Complete Power Given to IVRPD Over Break

Martial Law Declared After Local Riots

In rapid response to a riotous Spring Break in Isla Vista, which left \$5.4 million in property damage in its wake, the I.V. Recreation and Park District enacted a new policy that may land a few government boots and billyclubs upside the head of anyone stepping out of line.

In a closed-door special meeting last Friday, the Santa Barbara County Board of Supervisors relinquished indefinitely all jurisdiction and law enforcement power to the IVRPD. The decision came after Gov. Gray Davis was forced to call the national guard into I.V. on Thursday to put an end to approximately 300 cases of burglary, vandalism, arson and assault that occurred throughout the week, according to 3rd District County Supervisor Gail Marshall.

"It was just complete pandemonium over in that little rat's nest, and the county just wants to wash their hands clean of it," she said. "The IVRPD is much better equipped to deal with the problem — for God's sake the county can hardly get a street light built, let alone curb large-scale

uprisings." Police do not know what sparked the looting and rioting, although the fact that many students were away on vacation probably fed fuel to the fire by providing easy targets, Sheriff's Dept. public information officer Mike Burridge said.

"In a situation like that you're talkin' hardcore, way hardcore," he said. "We gagged, bagged and hogtied some 111 participants, but there's no


way to pick 'em all off — that's when the national guard came in."

Following the county's decision, the IVRPD called a special meeting of its own Saturday, unanimously passing Resolution #666420, which immediately instituted a policy of martial law throughout I.V. The new policy effectively gives the I.V. Foot Patrol the discretion to use "extreme force" to maintain order, according to IVRPD Director Dave Fortson, who said the unruly nature of I.V. residents is a "clear and present danger" to the well-being of the community.

"We're trying to send a clear message here: You're in my house now, you little bitches," he said. "I'm a firm believer that some people are born bad, and no citation, fine or jail sentence will put an end to this madness. This resolution is an immobilization plan and the bottom line is that if you break some punk's leg today, he won't be robbing your house

Local law enforcement strongly endorsed the county's decision, and, according to IVFP Lt. Ugo "Butch" Arnoldi, are more than willing to act under the provisions of the IVRPD resolution.

Leg Council Battles Over Proposed Bill to Support Alcoholic Habits of Students

In a shocking landmark vote Wednesday, Associated Students Legislative Council uprooted the future of student government at UCSB for the remainder of the academic year.

Originally slated as a makeup Leg Council meeting, last week's affair saw the passing of a bill disbanding this year's A.S. and Capital Improvements and Reserves accounts. The liquidation of these accounts leaves a \$136 refund for each undergraduate, good for one keg of Guinness Extra Stout er. The legislation, titled The Free Beer Bill, was authored by Rep-at-Large David Klein, who said its hasty actions were long overdue.

"Let's go hostile," he said.

Debate arose on the bill when Rep-at-Large Lindsey Condict chastised it for its strong criticisms of A.S.

"That seems wrong ... to put out a negative opinion about a student movement," she said.

Finance Board member Brian Cheng sought alterations to The Free Beer Bill. Cheng suggested the board put all A.S. money into the unallocated account for festive occasions.


"I have an idea ... let's put all the money in unallocated so we can have phat parties and keggers," he

Not greeted with a favorable response, Cheng rose from his seat delivering a philosophical question unto his colleagues before leaving the room.
"What the fuck? Why am I here?" he said.
After Cheng's exit, Rep-at-Large Sara Azadi

argued against the validity of A.S. entities as a whole, citing spring elections as an example of bad

Feminist Groups Sue Administration, Deem Storke Tower Phallic Symbol



The phallic nature of Storke Tower is in question as feminist groups file suit against campus administrators.

Throughout the last 30 years, the women's movement has mounted many hard struggles, but a campus monument may prove to be the longest and hardest yet.

The UCSB chapter of the feminist organization Step Back Jack and the international women's committee LOUD (Liberation of Ovarian and Uterine Democracy) filed a suit against campus administrators last week, asserting that Storke Tower stands as a phallic symbol. SBJ president Ima Butch said the phallic representation of

Storke Tower violates Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964.

"To be frank, Storke Tower looks like a big penis. But there are so many other similarities between [Storke Tower and a big penis] that it's blatantly offensive," Butch said. "For example, Storke Tower is the tallest building put right in the middle of campus, like we all are just dying to see it. Then, do you notice how the tower has an elevator shaft; I mean, does it have to be called a shaft? Another intentional similarity is that sometimes the bells of the tower work and other times not, but then there are times when somebody goes up there and plays it right so that an

occasional melody pops up."

Although campus administrators have not made any public statements regarding the suit, Storke Tower's architectural designer Larry Bismarck said that the building was not created to intentionally exude a male persona.

