### **Soccer Squad Bounces Back** Winning Weekend Matchups

Two Wins Help Gauchos Forget About Chapman Loss

The UCSB men's soccer team wasn't going to let a slight break in their fourgame win streak get them down. When conference play began for the Gauchos, the experience gained from the loss to Chapman University proved beneficial.

Santa Barbara (7-4 overall, 2-0 MPSF) kicked off their Mountain Pacific Sports Federation Conference schedule with an important 3-2 victory against the Cal State Fullerton Titans Friday night and a defeat of San Diego State 2-0 yesterday at Harder Stadium.

Coming off the Panther game, which ended 4-6 in overtime, the Santa Barbara squad was ready to prove that the season would not resemble that of

past years, and that the program is on its way up.
"The Chapman game hurt us but we did some good things," Head Coach Mark Arya said. "[The coaching staff] warned the team about the big let-down that sometimes occdown that sometimes occurs after a win streak and, unfortunately, it hap-pened against a Division III team. But, I think that it taught a good lesson."

The lesson was taught and the Gauchos cleared

the way into conference play with two strong wins this weekend. The Titans opened the game as Alfred Partida scored the first goal at 33 minutes. Three minutes later, Fullerton midfielder Brad Wilson scored 10 yards from the

Just as things were be-ginning to look bad for the Gauchos, forward George Savage scored for UCSB with only a minute re-maining in the first half. After halftime, Arya's

team began with a man-marking zonal defense and started to acknowledge and act upon several of the dangerous Titan shot opportunities.

"We had started the

game with a more zonal defense and [Fullerton] had two or three dangerous scoring opportuni-ties," Arya said. "But then we came back and deemphasized on zone and began to deny them

In the 56th minute, mid-fielder Greg DePaco fi-nally tied the game 2-2 with a shot 10 yards from the goal assisted by both midfielders Ralph Robert-son and Matt Arya. DePaco's goal kept the Gauchos in a state of limbo until midfielder.

limbo until midfielder Ralph Robertson scored off a free kick five minutes

"Both Ralph and Brian

Mackerer played great games and we're pleased with their intensity," Mark Arya added. Mackerer, who had to go to the emergency room after the game because of a bruised kidney, started the Fullerton game after missing eight games due to a knee

"I was really happy to come back and play," Mackerersaid. "We played a solid game and after a slow first half — we were determined to come back and get three goals."

The celebration didn't

end after the Titan victory, as the Gauchos moved on to beat San Diego State 2-0, leaving a perfect 2-0 record in MPSF.

With the sun blazing on

the field, both Arya and Aztec Head Coach Chuck Clegg were wary of the heat and substituted players throughout the afternoon game.

"Because of the weather, we had to take a different approach," Mark Arya said. "We had to get the players in and out as often as possible."

After a scoreless first half, the Gaucho team came back and created a number of scoring opportunities. With 38:18 left in the game, Robertson scored the first goal of the game with a direct kick.

After two Aztec yellow cards and several missed

### Gauchos Can't Get Past #5 Tigers; **Record Winning Streak Snapped**

After a week of practices filled with ups and downs, the UCSB women's volleyball team's weekend on the road had that same yoyo effect.

Breaking a Gaucho 13-game winning streak, the #5 University of the Pacific Tigers (11-2 overall, 5-1 in the Big West) pulled together to take the big four-game win over the #6 Gauchos on Friday night (7-15, 12-15, 15-4, 10-15). However, Santa Barbara came back with a vengeance at San Jose State (9-4, 5-2) on Saturday night. Despite much improvement from the young Spartans, the Gauchos quickly found their pace and took the match in three straight games, 15-11, 15-7, 15-5.

The heartbreaker of the weekend came right away for UCSB (14-1, 6-1), but with all of the problems the team faced this week, not to mention the strength of Pacific, the loss shouldn't have a lasting negative affect on the team.

### **Pomona Invitational Gives Young Runners Chance to Get Experience**

The UCSB men's and women's cross country B-teams came back from the Cal Poly Pomona Invitational last weekend with exactly what they were seeking: more experience.

Only two teams competed in the men's race (UCSB finished second with 48 points) and just three teams ran in the women's race (Santa Barbara again finished second with 50 points).

"[The Gaucho runners] represented UCSB well," UCSB coach Pete Dolan said. "In the end, they had all the race that they could handle."

The Gauchos sent their B-team to the invitational on Saturday in order to rest the top seven runners and give the bottom seven a chance to show their stuff.

"I think we ran pretty well," freshman runner Jon Stires said. "We used each other well. We ran in a pretty good pack which is something that we wanted to work on."

UCSB's Dave Blum was the first Gaucho to finish, coming in sixth with a time of 27:36. Santa Barbara's Josh Cobb finished ninth with 27:44 and Stires finished tenth with a time of 27:47 as the Cal Poly Pomona runners won the race with 21 points.

For the women, the Gauchos' Deanna Hadley (who normally runs with the top seven) won the race with a time of 18:41. Mary Crane was the next Gaucho to complete the course, coming in seventh with a time of 19:16, and Adrienne Bell followed her in tenth place with a time of 19:30.

For the Gaucho coaching staff, the next big decision to make will be figur-

ing out who to put in the starting seven for the conference championships.

Coach Dolan seems to be keeping an open mind.

"I can put it this way,"
Dolan said. "With young
people, you never know
when they can break out
with a big race. I try to
keep it as open as possible,
but it's up to them to race
their best."

The younger runners don't seem to be as optimistic.

"It's kind of hard to tell," Stires said. "I think that the top seven is pretty much set unless something drastic happens. The alternate is really the only spot that I think is open."

The next race for the Gauchos will be at the San Luis Obispo Invitational, the final meet before the Big West Championships.


