Jacqueline Rook Shot to Death, Autopsy Shows

The decomposed body found in Refugio Canyon early Thursday afternoon has been identified as that of Jacqueline Ann Rook, an Isla Vista resident, the Santa Barbara County Coroner's office reported late Thursday evening.

A preliminary autopsy determined that she had been shot to death. Rook, who disappeared November 20, would have turned 22 last Friday. She was a UCSB student from Los Angeles, majoring in Communications Studies.

Rook's body was found in Refugio Canyon by the Sheriff's Search and Rescue Team, within one-half mile of where the body of Patricia Laney was discovered Wednesday afternoon. Ballistics reports have not determined if the same weapon was used in the deaths of the two women.

Continued efforts by the Sheriff's Department have failed to uncover any sign of Mary Ann Sarris, 19, who disappeared December 6.

Laboratory tests are being conducted to determine if Laney was sexually molested and results could take up to a week to process. Rook's body was too decomposed to tell if she had been sexually assaulted.

Laney, a psychology major at UCSB, was reportedly last seen on her way to a dentist in the Goleta area. But Sheriff's Department officials declined to say whether she had kept the appointment.

In Isla Vista and on campus, the discovery of the two bodies has triggered a rash of obscene and threatening phone calls to local police departments. The University police has received an influx of missing person reports, but so far, all those reported missing have turned up unharmed. The Community Service Organization (CSO) has reported a vast increase in requests for their escort service.

Widespread publicity about the murders in California newspapers and television has resulted in a number of calls from concerned parents. Some have asked for increased security precautions in the Isla Vista area. Most strongly oppose local efforts to protect female hitchhikers which they feel would encourage thumbing.

The University Administration and the Campus Police also strongly advise against hitchhiking. They have criticized the "give a sister a ride" campaign, and the boxes for depositing license numbers because

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Proposed Legislation to Divert Santa Barbara Tanker Traffic

Sparked by the recent wave of oil tanker disasters, local politicians are calling for the diversion of tanker traffic away from the Santa Barbara Channel.

Congressman Robert Lagomarsino is expected to introduce legislation today requiring tankers transporting oil from Alaska to Long Beach to be routed outside the channel.

"We have seen the tragic consequences of tanker wrecks off our coasts," said Lagomarsino in a recent press release, "Now is the time to act."

Lagomarsino's bill is aimed at outlining a specific route for the tankers carrying oil from the

Alaskan pipeline.

"Since we are talking about American tankers going from one American port to another, I don't see why we can't specify a particular route. That's what my bill will do," said Lagomarsino.

"This bill wouldn't cover all ships using the channel, but it would apply to the bulk of the traffic," Lagomarsino continued. "If it prevents even one wreck, it will be worth it."

Michael Wootton, Lagomarsino's district assistant, indicated that the congressional bill was not prompted solely by the recent tanker disasters.

"There has been increased concern over the prospect of

increased tanker traffic and increased drilling in the channel," explained Wootton. "We've had a series of meetings with the Coast Guard over the past year and this bill is the result of these meetings."

The Lagomarsino bill has already drawn praise from several local environmental groups.

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Brown Attacks UC for Failure To Provide Relevant Education

SAN FRANCISCO — Attending his first meeting of the UC Board of Regents since July, 1975, Governor Jerry Brown last Friday attacked the University for not doing its part to solve what he termed "the fundamental problems" of society.

During a report to the Regents on the quality of UC professional schools, Brown said, "Never before has education been so irrelevant for so many kids in our society."

The report, a survey of business, law, and education schools, concludes that these schools at UC Berkeley and UCLA rank among the top 10 in the country.

The report, however, also states, "The private professional schools at Harvard, Stanford, Yale, MIT and Chicago continue to rank at the top, almost always above the schools in the public sector."

"I suggest that these pillars of progress and bastions of expertise have failed the society in many ways," Brown said. "Society is

increasingly dependent on professionals to decide who is healthy and who is sick."

Student Regent Daryn Peoples agreed with the Governor. "Students are trying to fit the needs of society as we see them...we need to reexamine our professional schools and where we're headed."

Breaking the silence for the rest of the Regents, UC President David Saxon said, "I think you have to be careful of oversimplifying. There are students who are desperately eager to take advantage of this sort of education."

After discussion on the report, the Regents approved a recommendation to study why public professional schools rank below the private ones, and to identify and remove impediments which prevent the schools from "attaining greater distinction."

