Increased Number of New Students Enroll Thursday

Dr. Paul W. Wright, Registrar, announced that an increased number of new students have made applications for the Fall Semester. Approximately 550 have signified their intention to register this week at Santa Barbara College for the first time.

Of these, 55% are freshmen, 20% are sophomores and 25% juniors. Of the new students, 67% are women. However, Dr. Wright said that the total enrollment for the Fall Semester will probably balance out to 55% women and 45% men.

Actual registration of students will take place Thursday, September 18. The schedule will run something like this:

9 a.m. — 4 p.m. returning students who are not veterans register and pay fees. Registration will take place in the Men's Gym.

9 a.m. — noon, all veteran students, new and returning, register and pay fees. Registration will take place in the Auditorium.

Noon — 4 p.m., new students who are not veterans register and pay fees. Registration will take place in the Men's Gym.

Following the registration, all students, new and returning, will go through the Dean of Men and Dean of Women lines in North Hall to fill in the required card information for the respective offices.

Centralized enrollment in classes will occur Friday, September 19, allowing Senior students priority from 9:00 to 10:00 a.m. All other classmen will sign for classes from 10:00 to 1:00. Each department will have a station at which a student may enroll in all classes in that department without the tedious process of visiting each individual instructor. The location of departmental enrollment stations is as follows:

Council Still Needs Committee Chairmen

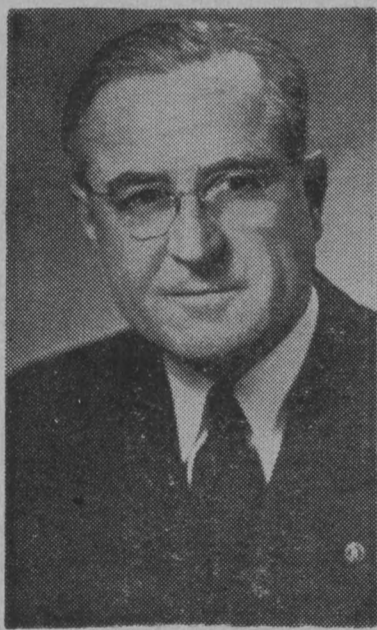
Applications for the committee chairmanships still open are now being accepted in the Associated Students office, according to President Fred Wade.

Dinner, Rally, Howdy Dance Combined For First All-College Social Event

The Gaucho Gambol this year will combine the howdy dance with the all-school picnic customarily sponsored by the collective efforts of the Associated Women Students and the Associated Men Students.

A rally for the La Verne football game will be incorporated as well a talent program for the entertainment of all.

Uniquely arranged to occupy the entire evening, the Gambol will begin at 5:00 p.m. tomorrow night and continue through 11:30. Skip Wilson's band has been procured for the dance, and Gambol tickets will include admission to the dancing.

Stan Williamson, Gaucho head football coach will introduce the entire team which includes many new faces. He will also outline a few principles of the revived, and often preferred, single wing attack.

The Howdy Dance will be held in the cafeteria and is scheduled to begin sharply at 8:00.

The event is required for all freshmen.

Seventeen Santa Barbara College faculty members will have new academic titles this fall as a result of promotions announced by Provost J. Harold Williams.

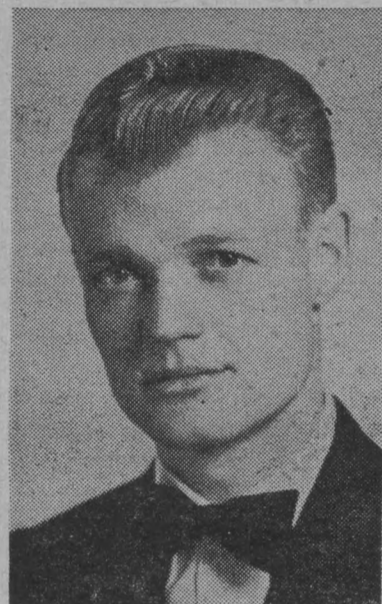

Presidents Sproul, Wade Extend Welcomes to Santa Barbara College Students

With the opening of classes this fall the University of California enters upon its eighty-fifth year, although no present campus has been occupied for longer than eighty years. The first campus was in Oakland, California, and the site is now in the center of the business district of that city. The second campus, at Berkeley, first came into use at Commencement in 1873, and the Los Angeles campus, then on Vermont Avenue, was taken over by The Regents in 1919. Santa Barbara College became a part of the University in 1944.

