
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

Stearns Wharf a Hotbed of Activity as Fire Destroys Businesses on Pier

Hundreds of spectators came from all over the area to watch as a Santa Barbara landmark went up in flames Wednesday night.

The far quarter of Stearns Wharf was engulfed in flames, as a fire that began around 10 p.m. burned through the night. Although the origin and cause of the fire are still being investigated by the Santa Barbara Fire Dept., the officer Pete Ramsdell. damage was immediately evident,

"The original reports were that Moby Dick's [restaurant] was on fire, but it will be days before they have confirmation [of the cause]," he said.

The fire was combated by several crews from throughout the county, as well as by water underneath the pier that helped suppress the flames, according to Santa Barbara Fire Dept. public information

"We have about 50 firefighters saws to cut approximately a 4-foot

out here," he said. "We have one crew from Montecito, three crews from the county and one crew from Carpinteria ... We've got the Coast Guard and Harbor Patrol [using]

The destruction on the pier was started. confined to Moby Dick, the Santa Barbara Shellfish Co., a bait shop, a maintenance shed and the fishing area. At press time the fire had been contained to this area, although it had spread to the pylons below the wharf. Johnson said the fire department had used chain-

trough in the boardwalk to help control the blaze.

According to Ramsdell, the fire department responded quickly, but the fire had already taken hold and unfavorable wind shifts spread the fire across the pier.

Dave Johnson of Santa Barbara

Public Works said the fire will probably not affect other businesses on the wharf very much.

"The likelihood is we'll reopen fairly soon," he said. "It's probably going to take two years [to rebuild

Failure to See Teaching Assistants' Union Sparks Strike Administration's

After hours of deliberation Wednesday night, the graduate student strike committee voted to initiate a strike by the end of Fall

Teaching assistants have formed the Associated Student Employees union and affiliated themselves with United Auto Workers. Failure of the UC administration to recognize TAs as employees and ASE/UAW union members has created a dispute, which will have far-reaching consequences for graduate students, faculty and undergraduates. According to Graduate Students Association Internal President Chris Martin, the possibility of a strike arose in the spring.

"Last spring [grad students] voted to authorize a strike," he said. "The way the vote was worded, if the university chose to recognize the union we wouldn't strike. So far the university has chosen not to do this."

Martin said that TAs' working conditions

are better in some departments than others.

"The main gripe came from humanities and social sciences departments," he said. "It seems in these departments TAs are taken advantage of. This is not so much the case in the natural sciences."

TAs devote a significant amount of unpaid overtime to grading papers, according

"These jobs end up being these 30- or 40-hour monstrosities," he said.

External GSA President Jesse DeAro said a group of union representatives made a unanimous decision to strike.

"Union members voted to create a strike committee made up of 11 people. It is the determiner of whether or not there will be a strike," she said.

The strike will be of limited duration, during which time TAs will not hold sections, grade assignments, e-mail or call students, according to DeAro.

"It will be a set period of time for the strike vs. an open-ended one until they get what they want," she said.

Despite the strike, grades will be calculated for the quarter, Martin said.

"[TAs] have to hand in all grades they've compiled so far and give them to the faculty member in charge of the class," he said.

According to strike committee member John Baranski, the committee's vote was based on the feelings of union members and the general level of support for the strike. "We've been talking to members one on

one, doing department meetings and having general membership meetings," he said.

According to English Professor Porter Abbott, a TA strike will force him to make significant changes to his curriculum, which currently includes essay exams.

"I don't know whether my TAs will strike or not, but what I hope to do is personally meet with sections, the ones that I can," he said. "I will have to figure out how I can design some kind of multiple-choice format final exam, something amenable to scantron

that is academically worthwhile."

Student Lobby Representative Devin Molina said efforts are underway to coordinate outreach to undergraduates regarding the strike. Tables by the UCen and announcements in lecture classes will offer information and support a letter-writing campaign to the administration, he added.

"The TA strike isn't meant to harm undergraduates. It's meant to put pressure on the administration to recognize the union," Molina said.

According to Molina, Fall Quarter grades may be delayed, and seniors or others needing the grades immediately should talk to their professors.

"There won't be any TAs to grade papers. Faculty or administrators will have to do it,' he said. "Grades will be delayed ... it's not like the quarter's not going to count."

