Water Board, Props Face Voters Today

The main issue facing voters today is the election of the Goleta Water Board members. Their selection along with Propositions A, B, and D will affect the future development of the entire Goleta Valley.

The three incumbents on the Water Board, Llana Sherman, Allan Wyner, and Jose Martinez, are being challenged by three new candidates, Don Weaver, Al Hove and Albert Paul.

The incumbents support continued control of development in the Valley. They stress the importance of letting the people determine the proposed growth of Goleta rather than the developers.

The incumbents are striving to eliminate "special interests" from Water Board decisions. They want to represent the people and say that none of them have any personal interests at stake in decisions made by the Board.

The challengers appear more interested in the agricultural needs of the Valley than in growth control. They view water management as the main function of the Water Board. All of the challengers have been attacked for their personal land holdings or business dealings in the Goleta Valley.

Their platform does not deny the importance of limited development but they desire agricultural use where the land is suitable. The challengers proposed methods of operation including zoning, water allotment, and incorporation. They also support the use of the Feather River water.

Three propositions are on the ballot today, Props A, B, and D. The first two are aimed at easing the water shortage, while the third is concerned with the I.V. Park District purchase of vacant land in Isla Vista.

Supervisor Proposes Redistricting County to End Population Discrepancy

If the County Board of Supervisors agrees to pass Supervisor Francis Beattie's proposal for redistricting on December 29, 1975, the coming June elections will witness possible changes in the first, third and fourth supervisorial districts.

The proposal resulted from the population disparity between Supervisor James Slater's third district and Beattie's fourth district. The third district is of immediate concern to Isla Vista residents since it envelopes Isla Vista, Western Goleta and the Santa Ynez Valley.

According to County estimates, the third district has about 25 percent more

population than the fourth district which includes Lompoc. The actual figures given by Beattie are 61,000 people in the third district and 49,000 in the fourth district.

Beattie and John Stahl, assistant to Slater, explained that the unequal population is in conflict with the one-person, one-vote rule. Thus, the purpose of the proposal is, in Beattie's words, "to have the districts conform to the law by maintaining equal numbers (of people) in each."

DISPARITY

Explanations for the population disparity were offered by both Stahl and

Beattie. Stahl viewed the shutdown of the Vandenberg Air Force Base as one cause of the disparity. Many people lost their jobs and were forced to leave Lompoc.

Beattie explained the disparity with regards to 1971 census tracts. "They had to be followed," he said, "even though they were out of line at the time. We had no choice." New census information will be available on November 17.

The opinions of Beattie and Stahl differ with regard to the political ramifications of redistricting. Stahl stated that new districts would affect the Santa

Ynez Planning Commissions and Planning Advisory Commissions.

