Booths will dispense script, the only legal tender in the Coast, at ten cents each—ten for a dollar. The Coast will operate from 6:30 to 11:00 pm both Friday and Saturday evenings.

## Colorful Entries

The Embarcadero, North and South Pacific Avenues, and Finnegan's Alley will be ablaze with

every conceivable type of entertainment, ranging from skill games and live talent to intriguing movies. Forty booths will depict the traditional San Francisco waterfront theme.

Townpeople and representatives from other Tri-County cities will be on hand, as will high school students from all Tri-County high schools. Associated Students felt that such a show would serve to demonstrate to future college students the gayer side of life at Santa Barbara College.

## "Movie Tonight?"

Two local pubs will furnish movies—the North Hall Cinema and the Pine Hall Palace. The Cinema will feature old-time movies with added floor-shows, and the Palace will feature a comedy filmed at UCLA by the Theatre Arts Division of the University. Each show

will be continuous both nights of the Coast.

## Live Talent

In the live talent division, the Embarcadero will present a star-studded freak show, a human slot machine, and a risqué burlesque. All these shows will continue thru the four and one-half hours each evening of the Coast. Admissions will be collected by screaming barkers, and the Gay Ninety music, the color and pageantry of the old days will set everyone spinning with laughter and thrills.

The Tunnel of Love, utilizing the Quad pool, will provide waterfront atmosphere for the star-struck, with rides in real boats through its maze of passages. In the meantime, poor pledges will be taking less pleasurable water trips in the Baseball Throw on the Embarcadero. A modern saloon will

add color, as will the Garter Gaiety and food booths.

## Sponge Treat

Sponges thrown at live targets will provide recreation for the young in heart on North Pacific Avenue. Girls will peer from a giant Pirate's face in this booth, and wet sponges will serve as the guided missiles. Snow cones, a penny toss, and a destruction booth using slingshots as weapons add more excitement to this avenue of the Coast.

The Honeymoon Express will convey all comers to all parts of the eastern side of campus in its traditional tours. Candied apples and soda pop, coupled with a guessing game will lend atmosphere.

## Alley of Fun

Finnegan's Alley, commonly known as the Men's Gym Lawn during less carefree capers, is

cramped with fine saloon-type talent at the far end. A Marryin' Sam booth will also be in operation for all elopers. The Bella Union Theatre presents its girl-studded review in full color each and every hour.

The Dirty Dane returns again to the mats at Santa Barbara in a slap-down, drag-out battle with Darling Jim, idol of millions. Remembered for his horse-play in previous Coasts, the Dane has been quoted as saying, "Ugh." Garters will flash in the Ring a Leg booth, and the Golden Spigot will serve all with refreshing drinks.

Teacher's Taco Stand will serve its goodies to all, and those with a destructive vein may squash eggs in the faces of real-live targets in the Egg Throw. Pool hall entertainment will be on hand, as will the four artists with their six-foot

interpretations of all "characters" who wander into their cartooning studio.

## LOYALTY OATH MEANING TOLD BY INTERIM REPORT

What does the Loyalty Oath mean to California? We have heard arguments and read opinions, now let us sample some tragic facts and learn first hand just what the Oath has done. A future article will attempt to show what is being done to correct the situation, while this report will try to offer quotes and documented information on the scope of our loss.

The Interim Report of the Committee on Academic Freedom to the Academic Senate, Northern Section, clearly shows the scope of academic dismissals: "The number of Senate members ejected from their posts is of course known to everybody as 26. Thirty-seven additional members of the academic staff have resigned in explicit protest." This makes a total of 63 faculty members.

### Example

The Report gives many documented examples of the quality of personnel which has been lost. For example, when Professor Winkler of Berkeley was given an appointment at Harvard, the Department Chairman stated: "Although the Department was picking the best available man, it was glad to give refuge to one of the California dissenters."

Concerning resignations, which are slowly breaking the back of the University, the report states: "Among the 37 which have resigned in explicit protest against the abrogation of tenure are three full professors including a professor of psychiatry, internationally celebrated and immediately appointed by an eastern university three associate professors, including one of the most distinguished experimental physicists in the world; ten assistant professors, four lecturers, three instructors, and thirteen teaching and research assistants."

