UCSB Takes 2 of 3 From #17 Santa Clara in Opening Series

Smaldino Powers Gaucho Attack With Eight Hits, Five RBI

Despite losing Sunday's contest, 14-11, in their three-game series with #17 Santa Clara, the Gaucho baseball team had to be pleased with the results of the season-opening weekend at UCSB's Caesar Uyesaka Stadium.

By beating the Broncos (1-2) on Friday, 7-6, and on Saturday, 9-6, UCSB's record stands at 2-1. Last season, Santa Barbara didn't earn its second win until the seventh game of the season.

"We have some ability to score runs offensively, and we did that," UCSB Head Coach Bob Brontsema said. "We'll try and learn from the positive and negative things we did, and we'll get better."

In Friday's season opener, the Gauchos got to SCU starter Bob Pailthorpe (0-1) early, scoring four runs in the second inning off the 1994 Western Coast Conference Pitcher of the Year. The big blow of the inning was a three-run double by senior left fielder Doug Smaldino.

"[The baseball] was a beach ball this weekend," Smaldino said. "I just saw it and hit it hard almost every time."

Smaldino had an incredible series, going 8-12 with five RBI, five runs scored, a home run and five walks.

"Doug's a good offensive player," Brontsema said. "Those are the types of things we expect from him because he's a good player. He's a tough out and he had a great series."

UCSB received strong starting in the contest from senior right-hander Steve Lane (1-0). Lane went five innings, allow-

ing five hits and two runs to earn the victory.

Other offensive contributors were junior third baseman Louis Tapia, who went 3-4 in the game with two RBI, and junior center fielder Wynter Phoenix, who had a hit, a run scored and an RBI.

Sophomore right-hander John Minton pitched scoreless ball for 1½ innings to earn his first save of the year. The game did not end easily for the Gauchos, however, as sophomore right fielder Brett Hardy had to track down a fly ball at the warning track to preserve the UCSB victory.

On Saturday, UCSB went with senior co-captain Pat Treend on the hill. Treend (1-0) pitched well, allowing four runs over seven innings to notch the win. He struck out seven Broncos, walking only three. Sophomore righty Clint Pearson allowed one hit over 1½ innings to earn the save.

"Pat and Steve both came out well," Smaldino said. "They were a big pickup for us."

Offensively, Smaldino led the team once again, going 3-4 with three runs. Junior first baseman Jared Janke added two hits and four RBI. Hardy and sophomore shortstop Joe Kemper each had two hits and two RBI.

On Sunday, the starting pitching that had served Santa Barbara so well in the two previous games was not able to tame the Bronco attack.

Sophomore right-hander Jorvic Salazar (0-1) was shelled, as the Broncos jumped on him for two first-inning and

SB Holds On to First Place With Two Conference Wins

Leading the Big West conference, the UCSB women's basketball team held on to post a close victory at San Jose State University on Sunday after defeating the University of Hawaii on Friday.

Santa Barbara (12-5 overall, 8-2 Big West) was able to defeat SJSU (4-16, 2-9) by a score of 69-63 to earn its sixth conference victory in a row.

The Gauchos defeated the Spartans, 74-63, earlier this season, and San Jose was hoping to return the favor on its home court. After a first half dominated by UCSB, 34-27, SJSU was able to tie the score at 60-60 with only 1:35 remaining.

However, Santa Barbara was able to jump back out to a five-point lead with only 31 seconds remaining. SJSU junior point guard Michelle Gossman put in a layup, but

Volleyball Surely Beats LaVerne, #5 Cougars in Vital Home Games

With a new and improved starting lineup, the UCSB men's volleyball team made their presence known on the court this past weekend.

On Friday night, the #7 Gauchos avenged an early-season loss to #5 Brigham Young University, defeating the Cougars in five games (15-5, 16-17, 15-17, 15-9, 18-16) before sweeping LaVerne University on Saturday night, 15-5, 15-4, 15-2.

Friday night's match was a battle that won't soon be forgotten by either UCSB (5-2, 4-1 in MPSF) or BYU (4-2, 3-2 in MPSF). The last time these two teams faced each other, the Cougars had the upper hand and swept the Gauchos in three games, but a lot has happened since then.

