The Night Patrol.

If of all the taxes personal service is the most intolerable, there never was a community more oppressively, grievously burdened than ours. For the last fortnight the citizens have been formed into a patrol, whose detachments of cavalry even, as well as infantry, nightly visit the purlieus of our quiet city.

Each night ten peaceful burghers, accustomed in the tedious muniments of war, assemble at half-past eight at the Mayor's office, whence they sally

To guard the ship from foe or wreck,

there appearing to be, for the metaphorical ship in question, as much danger of one kind as of the other to guard against. Nevertheless, the ten peaceful burghers, without pausing to examine nice points, and in the true uninquiring military spirit, tramp, tramp until daylight, sleepily lugging the quarter master's rifles through every nook of Doctor Haley's celebrated survey. Nought do they, from sun to sun, encounter that is scandalous or unlawful; nought to check, quell, arrest or report, except the loud mouthed barking of their predecessors in the watching business—the wild dogs unreduced to the state of sausage in this most correct of California communities—or else the acrimonious queries of ten varas of red bayeta, startled from hymeneal slumber, and wondering whether Castro or Fremont has "come again." Nevertheless, they pursue their uninterrupted watch; nor could they more cheerfully discharge their tedious obligations if Ali Baba and the forty thieves stood at the gates of the city.

No law obliges them, no startling impending danger rouses them to unwonted energy. They merely obey the extrajudicial injunction of their vigilant Mayor and the Resolutions of a popular meeting.

Now if the number on guard every night is compared with the Election returns, we can hardly express too much admiration for the patriotism exhibited by our citizens.

The town contains fifty-eight Fremont men, one hundred and thirty-three sturdy Democrats, and eight followers of Mr. Fillmore's policy, out of which total number of one hundred and ninety-nine voters, ten are willing, once in twenty nights, to exchange their warm beds for a cool stroll through the streets. Surely the Spartan mothers would not disdain to call us sons. Not the devoted San Francisco firemen, not the defenders of historic Saragossa, not even the warlike Parisians—who, rather than surrender their city to a Protestant king, fed on Madame de Montespa's fearful bread, until that commiserating prince "took to water," viz: got baptized—ever manifested more heroism and public spirit.

Other communities may boast more liberality in their charitable donations, more system in their municipal regulations, more enterprise in their public and private improvements,—other cities may have a police deserving somewhat the name, streets that are streets, jails that are jails, and taxes that are taxes, but we, no sooner is it proclaimed that "vigilance is the price of personal safety," than forthwith we subscribe—just five per cent. of our sleep, and, unlike many of the subscribers of this Gazette, pay up as soon as called upon.

Ever since the institution was organized but one case of insubordination has been reported to the Mayor. One of our most influential citizens, when called upon yesterday by the City Marshal to "meet him at the town's end," declared, "I'll not march through Coventry to-night, that's flat." And he did not, so that Coventry, ungraced by Falstaff, had to be content with the substitute Peto for once.

THE FIRST RAIN. The first rain of the season fell here on Saturday and Sunday last. Not enough fell, however, to penetrate and moisten the parched earth to the depth of an inch. The drying wind from the northwest, which set in immediately after the rain, has preserved whatever of grass seed there was remaining on the ground.

Probate Court.

Hon. CHARLES FERNALD, Judge.
MONDAY, Nov. 24.

Russel Heath filed a petition to be absolved from all further liability on the bond of A. B. Thompson as guardian. Order entered requiring new bond to be filed within ten days after service of notice.

In the matter of the estate of Crisanto Lorenzana. Inventory filed by executors, and the homestead, household furniture, and the property exempt from execution, set aside for the use and benefit of the widow and minor children.

In the matter of the estate of Jose Jimeno. On petition filed last term, letters of administration ordered to issue to Antonio Jimeno.

In the matter of the will of Jose Dolores Ortega, deceased. On petition of N. A. Den, the first day of next (December) regular term set for hearing proof of said will. Ordered that citations issue to heirs, and that subpoenas issue to subscribing witnesses.

In the matter of the estate of Manuel A. Rodriguez de Poli. Petition of widow for letters of administration on said estate filed, and Tuesday, the 9th December set as special term for the hearing.

Several petitions of guardians presented and disposed of.

THE SOURCES OF THE NILE. We learn from English papers, that the Expedition initiated by the Viceroy of Egypt, to discover the sources of the Nile, and which for months has occupied the attention of the learned in Europe, has, after unavoidable delays, started under the command of Count d'Escayral de l'Auture.

