

Gauchos Secure Third Place With Big West Wins

They came; they saw; and, without a doubt, they conquered.

In front of rabid Klum Gym crowds of over 1,000 spectators on each evening, the UCSB women's volleyball team put a twist on a rivalry that had previously been one-sided, as the Gauchos took two matches from the University of Hawaii on Friday and Saturday. The wins were the first ever for UCSB at Hawaii, and they couldn't have come at a better time, as Santa Barbara basically solidified at least a third place finish in the Big West

Friday night, the Gauchos came out on fire and cruised to a 15-2, 15-10, 15-6 win while outplaying the Rainbows in every facet of the game. Leading the way offensively for Santa Barbara was senior outside hitter Julie Pitois, who drilled 18 kills at a .471 clip. UCSB Head Coach Kathy Gregory had nothing but praise for Pitois, who garnered Big West Player of the Week honors a week ago, and is a good bet to repeat this week

a good bet to repeat this week. "Julie Pitois was unbelievable," Gregory said. "She finally gave us the big hitting in a big game, and she really intimidated a top team. We were hit-ting so well, I kept asking myself, 'Is that really us out there?

Also providing offensive firepower were sopho-more hitter Heather Collins, who had 12 kills, and junior Ana Elisa Franca, who had nine. UCSB hita strong .373 on the evening, a tribute to sophomore setter Chrissy Boehle, who effectively confused the Rainbow blockers with her distribution of sets.

"This was the most magnificent team effort we've had," Gregory said. "Chrissy set one of her best games. She really moved the ball around, and

Hawaii also struggled offensively, hitting only .187 on the evening. Kenyatta Lovelace, who leads UH in kills, was limited to only seven kills by a Gaucho defense that responded with eight blocks and 49

digs. "Every time we'd make a move, they'd come back with a big play, or we'd make a big mistake," Hawaii Head Coach Dave Shoji said. "We couldn't sustain our momentum, we couldn't seem to win the big rallies. We just couldn't put the ball

down when we needed to." Although Saturday's match took a little longer, the Gauchos spanked Hawaii again, 15-12, 15-10, 15-5, to drop the Rainbows to 10-9 overall and 8-4 in Big West play. The lone scare for the Gauchos came in the second game, when UCSB took a 13-1 lead before Hawaii came storming back. Santa Barbara held on to win the game and the rest of the match was a mere formality.

"It was a little scary for us in the second game, but we stayed in there," Gregory said. "Our outside hitters were unbelievable." Pitois and Collins again were the focal point of

the offense, as the pair notched 16 kills apiece from the outside spots. Senior Kristie Ryan chipped in 15 kills at a .464 percentage while adding 13 digs, and freshman blocker Kim Keys came up with 10 kills and six blocks. By hitting .358 on the evening, UCSB put an emphatic end to Hawaii's dominance in the rivalry between the schools. The Rainbows held a 21-2 edge on UCSB going into the weekend.

"Heather and Kristie did it all," Gregory spouted. "They passed well, hit well and played de-fense. Julie and Heather carried us offensively in the beginning, and Ryan did it in the end. That's

what you call balance, and we need that to win." Saturday's win was the sixth in a row for UCSB, which now stands at 16-5 overall and 11-3 in conshe was up there at the net blocking." With Boehle mixing the sets well, the Rainbows — perennially one of the best blocking teams in the Big West—were only able to manage three blocks.

The Trojans continued their momentum into the second and third quarters, but UCSB senior James Dent's goal in the closing minutes of the third sparked his team as they entered the final period. With USC leading 9-4 coming into the fourth, the Gauchos rallied for three goals to close the gap. However, the team could come no closer.

"A four or five goal margin is substantial," UCSB Head Coach Pete Snyder said. "It's hard to overcome, and it's particularly hard when you try to rush things to get back in and cut their lead down.

"When we did our set defense we did pretty well, but they scored at least four counterattack goals," he added. "We played pretty decent defense 60 to 70% of the game, but the time we didn't we would give up a run of two to three goals."

