President Will Lead, Bust Noggins

After months of debate, members of the University of California Board of Regents have selected a candidate to replace the current UC president, whose term will end Oct. 1.

Regent Roy Brophy, chair of the selection committee, announced former heavyweight boxing champion Mike Tyson as President Jack Peltason's replacement Friday evening outside Elmer's Bar and Grill in Oakland, where the board gathered to finalize its decision.

"We're hapsy to announce Tike Myson, I mean Mike Tyson, as Uniservity of California Big Cheese," he said. "We're ecstatic."

Tyson, who served three years of a six-year sentence for rape, was nominated by his promoter Don King who believed the position would enhance Tyson's reputation. "We're ecstatic. Mike Tyson's image is going to skyrocket from a prison room to the moon, from a pen cell to a tower bell, from ... I have to pee," said King.

The committee, which consulted with student, staff and alumni advisory com-

Republican Candidate Picks Isla Vistan as Running Mate

In a surprise move Sunday, Gov. Pete Wilson appointed an Isla Vista resident as his running mate in the quest for the Republican presidential nomination.

Geoff Green, an I.V. Recreation and Park District director and former Associated Students president, was introduced to the media at an afternoon press conference. The senior biology and environmental studies major believes he was selected for both political and personal reasons.

"I think I was picked because of my strong ecological and liberal leanings, to strike a balance with the governor," Green said. "Or maybe he picked me because of my cool goatee."

Green will help bring in the youth vote

in a way the elderly politician will not be able to, according to Wilson.

"Let's face it — I'm old and I've managed to completely piss off the student population with fee hikes," Wilson said. "I think that one day Geoff will be mentioned in the same breath as Spiro Agnew and Dan Quayle as an exemplary vice president."

However, the announcement was not without controversy as approximately 50 protesters picketed the press conference and subsequent reception.

Due to his running, Green has decided to vacate his IVRPD position before the expiration of his term, angering many in the local community, according to fellow IVRPD director Pegeen Soutar.

"I can't believe it. He just ditched us," Soutar said, breaking into tears. "He said

Big Green Animal on a Scarf-Fest as I.V. Residents Drop Like Flies

After devouring 23 Isla Vista residents Sunday, a giant mutated Southwestern arroyo toad continues its devastating rampage today, haphazardly hopping westward toward Ellwood Shores.

The creature rose from the Campus Lagoon sometime Sunday morning and began feeding on passing joggers, according to eyewitnesses. Believed to be the same toad as the one that escaped from the Biology Dept. last week, its mutation is possibly the result of exposure to the stagnant polluted water of the lagoon, according to Xavier Xerxes, a junior biology major.

"The chemical balance of the lagoon's

water probably blended with the toad's DNA and caused him to grow at a drastic rate," Xerxes said. "Freshman year, I was under the impression that the lagoon was safe for swimming. I was in that water for eight minutes and my turds were day-glo pink for a month. Believe me, that's no life-giving liquid."

Although police and military officials have attempted to destroy the amphibian beast, their efforts have repeatedly been thwarted by avid environmentalists who act as a human shield for the metamorphosed creature.

Since the Southwestern arroyo toad was placed on the endangered species list last January, slaughtering the creature would be irresponsible and illegal, ac-

University Journalists Jailed for Joking

ANTIOCH, OHIO (AP) — Twenty-four journalism students were arrested Monday morning after the publishing of the April 1 issue of the Antioch University newspaper.

The April Fools Day release of the campus-supported tabloid *The Big Anchor* proved to hold numerous falsehoods, non-truths and other potentially slanderous storylines.

Academic officials of Antioch, most recently known for its Martin Luther-like statement of sexual rights and regulations on campus, were outraged at the printed matter. Premier Robert Bardsley was available for comment at a national press conference held immediately.

"We had long been aware of the possibility of an incident like this occurring, knowing the raucous staff of *The Big*

Anchor, but we are quite honestly shocked at the excuse for journalism before us today," he said.

