

Now local residents may whisk themselves away and in two hours find themselves at the gateway to the Rocky Mountain ski resorts of Colorado. A consistent, reliable network of bus and air connections ensure that the anxious ski enthusiast is quickly transported from Denver to his or her favorite of the many ski resorts in the state.

Indeed, the options are open. Colorado, land of the Rockies, the aspens and that fabulous chamagne powder, offers every type of skiing to skiers of all levels of proficiency. Something for everyone. The exhilarating excitement of the sport can only be enhanced when experienced in Colorado.

One of the oldest and most well known ski resorts in the state is fashionable Aspen. Aspen consists of four separate ski areas: Aspen Mountain, Aspen Highlands, Buttermilk and Snowmass. Aspen Mountain, (Ajax Mt.), rises directly out of the small town. The mountain provides some of the

most challenging skiing in the Frontier Airlines from Denver to

Aspen Highlands has been called a "fun" mountain by many skiers. Its slopes cover terrain for all abilities making it ideal for improving skiers. Highlands is the number one NASTAR racing area in the U.S.. Buttermilk also offers plenty of beginner and intermediate trails and is Aspen's favorite family area.

Snowmass is located 11 miles west of the town of Aspen. The huge resort, 1400 acres in all, offers one of the widest varieties in skiing. Plenty of wide open runs and lots of powder are reasons for Snowmass' rapidly growing

Aspen may be reached by air from Denver via Rocky Mountain Airways and Aspen Airways. Continental Trailways offers bus service from the Denver Stapleton airport. Accomodations are numerous with 110 different hotels, lodges, condominiums and dorms.

Crested Butte is another popular ski area and was last years site of the All-Cal Carnival. Crested Butte has a wide variety of terrain including long, gentle beginner slopes, dozens of intermediate runs and some challenging expert courses. Skiers may fly aboard

On Oct. 28 United Airlines began state and most trails are rated from the resort. A \$3, 45 minute bus ride operates to the slopes. Continental Trailways also travels from Denver to Gunnison. Accomodations are limited.

Purgatory offers skiing fun for everybody but mostly caters to the intermediate skier. Located in powder-famous south west Colorado, the resort boasts a 300 inch annual snowfall which ensures some of the most consistently good skiing around.

Nearby Durango is a popular apres-ski spot with its many restaurants and nightclubs. By air, take Frontier Airlines from Denver to La Plata, 37 miles away. A shuttle bus operates from La Plata to Purgatory Lodge. Continental Trailways operates from Denver to Durango for \$22 for the first passenger and \$4 for each additional passenger. Taxi service is available from Durango to Purgatory.

Steamboat Springs is a cow town. It's small, rustic and truly represents the west. Nearby is the resort of Steamboat- "Ski Town USA." Excellent skiing from smooth beginners runs to deep powder through the aspens is offered. Another feature at (Please turn to p.A7, col.1)

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Wintertime in S.B. Area: White Xmas

Winter in Santa Barbara falls somewhat short of the proverbial wonderland of white.

Here, replacing the snow, toboggans and Alaskan husky mush-masters of "real" winters, we have a quasi-season that merely fills the gap between fall and spring. This does not mean, however, that there are no discernable signs of winter's arrival at our sandy shores.

Winter here is more of a subliminal happening. While an easterner has bare trees and piles of snow to clue him in, Santa Barbarans must piece several subtle clues together in order to determine if winter has, in fact, arrived (or departed, for that matter).

A fairly reliable determinant of the winter season here is colds. 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
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
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
Nexus Jump Suit

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
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Denver: Two Hours Away

Steamboat is cross country skiing through the many trails of the surrounding Routt National Forest

Rocky Mountain Airways provides service from Denver to Steamboat Airport for approximately \$30 one way. Trailways also travels from downtown Denver to Steamboat for approximately \$12. There are many accomodations to choose from but reservations are strongly recommended.

Telluride is a favorite among Coloroado ski enthusiasts. Located in the same south west sector as Purgatory, the deep, light powder is featured as 400 inches of snow fall every winter season. The resort is nestled in the valley of a box canyon whose walls rise into peaks of up to 14,000 feet. No wonder Telluride has been called one of the most beautiful places on earth. The town was once a mining mecca of the west. Today the old buildings have led Telluride into being designated as a National Registered Historical Landmark.

Frontier Airlines will fly you to Montrose airport which is 61 miles from the ski area. From there you can catch the Telluride Transfer Galloping Goose Limosine Service to Telluride. Reservations are essential. Continental Trailways also provides charter service from Denver. Telluride only offers 14 places to stay so if you plan on skiing there this winter you beter get on it.

Finally, we come to one of the most famous ski resorts in the world. Besides a chic, international flavor, Vail boasts having North America's largest, most well equiped ski mountains. Vail offers one of the widest choices in skiing, from the gentle



slopes of Golden Peak to the hairraising runs in the north east bowl, Vail has it all. Although Vail has two gondolas, 16 lifts and an uphill capacity of 20,400 persons per hour, crowds are a serious problem and many skiers have complained of having to wait as much as an hour to get on a chair.

Rocky Mountain Airways flies from Denver to Eagle, Colorado, which is 35 miles from Vail. The 30 minute flight costs about \$50 round trip. From Eagle, one can get limosine service to the ski area.

Trailways has four daily runs from Denver to Vail for about \$5 each way. From mid-December to the end of March, Ski Express operates twice daily from Denver Stapleton to Vail for about \$8 one

Tork Fooner took the pragmatic approach. "How do I know when it's winter in Santa Barbara? Because it's summer in China?



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

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
some great skiing, wild parties or just hanging out with the locals at the swinging Tiger Bar in June.
