loss, only the Gauchos' second in nine games, drops Santa Barbara into third place in the Big West Conference with an 8-4 mark, 15-6 overall, trailing UNLV and New Mexico State.

"I think that's the ugliest game I've seen in a while," UCSB Head Coach Jerry Pimm said in a postgame radio interview. "There was so much hold-

ing and grabbing and bumping and shoving that we didn't react very well to. They got us out of sync with it and they made us play a little faster and a little more sloppy than we wanted to, and that really spelled the difference here. That, and 29 turnovers."

That, and 35 percent shooting from the floor. And six field goals in the second half. And 15 field goals the entire game. It was, statistically speaking, the Gauchos' worst game of the year, a fact Pimm was more than willing to concede.

"We didn't execute well," Pimm said. "We didn't block out well. We didn't guard the post well. We didn't pressure the ball well. We didn't attack their leads well. We didn't play tough enough physically, and we were mentally not with it tonight

tally not with it tonight.
"The first possession, I looked out there and we

were standing. We were tired-looking to start with. I don't know what the problem is, but obviously we played tired tonight. When they got into us physically, we didn't handle it real well. We were not mentally tough tonight, and it hurt us," he

14 Straight

Swimming, Diving Are Big West's Best, Again

When UCSB Head Coach Gregg Wilson saw his men's swimming and diving team being pushed around by other schools early last weekend in the Big West Championships, his message was clear — "Then do something about it."

do something about it."
The Gaucho men most definitely did something about it, and, led by NCAAqualifying performances by Greg Latta and Glenn Peoples, routed the conference in finishing with 824 points at Long Beach's Belmont Plaza, 130 ahead of runnerup UNLV's 694. More significant, though, was the annual rewriting of the record books by the men, as they won their 14th consecutive conference championship, a Big West record for consecutive crowns in any sport. The women were only slightly less successful, placing second to UNLV for the second consecutive year, 877-730.

"This season, we may have been shooting for the NCAAs (in mid-March) more than in the past, but you always want the conference championship," said Wilson, the winningest

UCSB Leaves 49ers in Dust, 88-52

There was a time when the UCSB women's basketball team was a pushover. In January of 1987, the Lady Gauchos suffered the most lopsided defeat in their history—a 105-25 drubbing at the hands of Big Westchampion Long Beach

Last night was payback

The 1992 version of the UCSB women's basketball team walked all over the 49ers in the Events Center Monday night, coming away with a convincing 88-52 victory in front of over 600 vocal fans. The win was the eighth in a row for UCSB (18-3 overall, 11-1 conference) — tying the team record set earlier this season — and keeps the 29th-ranked Lady Gauchos in sole possession of first place in the conference. The loss, the most lopsided Big West defeat in Long Beach St. history, dropped the 49ers (15-7, 9-4) into fourth place.

After the score was tied 2-2 in the opening minute, UCSB went on an eightpoint run and never looked back. Gaucho guard Lisa Crosskey scored 12 of her 14 points in the first half, and with the 49ers shooting only 35 percent before the break, UCSB cruised into halftime leading 43-30.

Things got worse for the 49ers, who were held score-

less for the opening five minutes of the second half. With the score 53-32 and 14:15 remaining, Crosskey dribbled towards the basket on a fast break and appeared to be on her way for a layup before a defender prevented her progress. Without missing a stride, Crosskey made a no-look, backwards, over-the-head, in-the-air pass to Becky Brown standing under the net.

"The pass Crosskey made over the top of her head may have been the greatest pass I've ever seen in a basketball game," UCSB Head Coach Mark French said.

Injury-Plagued Spikers Finish in Sixth

The UCSB men's volleyball team found out that wins aren't easy to come by when four starters are watching from the sidelines, as the Gauchos finished sixth out of eight teams in the ASICS Grand Prix Tournament at San Diego State over the weekend.

