Professor Jumps in the Arena of Politics

Capps Makes Plans to Seek Nomination for a Seat in Senate

A prominent UCSB professor announced this week his intention to seek the Democratic Party's nomination for the 22nd District congressional seat in the June primary.

Walter H. Capps, who has taught religious studies since 1964 and is currently the department chair, said Thursday he plans to bring democracy back into national politics. He hopes that through education, he can make the process a more representative one.

"Politics has replaced democracy, that's my thesis," Capps said. "The whole political process — the way it's done, the dependency on the media, the consultants — there's a whole sub-culture of political candidacy that tends to leave most people as observers looking in from the outside."

He said he will file his candidacy papers before the March 16 deadline, and that he has already been endorsed by U.S. Senator Bob Kerrey (D-Neb.) and former Santa Barbara Mayor Sheila Lodge.

"He's the best," Kerrey said. "We need him here because he has such an unusual approach to life and politics. He would change this institution so quickly."

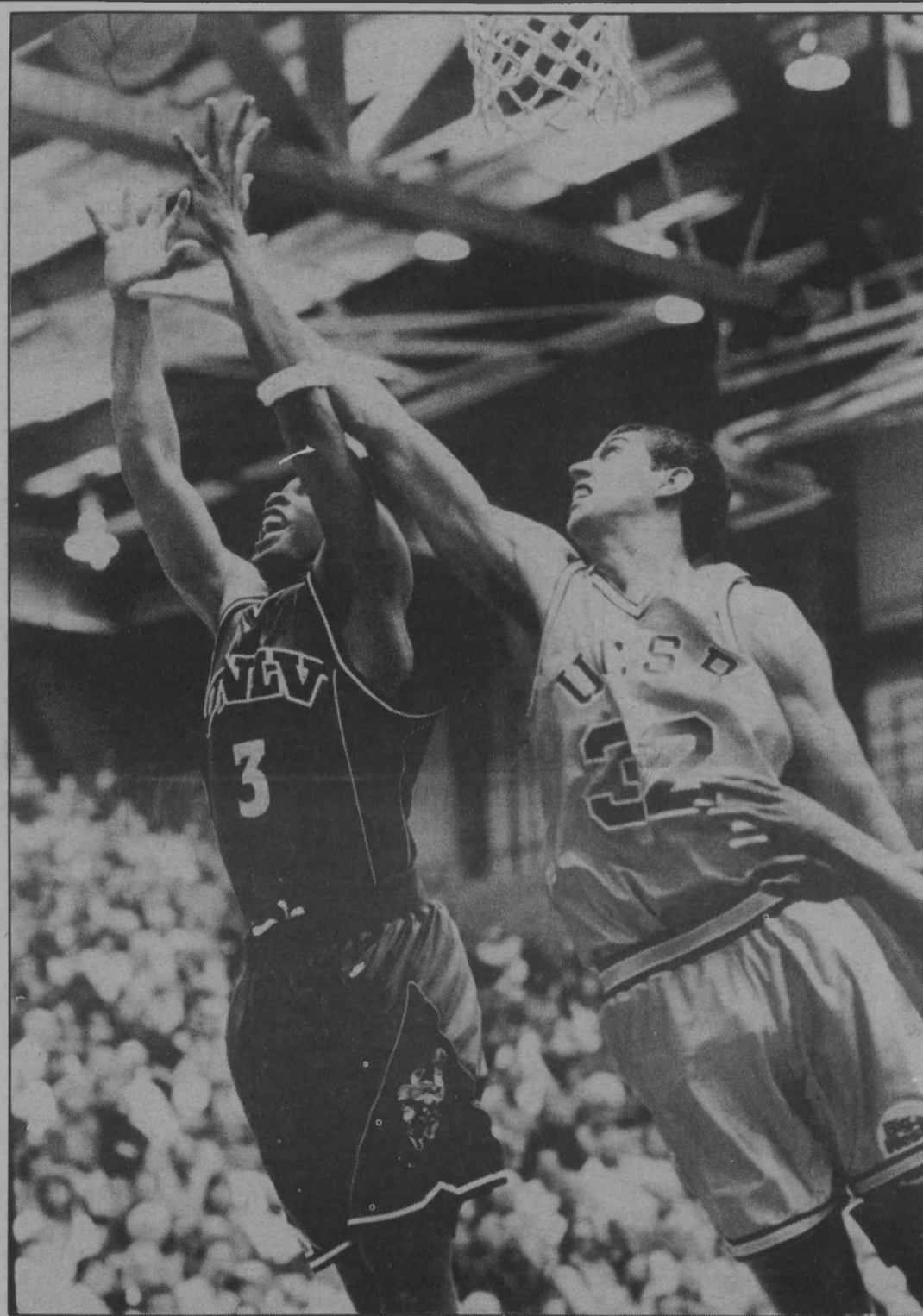
Kerrey, a Vietnam veteran, is a longtime colleague and friend of Capps. They co-taught a course on Vietnam at UCSB several years ago and toured the Soviet Union together on a U.S. diplomatic mission in 1988. The senator is also willing to visit Santa Barbara to bolster Capps' candidacy.

"I would love to come out and campaign for him. I don't have any dates yet, but I'd love to. I would even run against him if it would help him," he said.

The race for the 22nd District, which encompasses Santa Barbara and parts of San Luis Obispo County, will be without an incumbent since current Rep. Michael Huffington is making a run for the senate.

In addition to Capps, Marty Stone, a former staffer for State Sen. Gary K. Hart, and Hilda Zacarias, a Santa Maria book-

Number of Sexual Assaults Decline in I.V.

Property damage escalated above half a million in private and public dollars last year, but the number of sexual assaults reported declined from previous years, according to a UCSB on-campus crime statistics report.

A recent round of computer thefts brought overall losses to an estimated \$559,067, the monthly crime and police activity report said.

"The total dollar loss is pretty staggering," said Campus Police

Lt. Antonio Alvarez, who has observed an increase in petty thefts, such as stolen CDs and backpacks during the beginning of each quarter.

Nevertheless, although the number of arrests increased, principally for auto thefts and burglaries, campus crime declined 2% in 1993, according to Alvarez.

Burglaries rose 22% last year; 39 were forced entries. Computer-associated and hardware thefts have provided the biggest problem in property crimes, Alvarez said. Police statistics report no robberies last

year, decreasing from four cases in 1992 and aggravated assaults remained steady at two incidents.

"As a whole, violent crime is down with the help of community involvement in safety and security and the police outreach," Alvarez said of the campus environment, excluding Isla Vista. "We're a very open community, because of the volume of people; we're a fairly safe and secure environment."

Vandalism and graffiti continue to plague the university,

Businesses in I.V. Reflect the Changing of the Times

Problems for Isla Vista businesses began as student unrest fizzled out in the 1970s, and some believe the town will never regain the feeling of its early years.



"There were different kinds of stores to define the times," said UCSB Ombudsman Geoffrey Wallace. "The 1970s saw the beginning of the [Isla Vista] Fud Co-op and the expansion of the health clinic. It was a very good time for institutions."

One institution, Kinko's Copy Shop, opened in 1974 when owner Paul Orfalea set up a single copy machine in a shed across the street from the store's current location and sold students pencils and other stationery items.

"No matter what happens, Isla Vista will always be known

Stacey Koon Seeks Vindication, Money

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Even from his prison cell, Sgt. Stacey C. Koon is going after Rodney King. In a letter-writing campaign seeking vindication and money, Koon warns that unless his conviction is overturned, "neither you nor your family will be safe from the likes of hardened criminals like Rodney King."

Koon and three other officers, all white, beat King, a Black motorist, after a traffic stop in 1991. All four policemen were acquitted of state charges; those verdicts ignited three days of rioting in Los Angeles.

Koon and Officer Laurence Powell were convicted last year in federal court of violating King's civil rights. Koon is serving a 30-month prison sentence.

Earlier this month, a police disciplinary panel ruled that Koon should be



fired. In the four-page letter, Koon portrays himself as a political scapegoat of "black radicals and self-serving liberal politicians." He calls King "a muscle-bound, 6-foot-4-inch brute," and claims that he himself and Powell were "sold out by weak politicians and a deceitful news media."

The letter asks for donations between \$20 and \$1,000. Anyone who sends \$30 or more is promised a free copy of Koon's book, *Presumed Guilty*, which sells for \$22.95. For a \$50 contribution, Koon

says he'll try to autograph the book.

Koon said he needs the money for legal appeals, as well as to feed, educate and clothe his five children.

The mass mailing campaign was handled by a direct mail distributor who bought mailing lists from magazines, police officer organizations and other potentially sympathetic groups.

The letter is accompanied by excerpts from the book and a form on which to send a message to Koon's wife, Mary.