"Since losing to [BYU] the first time, we have made a lot of changes," UCSB senior middle blocker Carter Reese explained. "We have a lot more confidence and this win has given us even more. Our transition was a lot better."

"I think we proved to ourselves that we can improve where we need to

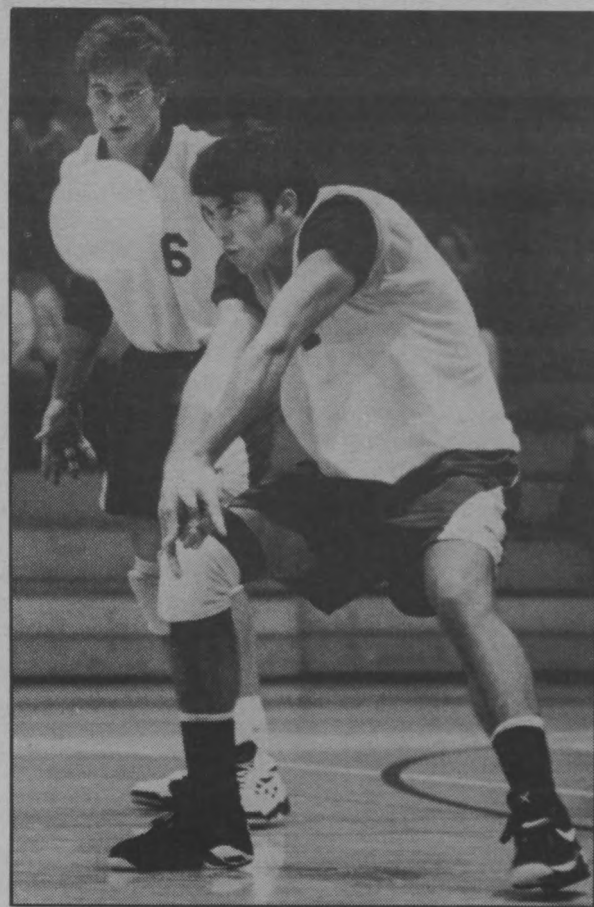
improve. If we can do that, I think we have a legitimate chance at the league title."

The Gauchos came out with a vengeance in game one, quickly taking the lead with a big boost of offensive strength from sophomore outside hitter Donny Harris, who pounded out seven kills.

The next two games were a little bit more of a challenge as BYU found some momentum late in each game from outside hitter Scott Larkin and middle blocker Kevin Hambly. Larkin amassed 21 kills in those two games while Hambly added 13.

Down 2-1, the Gauchos quickly bounced back. With a little extra defensive help from junior setter Todd Rogers and junior outside hitter Amaury Velasco, who made five digs each, as well as nine kills from Harris, UCSB found themselves at a 2-2 tie.

"We knew that UCSB had made some significant changes and a big improvement in their team," BYU Head Coach Carl McGown said. "We expected that they would play very well tonight and they did. We thought we played well, we kept

fighting, but it just wasn't enough."