I mention these facts in welcoming new and returning students to the campus in order to stress the idea behind the University of California, which is older than any of its physical properties, namely, that the function it serves is not limited geographically, and that it

Fraternity Rushing Schedule Announced

Inter Fraternity Council this week announced its plans for the fall rushing schedule. Rushing will officially open on Thursday, Sept. 24, but prior to this date there are several activities scheduled for the prospective fraternity rushees.

On Monday Sept. 22, the first day of classes, IFC is presenting an orientation meeting for all rushees at Ridge Hall 101 at 4 in the afternoon. The purpose of this meeting is to present the rules and regulations which govern rushing on the Santa Barbara campus, and to supply the rushees with information on the various aspects of fraternity life on Santa Barbara College.

Dr. George Hall and Mr. Paul Kolyn will be the guest speakers at this meeting, and both Dr. Reynolds, Dean of Men, and Joe Costantino, President of IFC will also inform the prospective rushees of the fraternity picture here at SBC.

Rushees are invited to sign up for the official rush season at the IFC table in the Dean of Men's line. By signing up at this time, the men will place their names on the official rush list, and will enable the fraternities to better contact them for the rush parties that will be coming up. The official rush period begins Thursday, Sept. 26, and will close Saturday night October 4. During this period the various fraternities will extend bids to the rushees for a variety of parties, and entertain-

ment designed to better acquaint rushees with the fraternity life.

On Monday, Oct. 6, the rushees will sign preference sheets in the Dean of Men's office, and pinning ceremonies will be conducted that night for the new fraternity pledges.

IFC president Joe Costantino pointed out that fraternities make it possible for a young college man to acquire the social poise, the experience, and maturity that will make him a better leader after his undergraduate days are over. Also, the fraternities manage to have a great round of parties, joints with sororities, picnics, intramural activities, and formals that the non-org does not have a chance to attend.

is not the University of any region but of the whole State of California. It is, moreover, a descendant of universities in other lands which are many hundreds of years old, gathers students and faculty members from all parts of the world, and sends its graduates out to every continent and almost every country on earth. It is because of this greater function that the University is able to offer so much to the people of its own State.

As students you are a part of this great enterprise, concerned primarily with the development of the human mind and the knowledge which men have accumulated through all recorded history. You will share in that enterprise to the fullest only through devoting time and thought to the courses in which you are enrolled. But your enjoyment of college life, and your fitness for life after graduation, may be greatly enhanced by participation in student activities.

Not long ago *Time Magazine* made a survey of some 9,000 college graduates, and found that the satisfaction derived in later life from a college education was most directly correlated with success as a student measured in grades received. The editors of the *Time* report say: "All the graduates, the humanities students, the social scientists, the physical scientists, and the engineers, rate on our satisfaction index in direct proportion to their grades . . . Wherever they went, whatever they studied, and whatever they are doing now, the graduates who made the best grades are most satisfied with college."

From these data the editors draw the conclusion which I now pass on to you: "Those four college years can never be repeated; they are your last days of freedom, before life becomes all too real and all too earnest; they are your last chance to experiment and test your wings, whether along scholastic or social lines; for heaven's sake, do not waste them in idleness or indirection."

Dr. Meshke To Speak At Home Ec Convention

Dr. Edna D. Meshke, professor of home economics and chairman of the department at Santa Barbara College, will be the keynote speaker at the Utah State Conference on Home Economics in Higher Education, to be held today, Thursday, and Friday at the University of Utah, Salt Lake City.

This honor went to Dr. Meshke because of her prominent work in the home economics field. Before coming to Santa Barbara College in 1948 she served as chairman of the home economics department at Butler University and the University of Maryland.

UCSBC Students Win Summer ROTC Awards

Four Santa Barbara College ROTC students attending the summer training camp at Fort Ord this summer won the Sharpshooter's Medal, it was announced by Major John W. Barnes, assistant professor of military science, who served as an instructor there.