There is a multiple choice section that includes responses such as "Yes, I agree. You got a raw deal," or "No, I don't believe you. You got exactly what you deserved."

Koon's publisher said Mrs. Koon has received thousands of letters. "They are 20 to 1 positive," said Al Regnery of Regnery Publishing Inc., which is based in Washington, D.C.

Regnery, who helped coordinate the mass mailing, declined to give a total amount of donations. He said the average contribution has been about \$25, with one or two contributions of \$1,000.

The letter is written on letterhead stationery that says "Sgt. Stacey C. Koon, L.A.P.D.," but is not official department stationery. It was first mailed in November. A second batch went out recently.

City Admits Liability, Avoids Litigation

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The City of Los Angeles' offer to admit liability for Rodney King's beating and pay "actual damages" is too good to refuse, a federal judge indicated Thursday.

But U.S. District Judge John Davies warned it will not preclude a civil trial for defendants other than the city.

Attorney Skip Miller, representing the city, told Davies: "The city wants to put this incident behind the city and the citizens of Los Angeles," and will pay King an amount set by a jury for medical costs, loss of employment and pain and suffering.

A second phase of the trial would address punitive damages, but Miller noted outside the court that the city is not liable for such damages and would not have to participate.



Admission of liability would save the city from litigating such issues as the Los Angeles Police Dept.'s use of force policies.

Attorneys for some of the policemen charged in King's beating opposed the plan, suggesting it would leave the officers open to massive punitive damage judgements by a jury conditioned to feel it owed King money for wrongs the city admits he suffered.

"It may be convenient for the city, but it's leaving Mr. Wind out there to

dry," said Russell Cole, attorney for former Officer Timothy Wind. Wind was acquitted in two trials but was fired by the police department and is a named defendant in King's civil suit.

Michael Stone represents Officer Laurence Powell, convicted of violating King's civil rights. "The officers have no standing to stop the city from rolling a wheelbarrow in here filled with money to pay Rodney King. But the officers have to be able to participate in a

damages trial," Stone told the judge.

Attorney Ira Salzman, who represents Sgt. Stacey Koon, complained that punitive damages could haunt his client long after he finishes serving his prison sentence for violating King's civil rights.

"He's serving his time and paying his debt to society," said Salzman. "But punitive damages last forever."

Salzman told reporters the city's offer was based on expediency.

"They allowed a gun to be put to their head," he said, "and they blinked."

King, who did not attend the hearing, is seeking \$9.5 million to settle the case. The city council offered him \$1.25 million.

The amount of actual damages has not been specified and would be determined by the jury.

Vote Reasserts Home Schoolers' Power

WASHINGTON (AP) — Stunned by a campaign that flooded Capitol switchboards, the House attempted Thursday to reassure Americans that the federal government will not try to license parents who teach their children at home.

Opening debate on reauthorization of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, the House, by a 424-1 vote, approved an amendment that says nothing in the bill applies to home schooling.

The amendment, sponsored by Rep. William Ford (D-Mich.), stripped from the bill a clause that would require school districts to certify that full-time teachers are qualified to teach their assigned subjects.

"It's an unnecessary solution to a nonexistent problem," said Ford,



chairman of the House Education and Labor Committee.

The lone dissenter was Rep. George Miller (D-Calif.), who saw his language stripped from the bill. He called the vote a "tragic ending to this story" and said it would result in children being taught by unqualified teachers.

Miller's spokesman, Daniel Weiss, said the congressman would have accepted language stating explicitly that the certification requirement applied only to public schools.

House members were pressed into action by thousands — some said tens or even hundreds of thousands — of phone calls, letters and faxes from those who feared the federal government was trying to assert its control over home schooling. Religious broadcasters and some talk shows picked up on the message.

The House also approved, 374-53, an amendment by Rep. Dick Armey (R-Texas), that goes even further than Ford's. It states that "nothing in this act shall be

construed to permit, allow, encourage, or authorize any federal control over any aspect of any private, religious or home school." It said the language "shall not be construed to bar private, religious or home schools from participation in programs or services under this act."

Armey said his amendment was necessary because 17 states consider home schools as private schools. Home schoolers declared victory.

"We had real reason to be afraid," said Mike Faris, president of the Home School Legal Defense Assn.

"If they meant all public schools, all they had to say was all public schools. If they meant all schools that receive federal funds, all they had to say was all schools that receive federal funds."

Lock-In Votes Debated at Meeting

Wednesday night's Associated Students Legislative Council meeting sparked some debate, as members were unable to resolve voting on a bill that would eliminate lock-in funding on several A.S. entities.

The debate concerning budgetary lock-ins focused on the question of fairness in providing the Women's Commission and Student Lobby with preferential funding while other A.S. committees and student groups are accountable to annual budget processes.

Off-Campus Rep Miriam Rabin believes the bylaw change is in order. "When they vote for us they know that we are going to be handling the budget," she said. "I don't think any of the groups should be protected better than any others."

Rep-at-Large Kris Kohler objected to the removal of these budgetary lock-ins,

however, and said an even stronger mechanism should be installed in their place.

"My long-term goal would be to have them be constitutional lock-ins," he said.

Only portions of the bylaw change were passed, including the instatement of a \$20,000 cap on funds allocated to A.S. Legal Services.

The council, however, tabled voting on removing the predetermined funding for the Women's Commission, Student Lobby and the \$10,000 A.S. financial aid grant until an alternative funding mechanism is devised.

The bill proposed last week to clarify the system of one-time funding for otherwise non A.S.-funded student groups passed, as well as a bill to change the structure of the Women's Commission.

Continued from p.1 students on how to participate in different AIESEC programs," said Ben Kiblinger, local AIESEC committee president. "The conference is linked to our mission, which is to improve cultural understanding between the different people of the world."

The organization sponsors an International Traineeship Exchange Program which encourages local firms to hire foreign students, in turn opening up opportunities for American students to work for companies in participating countries.

Much of the conference will focus on teaching new members more about the organization and provid-

ing marketing technique training, said Erik Lavin, organizing committee president and AIESEC external vice president.

"Another big training session is selling AIESEC," Lavin said. He added that this is an important method of encouraging local companies to take foreign students to work for them.

While the new members are learning about AIESEC and various techniques, the veteran members will be honing their skills. "The more experienced leaders problem-solve and discuss inter-regional communication," said Mark Warmerdam, a senior business economics major and AIESEC member.

This traineeship conference marks the first meeting the local AIESEC

chapter has hosted since 1989, Lavin said. To secure jobs overseas, members must ensure companies complete the paperwork to bring foreign students into the company.

The employment these students obtain opens up opportunities for them to stay employed by these companies. "These are really high quality jobs overseas," Lavin said. "We trade over 6,000 students worldwide, and we're in 78 countries."

IMPORTANT POINTS ABOUT THE VOLUNTARY FEES

What does voluntary mean?

Voluntary means that you may pledge or agree to donate a predetermined sum of money. This amount will be billed to you through the University of California BARC system each quarter from the time of your agreement to pay until you state you no longer wish to contribute or you are no longer a registered student (temporarily or permanently).

Will the fee also be collected during summer session?

No.

By voting YES on these two measures am I required to make a contribution?

No, each of these measures only establishes the opportunity for students to contribute.

Will these new voluntary fees reduce my mandatory fees to A.S., G.S.A., UCSA, etc.?

No, these voluntary fees will be collected in addition to your mandatory fee obligation.

What fee mechanism will be established to assess and collect these voluntary student fees?

If this election measure passes, students are simply approving that a mechanism be developed. Currently, three mechanism options have been posed to the University of California Board of Regents for approval.

What are the three possible fee mechanisms?

A student can be assessed a voluntary fee by the University via one of the following: a positive "check-off," a negative "check-off," or a pledge system. A positive check-off would mean that before you are assessed this fee you must indicate to the University to assess the specific voluntary fee. A negative check-off would mean that you must actively indicate not to be assessed a particular fee. The third, a pledge system, requires signing a pledge card before you are assessed the fee.

What is UCLC?

The University of California Lobby Corps is comprised of one graduate and one undergraduate representative from each of the nine campuses. It will operate independently from UCSA's educational function within the University of California. Further, its focus will be determined by the representatives from the campuses. Its focus will be to generally represent UC student interests to California state government agencies and representatives.

Who will be eligible for the UC Lobby Corps voluntary fee pool?

The UCLC fee pool is designated exclusively for that organization.

Can the UC Lobby Corps voluntary fee ever exceed \$5.00 per quarter?

No, not without another campus-wide vote.

Who will be eligible for funding from the student activities and organizations voluntary fee pool?

The student activities and organizations fee pool will be administered separately by the Associated Students' Legislative Council for undergraduates' contributions and the Graduate Students Association's General Council for graduate students' contributions using their already established financial procedures and practices.