"Storke Tower was not erected to stimulate any phallic ideas. It's hard to even make such a lengthy stretch between them," he said. "I hope this whole idea doesn't rub off on people. My hope is that it can be be beat off or it will just blow

- University of California, Santa Cruz, officials announced yesterday that the university plans to discontinue the use of its controversial written grade evaluations and replace them with a more personal, encouraging and friendly grading policy.

In place of the evaluations, the students will be given a specific object that reflects the level of achievement they reach in each class. Due to UC graduate school requirements, a system to translate the objects into letter grades has been created by the UC regents.

According to the most recent specifications, an A is a gold star cut from construction paper with glitter on it, a B is a silver star cut from construction paper with no

According to UC President Richard "the Blue Donkey" Atkinson, UCSC's new evaluation program is a positive reinforcement tool.

"I think that each of the objects really gives the students a positive feeling, man," she said. "I personally suggested the green origami goose and the blue donkey. Many UCSC students

had recently been complaining that the evaluation system of grading had become looked down upon by graduate school admission officers because of the enormous volume of papers that were involved. Chancellor M.R.C. "Moonlight" Greenwood explained that the grading change should actually be more efficient than the letter-grade system.

"With letter grades, you don't really get a vibe of how the student actually performed in the class," she said. "Two students may receive D's in a class, but one might have learned more. Under the object-grading method, the objects actually reflect the effort of the student. When two students get D's in an object-grading class, the evaluator can immediately look at the quality of the objects and see who performed better because of the vibe that the origami geese are emitting."

SANJOSE, Calif. (AP) - One more smogging motor vehicle bites the dust, and a small corner of the world stops in its hustle-bustle to mourn the loss.

Sunday marked the final ride of a roving, wheezing legend — the Crustmobile, a monster of a white Chrysler Plymouth minivan known to be the curse of punk teenagers and the bane of little old ladies.

The car was the pride and joy of owner Mezuu Meeru, 19, who recalls many fond memories spent behind the steering wheel of her beloved car.

"I got my first kiss in that car," Meeru said with a blush and tears in her eyes. "I learned to drive in that car. I can remember just hopping into the old Crustmobile with my friends and getting lost or yelling obscenities at random pedestrians ... those were good times, good times."



· HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — The National Chapter of the Sigma Alpha Pi fraternity announced it would be banning alcohol in its 42 houses by the year 2006.

SAP spokesperson Arnie Jahoobies told a group of three reporters at a press conference last Wednesday that the decision was made by a group of past and present members. Seven years has been set aside for each house to complete the change.

"We wanted to give the guys in the house now a chance to graduate so that we start with a fresh crop of pledges that know what they are getting into," he said.

There was some disagreement within the group of what exactly the ban should mean. In fact, according to current UCSD chapter President John Crapper, there have been no real boundaries set for the houses.

Narcotics Made Available to Ailing Students


A trip to the doctor's office may become a trip of a different kind for UCSB students, who can now receive psychedelic pharmaceuticals and other controlled substances for a number of ailments.

Student Death Services began distributing illicit drugs during Finals Week of Winter Quarter. According to Dr. Jack Kevorkian, the new Student Death Services director, the decision is the logical extension of California's medicinal marijuana policy.

"In 1996, the voters of this state made a strong statement with Prop 215, and I wanted to make Student Death the source for medicinal marijuana," he said. "But then I thought, Why stop at marijuana? There are a lot of drugs out there that have tremendous therapeutic purposes.' "

Kevorkian said the drugs being prescribed include marijuana, LSD, mushrooms, crack and powder cocaine, heroin and absinthe.

"We tried to cover the spectrum of possible symptoms," he said. "For example, we prescribe LSD or 'shrooms for clinical boredom, absinthe for writer's block, coke for chronic fatigue syndrome, heroin for

anxiety, and marijuana for what I call 'Isla Vista Meathead Syndrome.' I mean, some of those guys just need to smoke a bowl and chill out."

The clinic's new inventory has been met with a mixed reaction by law enforcement. Campus Police tried to shut down Student Death over Spring Break,

but the Santa Barbara County Sheriff's Dept. intervened, resulting in a gunfight at the west entrance to campus March 29. The Sheriff's Dept., led by I.V. Foot Patrol Lt. Ugo "Butch" Arnoldi, slaughtered the entire UCSB police force and made the campus safe for

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

User Sues University for Drug Loss

In a symbolic display of the increasing public acceptance of drug use on campus, a UCSB student is suing the university for negligence in bathroom-amenity construction in hopes of recovering the cost of lost cocaine.

Senior environmental studies major Laura "Fatties" Smith alleges that one of the university's so-called bathroom stall flipped back into a vertical position at a very inopportune time, sending two lines of cocaine into the air. Smith claims that the spring pulling the tray back upright was so strong it caused her counterweight to slip off, thus allowing the fully loaded tray to snap back into position and "spray blow everywhere."

