The Ramones show at The Graduate last Sunday was more like a party than a "concert" (small club, friendly atmosphere and lack of skinheads) and was one of the funnest shows I've ever been to. 





Finally, as the afternoon wore on (this was a 2 p.m. Sunday matinee show!), the Ramones took over. complete with smoke machines and went from one tune to a 1-2-3-4-nother fast and tight. There's no stopping the cretins from bopping, and bop the throng did. Good clean bubblegum music and good clean sweaty fun. This being the fifth Ramones tour I've seen their set hasn't changed much. "Durango 95" blasted into "obotomy" and a variety of others from every and all Ramones albums — an assortment that easily could have been It's Alive or Ramonesmania on the stereo at full blast. (Incidentally, this was also the first Ramones show I'd been to where my ears didn't physically hurt from the decibels and no speakers were blown.) 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


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NAILED TO SOUND

Back from record hell I bring forth fruits of my searches.... A new record label from Delaware, N.T.S. ("Nailed To Sound"), creates a new avenue for dark and eerie workers for the technology of tomorrow. Music technology, that is. Some call it "Industrial" or "Agreppo," but it is comprised of concrete explosive rhythms, distraught vocal patterns, bold synth and sampled choruses of confused aims. N.T.S. brings us two artists, Spit and Batz Without Flesh. Spit is the midwestern answer to Foetus, the man of many, the answer to few. The highlight of the three-song EP is entitled "Valsalva Maneuver." A man and his drum track make an inseparable combination. Sampling and rhythms put the listener through a short "Hellraiser" sequence. The ultimate in pain and pleasure simultaneously. The A side is substantially different in that it leans toward Pailhead's speed and anger, a punk-ish appetizer for the next N.T.S. release. Number two in the catalogue is Batz Without Flesh, borrowing ideas from Frontline Assembly and the power of Skinny Puppy. Reaching past Canadian style to a more English electro vein, ala Ganzheit. The track "Futureshock" is an example of synth vs. drums, a battle whose victory may not be seen in our time. Five tracks provide the consumer a taste of American strength in a virtually virgin area of electronic music.