Do campus organizations who do not want to change the purpose of their group in order to qualify for mandatory fees automatically qualify for voluntary fees?

No one automatically qualifies for receiving voluntary fees from the voluntary fee pool. Student groups must apply to their respective student governments, and based on established policies and practices, a funding determination will be made on a case by case basis.

Can the student activities and organizations voluntary fee ever exceed \$2.00 per quarter?

No, not without another campus-wide vote.

What if the voluntary fee range question(s) fails to receive a majority vote?

The Associated Students' Legislative Council and the Graduate Students Association's General Council will still use the criteria as stated in questions 2 and 4 on the ballots.

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CRIME: Lack of Reported Rapes May Be Cause for Downfall

Continued from p.1 with 74 incidents of property damage, increasing slightly from 71 in 1993. Alvarez attributed the increase in part to the campus expression wall in Storke Plaza.

"The expression wall is a beacon to the other people not from our community to use the wall. On their way out, they do their graffiti where it is not intended," he said, adding that there was a significant decrease in graffiti last summer when the expression wall was removed. "The wall went up and then the vandalism went up."

The biggest continuing concern for police, bicycle

thefts decreased 14%, with 362 incidents reported on campus. "They are our number-one property theft for many years," Alvarez said. "The sheer volume and accessibility make them very lucrative."

Augmenting the efforts of the Campus Police is the Community Security Organization. Despite a 40% staff reduction, the CSO has managed to continue to effectively patrol campus premises and ward off potential thefts, said Coordinator Deidre Acker.

"We've been more effective and strategic with our patrols concentrating on bikes," Acker said. "Maybe the reports are down because there are

less of us here in the office ... we're all out on campus."

However, several arrests have been made regarding suspicious individuals observed prowling near bike racks or possessing tools typically used to steal bikes, according to police.

Law enforcement officials attribute the decrease in bike thefts to stepped-up security, instituted after last quarter's computer thefts.

"We have concentrated this year to direct our patrols to be on campus core areas to suppress criminal activity to prevent computer thefts. The fallout has been a decrease in bike

thefts," Alvarez said.

Excluding unreported incidents, UCSB has also experienced a dramatic decrease in rapes, with five in 1991, one in 1992 and none in 1993. Alvarez attributed this to student prevention education and awareness.

"Although we didn't have any [rapes] reported, we know that too many do go unreported," Alvarez said.

Fear of public scrutiny, unfamiliarity with the legal system and social attitudes can discourage victims of sexual assault to report crimes, said Cheri Gurse, coordinator of UCSB's Rape Prevention Education Program.

"It is definitely my belief that these numbers are not representative of the reality of incidents occurring," Gurse said. "I fear that it is the continuous fallout of the way media has treated those who have gone public since the Anita Hill and Mike Tyson trials. I hope we can turn that around."

Until two years ago, UCSB had seen a steady increase of reported rapes taking place on the premises, Gurse said.

"I believe that there are many more sexual assaults and rapes occurring, but more [victims] this year than in previous years have chosen not to report," she said.

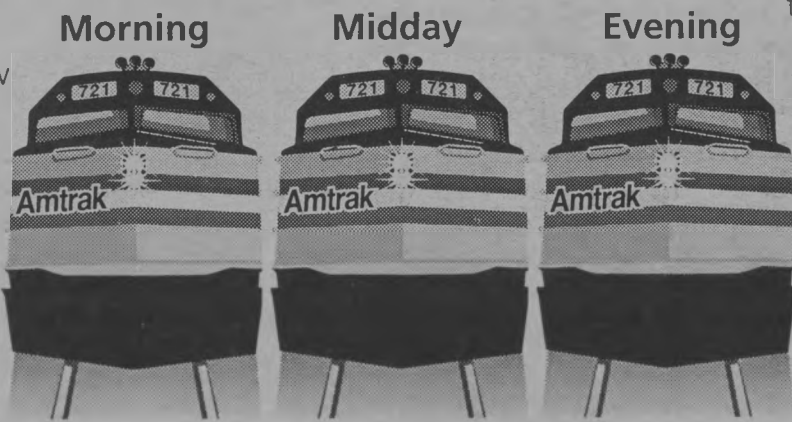

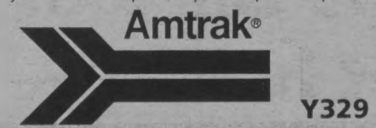

Today, Orfaea owns nearly 400 Kinko's shops in the U.S., Canada and Australia. Although he sold his first store in 1976, he reportedly longs to have the old I.V. store back in the family.

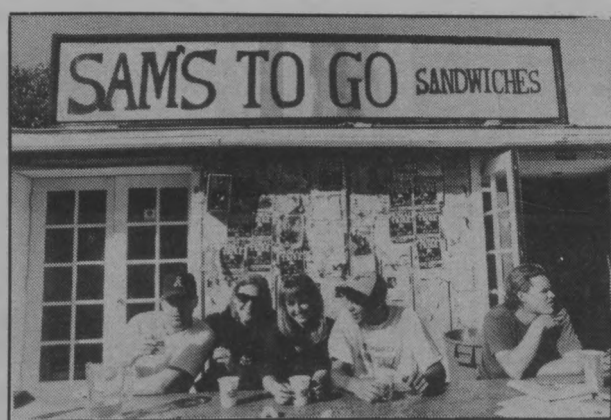
According to Assistant Dean of Students Yonie Harris, before the Fud Cop opened on Trigo, a variety of restaurants filled the space, including the Rhythm Café, which provided international cuisine and entertainment.

"It was an example of a business that contributed diversity to the community and provided wonderful food and entertainment," Harris said. "It gave people something to look forward to. ... It had a very eclectic clientele."

Harris worked for two years at the Rhythm Café, which closed its doors in 1979. She performed as a belly dancer every Friday night and as a gypsy guitarist either solo or with a flamenco dancer.

"The community was more interactive back then," she said. "I'm sure there's a sense of togetherness that goes on on [Del Playa] when there's live bands, but that's directed at a particular segment of the community."

Other cafés, such as Borsordi's, a traditional 1950s-style café located on Embarcadero Del Mar, tried to keep the commu-

