Train Canceled to All-Cal; Rooters May Fly to Berkeley

Cancellation of the proposed rooters train to the All-University Weekend in Berkeley next week was announced by Graduate Manager Russ Erikson. Reason given was the fact that UCLA rooters will fly to the celebration instead of go by train.

Mary Ann Zane, Cal Club chairman in charge of arrangements for students on this campus of the University, said that arrangements are being completed to charter an insured DC4 passenger plane from Robin Airlines to fly Gauchos to Berkeley leaving Friday afternoon and returning at noon on Sunday.

Reservations for the flight will be \$16 round-trip, with transportation provided from Oakland airport to Berkeley. At least 64 reservations must be made by Monday, November 5, or the flight will be cancelled.

Housing Forms

Mary Ann also announces that application forms for students for the weekend are available in the Graduate Manager's Office and that as much student housing as possible may be arranged with Berkeley providing the applications are received early. Naturally nothing positive can be promised in the way of accommodations.

Tickets for the two games on Saturday are being sold for \$1.50 each with student body card, and \$3.00 without. All-University Dance tickets are \$1.80 per couple. Both are still available in the Graduate Manager's Office.

Seat Block

As many students as possible are urged to be in Berkeley by Friday morning for the University Meeting in the Men's Gym at 11 am, since there will be a block of seats reserved for Santa Barbara students.

Theme of the entire weekend is a tribute to President Robert Gordon Sproul on his twentieth year as head of the University. For this reason, members of the California Club on all campuses strenuously urge all students to attend and participate in the many activities scheduled.

In return for this, the student agrees, if the Army needs him, to serve as an officer for two years after his graduation. It also enables him to complete his education, qualify for a commission, and, if needed, to serve as an officer instead of a private.

Deferments are also available to ROTC students who have completed the second year basic and who have four semesters left in school.

One of the nation's most interesting political battles is reaching a climax in Ohio, where Senator Taft is fighting for his political life.

Two weeks ago *Life* published a line from a letter written by John L. Lewis referring to Taft as a man who "was born encased in velvet pants, and has lived to rivet an iron collar around the necks of millions of Americans."

I ran across the entire letter, as written to Mr. Livingston Ireland, president of the Ohio Coal Operators Association, and felt it was clever enough to merit publication in *El Gaucho*. Here it is:

"Dear Mr. Ireland:
 "Taft's secret political handlers propose to have him enter coal mines to cozen the men underground. This will be bad from the standpoint of coal production.

"Taft was born encased in velvet pants, and has lived to rivet a collar around the necks of millions of Americans. He is a relentless, albeit witless, tool of the oppressors of labor.

"You should refuse him entry to mines where Americans toil. The underground workings are necessarily confined, and the air therein is easily contaminated. The effluvia of the oppressor is ever disagreeable and could enrage the men to the point of evacuation of the mines. This we would both deplore.

 "John L. Lewis."
 Sometimes Lewis gets so carried away by his use of words he fails to say what he started out to say. This time I believe he has put down some clever sentences, and also said exactly what he intended to say.

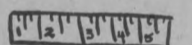

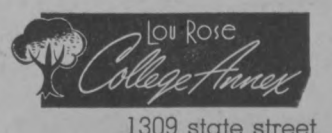

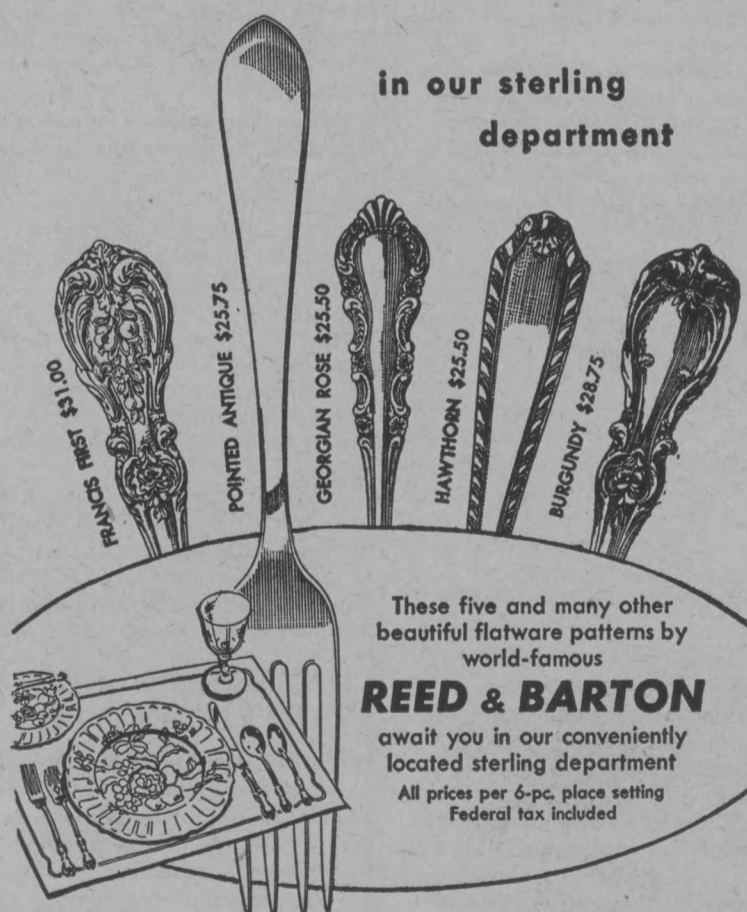

ENGLEMEN EYE THIRD CCAA VICTORY

TEAM SEEKS 2C2A CONFERENCE CROWN WITH PEPPERDINE, AZTEC VICTORIES

With two wins and no losses in conference play, the Gauchos are currently leading the 2C2A race, and a victory over Pepperdine tomorrow night, followed by a win over San Diego State, will give the Gauchos their first championship.