"The fact that they renamed their publication *The Big Incher*, if even

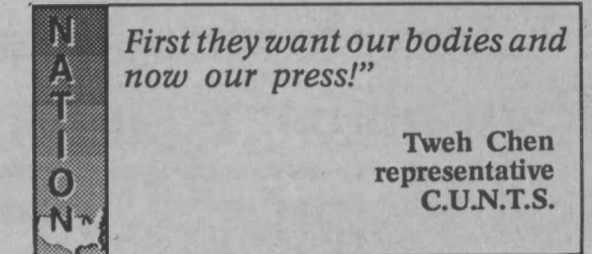

Baseball Players Close the Deal on Temporary Contract

NEW YORK (AP) — Major League Baseball Players' Association negotiator Donald Fear signed the owners' proposal Sunday, ending the 3003-day-old baseball strike.

The players agreed to a one-month collective bargaining agreement which ends in May, allowing both sides to act like babies all over again.

Both sides were able to put down their rattles and formula bottles long enough to hammer out a deal which includes neither a luxury tax nor a salary cap, but instead will include a system where players beg for money from fans after games.

Player representative David Conehead indicated that going back on strike in May would actually be more fun than playing baseball.

"What do I care? I signed a guaranteed con-

tract, so I'll get my millions regardless," he said. "I can go back to lounging around my pool and picking up underaged women."

New York Yankees owner Georgie Stoveburner said that only playing



for one month isn't beneficial for baseball because it won't give him enough time to bring Billy Martin back from the dead to coach, and then fire and rehire him back several times throughout the season.

"I want them to play," said Stoveburner. "If I can't ruin somebody's career or manipulate people like puppets, I don't have anything."

Don King to Promote Tyson-O.J. Simpson Boxing Match

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Boxing promoter Don King made a surprise announcement Saturday, declaring that Mike Tyson, the gem of King's former clients, will not be entering the ring anytime soon with a sanctioned opponent.

Instead, King said that he is negotiating for Tyson, recently released from prison on charges of rape, to battle it out with O.J. Simpson in what could be the biggest fight in the history of boxing.

According to King, the plan outlines Tyson, a former world heavyweight champion, to fight Simpson at the MGM Grand Hotel in Las Vegas on a date to be announced. King said he is also in talks with California state prison officials, with the goal of providing an opportunity for Simpson to be released from jail.

"I believe that O.J. is innocent, and I want to help get him out," King said in a prepared statement.

King said that in order for Simpson to be released, Simpson must defeat Tyson in a 12-round



bout by at least a technical knockout. Anything less would return Simpson to jail for at least the duration of his trial.

Sources close to Simpson, as well as prison officials, had no comment at press time.

Tyson, who declined comment but made one anyway, was much less optimistic of Simpson's chances. "I'm gonna pound that sucker."

Virus That Disrupts Logical Speech Accidentally Loosed

BUELLTON (AP) — A newly-invented, contagious strain of *Abstracticus* thrilled genetic engineers at a conference Friday, but it may give epidemiologists something new to worry about.

Michael Huffington Throws Hat Into Presidential Arena

SANTA BARBARA (AP) — Former congressman and sore loser Michael Huffington joined the tide of presidential contenders Sunday, announcing his plans to purchase his own political party.

Huffington vowed to avenge his loss to California Sen. Diane Feinstein, and said he was prepared to privately fund a pool of reliable voters and Congress cronies that would guarantee a shoe-in in the 1996 elections.

He amused news reporters and onlookers at the afternoon press conference at Stearns Wharf, but wife Arianna's fly-away bouffant hair stole the show in the 30 mph winds. If elected, Mr. Huffington promised to decrease taxes, governmental bureaucracy and the volume

of Mrs. Huffington's hair. "America is at the crossroads of change. What we need is a leader who has the integrity, loose change and documented domestic help to make that transition," he said.