At a press conference after the meeting, Brown said that the University should do more to solve the problems of society.

"I always think there's room for improvement. The University of California is a pre-eminent

institution, and I would like to see it address more fundamental problems."

"A law school can't be ranked number one merely by the law professors, the number of books in their library, and the salaries they pay," Brown said. "In law, criminal processes are bogging down. Certainly law schools

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Dow Chemical Halts Plant Construction

SACRAMENTO — Dow Chemical Company will not build its proposed \$500 million petro-chemical plant on the Sacramento-San Joaquin River delta — at least not yet.

In a statement Wednesday, the giant international chemical company announced it has "indefinitely delayed" construction of the petro-chemical plant near Antioch. The facility was to process oil, some of it from Alaska, into petro-chemical products for the west coast.

"The plant site was ideally suited for supplying this area," said Ray Brubaker, general manager for Dow's western operation.

Brubaker said the decision to delay the project was a normal business one. According to assembly member Daniel Boatwright (D-Concord), Dow has spent more than \$10 million over the past two years attempting to secure the required building permit from the state.

Brubaker said, "...the permitting process for new facilities has proved to be so involved and expensive that for the time being, at least, it is impractical to continue with this project."

"When we build a facility the size of this one, we plan on staying for at least 50-year period. We want to locate in an area where the people and the government want us," he said.

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HEADLINERS

CLASSES WILL BE HELD as usual in Dayton, Ohio, according to Superintendent John Maxwell, despite an energy emergency declared because of a natural gas shortage. Maxwell, however, added that city schools will close if fuel to heat them has to be taken from industries, resulting in many layoffs. Maxwell remarked, "We can't be open if it's going to put the kids' daddies out of work."

WEST GERMAN CHANCELLOR HELMUT SCHMIDT and four of his cabinet ministers have arrived in London for economic talks covering financing British troops in Germany, British deficits and an economic summit conference proposed by President Carter. The two European leaders also have scheduled talks in their own capitals with Vice-President Mondale later in the week.

A MILD EARTHQUAKE IN BERKELEY yesterday rattled windows, but a seismologist says it apparently was not an aftershock from a swarm of stronger tremors that shook the San Francisco Bay area two weeks ago. A spokesman at the University of California seismographic station said the quake was centered on the Hayward Fault, a few miles south of the University, registering 2.0 on the Richter scale.

COAST GUARD OFFICIALS in Honolulu, Hawaii say the abandoned Panamanian Freighter "Crown Pearl" sank in the Pacific early Sunday. The ship was being towed to Honolulu for salvage. It was abandoned January 15 after it began taking on water and the 25-member crew was rescued by another vessel.

ARLO TYER, ARKANSAS STATE REPRESENTATIVE, says people who care enough about each other to live together should marry. And to give that decision, a financial edge, Tyer has proposed legislation that would impose a \$150 tax on unmarried couples. He also says that unmarried couples should have blood tests and permits to live together in addition to paying the tax. Describing himself as "just a family man," Tyer added, "God created the home and it's being broken up by permissiveness."

UC Board of Regents Angered By Brown's Funding Proposal

SAN FRANCISCO - The UC Board of Regents expressed anger, and at times hostility, over Governor Brown's proposed 1977-78 budget during their meeting last Friday.

Anger centered on a portion of the budget which makes a single appropriation for all State salary increases, including the University, with the total to be allocated as the result of "meet and confer" sessions.

UC President David Saxon expressed concern "whether the 'meet and confer' process will change the traditional authority and responsibility of the Regents and the State Personnel Board for salary-setting."

In the past, the University has received a separate allocation for salary increases from the State.

Regent Edward Carter, speaking to the Governor, said, "To have a proposal that University funds be comingled with State funds is simply contrary to the 110 year tradition of the University."

Speaking from prepared remarks on Thursday, Saxon indicated that, on the whole, the University had not been dealt with unfairly in the budget.

"In the operating budget, more than three-quarters of the increase is attributable to cost increase factors and merit salary increases and promotions," Saxon said.

"I am pleased that these needs have been recognized as essential to the University's ability to continue its operation and excellence," he said.

Saxon also expressed pleasure with the inclusion of \$3.3 million in State funds to cover instructional lab costs currently covered by the Educational Fee paid by students each quarter.

Rob Kamai, ASUC Davis president, spoke for the Student Body Presidents' Council (SBPC). Kamai felt that because of State budgeting for instructional lab costs, and because of decreases in other student fee related costs, the proposed Reg Fee increase should be postponed.