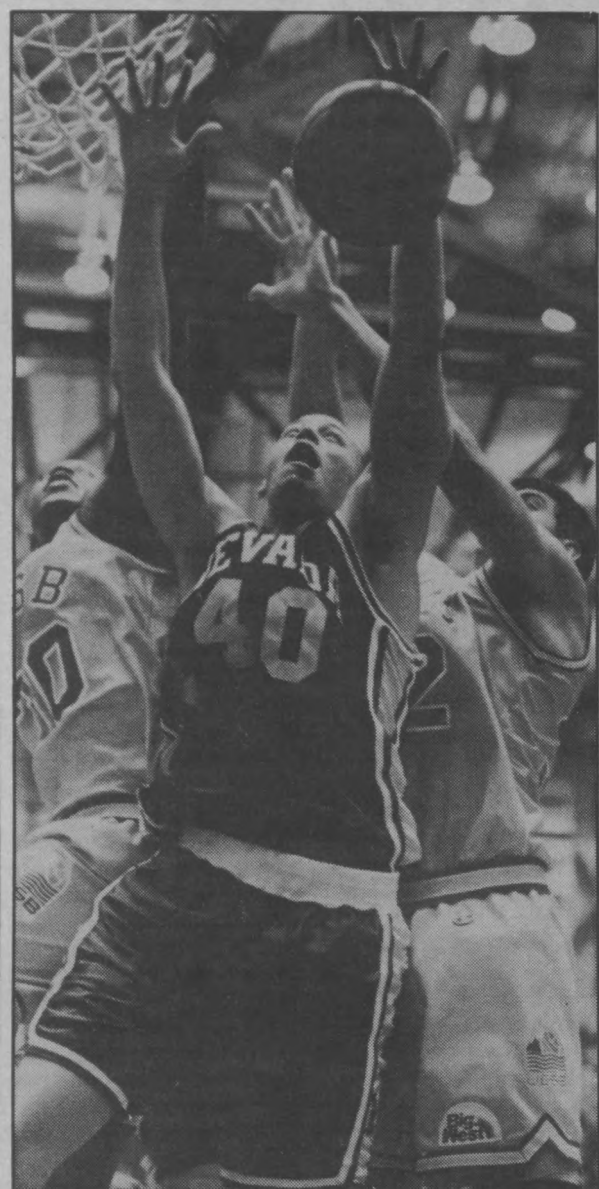
Game five was a neck-and-neck battle. The Gauchos maintained the lead most of the game, but their margin was small the whole way through. Sophomore middle blocker Rob Treahy then led the way for Santa Barbara with four kills, one service ace and two blocks. Velasco and Treahy ended the match by blocking BYU outside hitter Karl Van Reusen.

"That was a great win

for us," UCSB Head Coach Ken Preston said. "First of all, I thought that Rogers and Harris played really well, but Treahy was really big. He had a really great match. He served well, he missed a few, but got a lot of tough serves. He was unstoppable at the net and he blocked a lot of balls and touched a lot of them."

"The difference between the first game and this game if you look at it

UCSB Beats UNR; Ends Losing Streak

Flick's 19 Help Squad Get On Track

In clearly the most balanced team effort since the beginning of the conference season, five Gauchos scored in double figures as the UCSB men's basketball team defeated the University of Nevada, Reno, 80-68, in the Thunderdome Saturday night.

The win over the Wolfpack (10-9 overall, 6-5 Big West) snaps the Gauchos' four-game losing streak and brings the squad's overall record to 10-8, 5-5 in conference.

"Every game, Coach puts up what our next win number is going to be, so we were going for win number five in conference," senior center Doug Muse explained. "I've been staring at that damn five for the last four games, so I'm just so glad that we won."

Throughout the contest, UCSB's offense proved effective at finding the Gauchos with the "hot hand." Junior forward Mark Flick's 10

points in the first 3:58, including two consecutive three-pointers, paced the Gauchos to a 14-7 lead, which became 12 points three minutes later after a trey from junior guard Lelan McDougal. However, UNR answered back with a 16-5 run that narrowed the score to 24-23.

That's when senior forward Duane Carter took over with nine points in a 2:35 span, giving UCSB a 35-29 lead. The Wolfpack countered with six straight points, but a Muse free throw and a McDougal bank shot gave UCSB a 38-35 halftime lead.

"I thought we handled the ball pretty well against their zone, and we made 55 percent of our shots in the first half," UCSB Head Coach Jerry Pimm said. "We've been in a little bit of a shooting slump and it was just a matter of getting a positive feeling about how to attack their defenses."

Muse's six straight

Swim and Dive Squads Slip in Stanford Meet

It is never an easy task to perform on the road, and the challenge becomes that much harder when the opposing squads are some of the best in the nation.

The UCSB swim and dive team found this out the hard way last weekend as the Gauchos men fell to both second-ranked Stanford University and #4 UC Berkeley, while the women were defeated by Big West powerhouse University of Nevada, Reno, although they successfully crushed UC Davis the next day.