The presidential hope-



ful also said he supports term limits and believes convicted murderers should get a maximum of only 10 years.

Huffington has earned the esteemed backing of Republican Speaker of the House Newt Gingrich and former Lemon County treasurer Robert L. Citron.

Black, Sticky Amusement the Goal of Proposed Clearview Theme Park

In an attempt to bolster local support for their proposed onshore drilling project, Mobil Oil Corporation officials announced plans Sunday for a theme park to encompass the Clearview development.

The park, to be named Petrol Gardens, will contain attractions centering on themes related to oil development, according to Mobil public affairs advisor Shauna Clarke.

"The park will be a center of family fun, entertainment and the celebration of one of our most valuable resources," Clarke said. "We feel that after a day at Petrol Gardens visitors will walk away with a

higher appreciation of oil and what it takes to properly handle such a grand natural resource."

Among the plethora of attractions within the park site will be the Gonzo Gusher, which propels riders in an oil barrel-shaped vessel through a series of canals filled with Texas crude, ending in a

175-foot drop from the peak of the Clearview tower, Clarke said.

"We feel this will be the centerpiece attraction at Petrol Gardens," she said. "Especially on those warm summer days when a nice oil shower is just the thing to help you cool off."

Mobil plans to market the park to families through the use of Saturday morning cartoon characters such as Slant Drill Sammy, Ricky Righand and Goey Gusher, from the popular children's show *Petroleum Playtime*, according to Clarke.

However, the park poses too many safety problems despite possible economic benefits of the project, according to

UCSA to Use Skillz to Lower Bills

The University of California Student Association will unleash its most severe volley to date against fee hikes at May's UC Board of Regents meeting.

Through a drive entitled "None o' y'all can fuck with this, bring it on Mr. Bigshot Regent punk-ass mark motherfucker," UCSA will attempt to raise money to eradicate the discrepancy between the regents' budget for 1995-96 and that of the state of California through a series of freestyle rap challenges to members of the board of regents.

The contests will attempt to raise \$109 million to fill the gap between the regents' current budget proposal and that offered by Gov. Pete Wilson's office.

While the regents' November budget anticipated a 7.9 percent increase in state funding which would have allowed the University to avoid significant fee hikes for the first time in five years, the governor's budget antici-

pates a smaller increase in state funding.


"We need money and we're getting it through the power of rhyme," said UCSA Executive Director Glenn Magpantay. "We're going to set up our turntables outside the meeting and bust some of that ol' fonky shit."

"Hopefully folks will appreciate our efforts enough to put a little money in our jar and offset the \$109 million gap," he added. Magpantay declined to bust a freestyle as of press time.

Although Regent Roy Brophy believes the students' efforts will not be enough to raise the necessary funds, he will nonetheless acquiesce any challenges to his skill on the mic. "Bring it on," he said.

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
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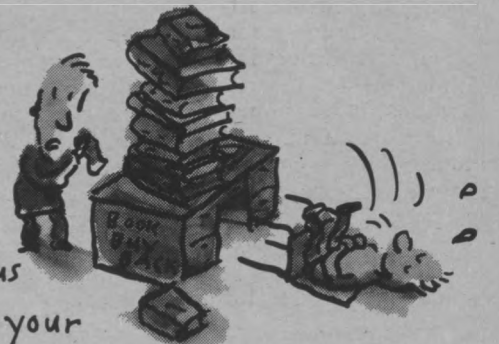
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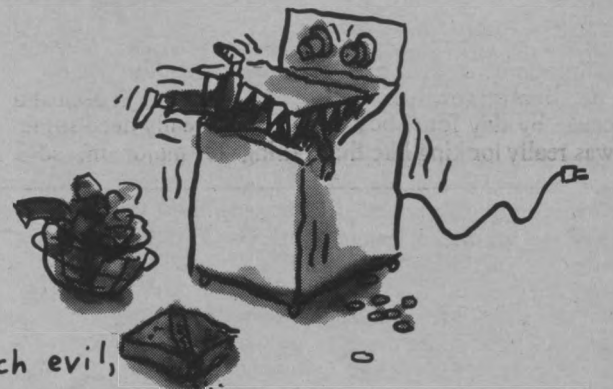
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Spelunking Protest Caves In Due to Lack of Administration Exploration

Pleas for a new interplanetary spelunking department fell on deaf ears as a group of nearly 40 promotional demonstrators took over Storke Plaza during Spring Break.