Already handicapped by the absence of setter Jeff Zevely and hitter Todd Ahmadi, Santa Barbara was also forced to play most of the tournament without starting hitters Eric Fonoimoana and Kory Hull. Fonoimoana was bothered by a pulled muscle in his back, while Hull was out with a strained calf muscle.

In a sport where transitional teamwork is essential, losing four of the six players on the court can take its toll. "We hadn't played any of the lineups that we were forced to play in the tournament before. Not even in practice,"


Hull explained. "Basically, it just didn't click."
Santa Barbara started off the tournament losing to Indiana-Purdue Fort Wayne in three straight games on Friday. Later that night, the Gauchos fell to San Diego St. in just four games, after sweeping the Aztecs in three straight only a week before with Hull and Fonoimoana in the

After defeating Loyola Marymount in four games on Saturday, the Gauchos dropped to Cal St. Northridge in just three, matching them against LMU again on Sunday, the final day of play.

Santa Barbara squeezed out another victory over the Lions in five games, 15-12, 9-15, 13-15, 15-9, 15-11, behind 22 kills from hitter Greg Ryan, and 20 kills from opposite

But in the final match for fifth place, the Gauchos suffered their second loss to Hawaii on the year, losing 7-15, 15-7, 15-8, 15-13. Santa Barbara's 2-4 record in the tournament only applies to its overall record, making the Gauchos 3-7 on the year, while they remain 1-2 in conference play.

'In retrospect, it's definitely not a disappointment, UCSB Head Coach Ken Preston explained. "When your starters are on the bench, they can see things that are done incorrectly on the floor and improve on it, while the guys that get a chance to play are gaining some invaluable

UCSB Football to Rally for Support

While UCSB students will vote today and Wednesday on a lock-in fee that would save the Gaucho football program from extinction, many of the team's members and boosters have been busy trying to muster interest and support from the student body.

"We've done everything we intended to do to get the word out to the students," said Adam Loew, chair of the "Save the UCSB Football Team" Committee. "Because of the weather, we couldn't flood the campus with banners like we had planned, but that has pretty much been the only thing in our way. We have plenty of support, now we just need people to show up and vote."

The campaign to keep Gaucho football doesn't stop

with banners and posters. In fact, today in Storke Plaza between 11 a.m. and 1 p.m., the football team will stage a rally, encouraging students to vote. Dave Hefferman of KCQR will also be broadcasting during the rally at Storke, where an open-microphone will be set up for students to voice their opinion on the football topic.

For the lock-in to pass, a minimum of 3,600 students need to vote, which would require 2,400 affirmative votes. The percentage of 'yes' votes required is then based on a sliding scale for every vote between 3,600 and 5,000. If more than 5,000 votes are cast, the lock-in then requires a simple majority to pass.

Initially, the biggest concern for the Save the Football Team Committee, according to Loew, was getting enough support from the student body. But now, their

concern is just getting enough people to the polls.

"Because of the weather, people may not come out and vote," Loew said. "We thought that (the lock-in) would be made a bigger issue by more people. We have found, though, that there is a lot of support out there and not too much negative. We're pretty optimistic."

Lady Netters Open League Season With Win



UCSB baseball Head Coach Al Ferrer figured it wasn't that big a deal that he hadn't answered the questions surrounding his pitching staff before the 1992 season began. After all, what better way to evaluate your pitching than to have them perform in real games — something Ferrer was planning to do during the first few weeks of the season. However, these days Ferrer has been kept more busy eva-

luating weather reports than pitching arms. UCSB had its entire three-game series at Cal State Sacramento wiped out last weekend because of the inclement weather. The Gauchos have now had their last four games cancelled due to rain and have not played in nine days. That's thrown a kink into Ferrer's pitching plans.

"Since we didn't make our (pitching) decisions in the fall, we're trying to make those decisions now that we usually make in the fall," Ferrer said. "The rainouts are hurting us — we need to get people some work."

The Gauchos (6-2) will try to get one this afternoon against Cal Poly Pomona at Campus Diamond at 2, with freshman right-hander Steve Lane (1-0) scheduled to start.