"Such a gesture would symbolize the commitment by the University to maintain a low tuition institution, assessible to students from all economic backgrounds," Kamai said.

Saxon expressed disappointment over the lack of funding for Employee Affirmative Action Programs. "The Governor's budget provides only \$250,000, although governmental reporting requirements alone cost many times more than that amount," Saxon said.

In other action, the Regents agreed to extend the position of student Regent for an additional five years. The position of student Regent was filled last year for the first time by former UCSB student Carol Mock. This year the position is held by Daryn Peoples, a UC Berkeley graduate student.

A proposed Conflict of Interest Code for the Regents and members of the systemwide and campus administrations caused a great deal of confusion.

The Regents approved the latest revision of the 26-page code. They also voted, however, to have a committee of four Regents work with Saxon and General Counsel Donald Reidhaar on revisions for the code before the February 10 deadline for submitting the code to the Fair Political Practices Commission (FPPC).

Regent Dean Watkins called for a modification of the requirement which mandates Regents to disclose their investments in companies contracting with the University. "Regents don't decide where the University is going to buy hamburgers for the dorms," Watkins said.

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Park District Directors Vote to Adopt Differential Wage Scale for Employees

Isla Vista Recreation and Park District Directors last Thursday voted three to two in favor of adopting a differential wage scale for Park Board employees.

Voting for the measure to pay employees according to their seniority and skill were Directors Judy Evered, Will Peabody and

Jim Jordan. Directors Carmen Lodise and Bruce Murdoch opposed the measure.

Park District Manager Carter Ray circulated information showing the disparity between the district's wages and those paid by the county and the University for comparable positions. Ray emphasized that

most district positions incorporated more than one job description.

The report showed that Crafts Center District Ben Fieseler, who occasionally works as a "heavy equipment operator," is eligible for an hourly wage of between \$5.73 and \$6.99 working for the county. But since September he has been earning \$3 an hour. When the differential plan is implemented February 1, he will receive \$3.95 an hour.

Discussion preceding the vote centered on the philosophic advantages of an equal wage versus the validity of a wage scale which differs according to levels of responsibility, skill and length

of employment.

Lodise distributed a statement outlining his support for an "across the board increase in wages" as opposed to differential payment. "To my thinking, a person who seeks higher levels of responsibility within an organization is a special person who needs these responsibilities for ego fulfillment," Lodise said.

Eco Action member Ford Johnson objected to Lodise's contention that, "...the Park District will never be an agency

to pay its workers enough to settle down and raise a family in Isla Vista."

Lodise explained that there were many people anxious to work for the community in order to gain experience. Johnson countered by asking Lodise why he never referred to Isla Vista as a "training ground" when arguing in favor of incorporation to which Lodise replied, "my support of incorporation has never been based upon the idea that Isla Vista is a stable community."

Ray told the board that although the new wage plan would reduce contingency funds to \$800, the Board holds approximately \$6,000 in other accounts.

Genetic Engineering: Humans to Order?

(ZNS)—A biology professor at the California Institute of Technology predicts that human reproduction may soon be replaced by genetic engineering.

Dr. James Bonner says that recent laboratory breakthroughs, which enable scientists to recombine DNA molecules, have moved us into the age of using genetic perfection.

Bonner is quoted by Mother Jones magazine as saying that with limitations being placed on the number of children in a family, "there is a moral obligation to see that these children are free of genetic defects."

According to the biologist, humans have made attempts to genetically perfect their plants and animals, and the next logical step is the genetic perfection of humans.

As to how this could be done,

Bonner writes: "One suggestion has been to remove genetic material from each individual immediately after birth and then promptly sterilize that individual. During the individual's lifetime, records would be kept of accomplishments and characteristics."

"After the individual's death," Bonner continued, "a committee decides if the accomplishments are worthy of procreation into other individuals. If so, genetic material would be removed from the repository and stimulated to clone a new individual. If the committee decides the genetic material is unworthy of procreation, it is destroyed."

We Must Be Realistic About Our Own Safety

Perhaps now the county Sheriff's Dept. will be a little more concerned about the "crazy kids in Isla Vista," but we have to find our own ways to protect the members of our community. The loss of human lives is too high a price to pay for gaining the concern of the Santa Barbara community.