The proposed department would prepare students for cave exploration on other planets.

Demonstrators hoped to attract the attention of administrators to encourage their approval of the department. "We hadn't thought of this beforehand, but we ran into trouble when we realized the administrators were on vacation too," said organizer Barbara Ciel.

Those in attendance were encouraged despite a nonexistent turnout. "I think our efforts were fruitful nonetheless," Ciel said.

The group went nearly 80 hours without sleep in order to promote their cause. "We knew the minute we went to sleep an administrator would show up," said sophomore demonstrator Jimmy LaPorte.

However, some demonstrators were grateful that administrators were not present. "I'm glad they didn't come at the end of the demonstration because by day four, boy, I was really looking like the

cutel" giggled freshman Jennifer Maison.

The group backed their cause by saying that nearly every major university in America has an interplanetary spelunking department.

"From what I understand, groups from all the other schools had to go through a long, arduous process to get the department approved on their respective campuses, but they all succeeded and so will we," Ciel said.

"Here at UCSB, we are prepared to fight this to the end," she added. "This is such a growing field, we cannot deny students the opportunity to major in something with such a prosperous future."

All that is needed now is effective transportation to other planets and the career prospects will really expand, according to Ciel.

"I am really hopeful for the advancement of jobs in this field," she said. "Once students have obtained a major like this, they are employable anywhere, really."

Students had different reasons for participating in the demonstration. "I came to UCSB seven years ago for its psych department, but that damn curve was just too difficult, and I didn't really like anything else offered here," said demonstrator Ron Bleu.

"Now that I'm almost a junior, I really need something to major in, so I

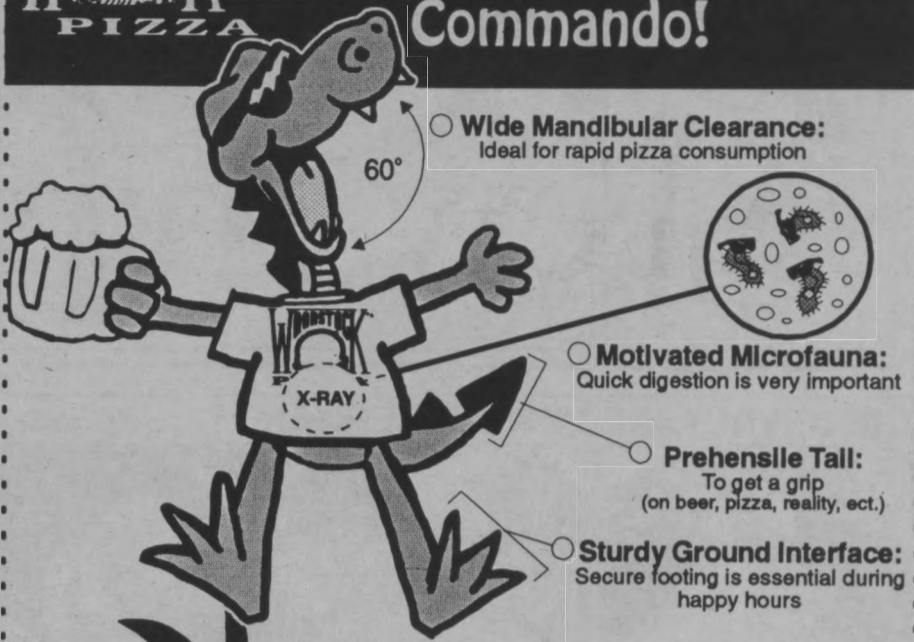

Chancellor Henry T. Yang learned about the demonstration upon his return from Spring Break. "I was none too pleased to hear about all this," he said.