"Usually I use my art history textbook to hold the thing I use my art history textbook for. But as soon as I started rolling a bill, the fucking tray shrugs off my book like a prom dress and flips up anyway," she said.

According to Smith, the resulting launch of "pretty damn clean" cocaine received the attention of five or six other restroom patrons, eliciting cheers from a







er Jim West Takes a Stand Against the Development of Islands

A few weekends ago I had the pleasure of exploring and hunting on Santa Cruz Island, the largest in the chain of islands off the Santa Barbara coast. > If all the city folk got out of their cars and took a boat out to the islands, they would see all the animals and bushes that make the islands such a

If you are physically weak and you don't like hunting, park rangers guide slowly paced tours on the islands. The rangers, who are out of shape but well-versed in the history and ecology of the islands, lead hikes that are rich in scenic beauty. The rangers recommend hikers take full advantage of the photogenic landscape by bringing a camera along on the hike. I recommend you avoid the rangers. They carry guns.

For the more advanced outdoorsman, group hikes and photography may seem a little boring. The true outdoorsman will want to explore the islands at his own leisure. He has no time for group activities and lazy rangers. The Channel Islands are very accommodating for this sort of man.

Despite legal restrictions, the hunting on the Channel Islands is superb. On Santa Cruz alone, a dozen or so species of middle-sized mammals romp freely and make fair game. Big-game hunters shouldn't waste their time on the islands, for the larger animals such as the hippo and the wooly mammoth were hunted to extinction by the Indians centuries ago.

I bagged a pair of 40-pound red-tail foxes two hours into my trip on the southeast side of Santa Cruz. Later in the day, I traded my Remington rifle in for my \$2,000 custom-made fishing pole. It was a few days before the opening of salmon season, but I figured what the hell. I picked a shady spot on the southeast side and cast my line. It wasn't long until I hooked a 50-pounder not 100 yards from where I bagged the foxes. Within three hours, I managed a pair of foxes and a 50-pound salmon. Indeed, my loot would have sent sportsmen like Hemingway into a fit of orgiastic drooling

I think the possibility of development is a travesty because no strip mall or football stadium could replace the champion hunting conditions the islands maintain. I am a naturalist and an explorer, and I do not want to see my hunting grounds turned into an airport.

Many UCSB students never make it out to the Channel Islands, and that is a shame. I don't know what most UCSB students do for fun, but I think if most of them took a day off from their dour routines and went hunting and bagged some foxes, they would join my cause.



"All I can say is it came from Europe," he said. "I drank a quart last night and saw God, but the hangover's a real bitch. ... If it worked for Hemingway, it can help you with your term paper."

Kevorkian's actions are in direct defiance of federal and state drug laws, which could complicate the suicide doctor's existing legal problems. Local politicians, however, have been supportive of the drug handouts. Congresswoman Lois Capps (D-Santa Barbara) has even visited Student Death to seek treatment for

"I'm trying to serve my constituents to the best of my abilities, but it's a lot of work, and the coke has really helped," she said. "I'm on 17 committees now, and I haven't slept for three weeks."

Former State Assemblyman Tom Bordonaro also approves of Kevorkian's efforts, despite his reputation as a hard-liner on drugs.

"I've been using marijuana as a painkiller for about 20 years," he said. "Unfortunately, I was incredibly stoned at all the debates last year, so I lost the Congressional race to Lois."

Chancellor Henry T. Yang has fully endorsed the new and improved drug selection at Student Death. promising full financial support for Kevorkian's buys.

"This has been a long time coming," Yang said in a faxed statement to the Daily Nookie. "I have personally sampled each and every one of the drugs, and found them to live up to the university's twin goals of excellence and diversity. In fact, I'm 'shrooming out of my mind as I type this statement. ... If oonkly teh damn keyz wuld hold stil."

The Student Resource Building is planned to include key student support services such as Campus Learning Assistance Services (CLAS), Educational Opportunity Program (EOP), the Women's Center, University Children's Center satellite (UCC), Office of International Students & Scholars (OISS), Greek Affairs, Education Program for Cultural Awareness (EPCA), and Student Information Systems (SIS), and Student Affairs Information Technology (SAIT).

SHORELINE INITIATIVE

The Shoreline Initiative will help maintain a clean, safe, and environmentally sound coastline adjacent to UCSB (note: this excludes Isla Vista). This initiative will fund proposals to: coordinate and provide supplies for intensive beach clean-up efforts, maintain safe points of access, address pollution from varied sources, protect and restore coastal habitats to their natural state, provide environmental education, and monitor environmental and water quality.

Do you approve a \$3.00 per student per quarter (excluding summer) mandatory student-imposed fee beginning Fall 1999 to help maintain the three miles of campus-adjacent shoreline? 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

accordance with UC policy, thanks in part to a clause introduced after University of California Board of Regents viewed the 1988 film "Gorillas in the Mist." 