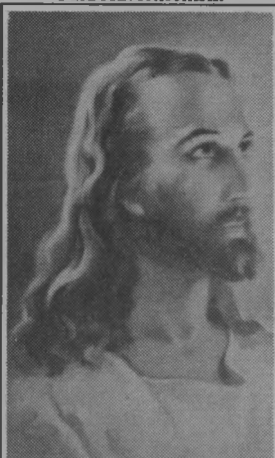

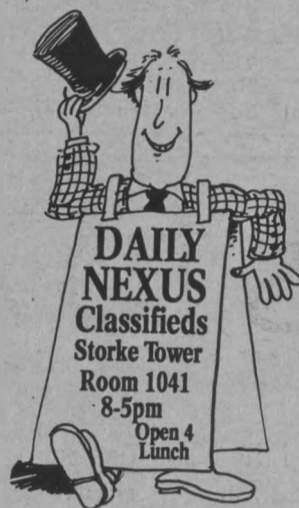

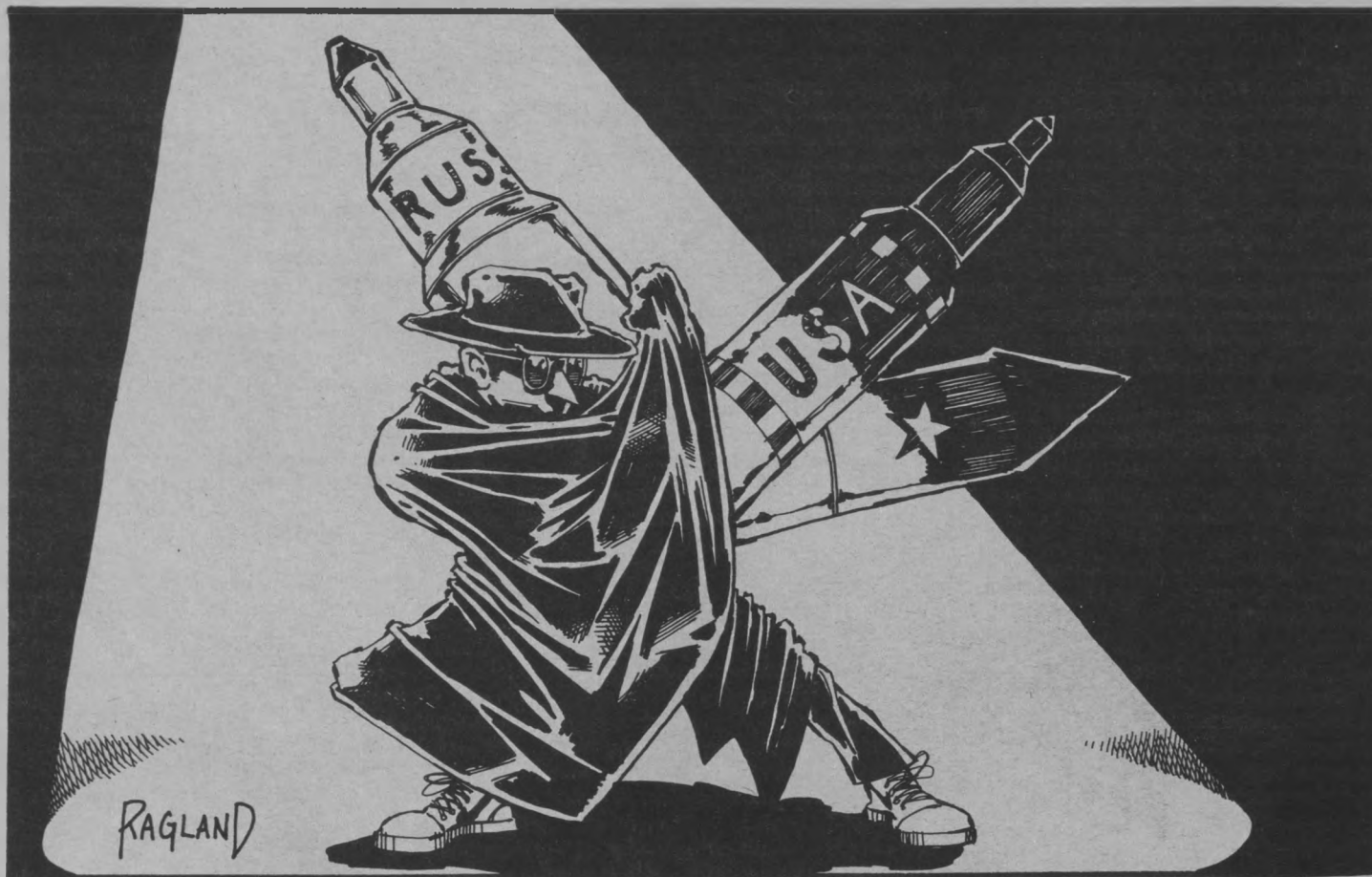

The High-Tech World of Espionage is Stuck in the Politics of the Iron Age

There were a number of folks writing in literary magazines over the past few years who wondered if the end of the Cold War between the U.S. and the USSR would spell disaster for the spy novelists of the world — Ian Fleming's successors, like Tom Clancy and Clive Cussler. Perhaps they worried needlessly.

The Cold War may be over, but that fact hasn't penetrated the big brains behind the "international intelligence community," or at least the masterminds at the CIA and the FBI. Witness the brouhaha and egg-facedness evident this week with the revelation that high-ranking CIA official Aldrich Ames has been leaking information to the Russians for the past 10 years or more. Looks like Tom Clancy might be back in business real soon, eh?

Now Clinton administration officials are rumored to be scrambling to figure out what to do about all this spying at a time when U.S. aid is being readied to stabilize the Russian economy. 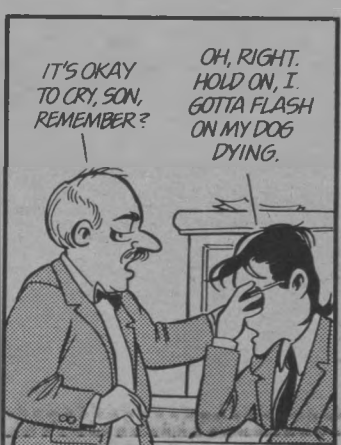
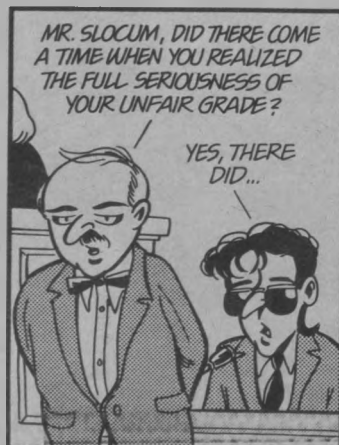
That would be too bad, it's a shame when people become obsolete.

With all these things in mind, I kicked back on my couch and watched the 55-minute video. It's about what you would expect: a series of interviews with a dozen 18- to 22-year-old women who, in scenes spliced in with the interviews, take all of their clothes off (artistically, of course). Now, as one who tries to be a reasonably good feminist, my first reaction was that this kind of thing is objectifying, that it dehumanizes these women and is nothing but sexist garbage. But as I listened to these women talk about their goals and aspirations — while proudly displaying their athletic, stark naked bodies — I couldn't really dismiss them as mere sex objects. I listened as much as I looked.

Take Michelle Diamond, a psychology/criminal justice major from Rutgers. Her segment starts with a minute or two of her comments about who she is and what she's all about, followed by a scene in which she plays Beethoven's Moonlight Sonata on a grand piano in a candlelit room.

"I really just want to be happy in whatever I do," she says of her career goals. "I'm really not concerned with making a lot of money, I just really want to do something that I enjoy."

And there's this comment from Amy Summers, a flannel-wearing marine biology major and skin-diving fanatic from the University of Oregon: "I still want to get married and settle down, but I think I have a lot of living to do first."

Sound familiar? It is — almost everything these women talk about are themes echoed by most other people our age. In fact, with the exception of the fact that they get naked in front of the camera (tastefully, of course), these women are like any confident and extroverted students who attend UCSB or any other college. They want to start their own businesses or pursue careers that give them a lot of freedom; they like to have fun, work out, dance and play sports; they're concerned about the environment and with other people.

None of these people are two-dimensional, airbrushed floozies with bobbling breasts who expose themselves for money — they are smart women who are satisfied enough with themselves to say, "Hey world, look at me!" Sure, they roll around naked in interesting ways to the sound of cheesy music; but then again, don't we all do that once in a while?

There are a few serious questions about body image and the reinforcement of beauty stereotypes that this video raises, but no more so than the rest of the mass media. While

only a couple of the women are the stereotypical blonde, buxom centerfold type, most of them are in fact white women with big boobs. Although I concluded that the video celebrated female beauty more than it exploited it, it must be said that the folks who made the film have a narrow view of what that beauty is — which is truly unfortunate. The personalities of the models may reflect the times, but that doesn't mean the organization has to.

Meanwhile, there is just enough comical objectification — all of it dealing with men — to make this video slightly hysterical. Several of the sequences in which the women undress are supposed to be sexual fantasies, and include nameless, muscle-bound studs running around with heaving chests and with no shirts on. These guys have no speaking parts and are just in the scene as ornaments for the ladies, making this a strange *Playboy* video indeed: the guys end up sexually objectified while the women are humanized.

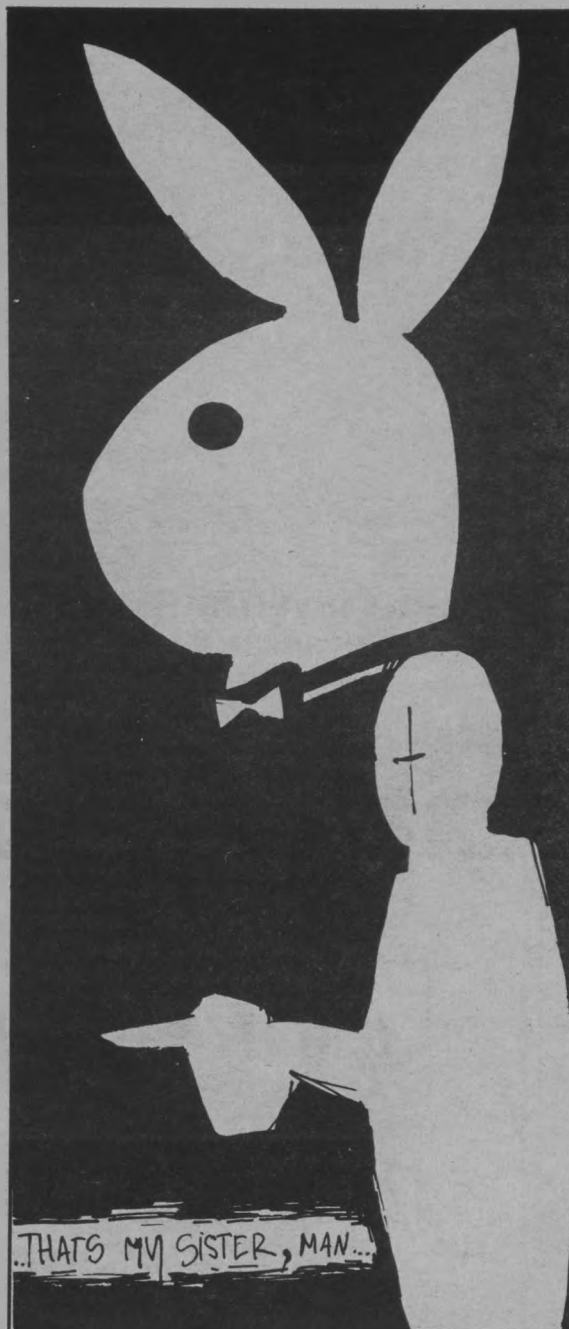
Kind of refreshing, actually.