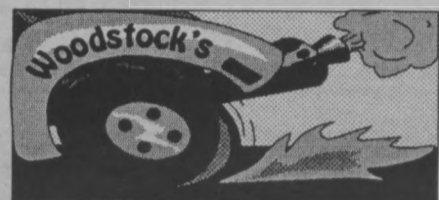
There have been nearly a thousand injuries and 87 documented deaths nationwide related to departmental course activities, including mock spelunking and simulated space flight, according to Yang.

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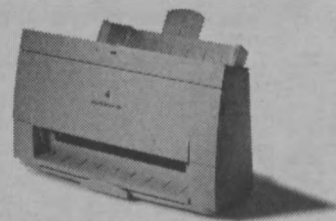

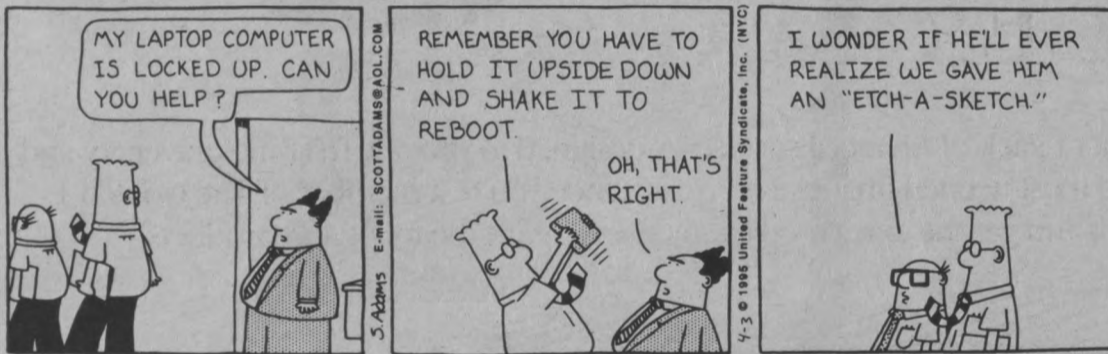


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Ability Not Required at Upcoming Festival

The artists slated for Extravaganza 1995 have been confirmed, prompting headliner David Hasselhoff to diligently rehearse to provide the U.S. with a concert as thrilling as those he presents to the Germans. Brushing up on his languages, Hasselhoff, more familiar to Americans for his star roles in *Knight Rider* and *Baywatch*, will wow the Gaucha crowd with tunes in German, Spanish, Cantonese and English. tongues, according to Neil Sequiera, concert co-chair for Associated Students Program Board, the organization presenting Extravaganza.

“Students are always interested in diversity, and we thought the best way to provide a diverse concert was to include an artist who was able to sing in several languages,” Sequiera said. “We had heard of his popularity in Germany and knew he’d be just as well-received here.”

The concert bill will also include the host of television’s *Entertainment Tonight*, John Tesh, who has written theme music for the Tour de France and the L.A. Marathon.

“Not only is he a great songwriter, but he also has a dynamic voice. His stage presence will set the crowd on fire and that’s precisely what we were looking for to follow up our headliner, David Hasselhoff,” said Josh Wendroff, A.S. Program Board advertising and publicity coordinator. “If you’ve ever heard John Tesh’s covers of The Police’s hits, you know he’s really great.”

Extravaganza patrons can also look forward to the sights and sounds of Las Vegas lounge singer and one-hit wonder Wayne Newton, who will only sing “Danke Shoen” during his one-hour stage appearance, performing the tune until the crowd is forced to sing along, according to Sequiera.