Many of us are guilty of believing that nothing bad will ever happen to ourselves or those we love. We can't live with fear all our lives, but each individual must develop a realistic sense about his or her own safety. There is both beauty and terror in the world, and we can't immerse ourselves in either one.

What we can do is work individually to increase community awareness of safety. In the past, Isla Vista residents have fought successfully to retain the Foot Patrol; we now need to fight for better bus service to the Isla Vista/Goleta area. When buses run infrequently people are more inclined to hitchhike.

The Metropolitan Transit District will need a large show of support from this community to increase bus service. If everyone who reads this will call their general office at 963-3364, maybe we will see some improvement.

Das Institut in Isla Vista has cars to lend to people who need rides. Their number is 968-7061. People needing rides can also call the I.V. Women's Center at 968-5744. The Women's Center has private cars and is trying to get cars from the campus Community Affairs Board.

UCSB's Community Service Organization provides an escort service for anyone walking to or from campus after dark. Their number is 961-3446.

In emergencies people can call the I.V. Foot Patrol at 968-1544, the Sheriff at 964-9811, or the Rape Crisis Center at 963-1696.

Please, people, don't hitchhike. There are alternatives, and it isn't worth it.

There is little to do that seems appropriate when a loved one dies. When it is murder the helpless rage and blinding sorrow lead the mind in circles.

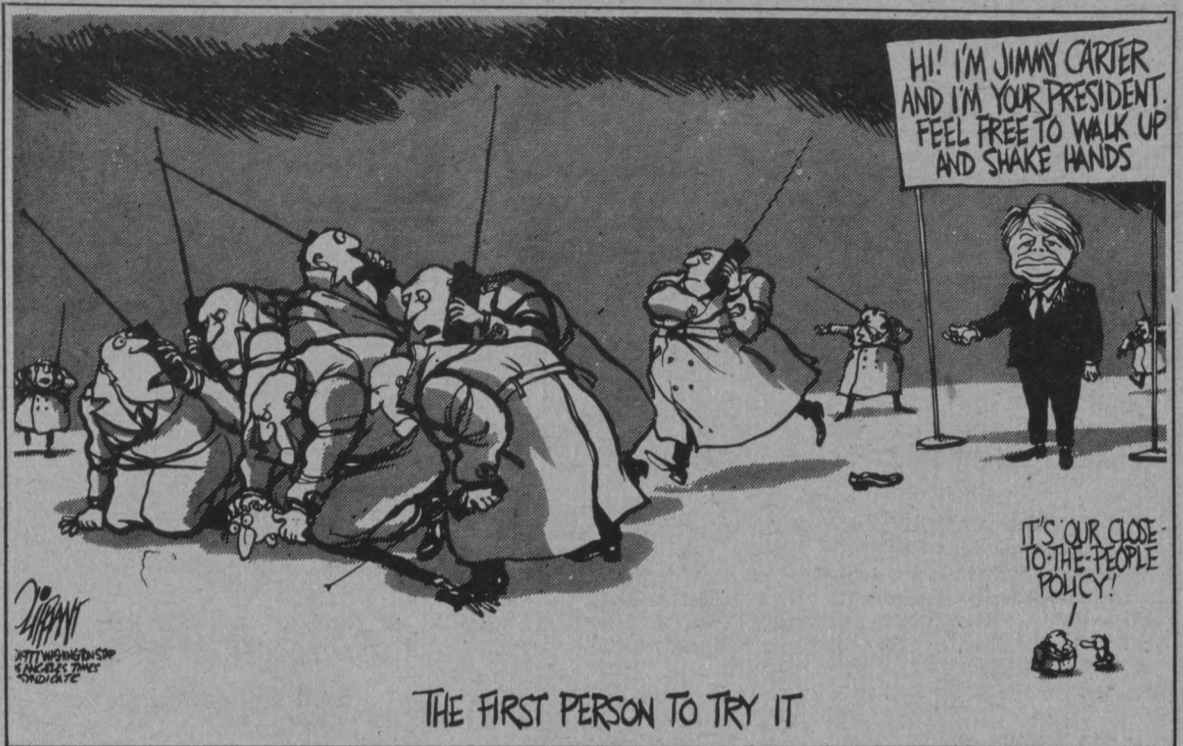

William Krebs in his article on Patricia Laney's murder did not bring out some important information. Many community members believe that Patty would not willingly have gotten into a car with someone she didn't know and trust. Although Patty was "known to have hitchhiked," she knew both Jackie Rook and Mary Sarris and became active in the printing and distribution of information regarding their disappearances. She'd been working on the campaign the morning of her

abduction. The evening of her disappearance Ms. Laney arranged to have a friend pick her up at the corner of Patterson and Hollister. Finally, she knew that she had free bus service and that the buses were still running.