"We knew it was going to be tough and we took our lumps, but it was not without a cause," Head Coach Gregg Wilson said. "We learned a lot, and the kids will bounce back. I am confident in that."

The first day of competition proved to be the most difficult for the men's team. Heavy-hitting Stanford (5-1) crushed UCSB, 146-83, to hand Santa Barbara its first defeat of the year. The Gauchos (7-2) were clearly feeling the effects of recent illness, a long drive and no Mark Anderson. The junior is regarded as one of the top breaststroke swimmers in the nation, but could not compete due to sickness.

After the loss, UCSB regrouped and put together a far more impressive performance the following day vs. Cal. The squad still fell to the Bears 129-98, yet its times were much improved over the previous day.

Junior Bob Noe turned in the top swimming performance, as the junior had the only individual wins for UCSB. Noe nabbed wins in the 200 breaststroke at Stanford and in the 100 breaststroke at Cal. Senior Rick Alter and sophomore Jonathan Kelling did their part on the diving board, each posting a victory at Cal.

"Stanford was not one of our best meets, and we could have gone into a shell afterwards," Kelling noted. "But instead we rose to the occasion against Cal and turned out some great performances against one of the nation's best."

Gauchos Take Third at Palo Alto; Team Rebounds to Defeat San Jose

The UCSB women's gymnastics team showed diversity and depth on the road last weekend when it went to battle in a four-team field at Stanford University on Friday and San Jose State University on Saturday.

Santa Barbara finished ahead of UC Davis for third place in Palo Alto behind Stanford and Seattle Pacific University, but came on strong to defeat the Spartans on Saturday in San Jose.

However, the Gauchos suffered a major loss at Stanford when junior April Sargent suffered a season-ending injury when she dislocated her elbow on the uneven bars. Sargent was ranked second in the Big West in the vault going into Friday's meet.

"April will be missed tremendously," UCSB Head Coach Randy Lane said. "But our team has a lot of vaulters ready to step up."

Despite the injury, UCSB was able to do some damage in a few events on Friday. The Gauchos displayed their best floor exercises of the season, tallying a 47.125. The vaulting score increased a point from last week, totaling a 46.3.

Senior Lauren Yee hit the balance beam high score of the year with a 9.675

in a 46.8-point team effort. It was the uneven bars, though, which jinxed the Gauchos, as they were only able to total a paltry 42.6.

"The weekend went OK," sophomore Margie Hoeffler said. "We had a rough start, but pulled it together as the meet went on."

One bright spot for Santa Barbara was the fact that Yee and Hoeffler took second and third, respectively, in the all-around event. It was Stanford's Keri Monahan who won the all-around event with her score of 38.525.

Saturday was a better day for the Gauchos as they defeated San Jose's Spartans in with a team score of 183.925. The floor exercise proved to be a UCSB highlight when Hoeffler won the event with a 9.65, helping the team total 46.14. Uneven bars scores also improved from the night before, with UCSB scoring 44.675.

On the balance beam, senior Dana Faircloth won the event as a replacement for junior Emily Tripianno at the last minute with a score of 9.425. Gauchos sophomore Annie Bretado finished third with a 9.35.

Once again, Hoeffler challenged for the all-around title, but came in second place at 37.45. San Jose's Tara Law won the all-around, scoring 38.525.

Reese ended the match with 14 kills at a .414 hitting percentage and had three blocks. Leading in blocking was Treahy with eight total blocks, including three solos. He also pounded out 24 kills at .537.

Velasco added 15 kills at .313, three aces, 14 digs and four blocks to the team effort, while Rogers led the defense with 18

digs. The offensive player of the evening was Harris, who ended the match with 33 kills at .338, two aces, 11 digs and three blocks.

"The last time, [BYU] jumped out to a big start," Harris said. "This time I think we might have had the upper hand, but by the end of the game it was really split between both teams."