But the main issue for me while watching this video was trying to get over the feeling that these women shouldn't be taking their clothes off on my TV screen, and that if they were really intent to do so that I shouldn't be watching. I believe that there are some serious problems that come with pornography, but I finally concluded that I shouldn't feel ashamed to see and appreciate someone's body if they are going to get naked regardless.

Ty Erickson of Oklahoma State says, "a woman's body is beautiful, it's art," and she's right — the body isn't dirty, disgusting or anything that we should have to look away from. Whether it is in painting, sculpture, photographs or film, the naked human form is a beautiful one that should not inspire shame or insecurity. There's really no reason why these 12 women — or anyone — should refrain from displaying and taking pride in their bodies. We shouldn't be ashamed to show ourselves for who and what we really are; birthmarks, scars, moles and all.

Besides, when it comes to entertainment, I think we'd all rather go streaking than go to a Solvang country music festival.

Censorship and the Search

Back in 1969, the U.S. was involved in one of the most influential and profound transitions of its development. A recount of that history is not the intention of this space, but it needs to be acknowledged. What is important to note, however, are some very recent and ongoing transitions this campus and its community are endeavoring in which harken back to that previous intense, visionary idealism. What is at issue here is censorship.

This archaic, repressive form of oppression was supposed to have died with the signing of the First Amendment. But, as history has shown, the Constitution is only valid when the rulers need it to be. This paragon of democracy has seemingly vanished like the Spanish Inquisition.

Because of the ambivalent nature of the Constitution, there are as many ways to get around its blockage of censorship as the amount of forms it can take. The current chancellor search that UCSB and the University of California Board of Regents are conducting is just one type. By not disclosing the names of the final candidates to the general campus, UC President Jack Peltason and the search committee have censored information that should be public. President Clinton reveals the names of all his prospective nominees, so a much lesser power should not hesitate to do the same.

This tactic is clearly political so that the regents can empower themselves to discriminate among the "candidates" without imposing public scrutiny on themselves. For all we know, this could mean that there is only one candidate who has already been selected, much as Peltason himself was appointed by Governor Pete Wilson for reasons not entirely based on educational potential.

Supposedly they are protecting the candidates from their current employers, but for what reason? Are these CEOs perceived to be as unprofessional as this search process has been? Why not disclose the names of the lucky candidates. Maybe someone will be able to pick up a character trait that might lead a chancellor to extort and embezzle university money, mishandle funds, or not know when to say when, and save the institution some embarrassment. The more people researching the candidates the better. Imagine if Justice Clarence Thomas (aptly named, by the way) was nominated without disclosing it to Anita Hill.

There are, of course, other forms of censorship, which usually is not the better part of discretion. Cervantes, Shakespeare and Voltaire are among those who outwitted the most famous kind. But it still manifests in other forms, and that is why 1969 was mentioned earlier. In March, the film *Midnight Cowboy* is scheduled for a re-release in honor of its 25-year anniversary. This movie is not noteworthy for its best picture nomination, or even the best actor nominations of Dustin Hoffman and John Voight. It is certainly not news that Hoffman was involved in a movie

that helped define and characterize the voice and plight of a generation. Remember *The Graduate*? The news about this movie is that it was rated X. No other X-rated movie has had such critical success.

Today, we can be concerned with such a monumental breakthrough because of people like Maxine Waters and Martin Lawrence. Lawrence is from *Do the Right Thing* and the TV sitcom "Martin." I'll get back to him. Waters is a U.S. congresswoman who has been on Capitol Hill fighting for the same rights won during the civil rights movement. She is defending rap music.

She is not defending the actions of people such as Tupac Shakur or Snoop Doggy Dogg, who are the epitome of why rap has received such a bad rap. Ever since the 2 Live Crew obscenity case reached the national spotlight, African-Americans' positions in the entertainment industry have become a national concern. Wasn't Jim Morrison arrested for the same thing in Miami in the '60s? Morrison, however, was dubbed a poet and solidified his legend for that incident, while legislatures continue to deny that rap is poetry today. Waters indeed is defending rap because it is a "new art form" developed and mastered by "our children." This last fact may precisely be the problem.

It is needless to say that Waters has received much criticism, but it is interesting that the most derisive is stemming from other Blacks. Influential African-Americans such as C. Delores Tucker, chair of the Political Congress of Black Women, are among those who agree that gangsta rap glorifies misogyny and violence.

Waters, whose district includes much of South Central L.A., contends that gangsta rap only uses the language that society has provided them and that "just because we don't like the symbols they use or the way they look, we should not allow that to cause us to embark on a course of censorship." She argued this point and many others in Senate Judiciary Committee

hearings designed to explore the supposed link between hard-core hip-hop and crime, the most recent of which was Feb. 23, 1994. This room of mostly white old men is sure to understand the plight of the inner-city and adjudicate based on that knowledge.

Lawrence is under this same sort of criticism for his new feature film. This movie is the same concert genre that Eddie Murphy, Steve Martin and Richard Pryor used to catapult into superstardom. Lawrence no doubt is hoping for the same result, but he has a problem the others never did. He is rated NC-17, which is the modern equivalent to an X-rating, and most of the audience generated from his TV show is too young to see the film.

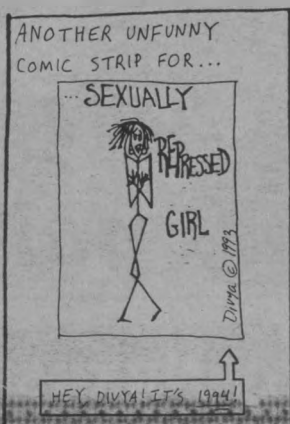
Martin also has the reputation facing many rappers in that he is seen as a militant white-hater with a loud mouth ... a sort of Eddie Murphy and Malcolm X combination. He believes that censorship is being used to keep the white man in power, a belief that has many merits. There are still people who are afraid of Black men, or any man of a different race with money and power because a united front could overthrow today's establishment. This is probably why Lawrence will not take out the disputed scenes, as the makers of *Basic Instinct* did, to soften his rating. If Donahue can discuss masturbation at four in the afternoon when many kids are home, why does Lawrence receive an X-rating? Donahue must be an expert masturbator.

Whether the claims that racism is the motivating factor are true will never be known. And, apparently for many of the same reasons, the nominees for this campus' top job will be kept a secret. We who will have to call this person "boss" will just have to trust that advances have been made since the original release of *Midnight Cowboy* and that democracy will not be tainted. The amenders seem not to take their own amendments as law, which seems to suggest that we all should find amendments we don't feel like adhering to and see what happens to us. Maybe you'll get elected.

 eeper and tax consultant, are seeking the Democratic nomination for the seat.

Assemblywoman Andrea Seastrand (D-Santa Barbara County 5th District Supervisor Mike Stoker and Wayne Reddoch are each seeking the Republican nomination.

Capps is known nationally for his UCSB course "The Impact of the Vietnam War," which has been featured three times on CBS television's "60 Minutes." He served as the

director of UCSB's former Center for the Study of Democratic Institutions from 1979-80, and is currently on the steering committee for the UC Washington D.C. Center program.

The professor said he will maintain his academic posture, always staying open to new ideas and not allow politics to make him jaded.

"People tell me I'll change my views once I get into it, but there's no way that I am going to become a politician," he said. "I have always been a teacher and a scholar and a writer.

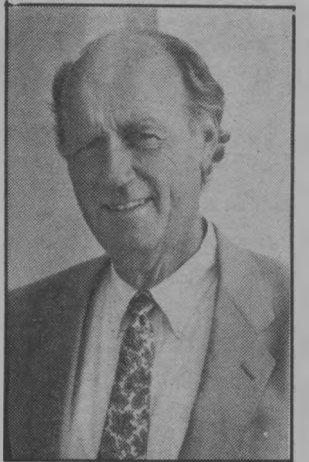
"I'm also thinking about how much I would learn. I

think if you're in a place like that you can draw on the resources of that environment and get stimulated by it. I would like to see how democracy works," he said.