Today there will be a rally at noon in Storke Plaza in support of the extension of bus services, development of short distance taxi service, and boycotts of businesses and activities which exploit sexuality especially in combination with violence to sell products and create role models.

Tuesday at noon there will be

a march down State Street to present petitions to Omer Rains and Lagomarsino's offices and the Municipal Transit District in support of extended bus service. Carpools leave the Service Center and North Hall parking lots at 11:15 Tuesday.

Those who feel sorrow at the deaths of Patty and Jacqueline are joining together by wearing black armbands until the murderer is apprehended.

Those who knew Jackie knew how responsible she was, knew she could take care of herself. She was one of the few people I've come in contact with who knew exactly where she was going and what she wanted to do with her life. She was very self sufficient and often travelled

alone. Jackie loved life and enjoyed people as anyone could tell from her volunteer teaching and her job as a resident assistant.

The moral of the story? DON'T HITCH-HIKE!!! As simple as that. What happened to Jackie could happen to anybody. Yes, I understand it's rare. I've used the same arguments; I know the statistics. No odds spared Jackie. Maybe saving 5 or 10 minutes by not waiting for a bus is worth it to you and you don't care about the risk. I don't think your family or your friends would agree.

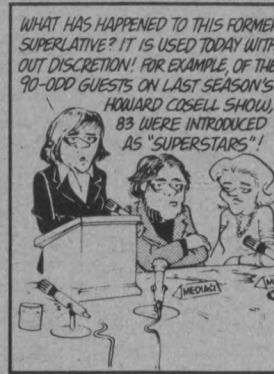

Las Vegas Snuffs Gauchos, Record Dwindles to 5 and 9

The University of Nevada, Las Vegas proved to be an ungracious host Friday night, as the Running Rebels cagers dismantled UCSB, 113-69.

Currently rated sixth in the major polls, The Rebels set an NCAA record by scoring over 100 points in their 12th consecutive contest. Leading the way for UNLV were Glen Gondrezick and Lewis Brown. Gondrezick hit on 12 of 16 attempts from the field, finishing with 26 points and 7 rebounds. Brown also shot well, hitting 8 of 15 from the floor, for 19 points, grabbing 8 rebounds.

"UNLV beat us every way possible tonight," commented Coach Ralph Barkey. "They are extremely quick and thoroughly dominated our team. I thought our team played very badly."

The game was close at the outset, mainly because of two factors: UCSB's combination zone worked very well for the first part of the game and the Gauchos ran a smooth, patient offense. With 13 minutes to go in the first half, Las Vegas' lead was only 17-15, but the game was soon 28. UCSB managed only three points in the next five minutes, and fell behind 31-18, and at halftime, 53-27.

Again free throws played an important role in the Gaucho demise; they made only 13 of 25 and 5 of 12 in the first 20 minutes. However, scoring droughts throughout the contest was definitely the biggest factor.

With 10:40 to play the score was a respectable, 79-55, but UCSB went for another 3 and a half minutes without scoring; UNLV's lead ballooned to 94-55. The Rebels shot 53% for the game, to the Gauchos 41.8% (36.7% in the first half).

On the bright side, "Tex" Walker played an outstanding game, scoring 23 points and grabbing 7 rebounds.

Gaucha Netters to Play Pros Today

Warming up for some tough season play, the Gaucho tennis team will take on the Pros of the South Coast area today in an afternoon tournament.

The entire men's team will pit their forces against such notable pros as Bob Chapple, a former NCAA singles and doubles champion, Larry Easley of Ojai, Bill Reynolds, and John Kinsella, former number one player for Loyola. UCSB alumnus Crandall Edwards will also play. Edwards was number one on the men's team here.

Along with UCSB's top six men, coach Patton reported that Dan Shawn, John Vogel, Doug Woodburn, George Leon, red shirt Frank Sasseli and others will join the team in challenging the Pro players.

Patton planned this match to prepare his team for a very intense season, especially for their opening match against UCLA, last year's number one team in the nation. The Gauchos meet UCLA this Friday, here, in the stadium courts.