UCSB Assistant Coach Rob Boyd credited the USC win to the Trojans' impressive discipline and shot selection.

"We wanted things to be a bit more hectic for them when they were on their offensive side, so they would take bad shots," Boyd said. "But they were really patient. They slowed things down and used most of their shot clock, then took good shots in the end, and usually ended up scoring goals. They are very disciplined. If they would have taken the shots that we wanted them to take, we would have had a really good chance at winning."

"What worked well for them was their cross-passing," Eggert added. "No one on their team was exactly selfish. That's how they won and that's why we lost. They had seven players playing, and we only had a few players playing."

Santa Barbara closed out its season by losing a close, hardfought 1-0 decision to the University of Hartford on Friday at Santa Clara. It was the 17th win of the year against only one loss for Hartford, while the Gauchos closed out their season by falling to 9-8-0 on the year.

The game was played under less-than ideal conditions, as heavy rains which soaked Santa Clara's Buck Shaw Field last week left the playing surface in extremely poor shape. "I'd be coming back from a

play and I'd just fall. There were mud puddles every-where," UCSB sophomore Kristen Borland said. "But at the same time, it slowed [Hartford] down too, and they rely on their speed."

The match was decided in the final minutes of the game on a controversial play. With 1:23 remaining, a mad scramble for the ball in front of the Gaucho net resulted in a Hartford player going down. As a whistle was blown to stop

play, the ball went into the net. The referee then pointed in the direction of Santa Barbara and sophomore Kris Bassler took what she thought was a Gaucho free-kick.


UCSB then took the ball all the way down the field, but when Hartford goalkeeper

## Women Finish Strong Second in Big West Finals at Hawaii



Bradbury is 9th, Gains All-Conference Honors

The 1992 cross country season officially ended for the UCSB women's squad last Saturday at the Big West Championships at Honolulu. Backed by tremendous parental and administrative support, the Lady Gauchos came away with a second place finish in the 10-team field at Pali Golf Course.

Conference rival UC Irvine took the team title with 48 total points, while the 73 points compiled by Santa Barbara surprised third place Cal State Fullerton (87 points), which was a favorite along with the Anteaters to win the team title. The rest of the team results included the University of Nevada at Reno (108), the University of Hawaii (123), Long Beach State (134), Utah State (142), UNLV (201), New Mexico State (207) and the University of the Pacific (313). UCSB Head Coach Jim Triplett attributed his team's success to great

UCSB Head Coach Jim Triplett attributed his team's success to great preparation and its ability to maintain concentration under such big meet conditions. Not only did the lady runners have to battle nine other programs, but they also had to withstand a difficult and muddy 3.1-mile course.

"The thing that gave us real momentum going into conference was that we really handled the mental aspect probably the very best," said Triplett, who was voted co-Big West Coach of the Year along with Irvine's Vince O'Boyle. "We didn't key up our girls too much, we didn't put any pressure on them. We applied what we would call 'positive pressure' to help them focus and keep everything in perspective."

The top finisher for the UCSB was sophomore Kara Bradbury, who finished with a time of 18:21, and whose ninth place finish also earned

### Bakersfield Men Set Pace as Swimmers, Divers Lose First Season Meet

A fresh start is what any team hopes for as it embarks upon a new season, and the UCSB swimming and diving teams were looking for exactly that when they traveled to Cal State Bakersfield this weekend.

On the strength of performances from the Bakersfield men's swimmers, the home team was able to leave UCSB in its wake and win the dual meet by a score of 129-108 on Saturday afternoon.

"Bakersfield was ready to swim fast and UCSB wasn't," Santa Barbara Head Coach Gregg Wilson said. "We had a few breakdowns with only a few swimmers rising to the occasion. It wasn't pretty."

To top off the frustration, Bakersfield had no divers entered at Saturday's meet, leaving the Gauchos to compete against one another. UCSB outscored Bakersfield 32-0 in the diving competition, leaving only 76 points earned by the Santa Barbara swimmers.