Though the professor's opponents entered the congressional race somewhat earlier, he is not worried about being an unknown.

"I'm way ahead in name recognition because I've lived here 30 years," he said.

Religious studies Professor Richard Comstock, a longtime colleague of Capps, said he was delighted to find out his in-

tentions to run for Congress. "He will make a good candidate.

 University Center on campus made it difficult for any coffee service to survive.

"Business isn't good anywhere, [and the UCen] can advertise outside of campus, but we cannot advertise on campus," said Bosordi's manager Leonard Friedman in 1982. "Additionally they are offering more services each year."

Bosordi's never recovered. It changed hands many times throughout the 1980s and in 1987 fi-

nally closed its doors.

I.V.'s poor economic condition in the 1980s can be attributed to a series of bad policies set into place by agencies controlling the town, said former Santa Barbara County 3rd District Supervisor Bill Wallace, who came to I.V. with his family in 1970.

He believes collusion between the UC and a former group of county supervisors caused fiscal disarray from which I.V. may never recover. Bill Wallace moved out of I.V. in 1991.

Passage of the Goleta Water District's ballot Measure T in 1986 allowed

the exploitation of lots zoned for single families on the town's west side by those looking for a quick buck. Students migrating to the new construction drove families away, which has left businesses dependent upon a nine-month, student-driven business cycle, the former supervisor said.

"It was a gross and horrible mistake that the University didn't buy I.V. the same way Stanford bought the [land surrounding their campus]," Wallace said.

A new era of franchise investment in I.V., with es-

tablishments like Domino's, Subway and most recently, Burger King, is setting the stage for the 1990s.

After 20 years of service, La Jicora, Burger King's predecessor, closed its doors in 1992, leaving longtime residents reminiscent.

"The day they closed we came together for breakfast and lunch; it was an interesting and revealing day," Harris said. "I found the community again and we all realized we were losing a big part of our life."

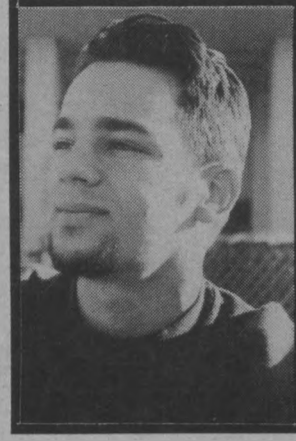

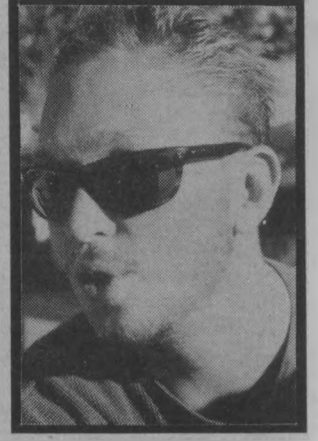

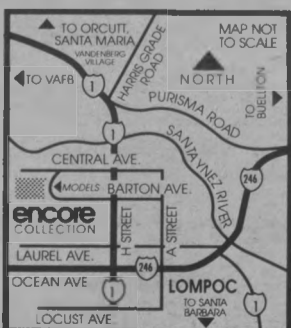

Spikers Hope to Win in Rumble at CSUN

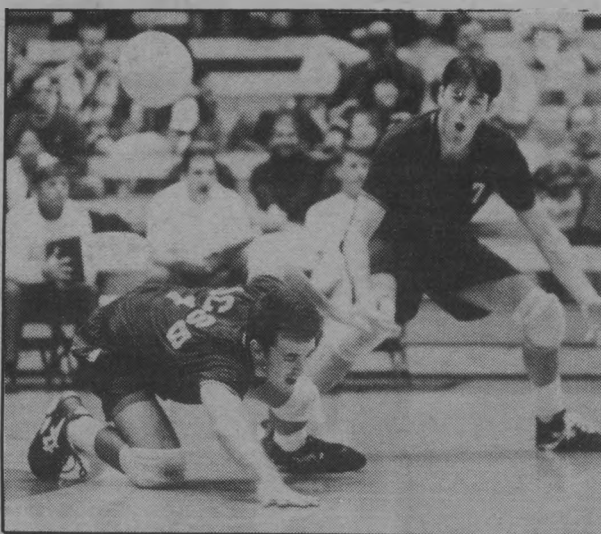
After re-entering the nation's top-10 since its departure on Jan. 24, the longest span in school history, the #10-ranked UCSB men's volleyball team will look to continue its upward ascent tonight at 7:00 when it travels to the EpiCenter of last month's earthquake to take on Cal State Northridge.

The contest will be the first conference matchup between the two teams since the Matadors eliminated the Gauchos from playoff contention in the last match of the 1993 season. Despite the fact that the '93 Matador squad lost four starters, including three-time All American Coley Kyman, Northridge

(6-3 overall, 2-1 in MPSF) has defeated UCSB (6-6, 3-3) in the preseason and again at the ASICS Grand Prix Tourney two weeks ago.

"We played CSUN down in the tournament and lost in four, but they're a very beatable team," junior outside hitter Daren Torbet said.

"I think Northridge is a good team, but I don't think they're great," Head Coach Ken Preston commented. "They have a good middle attack, good passing, and their back row is good. They're a pretty disciplined team especially their block, but they're not a great blocking team. They have good team enthusiasm and they're a good sideout team. But if we can sideout with this team, I think we can beat them."

Santa Barbara, which is coming off its biggest win of the season last Saturday versus #6 Pepperdine, is led by junior middle blocker Carter Reese, who was named MPSF Player of the Week after amassing 23 kills (.465) and 11 blocks against the Waves. In MPSF play, Reese is averaging 3.6 kills per game,

1.69 blocks per game (sixth in MPSF) and has a 40.5% hitting efficiency.

Torbet has also been playing huge as of late, hitting .446 (seventh in MPSF), while setter Todd Rogers has been the most consistent player this season, averaging 12 assists per game and 2.4 digs per game.

UCSB Baseball Team Has No Comfort on Road

By the time the UCSB baseball team finishes this weekend's series against Loyola Marymount University, they will have played ten of their last twelve games on the road. The Gauchos have another road game on Tuesday at Pepperdine before returning to Caesar Uyesaka Stadium for a nine-game home stand.

"It's tough being on the road," UCSB Head Coach Bob Brontsema said. "It's still not an excuse for how

we're playing, because we're not playing well at home either."

The team is not getting the job done at the plate, on the mound or in the field. The Gauchos are hitting .235 and have an on-base percentage below .350. Their pitchers continue to give up an average of more than eight runs per game, and are plagued by control problems — having walked more batters than they have struck out. Defensively, the team has

been shaky, committing an average of two errors per game.

"We can't afford to be giving up two or three unearned runs a game," Brontsema said. "It's a lot to overcome."

Centerfielder and lead-off hitter Doug Smaldino continues to be an offensive bright spot for the Gauchos. His two runs batted in against Cal Poly San Luis Obispo gave him a team leading total of 16

in only 13 games.

This weekend's series begins today with a 2:00 p.m. game at LMU.

"We don't want to be known as a team that other teams can pad their stats against," UCSB shortstop Matt Bokemeier said. "We need to claw and scratch our way back to .500. There's still a lot of things in front of us. Nobody's quitting yet."

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Aggies Crush Lady Hoopsters on Road in One of UCSB's Worst Performances

Things have not been going well for the UCSB women's basketball team lately.

In Las Cruces Thursday night, it found out just how bad things have gotten.

The Gauchos were crushed by New Mexico State, 81-55 in one of Santa Barbara's worst performances of the season. The defeat is the second in a row in conference play for the Gauchos and drops them to 13-11 overall and 10-6 in the Big West while the Roadrunners improved to 20-4 and 12-3.

The difference in the game came in the form of sophomore phenom Anita Maxwell, who poured in 28 points on 13-17 shooting from the floor and pulled down 10 rebounds. As a team, NMSU shot 61% (39-64) from the floor for the game and 68% in the second half. UCSB shot 35%.

The game started well for Santa Barbara as it jumped out to an early 9-0 lead on a Dio Aguinaldo steal and lay-in with 17:18 remaining in the half.