This should be an excellent spectator match, and Patton feels confident that his team will make a strong showing. Gaucho standouts to keep an eye on include, Dan Shaw, Ted Feley Filley, and number one man, Jim Thompson.

The match will begin at 3 p.m. and everyone is invited.

Women Cagers Outhustle Northridge 75-72 Game Ends in Double Overtime

About 50 spectators and 10 times as many empty seats got a chance to see a spectacular basketball battle Friday night at Robertson Gym. After the smoke cleared the UCSB women's basketball team wrested a 75-72 double overtime decision from a most formidable Cal-State Northridge team.

In the game's early going it appeared that the Gauchos were in control, keeping the visitors at bay by five points. However the Matadors, utilizing tough defense and a deliberate offense, grabbed a 37-35 halftime lead.

Capitalizing on Gaucho turnovers, CSUN continued to control the tempo of the game in the second half. It appeared that they had the game wrapped up leading by as much as nine markers.

However the hometowners hung tough, forcing some turnovers and making breaks for

themselves. They were able to tie things up at 58-58 as regulation time expired. In the first overtime the Matadors once again appeared to have the game iced away, leading by a two point advantage, and sitting on the ball, trying to go for the last shot in the game.

However, Northridge was forced to give the ball back to Santa Barbara when the 30 second clock expired. This proved to be the fatal move, as Gaucho forward Laurie Wilson hit a 20 footer from the corner to

end the first anti-climatic overtime knotted at 66-66.

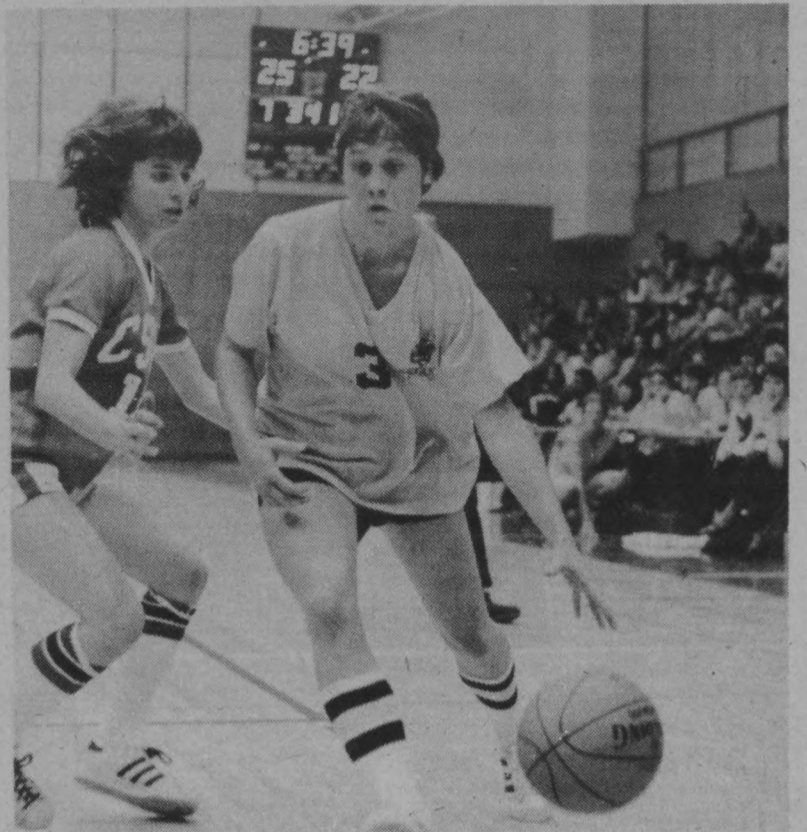
UCSB finally took the game when sophomore forward Mary McLaughlin successfully converted a three point play, which gave the Gauchos a five point lead with 3:10 remaining on the game clock. The Matadors tried to pull more tricks out of the bag but it was empty.

Commenting on the win, head coach Bobby Bonace said, "We won because we got up and stayed up. It was just a super effort. Cal-State Northridge has a fine team."

A look at both teams' records substantiates the validity of Bonace's statement. CSUN has a record of 602 while the Gauchos are 5-8.

UCSB's win was team effort. Their stellar performances came from Mariana Schiff and Mary McLaughlin who had 24 and 20 points respectively. Leslie Ford supported the team with her strong board play, plucking down 25 rebounds.

The Gauchos' next home game is Wednesday February 2, at 8 p.m. in Rob Gym.

