SANTA BARBARA, Apr. 7 (Delayed)—Playing their initial game under the lights, SC's Trojans lost their first intercollegiate baseball game of the season 10-8, to the Santa Barbara College Gauchos in a 3-hour and 20 minute contest here at Laguna Park tonight.

The CIBA leading Trojans were unable to adapt themselves to the lights until late in the game. The loss of SC's fifth of the season.

At this first convention since the war, Miss Smith was elected by the delegates as National Regional Representative of the West. The west includes Hawaii and Alaska and all of the southwest and western states to the boundaries of South Dakota.

The theme of the convention was “The Place of AWS in the Post-War World,” and the discussions were divided according to the categories in which they were classified, large school's service, large school's executive, and small school's executive and service.

S. B. Highly Regarded

“This convention was a very fruitful experience,” according to Miss Smith, “for all delegates concerned. The exchanging of ideas and attempting of solutions of common problems will be of great value throughout the convening years to AWS members here at Santa Barbara. Many new ideas were presented that can be incorporated into our organization. It was of great importance to discover that AWS on Santa Barbara campus is so highly regarded in the national organization as compared to other colleges and universities, as was proven by the fact that many universities asked to have copies and explanations of our organization and activities.”

One of the greatest underlying problems common to all campuses, was that of incorporating all women on campus into activities. Every phase of student life of women was discussed.

Representatives from universities and colleges throughout the United States were present at the meeting. There were seventeen representatives from the state of California.

# EDITORIAL

Certainly not more than two hundred students have anything at stake in the various elections, etc., and theirs is a personal stake. There is simply not enough interest in this type of information, to devote space to it in El Gaucho.

This group would like to open their El Gaucho each week and read gentle admonitions to keep the scrap paper and cigarette butts policed up, for the good of dear old Santa Barbara. I'm not saying that we shouldn't keep the butts policed up, but how would you like to write stuff like that each week.

We feel that in dealing with national events, we are focusing attention on matters which are or at least should be, of interest to everyone. To be sure, the paper should reflect the opinion of the majority of the students, and it is hoped that there will be continued criticism.



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