In the first half of swimming competition, the

Gauchos failed to come away with a win in any event. Bakersfield swimmer Andre Buraf — the defending national champion in Division II distance freestyle events — proved to be too much for the UCSB men. Buraf took first place in the 1,000 and 200 yard freestyle, as well as the 200 yard butterfly.

In the second half, Gaucho freshman Kevin Hoffman notched the squad's first win of the day by taking first place in the 200 Individual Medley event. Junior Bill Sweeney followed Hoffman's lead by winning the 1,000 freestyle and taking second in the 200 freestyle. With injuries and illness plaguing UCSB, the team was

With injuries and illness plaguing UCSB, the team was forced to rely on inexperienced swimmers who were competing in their first NCAA meet. "The problem was that we had to go to the freshman in

"The problem was that we had to go to the freshman in the first intercollegiate meet of the year, and that is not what you want to do," Wilson said. "You want to look to experienced swimmers who have been with the program."

UCSB team captain Derigan Silver is one of the seasoned veterans that Wilson looked for to compete aggressively. Silver took first in the 200 backstroke, but it wasn't nearly enough to boost the team's finish.

"This is definitely not the performance we needed to win this meet," Silver said. "We had to rely on freshman and they weren't ready to come out and swim the way the team needed."

"If we don't get the leadership and people don't step up, then it is going to be a long season," Silver added.

The competition was not nearly as difficult for the UCSB women Saturday, as they took on a Bakersfield team that has only been in existence for three years. Wilson completely changed the women's lineup, placing swimmers in events they normally do not compete in.


"With a non-pressure meet, the women had a good time swimming in off events," Wilson said.

UCSB freshman Ashley Cusato did well in races which are not considered her primary events. She took third in the 200 butterfly and second place in both the 200 breast stroke and 200 backstroke. Wendy Zellers also performed well in her first collegiate meet, winning both the 1,000 freestyle and 200 backstroke.


In a season filled with horrors and fright, perhaps it was fitting that on Halloween the UCSB men's soccer squad finally exorcised the demons that have been haunting them all year.

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One month and nine losses after recording their second victory of the year, the Gauchos got back into the winner's circle Saturday by downing Masters College, 1-0, at Harder Stadium. The win upped Santa Barbara's record to 3-13-0 on the year, while NAIA Masters College fell to 4-11-1.

After facing such powerhouses as UCLA and New Mexico this season, the appearance of struggling Masters College was exactly what the Gauchos needed to snap their nine-game losing skid.

"Luckily for us it came at a good time, when we needed a big win," UCSB Head Coach Mark Arya said. "One-zero is not a big score, but we'll take it."

The game's only score came only six minutes into the match. Gaucho forward Vince Thomas took a shot on the Masters College net that the goalkeeper was unable to handle. UCSB's Mark Coulter got to the rebound and one-timed a shot into the goal to put the home team up early.

While both sides created a few modest chances, there were very few scoring opportunities to be had by either team and the pace of the game often became tedious.

"In my opinion it was a very boring game," Arya said. "We came out and played very flat. But we still got the results." Arya also hinted that the mayhem of the Isla Vista Halloween

Arya also hinted that the mayhem of the Isla Vista Halloween celebrations may have been a factor in the flatness of his squad's play Saturday.

"I think the Halloween weekend definitely had a little bit of an effect on us," he said. "I'm not sure what hours our guys were keeping last night. A lot of our guys live right in the heart of [Isla Vista], so I'm sure they were kept up later than they wanted to be."

Saturday's game was the final Harder Stadium appearance for the Gauchos' five seniors. Coulter, Thomas, Kendall Fargo, Jason West and Stefan Gudmundsson all played the full 90 minutes against Mas-





The Lady Gauchos credited each other for their performance, citing both desire and hard work as factors in the second-place finish.


"We all pulled together like a team," said Hadley, who was the top freshman finisher in the meet. "We just really wanted it super




bad — I think we wanted it worse than anyone else. There was nothing for us to lose." "I think it's important to