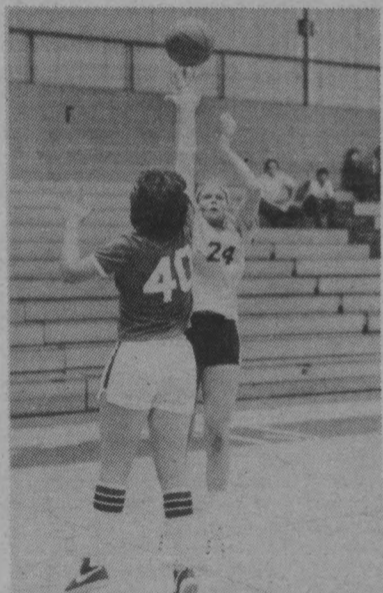


GUARD SANDY DOWNING was responsible for many effective Gaucho plays.

"We strongly support the bill that Lagomarsino is drawing up," said Ellen Sidenberg, a spokesperson for Get Oil Out. "We would like to see all tankers over 20,000 DWT diverted outside the channel."

A recent report by the Long Beach Harbor Commission and the California Public Utilities Commission pinpoints the S.B. channel as the most likely target for tanker accidents once the Trans-Alaska pipeline is completed this summer.

"All coastal accidents are assumed to occur somewhere in the Santa Barbara Channel," states the report, which also predicts that as many as five tanker accidents could occur in the channel during a ten year period.

"The companies bringing Alaskan Oil to Long Beach are not making any plans to go outside the channel," remarked County Supervisor Bill Wallace. "It's (tanker traffic) an ongoing problem that is not getting any better."

Wallace would like to see the use of existing pipelines as a replacement for increased tanker traffic. But Wallace's plan has not met with full agreement from environmentalists.

"We've (the Board of Supervisors) received some static from the Sierra Club," explained Wallace, who said that the environmentalists were concerned that the oil companies would build more oil platforms under the pretense of making the pipeline more economically sound.

"It's a valid argument, one that will have to be discussed," Wallace said.

Wallace opposes an alternative plan calling for the establishment of an oilport off the Guadalupe Dunes.

The Campus Police, the County Sheriff, and the I.V. Foot Patrol are attempting to inform the community about protective measures. Women officers met with campus dormitory residents yesterday to discuss rape prevention and awareness. The Foot Patrol has received several calls asking for information about self-protection devices. Both groups have met with community organizations involved in the case.

In the community, there has been a sustained response of anger and frustration expressed Thursday night at an I.V. Women's Center meeting. A local ride board and system for lending cars to women who need rides has already been established. Community leaders and concerned citizens met yesterday to consider a "give a sister a ride"

bumper sticker campaign and other actions.

Community groups have also put up posters warning hitchhikers of the deaths at local hitchhiking spots. Some of those who have called for better protection for I.V. women are wearing mourning arm bands until the apprehension of the alleged murderer(s).

To increase community awareness about rape prevention proposals, a rally will be held today at 1 p.m. in Storke Plaza.

After extensive search of the Refugio Canyon area, the Sheriff's Department has failed to find any new leads in the case. A trained dog from Sierra Madre has been brought in to help in the search. Police are requesting that anyone who saw Pat Laney hitchhiking at the corner of Patterson and Hollister or Highway 101 around 3 p.m. on Tuesday contact the Sheriff's detective bureau.

The construction of the proposed plant was opposed by ecologists as being potentially dangerous to the environment, especially to the Suisun marsh. "We don't know how dangerous the plant would have been," said Larry Moss of the Planning and Conservation League. "Dow never supplied the (Environmental impact) information to the state, so no decision could be made on the permit."

According to the Dow statement, the company has

spent more than \$4 million for required environmental studies. "We don't believe that anyone can build a more environmentally sound plant than we can," Brubaker said.

James Lee, president of the State Building and Construction Trades Council of California said, "After two years and \$4 million in cash outlay it's disgusting that an environmentally sound project which could bring over 1,000 jobs in construction alone has to be wiped off the planning boards merely because one local agency refused to issue a permit."

Countering Brown's remarks, Saxon said, "I would like equal time...I want to discuss state government and how to run it."

"I wonder why the State doesn't get at these problems,"

Saxon asked. "We are talking about some of the deepest and most difficult problems I know of. The University didn't create them, although it contributed to them, just as the University can contribute to the solutions, if we are given the freedom to do so."