“I’ve always loved that song, so when I arranged for Wayne to appear, I requested that he only sing ‘Danke Shoen,’” he said. “Matthew Broderick just didn’t do it justice in *Ferris Bueller’s Day Off*.”

The most recent addition to the bill is Kathie Lee Gifford, rumored to close her set with the Carnival cruise line theme song, Wendroff said.

“She brought tears to my eyes when she sang the national anthem at the Super Bowl,” he said. “I hope her personality will come through just as powerful at Extravaganza.”

With the spectacular artists in attendance, Extravaganza organizers have recognized the need to step up security, as concert revellers will be likely to rush the stage to gain a closer look, according to Dan Peterson, security chair.

“I can’t believe the people they were able to get for this year’s show,” he said. “It’s going to be hard to hold back the crowd from throwing themselves upon the artists. I hope we can handle it.”

Extravaganza 1995 will take place Monday, April 31, beginning at noon in Harder Stadium.

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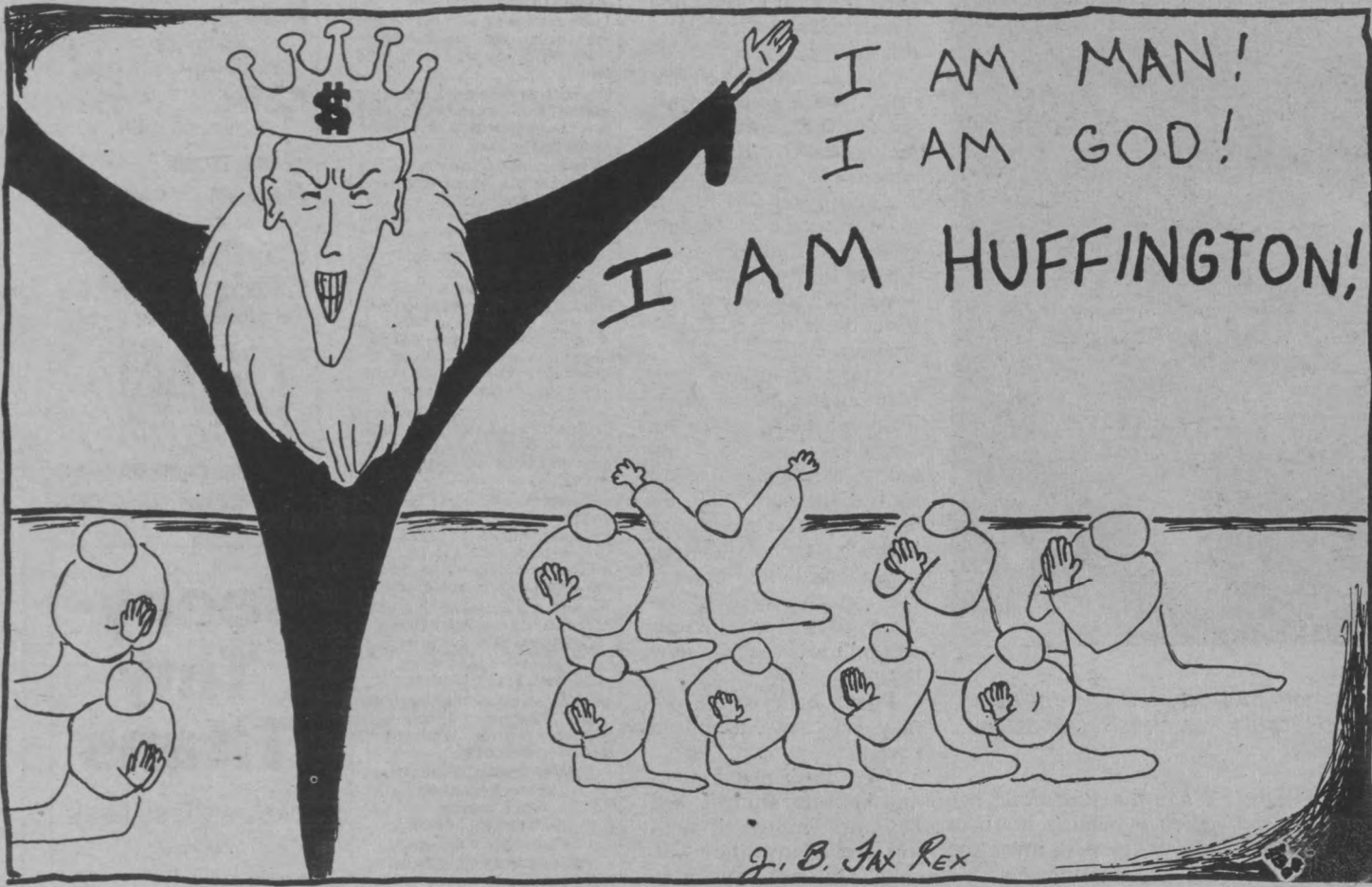