### Status

In the world of science, status is determined by what the professional societies think. Twenty different professional societies and groups have passed condemnatory resolutions. This cuts off the supply of eminent scholars, and greatly affects the quality of graduate students who choose California.

A most dramatic summary of what the Oath means is given by a report from the Department of Psychology at Berkeley. Four senior staff members were lost from this department. Each had attracted a coterie of promising graduate students.

### Huge Drop

Fewer than one-third the usual number of inquiries have been received regarding graduate study, while the number has increased in other state universities. Long-range plans to expand the depart-

ment have been cut off, due to the inability to acquire competent teaching personnel.

"Another fact should be mentioned concerning the morale of the staff. In my twenty years at California I have never seen so many manifestations of discontent as occurred after last August, and which still continue to be seen," according to a department spokesman.

No one can properly estimate the total price we shall pay for the Oath. Its cumulative effect will be seen for many years.

A bond of mutual confidence has been broken. Without feeling sorry for myself, I believe I can understand what Dr. Edward Tolman, world famed psychologist, meant when he said, "The students will be hurt the most of all."

## Benefit Dance to Aid Injured Baseballers

To benefit the three injured baseball players, the Junior Class is sponsoring an informal dance to be held May 26, in the Goleta campus theatre.

The three players, John Hackett, Bob Johnston and Ron Robinson, all members of the UCSB baseball team, were injured when their topheavy Suburban overturned on the way home from a double-header with Fresno. The three athletes have all returned to their studies, but with various reminders of the accident. The most seriously injured, Ron Robinson, has only been out of his cast for the last week.

The entire proceeds from the dance will be used to help defray the cost of the medical bills of the injured. The college is not held liable for accidents involving collisions of this type. Other debts not covered will be incurred by the Associated Student Body.

## Goodall Will Lead Panel at Prexies' Meet

Frank Goodall, out-going student body president, has been selected to be the chairman of the panel "Financial Operation of Student Government" at the annual Student Presidents' Association convention May 23 to 26 at Salt Lake City.

In his capacity as chairman, Goodall will also serve on the executive committee for the convention. Bob Christofferson, student body president-elect, will also attend the convention.