Philosophy 20 TA Steve Fortner said that he does not plan to join his striking

"The reason I don't want to strike is partially a personal choice," he said. "I think when you decide a teacher's what you want to

in Depression, U.S. Economy Stays Strong



KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (AP) — The skyscrapers are half empty here, and the jobs are disappearing. Compare that to America, where the stock market has bounced back and unemployment is at historic lows.

Federal Reserve Chair Alan Greenspan's description of the United States as an "oasis of prosperity" in a troubled world doesn't even begin to describe the huge gulf between America's good times and many other nations' very hard times.

In all, 40 percent of the world is in recession, and this region is ground zero of the suffering. Indeed, Malaysia, Thailand, Indonesia and South Korea have gone beyond recessions to outright depressions, rivaling America's Great Depression of the 1930s.

The disparity is causing

problems as officials try to come up with solutions to help the countries in trouble.

Vice President Al Gore met with other leaders at an opulent hotel, just one of children have been taken out of school because their families can't afford tuition. In South Korea, 2.2 million workers have been laid off as the country's once mighty corporate giants face painful

Economic output already has fallen 17 percent in Indonesia and around 7 percent in Malaysia, South Korea and Thailand. In the United States a decline of just 0.9 percent in the last recession was severe enough to prompt voters to turn President Bush out of office.


And today, in stark contrast to Asia, the U.S. economy is roaring through its eighth consecutive year of economic growth, a peacetime record.

Growth will slow next year, but any fears of a U.S. recession have eased now that the Federal Reserve has aggressively cut U.S. interest rates. Those moves also have sparked a rebound in the American stock market and helped stabilize Asian markets as well.

That doesn't mean the United States has been untouched. In Washington, the government reported Wednesday that the U.S. trade deficit so far this year is running at a record annual rate of \$166 billion, a whopping 50 percent higher than last year.

The growing deficit reflects Asia's troubles. American farmers and factories have lost valuable export markets as the steep Asian recessions have cut into demand for U.S. products.

 U.S. (AP) — It is just two minutes and 10 seconds long, but it's already causing such a buzz that fans are shelling out the full cost of a movie just to get a peek.

The cause of the frenzy is the trailer of George Lucas' long-awaited prequel: "Star Wars Episode I: The Phantom Menace.

At New York's Sony Lincoln Square, Jim Dellafiore paid full price, then left after the trailer without sticking around for the feature presentation. He wasn't alone: Movie theaters across the country reported similar fan reactions.

"It's going to be excellent," Dellaftore said of "Episode

I," which won't come out until May 21.

The trailer itself won't appear nationwide until Friday. But for a few loyal fans who were in the know, there was a sneak preview in 75 theaters across the country on Tuesday.

More than 20 years after "Star Wars" exploded onto theater screens, "Episode I" is the first of a new trilogy that goes back in time. The film traces how Luke Skywalker's father was seduced by the Dark Side and became Darth

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP) — Authorities have discovered the remains of 25 children in a western state capital and fear some were victims of satanic rituals.

The bodies — almost all of them skeletons — were found in two searches in Pereira, a city of 700,000 people about 110 miles from Bogota.

Twelve of the victims were found Tuesday in a riverbed below a city highway.

The other remains were discovered last week, scattered in underbrush in a city lot, after a child came across a skull. Forensic experts believe the oldest of the victims was 16

and at least half were 10 or under, Osorio said.

Authorities were considering a range of motives, from possible "social cleansing" of suspected juvenile delinquents by vigilante squads to satanic cults.

Liquor bottles were found beside many of the victims, two of whom were tied to trees and apparently tortured, Luis Fernando Henao of the mayor's office reported.

"It's a city where satanism is widely practiced, and there's a lot of talk that children are used in rituals," said Henao.

SANTA ANA, Calif. (AP) — Orange County officials have made life a little easier for communists.

Party members no longer have to register with the Sheriff's Dept. following a sweep of outdated ordinances. The Board of Supervisors on Tuesday repealed 243 local laws deemed unnecessary, old or unconstitutional.

The law on communist registration dates back to the 1950s Cold War era, when retiring servicemen, booming businesses and a local youngster named Richard Nixon helped make Orange County a rampart of the right.