We Like Mike for President in 1996

What's *really* the matter with this country? The exponentially expanding national debt? Its declining role as a world hegemony, both militarily and economically?

A constantly increasing amount of need and quickly shrinking resources to meet it?

Not even close. America's real problem lies neither with foreign nor domestic issues, in money, food, shelter or a lack thereof. Though these pesky little dilemmas continue to occur and might merit some consideration, they are not what's killing the Grand U.S.

So what's been effectively slitting Uncle Sam's throat for years?

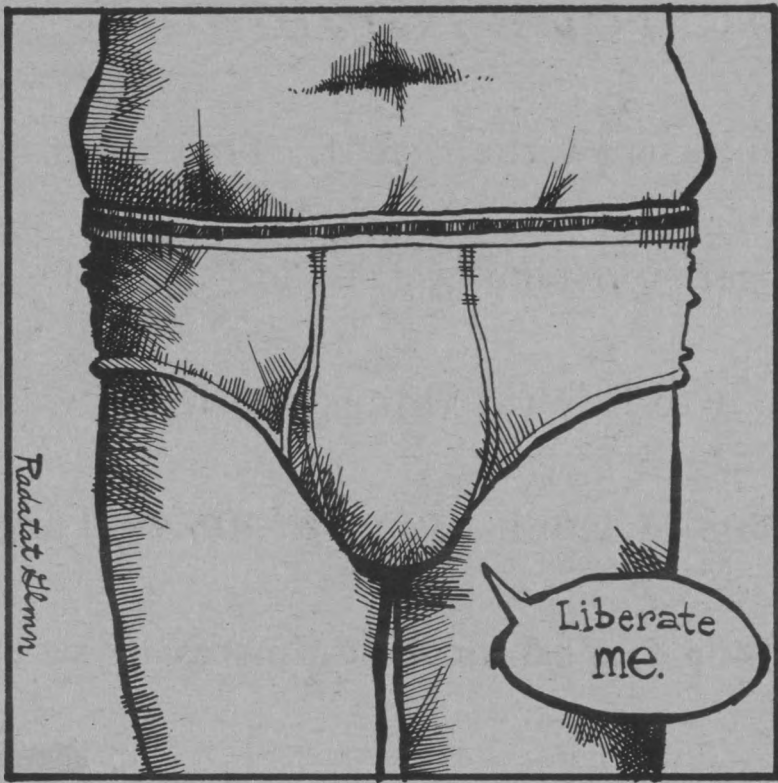

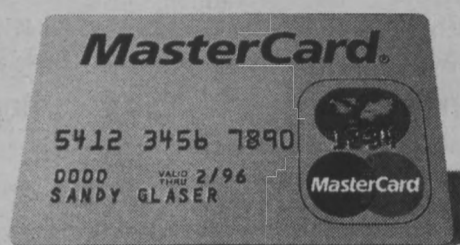
I can only hope that, through this letter, I have somewhat clarified the situation and its imminent dangers. Please join me in fighting this obvious evil.