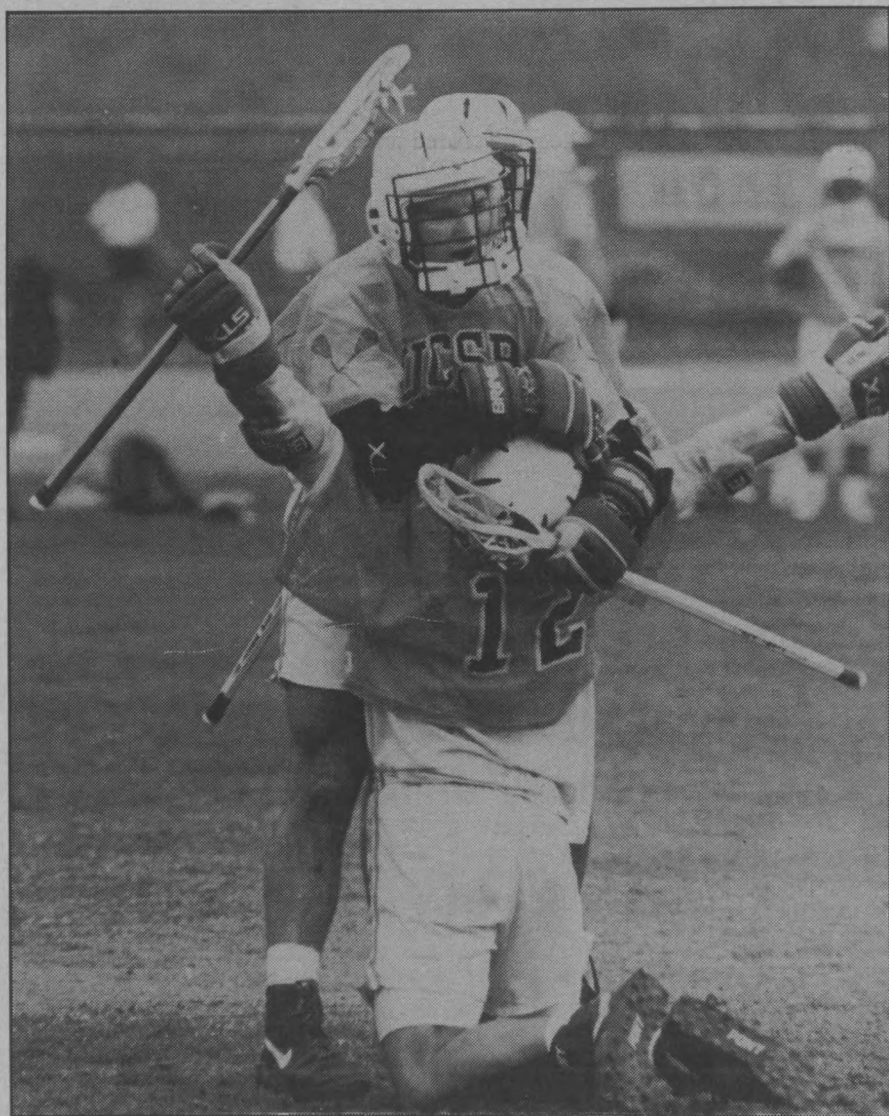
"They were definitely not playing as strong as last time because we were giving them a lot more pressure. They would have played better if we had let them, but we held strong."

For BYU, Larkin led the offense and defense with 31 kills at .313 and 15 digs. Hambly pounded out 25 kills at .277, made 12 digs

and led the team with 10 blocks, including two solos.

On Saturday, the Gauchos upped their winning streak to five straight as the second team annihilated LaVerne in 45 minutes. Freshman middle blocker Bob Hefty led the way with nine kills at .727 while making five blocks. Sophomore middle blocker Jeff Vanderwal and freshman outside hitter Mitch McCoy led the defense with six blocks apiece.

"The young guys played hard and well," Preston commented. "We basically had four freshmen, a sophomore and Chill [Brant Chillingworth], who stabilized the passing

"We have been running a lot lately and in the fourth quarter they were sucking wind," Wynne said. "We were

able to run at them at full speed, while they had definitely lost a step."

UCSB found itself down 9-3 heading into halftime, but according to Wynne, the Gauchos knew that they were the more experienced club.