Danny C. Escalera of Santa Barbara achieved highest score, shooting 182 out of a possible 210 points. This score rated him as the outstanding marksman of his company.

Others earning the medal were Vincent DiFiore, with 178 points, Paul Williamson, with 169 points, and Bruce Berry, with 169 points.

Twelve others were awarded Marksman Medals.

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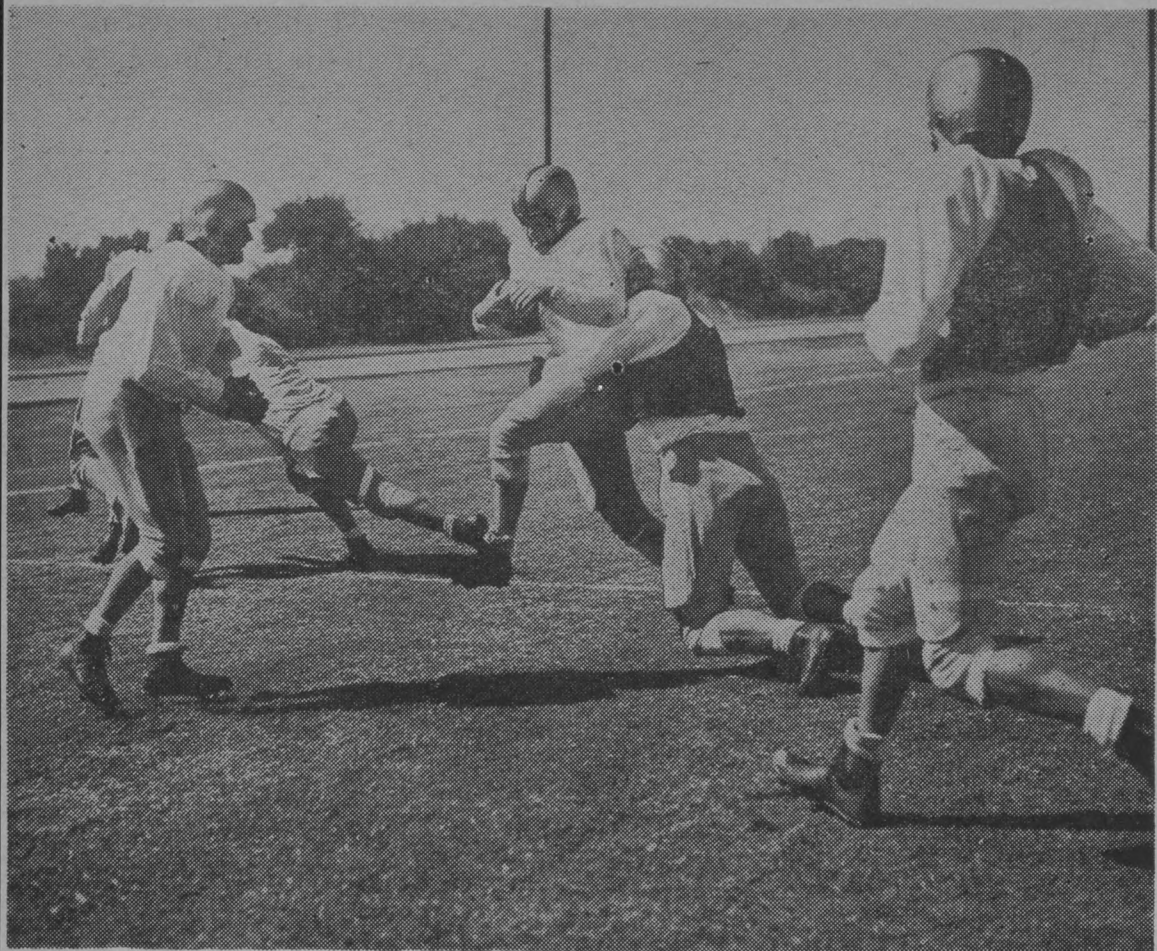

GAUCHOS OPEN '52 FOOTBALL SEASON HERE FRIDAY NIGHT

La Verne Leopards Meet Local Gridders At La Playa Stadium in Initial Contest

A new coach, a new system and many new faces—that's the story of the opening football game of the season Friday night. The 1952 Gauchos, sporting a single wing attack under Coach Stan Williamson open the campaign at La Playa Stadium against La Verne College's Leopards. Game time is 8:15.