Other repealed rules include a ban on public dancing from 2 a.m. to 6 a.m. and a ban on feeding other people's



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

Left Out in the Cold

Santa Barbara's Homeless Are Rudely Being Forced Off the Streets Without Any Viable Alternative

owntown Santa Barbara has recently retained the ordinance that prohibits sleeping on benches, in parks or even on the sidewalk. The ordinance basically prohibits sleeping at all for anyone who is homeless and is enforced

by police who will be ticketing violators.

This may not seem so outlandish to the many folks who are trying to walk down State Street and are impeded by people along the sidewalk, but since not sleeping is not an option, these people are faced with no alternatives. Santa Barbara doesn't have enough shelters to house the majority of people on the streets, even when the winter shelters are open.

The ticketing was established in the hopes of driving transients away from Santa Barbara, which in itself is a self-centered solution. By sending the people away, no problems are solved, and the homeless are still without homes. They are only where Santa Barbarans can't see them.

Out of sight, out of mind has never proven to be a viable solution to any problem. Although ticketing appears to be the easy way out, it really isn't. It is therefore just a bad solution.

The other disadvantage to ticketing is that since homeless people don't have permanent addresses, they don't show up to court, and a warrant is put out for their arrest. This leads to innocent people clogging up the legal system. While a warm bed in jail may be a good alternative for someone on the streets, it doesn't prove to be a long-term solution.

The dehumanization of the homeless population is the easiest way to justify all the inhumane actions that are being taken. When it is not a person, but a 'bum,' or any other euphemism for someone without a home, it is much easier to assume that they are not human enough to deserve attention or thought. This is obviously not how people should be treated, and a better resolution to the problem of homeless people downtown is more than necessary.

Private and public organizations can work to create programs, such as those that exist in many other cities, where people can go to get a meal and a bed as well as be provided with tools to help them successfully re-enter society. By giving people an address to put on a résumé, clean clothes and a shower - along with the basic human necessities — homeless people who desire to rebuild their lives will be able to.

This idea — at first glance — appears to be an expensive endeavor, but there are many creative ways that an inexpensive alternative to sleeping on the street can be created with cooperation from the community. This will also work to help homeless people begin contributing positively to the economy once again.

The homeless situation as it is right now is clearly not working. Change is needed for both those who call the streets home and for those who live in Santa Barbara and would rather not be confronted with stepping around homeless people on public streets.

But an inhumane and non-proactive solution such as ticketing is not the right temporary or permanent solution. The money shouldn't be wasted, but postponed so that homeless people can sleep in peace until the time when a plausible alternative other than Vivarin is presented.

HELP PROTEST FORCE-**OUT OF I.V. LATINOS**

Editor, Daily Nexus:

As concerned students within the Isla Vista/Goleta community, we felt it necessary to notify UCSB students about the ongoing housing crisis.

In recent months, 18 Latino families were evicted from their homes, and are now forced to search for immediate housing in an environment boasting a mere .2 percent vacancy rate.

And what did they do to be tossed out of their homes? Was their rent late? Were they "problem tenants"? Did they violate any part of their housing contracts?

No — their cases do not fall under any of these categories. We believe they have been unfairly targeted because of their lowincome status. In spite of their willingness to comply with rent increases (to pay for improvements that have yet to be completed), the landlords still insisted on their eviction. IN FACT, IT IS COMPLETELY LEGAL FOR OUR LANDLORDS TO EVICT US WITHOUT ANY JUSTIFI-ABLE REASON.

This type of injustice is not new to the Isla Vista community. A similar instance occurred in 1994, where Latino families were pushed out of their own homes to facilitate student housing. The landlords, in the absence of a "just cause" law, can continue to evict whomever they choose whenever they find it beneficial to their own interests, fiscal

This not only affects these Latino families, but also has an impact on the community as a whole, especially students. Due to the constantly changing face of Isla Vista, it becomes easy to manipulate incoming students into thinking that the new rent prices are fair. With their limited knowledge of independent living, students tend to be the victims of landlord neglect.

Obviously the unification of students and families acts as a necessary means by which we can combat unfair landlord practices. One way we can do this is by supporting a "just cause" law. Laws of this nature exist in other cities such as Santa Cruz and San Francisco. A "just cause" law is one that requires a landlord to produce probable cause before evicting any given tenant.

A way you can support this "just cause" law is by signing the Just Cause petition. For



Without the Jews, Israel would be Palestine.