"They had a good young team and took us by surprise," Wynne added. "We knew we just had to stay close, then we made our move and scored some goals."

However, the team turned to freshman attackman Adam Miner,

who scored the winning goal with three minutes left in the extra period to win it for UCSB.

The Gauchos defense held strong in the second half, giving up only two goals. UCSB's defensive midfielders stopped Sonoma on every one of its offensive opportunities.

Santa Barbara takes on BYU today at 3 p.m. at "the pit," between the softball and baseball fields.

Sophomore reliever Matt Klein, who had his first collegiate appearance in Sunday's game, giving up two earned runs in four innings of work, was pleased with the weekend but disappointed with

Sunday's loss.

"Two and one is a great start against the #17-ranked team in the nation, but I think we should have won today, no question," Klein said. "If I had got out of the sixth inning without any damage, we would have won, but things happen."

Smaldino was glad that UCSB was able to win the series, noting that Santa Clara swept the Gauchos in their three games last season.

"We had a bad weekend there last year," he said. "It was good for them to come out here and to take it to them, especially with them being ranked #17."

"It was a game we should have pulled out and won," said San Jose State Head Coach Karen Smith. "They had a hard time with our defense, but we did not play smart in the final two minutes and took quick shots that determined the game."

On Friday, the Gauchos played in Hawaii's recently built Special Events Arena, where they defeated the Rainbow Wahine 62-50.

In search of his first win since Jan. 5, Hawaii Head Coach Vince Goo instead tallied yet another loss to

his team's six-game losing streak.

Playing without the 1994 Big West Freshman of the Year, Goo has been unable to fill sophomore guard Nani Cockett's shoes since her knee injury in early December.

Instead of backcourt strength, the Rainbow Wahine did find comfort in sophomore center Kendis Leeburg, who led her team with 14 points.

Despite a slow start, Santa Barbara was able to pick up the game's tempo and jump out to a 12-point margin with 6:02 remaining in the first half.

However, the Wahine tightened the distance and brought the score to 26-19 at the game's halfway mark.

Sophomore forward Amy Smith, who led the Gauchos with 14 points, opened the second half with a jumper just before Leeburg scored seven consecutive points.

Soon after, the Wahine were able to inch to within two of UCSB, 32-30. Hawaii was never able to catch the Gauchos, however, as Santa Barbara made its way to an 11-point lead with 13:09

points to open the second half aided Santa Barbara in increasing its lead to 48-40 with 13:44 remaining in the game. But Reno center Faron Hand scored five of his own in a 7-0 run. The Gauchos' next hot hand was senior forward Wayne Butts, who scored 11 points over the next 9:32 to give the Gauchos a 70-65 lead. The lead became double figures once again on Muse's follow-up slam with 34 seconds left in the contest.

"The key to the game was Wayne Butts taking it to the hole," Muse said. "Lelan, Wayne and Duane all played great on the offensive side and Tecon [Madden] just shut his man down. Mark came out playing hard and it was just a good team effort."

Muse's 14 points and career-high 12 rebounds gave him his second double-double in as many games. Flick poured in a game-high 19 points to go with seven rebounds and Butts tallied 16 points and five rebounds. McDougal

added 13 points and five assists, while Carter finished with 11 points and six boards.

UCSB's other co-captain, senior point guard Tecon Madden, amassed six rebounds, a career-high five steals, two blocked shots and four points in 34 minutes of play. Perhaps more importantly, however, Madden held opposing point guard Eathan O'Bryant to six points on 0-8 shooting in 40 minutes of play.

"[O'Bryant] is one of the best point guards in the conference, so I thought Tecon played a whale of a game defensively," Pimm said. "You can't count in points how many times he knocked the ball away from the big guys or actually stole it away. He had five steals, and the way it was going, that could have been 10 points."

For UNR, Brian Green scored a game-high 16 points as Hand and senior forward Jimmy Moore added 13 points and eight rebounds apiece. Moore and O'Bryant combined for seven steals and eight assists while Daniel Watts finished with 10 points, eight rebounds and five
