Is the Bible funny? Can the word of God actually induce uncontrollable fits of laughter? At the hands of the Reduced Shakespeare Company, even the bloodiest of books in the Old Testament can be transformed into an uproarious theatrical joy ride.

The Bible: The Complete Word of God (abridged) is the latest offering from the Reduced Shakespeare Company. Their specialty is taking voluminous, deftly serious tomes and topics and condensing them into two-hour romps of slapstick, songs and shenanigans, performed by a trio of gifted comedians. Their previous efforts at reduction (to absurdity) include The Complete Works of William Shakespeare (abridged) and The Complete History of America (abridged). Both productions enjoyed energetic approval by audiences across the globe.


In The Bible, the company, armed with copies of the King James version (borrowed from a hotel room), Isaac Asimov's call Arts & Lectures at 893-3535. Guide to the Bible and The Children's Illustrated Bible, begins by recreating

the books of Genesis with the down-low "In the Beginning Blues."

Informative asides such as distinguishing the two Josephs (Old and New Testament versions) are done with songs and flash cards. The battle of David and Goliath is dramatically recreated in slow motion to the theme of "Chariots of Fire." The victorious David celebrates by dancing a slow-motion cabbage patch. And then there's that glimpse into the "Top 10 Rejected Commandments....

And how would the Almighty take to this artistic rendition of His word? The Reduced Shakespeare Company points out that God must have a sense of humor, for "why else would he have the children of Israel wander in the Middle East for 40 years, and then have them settle in the one place without oil?"

The Reduced Shakespeare Company Comes to U

Matthew Croke, Reed Martin and Austin Tichenor are the trio of actors known as the Reduced Shakespeare Company. Although the group squeezes humorous versions of Shakespearean plays into 90-minute performances, the actors in the company are not a cross between Richard Burton and that short guy who did the Micro Machines commercials (the one who crammed about five minutes worth of speech into 30 seconds).

That would be too silly. Luckily for those of us who like our literature relayed to us in a quick and fun manner, the Reduced Shakespeare Company is coming back to Santa Barbara, with performances in Campbell Hall on Tuesday and Wednesday nights. This time around, the troupe is offering their (relatively) brief interpretation of the Bible in their production The Bible: The Complete Works of God (abridged). We here at Artsweek thought the show sounded pretty damn cool, so we rang up company member Tichenor and got some info about it.

How do you cram the story in one of the biggest books in the entire world into 90 minutes?

Fast and furiously. As is with all our shows, we cut out Midwest in November. the unimportant characters and we get right to the sex and the killing - there is no book in the history of civilization with as much !rilling as the Bible. Also, the authors are dead, so they can't sue us.

How do you decide which acts are unimportant? It takes some figuring out. We wrote an American history [production] and we had to learn how to write together. The three of us decide how we're gonna cover the whole thing. Sometimes in the act of covering the whole thing, you mention a certain book and by mentioning it you've covered it. The audience becomes the final judge. We make mistakes and sometimes the mistakes are funnier than anything else, and so we'll keep

So how long have you been doing this show?

We've been doing the Bible for a year and a half. It took us about six months to write it and to get it into the shape we wanted. The official premiere was in December at the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C. It was a 12-week sold-out tour. We've also been to the Edin-

Wow. It's a great job 'cause we just get silly in front of people and get to make people laugh.

Have you received any heck for doing the Bible —

like, "That's blasphemy!"

We've only been criticized by people who don't go to the theater anyway. The ministers and rabbis and priests of all denominations see the show and then they send their flocks. We got a review by a nun at the Kennedy Center who said it was "wacky and zany and a little

Local bands will compete for money, prizes and exposure that could ignite their rise to stardom in the Ticketmaster Unsigned Band Showcase at Victoria Hall in downtown Santa Barbara this Saturday. The doors open at 6 p.m. for anyone 18 and over, and tickets can be purchased early from Ticketmaster or at the door for only \$1.99.

Six bands are slated to perform, five of them from Santa Barbara: The Derita Sisters and Junior, Holden, Hunnypot, Pollen and Wildflower. The sixth, Enok, hails from Ventura.

Holden, a piano, bass and drum trio, is made up of lead vocalist/pianist Todd Capps, bassist/ backing vocalist Bruce Winter and drummer Erik Herzog. Capps, the songwriter and driving force behind the band, shared his thoughts with Artsweek.

How would you classify Holden's musical

I think I would just call it melodic pop—I think in some ways we're doing songs with piano, bass and drums that in another format could work well with guitar, bass and drums, but it adds a different flavor. Not too many have done or are doing it with piano.

Is there anyone else that plays with just

piano, bass and drums?

The Ben Folds Five are the only other band out there doing it, so they must have stolen our idea.

Are contests like this important for aspiring artists?

I think it's a good thing to have an opportunity like this for local musicians to be heard by someone who has influence in the industry. I'm a little uncomfortable with it being a contest. There are so many good musicians, especially in the Santa Barbara area.

How important is this contest?

I'm not counting on it as either making or breaking my career as a musician.

What's the most exciting thing about participating in this contest?

The thing that excites me the most is being able to play with Erik and Bruce. It's something I've been looking forward to playing live with them for a long time.