That is my point. Recently, Israel has agreed to a 13 percent withdrawal of troops from the West Bank. This is under the condition that the PLO cooperate in protecting Israel against terrorists and that the PLO revise their constitution, which calls for the annihilation of the Jewish State.

Since the initial signing of the Oslo Accords in 1993, Israel has withdrawn from many parts of the West Bank and Gaza, while Palestinian terrorists have continued to kill dozens. Peace is something that the PLO cannot hand over.

The destruction of the Jewish nation is not only a fundamental part of their constitution, but is also a fundamental idea within

their Islamic beliefs. Last August, Yasser Arafat, the PLO chair, expressed his thoughts on the peace process. He stated that "Peace will not prevail and security and stability [will not] be achieved without the return of Jerusalem to its homeland and owners."

Until then, buses bringing 10-year-old children to school will face the risk of being bombed. The lives of innocent market-goers will be in the hands of suicide car-bombers. And until then, my roommate will have to call his sister, who lives there, to know if she survived the last terrorist attack.

The Jews are home. The pledge of their forefathers has been redeemed: Jerusalem is being rebuilt. May every Jew have a part in this rebuilding, for this year, and the year after, and the year after.

be, you decide on an obligation that's similar to a doctor or firefighter. What you're doing is sacred enough that you don't up and decide to withhold your services for financial or political reasons ... I plan to be available to my students, possibly holding sections off campus or outside to show solidarity."

According to DeAro, some departments have stated that they will not take action against striking TAs. However, the administration has had a negative reaction to the possibility of a strike, she added.

"There's been a couple of memos sent out to campus that are misleading," DeAro said. "With these kinds of threats in the background, the feeling is if you go on strike you could get fired. It's kind of misrepresenting facts."

A memo from acting Provost Everett Zimmerman to department chairs states, "Teaching assistants ... are not primarily employees ... collective bargaining can intrude into matters of

academic judgment;" and that "it is entirely permissible for faculty ... to encourage [TAs] to refrain from striking" without the use of threats or harassment. According to a "Know

Your Rights" handout distributed by the UAW, however, "your employer cannot ask how you feel about unions, strikes, or any related topics."

UAW organizer Mike Miller said any strikerelated discussion with an employer is potentially

illegal.
"Even to encourage a TA to go on strike is technically a violation of the law," he

Zimmerman said his memo simply reiterated university policy.

"What I'm stating is what the university policy is. This is not my original composition," he said.

Hughes, the Sociology Dept. union-bargaining representative, Associated Students and some departments have shown support for the strike. In a memo responding to Zimmerman's memo, Hughes stated that

83 percent of the more than 600 union members at UCSB voted for the strike.

"Women's studies, black studies, and Chicano studies have all issued statements in favor of striking TAs," Hughes said. "A.S. on Wednesday passed a resolution unanimous except for one abstention that holds the administration responsible for any disruption to their education."

According to Baranski, unanimous graduate student support for the strike is not

"You don't have to have every TA going out. You only have to have 30 to 40 percent of TAs to disrupt the system enough or to cause recognition," he said. "At other universities where According to Glyn graduate students have struck to get a union, it's only taken a third to get the administration to recognize

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
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

San Francisco Keeps UCSB at Bay


■ Layup With Eight Seconds Left Gives USF One-Point Victory

It was fast-paced. It was exciting. It was everything that UCSB fans had been missing. However, the one thing Santa Barbara men's basketball fans haven't been missing had to spoil an almost perfect night.

In UCSB Head Coach Bob Williams' debut, the one thing lacking from the home opener in the Thunderdome on Wednesday night was a victory.

Facing the University of San Francisco, UCSB had a chance to

pull out its first win under Williams, but fell in the final seconds,

Being able to pick apart USF's full-court defense, Santa Barbara took an early control of the game by breaking through whatever the

However, with 5:43 remaining in the first half, the momentum changed, and San Francisco took its first lead since the opening basket. Senior Gerald Zimmerman, who had only practiced twice after coming off a knee injury and a family emergency, hit a three-pointer to put the Dons up 25-24. Zimmerman finished as the game's top scorer with 24 points, adding five rebounds and a blocked shot.

"He's only practiced twice in the last month and a half," USF Head Coach Philip Mathews said of the 6'6" guard. "He just got off a plane this morning at 11 o'clock coming from Florida. For him to come through like that just shows what kind of guy he is as a senior, and that he's a leader on this team."