## Faculty Unanimously Elect Dr. Palmer to Vice-Chairman Post

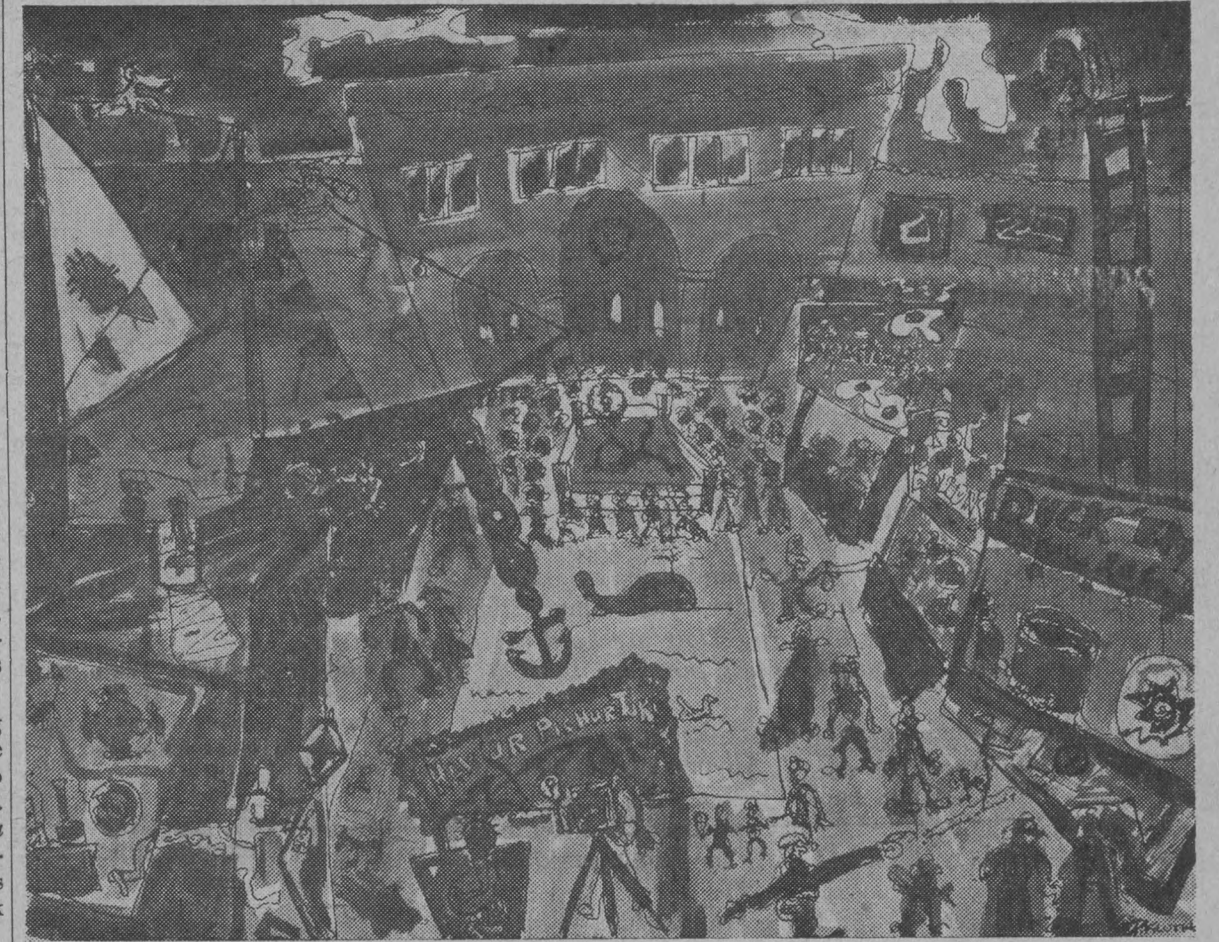

## Will You Hang Your Diploma on a Wall?

As graduation draws near the question arises among the graduating seniors, "Just what did I learn while I was in school?" While reflecting on this subject the future graduate may also have formulated an opinion as to what subjects should be stressed in college.

The students of Bard College, Annadale, New York, have some worthwhile thoughts on the subject, according to members of the faculty there who questioned the students and gave, as a summary of their idea about what they should learn the following report published last week in *The New York Times*.

"Desire for knowledge, scholarly dedication, motivation to learn.

"Moral and intellectual honesty, ability to face consequences, sincerity, ability to stand up for one's beliefs.

"The ability to use what one has learned.

"Adult behavior and attitude, sense of proportion.

"Ability to work independently, independence is thought, behavior and in arriving at decisions.

"Interest in a major field.

"Educability, ability to do college work well, intellectual ability.

"Individual improvement, ability to grow intellectually and emotionally, improvement over initial performance.

"Mental health, well-adjusted, intelligent social habits.

"Willingness to hear and consider other points of view."

*These are hard things to learn. They are hard things to teach. They cannot be taught unless they are lived by the teacher.*

The Bard students gave answers that make the detail of curriculum somewhat important. Anyone might learn much of all these things without books.

Just what kind of an examination would be given to prove these things had been learned? Only the lifetime examination that follows college graduation.

*You cannot "cram" for life's examination. You cannot hang a diploma on the wall to prove that you have learned what the Bard students think should be learned in college.*

If you have learned them you will not hang a diploma on the wall.

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## Otey Scruggs Enters Pasadena Decathlon

Otey Scruggs, Santa Barbara College decathlon star, said today he will enter the Pasadena Invitational Decathlon May 22 and 23 as his first real preparation for the National AAU Decathlon Championships here July 3 and 4.

The 21-year-old senior will be on the spot as defending champion. Moreover, he'll have much stiffer competition than last year if Occidental's Bill Albans, and Bob Richards, the "Flying Parson," enter as expected.

Albans took second behind Bob Mathias at the National Championships last year at Tulare. He scored 7361 points to edge out Scruggs with 7084. Scruggs won the Pasadena event with 7099.

Richards, who earns his living as a teacher at La Verne College, scored a whopping 7409 points in a recent decathlon. Such heavy competition should evoke a great deal of interest in the unusual event which has been popular since the ancient days of Greece.

The meet is sponsored by John Muir College.
