Bud Lambourne and his college dance band furnished the music for the evening's dancing.

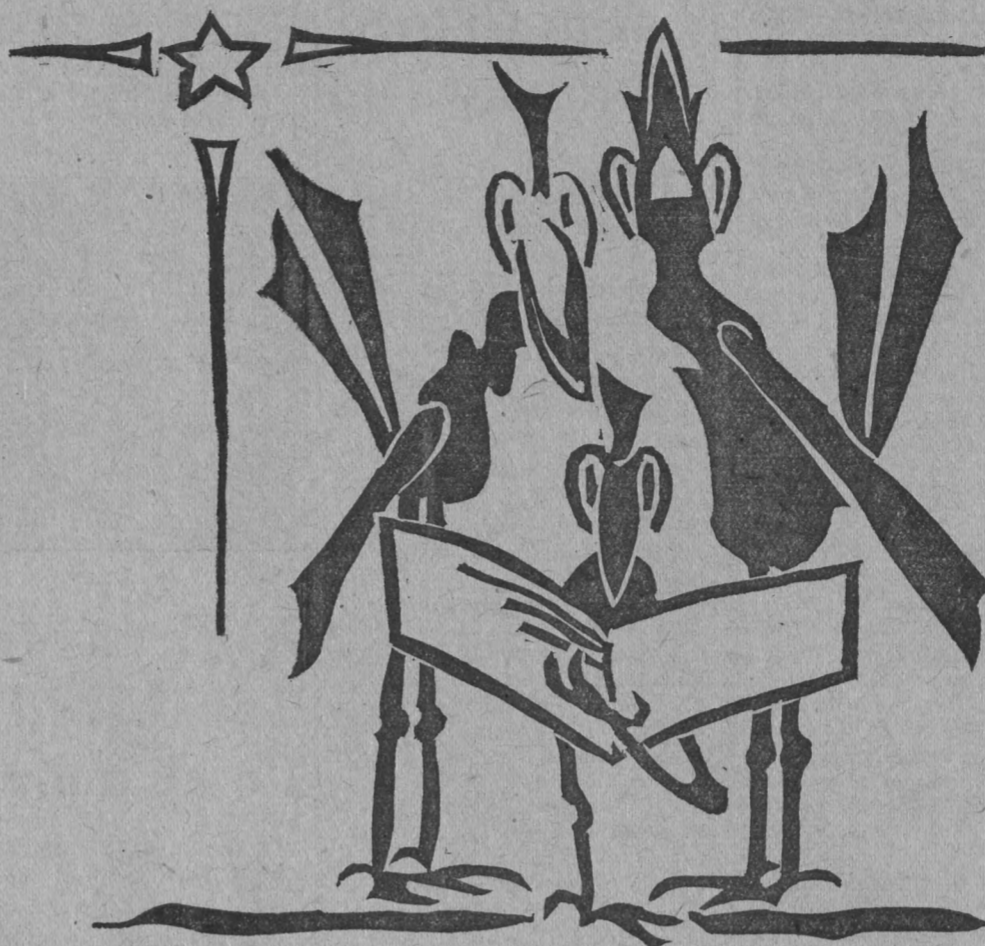
Social Events Must be Listed on Calendar

PROGRAM GIVEN TO MEMEBERS OF SAN MARCUS CAMP

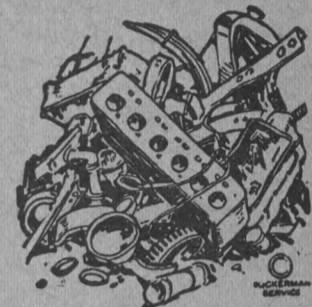

LaVerne Hoopsters Victors in Contest

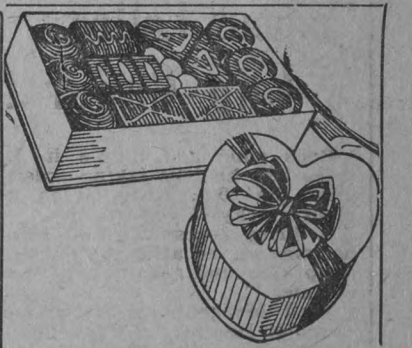
The La Verne college basketball team swung into action last week for some intensive drilling in preparation for a hard hoop schedule.