Sophomore Chris Lynch and senior Josh Merrill hit a pair of free throws each, and a layup by senior B.J. Bunton enabled UCSB to take a five-point lead. But, USF then went on a 12-3 run to close out the first half and take a 37-33 lead into the locker room. Merrill led UCSB in points and boards with 18 and six respectively, while Bunton chipped in 13 points.

San Francisco began the second half where it left off by taking an eight-point lead. However, the Gauchos wouldn't fold and came back strong to make the contest a tight match.

Santa Barbara used an 8-2 scoring advantage to tie the game at 52-52 with 8:52 to play. From Dons threw the Gauchos' way. there, it was a seesaw battle with

neither team getting more than a six-point advantage.

"I thought we showed that we were a little resilient, and when we took care of the ball up court, we actually played pretty well," Wil-


Down by six with 6:48 left, junior point guard Derrick Allen hit a trey off a feed from junior Erick Ashe. Moments later, Allen (five points, seven assists) returned the favor by dishing a dime to Ashe (10 points, four assists) for his own three-pointer, tying the game at 62 with under six minutes to play.

Down 68-66, San Francisco sophomore Ali Thomas drained a three with under a minute left after two offensive boards by his teammates kept the Dons' possession

The Gauchos came right back looking to score. Payton (15 points, six rebounds) drove baseline and made a nice reverse layup to send the home crowd into a frenzy with the thought of victory on their minds.

"I'm always thinking of a way to get to the basket or making a score," Payton said. "I saw the big man coming up and he played me baseline, and I knew I could beat my man. So I went by my man and just reversed it when I went up."

USF brought the ball down court to find a break in the Gaucho defense. Sophomore James Lee found wide-open freshman Russell Hinder underneath the basket, and he dumped the ball in to give the



HOOK ME UP: Senior B.J. Bunton and his 13 points weren't enough for the UCSB men's basketball team Wednesday night.


Dons a 71-70 lead with eight seconds remaining.

"I have to take that one square on my shoulders," Williams said of the play. "I didn't make a good adjustment, and I didn't give us a fair opportunity to win that with the last defensive stop."

Allen took the in-bounds pass and drove up court, forcing a layup that didn't fall, which ultimately

handed the Gauchos their secondstraight defeat out of the gates.

"We talked that if they did make a bucket we wanted as deep an inbounds as we could get it to the point and push it and look for the first easy shot or take it to the rim," Williams said. "Derrick did everything he could to get something positive to happen, he just got a little too deep.'

Cats Can't Keep Up With Speedy Gauchos

The runnin' and gunnin' UCSB women's basketball team opened its season, and some eyes, last night with a 101-89 victory over Northwestern University in Evanston,

The #22 Gauchos ran the Wildcats out of their own Welsh Ryan Arena with a fast-paced attack that saw seven players score in double figures for Santa Barbara.

"We want to play up-tempo," UCSB Head Coach Mark French said. "We want to run, that's our style. We've recruited players that play that way."

Northwestern All-America Candidate Kristina Divjak led all scorers with 27 points, but the Gauchos' high-octane offense had too many weapons.

"I like knowing that our sixth player is as good as our fifth," UCSB junior Kristi Rohr, who led

the Gauchos with 20 points, said of Santa Barbara's depth. "We don't have to hold anything back on the

Northwestern simply wasn't ready for the fast-breaking UCSB (1-0 overall) features.

"It was like chasing a track team," Divjak said. "They just came out of a cannon and were scoring at will on the fast break. We need to not get caught up in the other team's tempo."

"[UCSB] didn't stop breaking," Northwestern (0-2) shooting guard Dana Leonard said. "It was unbelievable. We just couldn't get back on defense quick enough.

Sophomore Erin Buescher led Santa Barbara with eight rebounds. Four other Gauchos had five rebounds, including Rohr. Junior Tawneé Cooper had 12 points and a game-high nine assists. Sophomore Rachelle Rogers poured in 16 points, five boards, two assists and two steals.

Santa Barbara shot 55 percent from the field and 79 percent from the charity stripe.

French, whose squad will now travel to Madison, Wis., to face a tough Badger team, is thrilled that Santa Barbara is able to cut its teeth on a pair of Big Ten competitors.

"We were really looking forward to coming [to the Midwest] and opening with a great Big Ten program," French said. "We were looking for a great game and certainly got it."