The Count having been authorized by the Viceroy to select twelve assistants, sought in Austria for officers of topographical celebrity; in Prussia for a well informed engineer; in France for naturalists; in England for nautical assistants. An excellent photographer, (M. Clague of New Orleans), so necessary on such an exploration, was furnished by the United States. The instruments necessary for observations were obtained in London, Paris, Berlin and Vienna.

This expedition, which has for its object the discovery of portions of Africa where the foot of the white man has never trod, promises to make us better acquainted with these unknown regions than we are with some parts of Europe. It has been furnished with everything that can insure success, and will be accompanied by a sufficient escort for its protection. The Count d'Escayral has had great experience. Thus the problem of the sources of the Nile is near its solution, and the interior of Africa will probably be opened to science about the same time that the Red Sea, through the Isthmus of Suez, will be opened to the commerce of the world. The Count and his companions were to begin the ascent of the Nile at Cairo, on the 1st of October, and its return, which may be looked for towards the end of 1858, will prove a great event in the scientific world.

Captain R. Burton, so celebrated for his daring visit to Mecca and Medina, and his journey to Abyssinia, is also about to start, under the direction of the British Geographical Society, for East Africa, for the purpose of penetrating to Lake Unidmes, and, if possible, to the sources of the Nile.

ENTERPRISE. Our citizens, says the Town Talk, have long maintained a reputation for enterprise beyond that of any community in the Union, and an example bearing on this occurred on Saturday. The mail steamer having arrived just as the up-river boat departed, before the mail was deliverable, Mr. J. W. Sullivan, who provides the interior with Atlantic and foreign news matter, made up his mails and chartered the steamer Martin White for Sacramento. The Martin White left at midnight on Saturday, and arrived at Sacramento at noon on Sunday. The interior stages having left, wagons were immediately chartered, and in half an hour the western, southern and Marysville packages were en route for their destination. This enterprise involved a cost of over \$800, which is by no means a small amount to one in the newspaper line. Mr. Sullivan has earned his position and extensive connection by his individual enterprise. At present he receives over one-half of the California semi-monthly mails, besides receiving an individual express via Nicaragua. In every town and mining camp he has his agents, through whose hands he distributes the enormous amounts of reading matter he receives from the Atlantic and Europe. Such enterprise as he displays is certain to thrive.

The Philadelphia Journal states that a firm in that city holds the government contract for making postage stamps, and that they produce no less than 14,000,000 per annum. The stamps are for 1, 3, 5, 10, and 12 cents, to suit distances as provided by law, the great bulk of the manufacture being of 3's, as might be anticipated. The firm are now making arrangements to perforate the sheets, so as to facilitate the separation of the stamps—which is practiced in England. The stamped envelopes are manufactured under contract by a firm in New York. They turn out 1,500,000 per week, one half of which number is for the government.

The yellow fever had nearly disappeared from Brooklyn—only two cases were reported during the fortnight preceeding the sailing of the steamer.

A complete statement of the cotton crop of the United States for the year ending August 31st, 1856, has been made out. The total receipts amount to 3,527,845 bales, being the largest quantity ever sent to market during a single year; but it includes about 300,000 bales left over from the preceding year for want of facilities for sending it to market.

THE BENICIA RAILROAD. The Granite Journal has information that Mr. Judah, the engineer of the Benicia and Sacramento Railroad, has brought encouraging accounts from the Atlantic States, and that the Company intend to put the work in hand immediately.

The schooner Laura Bevan, Capt. Morton, arrived in port this morning, from San Pedro.

LIGHT HOUSE

NEAR
SANTA BARBARA,
CALIFORNIA.

A FIXED RED LIGHT, 4TH ORDER OF FRESNEL, Illuminating the Seaward half of the Horizon

The Light House consists of a plastered dwelling of one and a half story, with a low tower, also plastered, rising through the roof. It is situated at an elevation of 146 feet above the sea, two miles south-westerly from the landing at Santa Barbara, and about 550 feet from the brink of the bluff. The light is 180 feet above the same level; but from the red color, and low order of lens, it will not be visible for the range due to that elevation. It should, however, in a clear atmosphere, be seen 10 to 12 miles.

The latitude and longitude of the light, and the magnetic variation in the vicinity, as given by the Coast Survey, are as follows:

Lat..... 34° 23' 35" N.
Long..... 119° 42' 05" W.
Mag. var..... 13° 30' E., November, 1853.

The light will be first exhibited on the night of the 1st of December, 1856, and every night thereafter until further notice.
