LA CUMBRE WILL BE OUT TUESDAY

La Cumbre, State's yearbook, will be on the campus Tuesday, it was announced this week by Katherine Bishop, editor, and Charles Poore, business manager.

Those in charge of the annual have made all efforts possible to bring the book out as early as possible, and its issuance on Tuesday, two weeks before the end of the semester, marks a new record in promptness, according to students familiar with previous issues.

The book will be distributed at the window of the student body office starting probably during the second hour and continuing all day.

Those having student body cards for both fall and spring semesters will be given a book, but those lacking cards will pay \$2 for each if they wish a copy. The total cost will thus be \$4 for those not having student body tickets.

Embodying all college features traditional to the campus activities of Santa Barbara State, the book this year will be probably one of the best yet seen, if all advance reports are true.

VAN WINKLE TO EDIT THE EAGLE NEXT SEMESTER

Katherine Bishop Named By Publications Board For La Cumbre Editor.

State Professors to Row Across Ocean to Hawaii This Summer

Dr. Jacobs and Mr. Bradley, both of whom were planning to go to Hawaii this summer for teaching and research work, respectively, this week cancelled reservations in San Francisco and chartered a rowing boat at the local harbor for the trip to the islands.

Both professors are taking daily rowing and swimming lessons in preparation for the trans-Pacific venture. They plan to take a large amount of food and books aboard their vessel.

Following the burning and sinking of the City of Honolulu at the islands last week, the State instructors decided upon slower but safer means of navigation. They will leave shortly after the close of the present session. Dr. Jacobs will teach, and Mr. Bradley will work on a history of the islands for a doctor's degree from Stanford.

Bring Blankets to Campus This Noon; Program of Excursions Is Planned.

Approximately 100 students and faculty members of Santa Barbara State will embark at 5:30 o'clock tomorrow morning at Stearn's wharf for Santa Cruz island and the three-day excursion being sponsored by the College Outing club.

With a reservation limit of 100 for the Santa Cruz, the vessel chartered by the club, last-minute payments were being made yesterday, and it was expected that the limit would be reached by today.

Camp will be struck at Valdez harbor, which has been the scene of former State camps. According to Noel Misemer, trip manager, and Charles Van Winkle, president of the club, an excursion will be made on Saturday along the mainland side of Santa Cruz island, and Painted Cave, Arch Rock, Prisoner's Harbor, Frye's harbor, and submarine gardens will be visited. Swimming, boating, fishing, hiking, games, singing, and eating will be other features for the cast-aways.

The return trip will be made at approximately 6 o'clock, Sunday evening, giving all visitors all of Sunday to enjoy their visit and meals.

Blankets will be brought to the campus this noon by each student planning to go on the trip, and the bundles will be stored aboard the Santa Cruz this afternoon in order to make the hour of departure as early as possible.

Among the faculty members who will go to the islands are Dean Ashworth, Miss Van Fossen, and Coach Trimble.