"We're kind of going at each other blindfolded," Ferrer said. "We wanted to see (Pomona) play earlier, or get some input about them, but they keep getting rained out also."

To make up for one of the games lost at CSUS, UCSB added a fourth game to its scheduled three-game series at Santa Clara this weekend.

The Aggies (13-9, 7-6) were not exactly burning the nets up themselves, hitting only 37 percent of their shots, while committing 18 turnovers of their own. But the Gauchos were rarely able to capitalize, as they were unable to find their rhythm in a game marred by sloppy play and numerous fouls — 52 to be exact, 28 of which were called on the

Pimm felt for the officials afterward. "Defensively, I thought both teams were a little bit sluggish," he said.
"They held on and grabbed, and gave the officials a really tough time. They could've called a foul every time would've made it an even five boards. worse game. As it was, it was bad enough."

UCSB was able to get out to a good start, however, as four consecutive Lucius Davis jumpers got Santa Barbara out to an early 14-9 lead. But that was the most the Gauchos could muster. as Utah St. guard Jay Goodman began a play symbolic of the night thereafter.

Able to convert many of the Gauchos' 18 first-half turnovers, they outscored UCSB, 26-9, to close the first half with a 34-23 lead.

The second half was even worse for Santa Barbara as Davis, who led the Gauchos with 19 points, had no field goals after the break, and was still the team's leading second-half scorer, hitting -Jonathan Okanes six free throws. Davis was

0-for-4 in the second half, committed six turnovers and, according to Pimm, "seemed to force things as the game got away from (UCSB).

Utah State's lead grew steadily thereafter, topping out at 67-50 on two free throws by Goodman. The Aggie's Roderick Hay added 14 points, grabbed nine re-bounds and repeatedly frustrated Davis with his tough defense. Guard Kendall Youngblood added 10 points, five boards and five assists in the winning effort.

The Gauchos had little to offer other than Davis. The other four starters combined for just 17 points on 5-of-19 shooting, as the team finished hitting just 15 of 42 shots. Junior Idris Jones had nine points and five rebounds, while Mike down the court, which Meyer added six points and



UCSB's Latta led the men, recording three victories to close out a stellar conference season. The senior won the 100 breaststroke (55.08), the 200 breast (2:00.33) and the 200 IM in a meet-record 1:47.80. Wilson felt the only real disap-pointment for the men was the slighting of Latta as Big West Swimmer of the Year, which instead went to Pacific's Todd Hosmer, who won the 50, 100 and 200 freestyle events.

"(Latta) had an outstanding meet, and should've been named Swimmer of the Year," Wilson said. "But he won't dwell on it. Now it's on to bigger and better things at the NCAAs."

Joining Latta at the NCAAs will be Peoples, a junior who, though unshaved and not tapered (in preparation for the NCAAs), won the 400 individual medley (3:54.05) while finishing third to Latta in both the 100 and 200 breast events.

Also recording good meets were sophomore Christian Ballard, who won the 500 free and finished second in the 1.650 free. Winning that event was senior Kurt Chambliss in a meet-record 15:14.71, which qualified him for NCAAs. Diver Pat Kaufman also successfully defended his titles in the one and three-meter diving competitions.

The women got off to a slow start in their best collective event, the 500 free, and could never recover as Las Vegas was able to move


ahead in the 100 butterfly and never look back.

Senior distance freestyler Tabitha Bonney led the women, winning the 1,650 free (16:52.45) while finishing second in the 500 free and third in the 200 free. Diver Erin Evans joined Kaufman in winning both diving events, and was "easily the class of the meet," according to Wilson.


Also recording a good meet for the women was Stephanie Raymond, who set a meet record in winning the 100 back (56.53) and finished second in the 50 free. Wilson also noted Meredith McLain, Jennifer Dodson and Jana Mellinger.

"I wasn't pleased by how much we lost, but I'm happy with the meet overall," Wilson said. "We needed bigger steps from our swimmers, but the other teams were impressive. It was a very competitive weekend (for the women)."