Tyson refused to fight Flinn, saying only, "I'm ecstatic."

However, the Dynamite Kid believes he possesses the necessary qualifica-

Many expected UC Provost Walter Massey to assume the position, including Massey himself, who was despondent Friday at not receiving the appointment.

Linda Krop, an Environmental Defense Center attorney.

"I don't know what Mobil thinks they're trying to pull," she said. "That 175-foot drop is way too high — it needs to be lowered."

The park will also feature educational attractions dealing with the oil industry, according to Clarke.

"We plan on opening a

special area of the park for younger visitors to help them learn about our procedures in cleaning up spills," she said.

Special tarred-bird cleanup booths will be utilized for hands-on education in the children's area, Clarke said. Park visitors planning on participating in the attraction are encouraged to bring rubber gloves, baby oil and steel wool pads.

Black Gold Bonanza,

another interactive activity, will offer visitors the opportunity to conduct their own exploration of the depths below the earth's surface for a shot at their own oil fortune, according to Clarke.

"We think this will be a fun family activity," she said. "But each participant will be asked to sign special waivers in case of health hazards or the actual discovery of an oil deposit."

Financial assistance for the project comes from the petroleum rights group Oil Is Life, according to Leum Petro, O.I.L. chairman.

"We feel the Mobil theme park is essential to protecting and promoting the rights which oil producers and users were given by our founding fathers," Petro said. "After all, oil products don't kill, people do."

These reports were subsequently proven false by reports of a simultaneous sighting of the chancellor at a hamburger stand in Yucca Flats, New Mexico.

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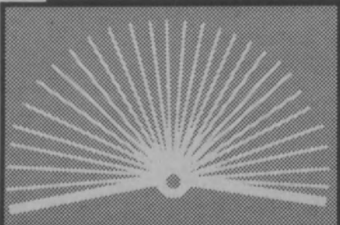
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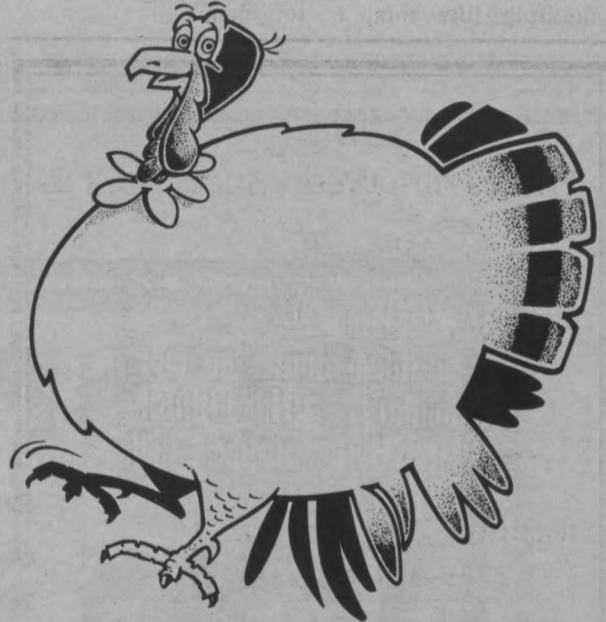

cording to Brent Foster, founder of newly created Friends of the Arroyo Toad Mutant Creature Thing.

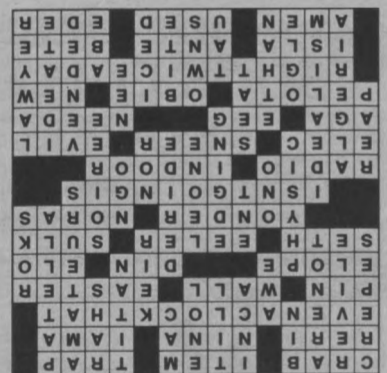