The "new" tag must be strange to Williamson. Actually, he is an old hand at La Playa Stadium, having coached the Gauchos from 1941 to 1948 (with time out for the war) and acting as assistant to Roy Engle in 1950. But Friday night's game is really a homecoming for the white-haired mentor. He spent last season as a lieutenant commander in the Navy and was named Navy "Coach of the Year" after leading the San Diego Naval Air Station eleven to a successful season.

There's nothing phony about the "new" designation attached to the single wing. The Gauchos have

been using the "T" and split "T" for the past several years and many of the players have never played under that system.

There have been only three short weeks of practice for the Gauchos but they have taken to the new system like ducks to water.

Although there is only one new face in the starting offensive line-up for the Gauchos—Right End Charley Green, the squad is liber-

ally sprinkled with newcomers. Five of the starting defensive team are wearing Gaucho uniforms for the first time. They are Ends Ray Thornton and Andy Spaan, Tackle Bill Paterson, Guard Chuck Cravens and Safetyman Bob Chapman.

Already familiar to Gaucho fans are such names as George Mattias, Grant Gaunce, Gordon Weber, Marvin Ashby, Minor Rootes, Chuck Miller, Gary Morris, Bill Schaefer, Don Steere, Dave Gorrie, Les Harris, Bob Biddle and Ray Stark.

Williamson will probably start Morris at the all-important left half spot. The sophomore Carpenteria flash has been battling with Bucky Baird, Bob Shoup and Doug Hitchen for the starting post at tailback and appears to have a slight edge.

Under Williamson's brand of football the tailback is the key man because of his passing. The Gauchos should set some kind of record this year for attempted passes since a startling percentage of their plays are of the aerial variety.

Defensively, the Gauchos will use a somewhat novel 5-2-2-2 set-up. Schaefer and Stark, two veteran linebackers, are the key to the success of that defense.

Stark reported only this week and may be a little rusty. But he was the most valuable lineman on the team last season and can be

counted upon to play a steady brand of ball.

Another late reportee who should come in for his share of action is Right Half Bill Davis. He just returned from a summer's tour of Japan with a college all-star baseball team. A quarterback on last year's split "T" team, he has worked into the single wing very well.

Little is known of the La Verne team's potential. They are about in the same class with some of the teams in the Southern California Intercollegiate Conference which makes up a major portion of the Gauchos' schedule each year. The Gauchos have not met the Leopards since 1940, but the southerners hold an edge of 7-5 in the over-all rivalry.

Recognition forms will be placed in the student mail boxes of organization presidents early next week. These forms must be filled out completely, including a list of officers and members, and returned by Oct. 3 to the Student Body office, stated Melida Horn, chairman of the Activities Control Board.

The recognition form, plus a copy of the organization's constitution must be on file in order for a group to be recognized on campus. George D. Sheperd, manager of the College Bookstore at Santa Barbara College, died here of a heart ailment Sept. 6. He was 54 years of age.

He came to Santa Barbara in October last year after serving as the Bookstore Manager at the Davis campus of the University of California since 1938. For three years during the war he was a price specialist in the Office of Price Administration in Sacramento.

Born at Chandler, Oklahoma, he was a graduate of Berkeley campus of the University of California where he earned a BS degree in economics.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Helen L. Sheperd, and three children.

2. Tuesday Morning of each week all completed loan fund applications must be in the Cashier's office.

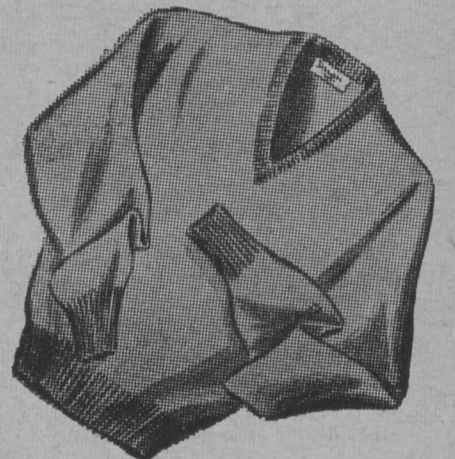
