"Elijah", Mendelssohn's famous oratorio will be presented by the combined choral groups of the music department tomorrow evening at 8:15 in the college auditorium, and Sunday evening at 7:30 at the First Presbyterian church.

This oratorio portrays one of the most dramatic incidents in the Old Testament, and Mendelssohn has put some of his finest talent into the music, to make the characters live for us in all their vital strength and pathos.

### TITLE ROLE

The title role of Elijah, the outstanding solo part, is sung by Sam Simons, who possesses a rich, warm baritone voice, well suited to the part. Other solo parts will be taken by Nancy Bramlage, who will sing "Hear Ye Israel;" June Lord, singing the widow's part; Bill Marvel, tenor; Else Jensen, soprano; and Jean Lewis and Rosina Tiberti, contraltos.

Dr. Christy is general conductor of the concert, assisted by Mrs. Barnett, Dr. Walter Buchanan and Mr. Jones. The oratorio will be accompanied by the string ensemble, with Frances Wishard at the piano and Virginia Blunden at Presbyterian church organ.

As a gift to the college and community, both performances of Elijah will be open free to the public.

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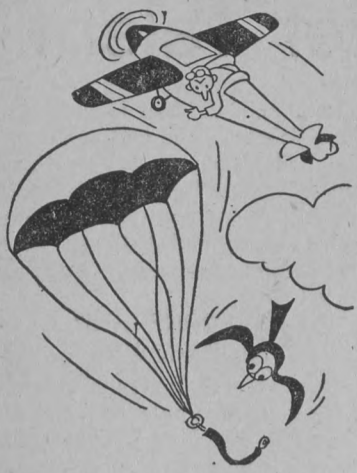


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## Model Contest Open to Girls

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# INTERSQUAD FOOTBALL TUSSLE REVEALS POWERHOUSE TALENT

A Gold punt blocked by Vic Paulson early in the second quarter and an ensuing touchdown by halfback Bill French from ten yards out gave the White eleven a lead they never relinquished, as Coach Stan Williamson's gridders signed off one of the most successful Spring training sessions in school history with the White shirts eking out a narrow 7-6 victory over the Golds last Thursday at La Playa field.

## LINESMEN STAR

It might have been a different story, however, without the stellar line play of Vic Paulson, Bob Bowman, and Joe Rossi for the Whites, as time after time this trio broke through the line to gum up the Gold machine during crucial moments. The running of Sam Cathcart, Gene Sherman, and Earl Engman and the smart engineering of quarterbacks Tom White and Sherman Worth for the Gold eleven chalked up 8 first downs to 4 for the Whites, and the game ended with the losers in possession on the White 23.

## DULL FIRST QUARTER

After a rather dull first period, highlighted mainly by fullback Jack Miller's spectacular distance punting and the snaky, swivel-hipped running of Cathcart, the Gold took possession deep in their own territory. Three plays netted nothing, and it was here that the fourth down punt was blocked by Paulson and recovered by him on the 19. French made 8 around left end and the White quarterback Bill Steele passed to Paulson for a first down on the 10. On the next play French shot through a hole off right tackle for TD, Miller converting beautifully to make the score 7-0.

After an exchange of punts, Tommy White recovered a White fumble on the enemy 17-yard marker, but Bowman broke through the line to smear White for a 9-yard loss on the first play. Two tries at the center and an incomplete pass failed to advance the ball, and the Whites took over on their own 17 as the half ended.

## GOLD COMEBACK

It was midway into the third period before the Gold began their comeback that carried them 80 yards on a sustained drive for their only score. Spencer, Gold fullback, made nine through the line and Cathcart, sparkplug of the march, picked up a first down on his own 33. A quarterback sneak netted two and righthalf Earl Engman made another first down on the 43 with two cracks at the line. A quick-opening play sent Cathcart off guard for 8, and the next play picked up another first down on the White 45 as the third quarter came to a close.

## FINAL SCORE

With Cathcart in command, the Gold chalked up their fourth first down in a row on the White 31, and a moment later Sammy through the middle picked up 7 more. Engman, on a hand-off from Worth, scampered through the entire White team before he was brought down on the 10, first and goal to go. Worth faded as if to pass, then slipped the pigskin backhand to Cathcart on a sparkling play and the driving halfback smacked all the way for 6 points. The conversion attempt was fumbled, and the score stayed at 7-6. With only seconds to go and the Golds fighting desperately for possession of the ball, Bob Cheatham, playing right tackle for the Gold squad, stole the porkhide and bucked to the White 31 before he was stopped. The Gold was smashing at the line and had the ball on the enemy 23 when the final gun sounded.

Outstanding on the field Thursday was Sam Cathcart who reeled off the longest runs of the afternoon and who is every bit as shifty and hard-charging as he was last year. Williamson had nothing but praise for the team as a whole, and Rossi, Bowman, and Paulson in particular. The capable mentor's only wish is that the boys learn to shield the passer in the new "T" formation, a very noticeable fault in Thursday's game. Only a handful of passes was gotten off because of terrific rushing by the opposing linesmen.

The teams played heads-up ball, and the prospects for the Gauchos fielding a winning team next fall are far from

The recent 2C2A conference track meet held in Fresno saw a powerful San Jose team sweep to a grand victory over five competing colleges with a total of 74 5/8 points. The final scores for the schools entered were: San Jose 74 5/8, Fresno State 34, San Diego State 26 9/10, COP 16 2/5, and Santa Barbara College 12 5/6.

Although the final score shows the Gauchos far behind, many outstanding performances were turned out by them, including the breaking of two school records.

## Swimmers Garner Third at 2C2A

Running up against the best conference competition to be had, Santa Barbaras eleven man swimming team grabbed off third place honors in the 2C2A championships at Fresno Saturday in a record smashing meet that saw a new mark being set in each event as College of Pacific nosed out San Jose, 71-2 for top spot. The Gauchos were next with 20 points followed by Fresno State with 11 and Cal Poly with none. San Diego did not enter a squad.

In losing their first contest of the season, Coach Dearborn's stokers had a rough afternoon as counters were scored in only four events. Bob Watts splashed his way to third place in the 150 yard backstroke to garner individual honors for the locals. The team of Aelong, Hart, Jones and Jardine came from behind to snag a second in the 400 yard free style relay, and Dick Specht and Phil Wahl finished 4th and 5th respectively to chalk up points in the 200 yard breast stroke. The Gaicho medley relay trio of Aelong, Watts, and Specht finished third in their 300 yard event.

received. Los Banos del Mar is located on West Beach, at the end of the bus line. The pool is 50 feet wide and 50 meters long, and has high and low diving boards. The water is half fresh and half sea water for greater buoyancy, it is reported.

## BALLOONS AND NIGHTGOWNS

Team events for men will include a balloon relay race and a 150-meter medley relay race. Women will amuse spectators in their nightgown relay (4 girls to a team), and then will participate in a 100-yard medley relay. A mixed team with 3 girls and 3 men per team will swim a 200-yard free style relay.

Individual events include a 50-meter back stroke race, a 50-meter breast stroke race, a 50-meter free style race, and diving competition for men. Women will participate in a 50-meter free style race, a 50-yard medley race, and in fancy or comedy diving.

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