But NMSU answered with a 20-0 run, holding UCSB scoreless for over seven minutes. Maxwell scored eight of her points

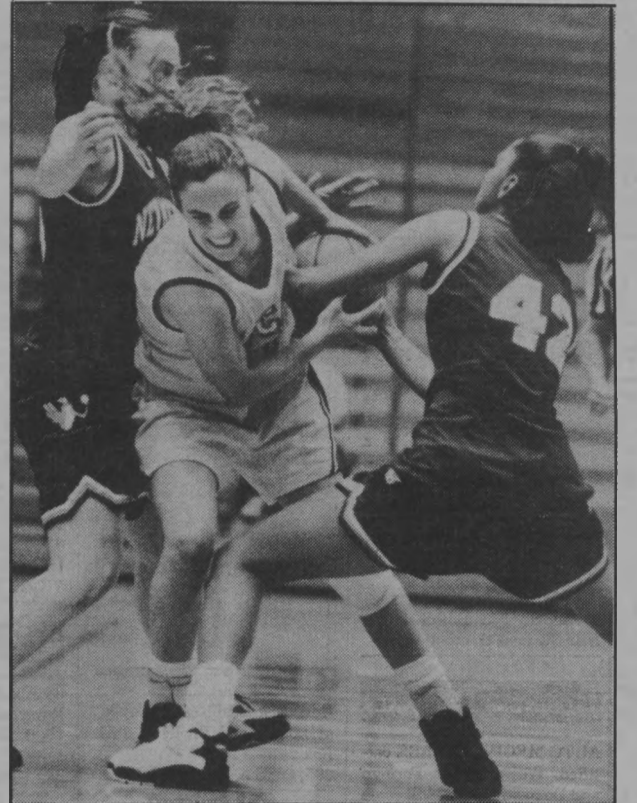
during the run.

"We had a lot of trouble with our off-ball defense," UCSB Head Coach Mark French said. "We had a lot of trouble getting through screens and they were able to make six or seven passes in a row and get easy shots. Our on-ball pressure was pretty good, but off the ball we were slow and against a team like New Mexico State, that's a real problem. I don't think we've ever had a team shoot 60% against us."

In the second half, the Gauchos cut the lead to 46-35 on back-to-back baskets by Amy Hughlett and Kristine Grazzini with 15:56 left in the game. But once again the Roadrunners answered, this time going on a 20-6 run over the next 5:38 to blow the game open. NMSU got its biggest lead at 79-49 with 2:52 to go on a Maxwell lay-in.

"It's a real big concern for us," said French of his team's late second half defense. "I think it has more to do with confidence and focus than anything else. We're just not focusing."

Santa Barbara's next opponent will come in the form of the Rebels of UNLV in Las Vegas Saturday night at 7:30 p.m. (KCSB 91.9 FM). The Rebels, who once held sole possession of first place in the Big West, have lost

The Gauchos had the game ripped away from them as New Mexico St. took control and won handily, 81-55 in Las Cruces.

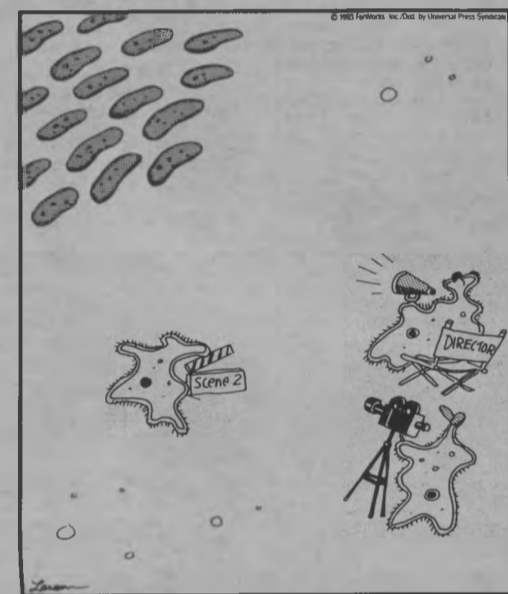
their last three conference games and are now in third place at 11-4.

The Gauchos lost to UNLV 78-61 at home earlier this season and Vegas would like nothing more to repeat their performance.

"I'm sure this road trip can't get much worse,"

French said. "I certainly hope it can't. Now you have a team that's lost three Big West games in a row against a team that's lost two in a row. We'll see who's going to bounce back. We can sit here and feel sorry for ourselves or we can come out and get it done."

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Netters Look to Overpower Cal Lutheran Again

Riding the momentum of an impressive conference win over Pacific last weekend, the UCSB men's tennis team will play only their second home match of the season against an overmatched Cal Lutheran team Saturday at the East Courts starting at 11 a.m.

The fact that this is a home match may be the only reason for Coach Don Lowry to stay with his regular lineup. Cal Lutheran is coming off a loss to

Cal State Los Angeles, not a tennis power, and they have never beaten the Gauchos in four tries.

"We're going to play Cal Lutheran at full strength," Lowry said. "This should be nothing more than a tune-up for us. Everyone should win at their position, but I'm challenging the guys to not just win but to play at a higher level."

"We're playing the same guys, because when you're 3-4, you have to take a win when you can get it. Be-

sides, they deserve an opportunity to play at home. Hopefully, it can boost their confidence."

One player that Lowry mentioned was Simon Kurth. The sophomore has been playing #3 doubles with Eddie Weiss, but he may see some time in the singles rotation soon if there are injuries or inconsistent play from the regulars.

"Simon has been playing a lot of singles in practice," Lowry said. "If there

is an injury, he can step in."

In the meantime, the Gauchos should have no problems Saturday. Their next test will come at the eight-team H.E.B. Team Tournament, March 4-7. UCSB will open with the #3 seed, Texas A&M.

"[Cal Lutheran] comes at a good time for us," Lowry said. "We're heading into a tough stretch of our season."

Cont. from back page minutes of play Muse made 4-of-5 shots and grabbed six rebounds. Ramaker led UCSB with 11 points and nine rebounds while Milling continued his strong play with 10 points and eight rebounds.

Stewart, who has made a living at the line this season, hit 9-of-15 to finish with 19 points and nine rebounds. Guard Reggie Manuel led all scorers with 23 points, including five three-pointers. But for the high-scoring Rebels, it was their defense which impressed UNLV Coach Rolie Massimino.

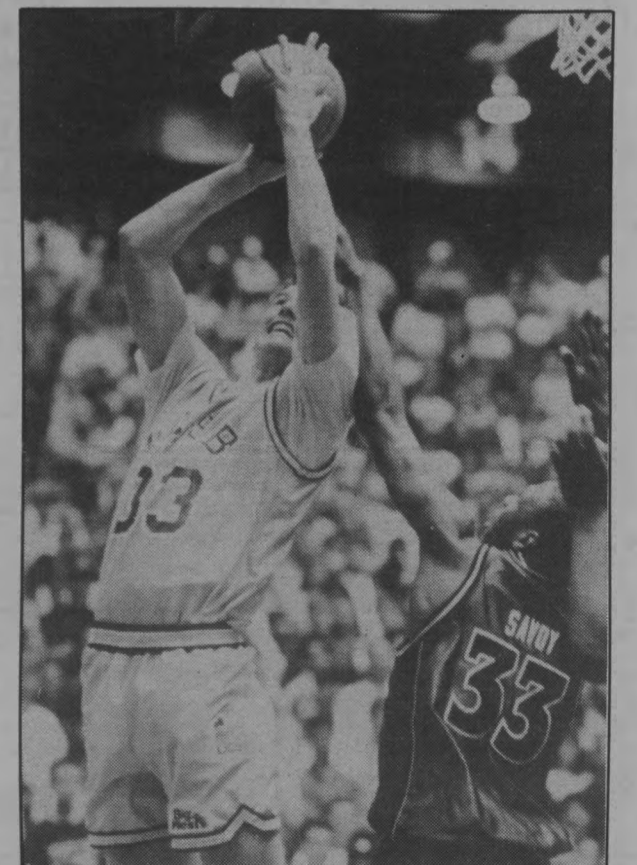
"I thought we really hung in there defensively at the end," Massimino said. "We thought Madden would go against Dedan [Thomas] at the end, but Sunshine did a really good job on Turner. They always play UNLV pretty well and I thought we responded nicely."

The Gauchos got out of

the gate quickly, going on a 14-4 run to open the game. But when Stewart gave Muse his third foul with 8:03 left in the first half, the Rebels outscored UCSB 18-12 the rest of the way even though the Gauchos led throughout the half. Stewart scored all nine UNLV points in the final 3:02 as the teams went into the locker rooms with UCSB up 36-34.

The second half showcased the long-range shooting of Manuel who hit three big threes in the half. Manuel scored 15 points in the second half to help his team to the win and leave the Gauchos smarting.

"We should have beat them twice," Milling said. "But we lost the game in the last minute or two with a couple of turnovers and some missed free throws. Hopefully we can come back and be looking forward to New Mexico State on Monday night and not thinking about this loss because it's in the past."

Runnin' Rebels Steal Show From UCSB

Game Comes Down to Final Shot as UNLV Slips By Gauchos, 64-63

Just when the Gauchos didn't think lightning could strike them twice this season against UNLV, it did.

Thursday night at the Thunderdome against the Runnin' Rebels, UCSB had one stolen from them again. This time it was a 64-63 decision that left the Gauchos and the home crowd of 6,000 wondering how it could have got away.

With 12.8 seconds remaining in the game and the Gauchos down by one, UCSB had a chance to win the game as guard Phillip Turner went one-on-one with Rebel guard Sunshine Smith. With Turner spinning in the lane, he pulled up from 10 feet with Smith hanging all over him. No foul was called and Turner's shot went off the mark. Rob Ramaker's desperation three-pointer as time expired caromed off the rim and the UNLV bench flooded the court in jubilation.

The Gauchos are 11-15 overall and 7-8 in the Big West, while UNLV is 12-11 and 8-7.

"The plan was to get Phillip the ball," UCSB Head Coach Jerry Pimm said. "He's our best free thrower and we wanted to get him to the free throw line. I thought we accomplished that. The only thing that didn't happen was that the whistle didn't blow. He got fouled twice."

"The philosophy of the officials is that they do not want to make calls at the end. I still disagree with the philosophy of officials in this country where they will not blow the whistle on last-second shots unless there is absolute blood. I think that's atrocious."

Down the stretch, however, it came down to who would be the team to make the free throws and take care of the ball. The Rebels proved they were the ones who could do both. Smith and forward Kebu Stewart each

made two free throws in the final 1:55 of the game, while UCSB struggled at the line all night. UNLV made 20-of-27, including eight of their last 10.

The Gauchos hit just 6-of-14 from the line in the game — including several big misses late in the contest. Ramaker had the toughest night of all at the line, missing on seven of his eight attempts. And a pair of turnovers in front of the Gauchos' bench also proved to be the most costly of the 20 Santa Barbara turnovers on the night.

"We made a lot of mistakes, not just the missed free throws," Pimm said. "We didn't get the ball inside nearly enough and our passing was not very good. We made some mistakes that cost us the game. At the end of the game, yes, we were begging for a call. I thought there was a foul but you can't rely on that."

"You've just got to make the plays prior to the end."

Early in the game the Gauchos were having good success going inside on the Rebels' defense. Ramaker, Doug Muse and Kyle Milling were able to push the UNLV big men around and score. The outside game was clicking early on as well. After Smith sank a 10-footer, Mark Flick and Tecon Madden hit back-to-back threes. Muse then drilled one from 12 feet out and UCSB had itself a 26-16 lead at the 8:15 mark of the first half.

But while the Gaucho front-line was doing the damage, UNLV's Stewart was also making sure it didn't come without a price. The big 6-foot-8 sophomore, along with some help from the officials, got all three UCSB big men in foul trouble. Both Muse and Ramaker picked up three personals apiece by half-time while Milling was hit with two.

Muse again played well before fouling out with 5:08 left in the game for standing straight up as Stewart leaned into him. In 15

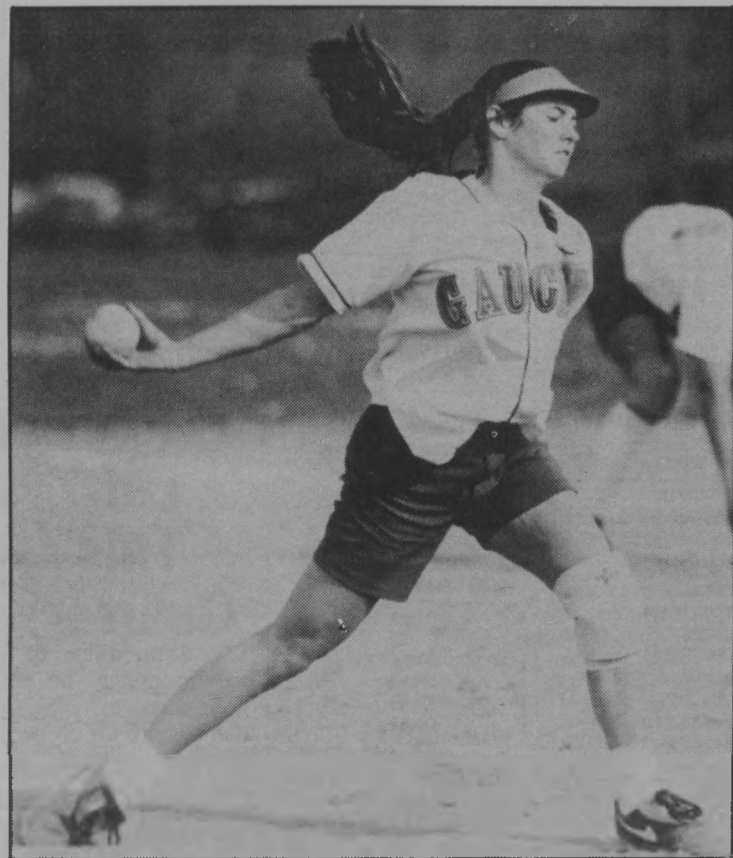
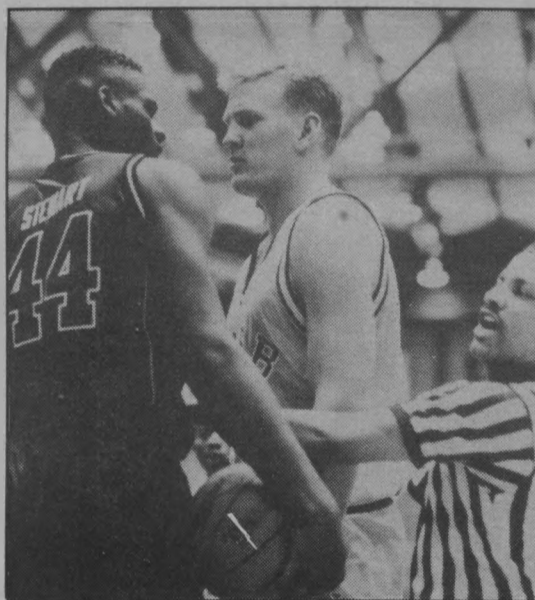
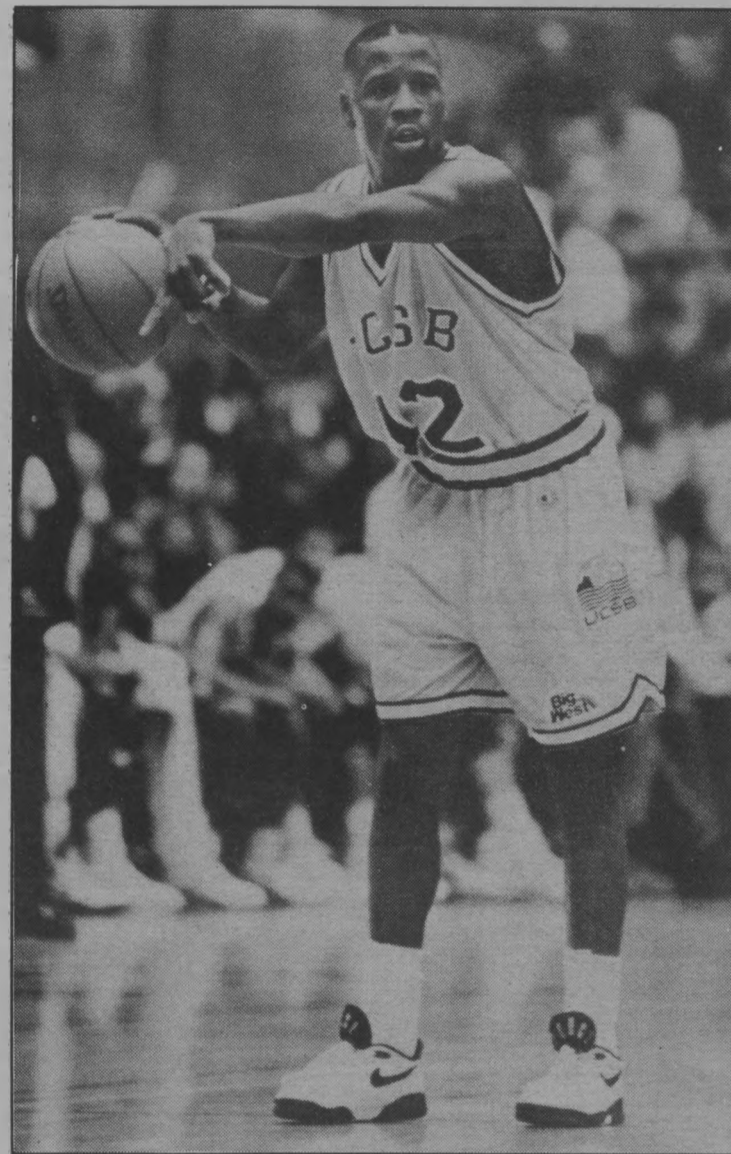