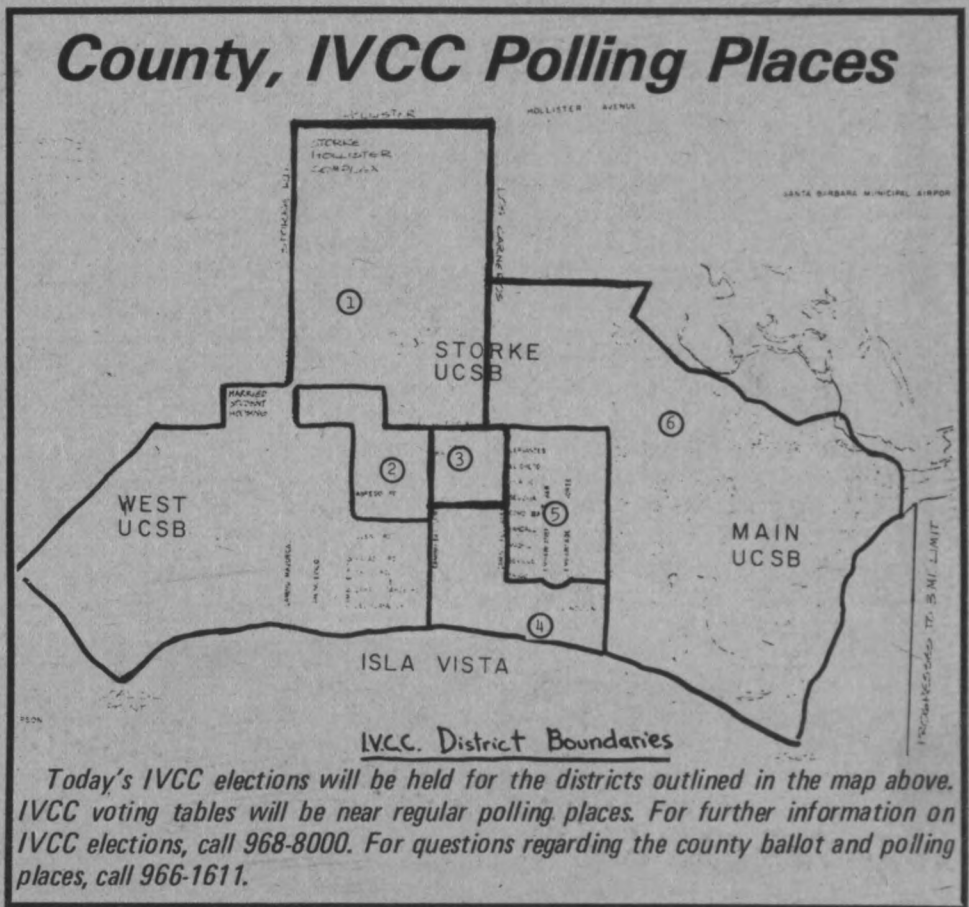
ENVIRONMENT

Stahl has labeled these groups as currently being "environmentalists." "Beattie," he said, "is nowhere near this stance."

Apparently, if County Demographer Cliff Pauley's redistricting plan of removing the Santa Ynez Valley from the third district and putting it into the fourth is passed, it is possible that the environmental emphasis will be reduced.

Beattie responded to the question of possible political ramifications as being "unknown at this point because it depends on where the new districts are formulated." He did foresee the maintenance of unity among the areas.

Both Beattie and Stahl expressed the belief that the proposal has a strong chance of passing.



Santa Barbara ACLU Protects Citizens From Constitutional Rights Violations

The Santa Barbara chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) is working with students and community members to protect citizens from any encroachments on their constitutional rights. At present and in the recent past the local ACLU has been engaged in a number of projects aimed at protecting individuals' rights.

One current project is the petition drive against Senate Bill 1 (S-1), a bill which will nullify a large number of first and fifth amendment rights if passed. This petition drive involves UCSB students and Isla Vista community members.

According to Bill Rubin, vice president of the Santa Barbara chapter, the ACLU is interested in forming an on-campus organization opposing S-1 "so that signatures can be gathered in the UCen." As a campus organization the group would be allowed to petition on campus,

thus drawing greater attention and support for the drive against S-1.

NUDE BEACHES

In addition, the ACLU has been an active force supporting the rights of persons using nude beaches. Rubin states, "We took some cases in terms of nude beaches up to the Supreme Court, but they weren't accepted." However, the ACLU currently has a case in the California state courts concerning an L.A. nude beach.

One of the S.B. ACLU on-going projects has been working with the Santa Barbara County Jail protecting the rights of prisoners. The group has been influential in attaining adequate medical attention for these men and women, who are unable to demand these rights directly.

As an organization serving the community, the S.B. ACLU encourages persons who feel their constitutional rights have been violated to contact them.

Although the S.B. chapter has no full time attorneys, they draw on the services of a number of volunteers. These attorneys can assess whether a case is of legal significance in the area of civil liberties.

LEGAL AID

In cases which are not directly involving constitutional rights, the ACLU refers the individuals in need of legal aid to the appropriate organizations.

The Santa Barbara ACLU is providing services which involve the protection of our civil rights. To continue these services the chapter welcomes volunteers and new members. Of particular interest to students is the organization of a campus group to petition against S-1. Persons interested in joining the S.B. VICE PRESIDENT NELSON ROCKEFELLER has declared he does not want to be considered as President Ford's 1976 running mate. Rockefeller's surprise move is expected to dramatically alter the outlook of the 1976 campaign. Rockefeller's action was taken without explanation. He made his decision known in a letter he carried personally to the President's office. The two men then met for about twenty minutes.

There was no word on what Rockefeller plans to do next, but White House Spokesman Ron Nessen said he does not think Rockefeller's move foretold an effort to win the 1976 presidential nomination for himself. Moreover, a Rockefeller spokesman said he knew nothing of any potential presidential challenge.

Former California Governor Ronald Reagan, who is due to announce his presidential candidacy in about two weeks, said he was astounded at Rockefeller's move. The Vice President's decision is seen by some as possibly undercutting Reagan's challenge for the Republican presidential nomination.

CONGRESSIONAL LEADERS say President Ford told them he will name White House Chief of Staff Donald Rumsfeld as Defense Secretary, replacing James Schlesinger and the U.S. Representative to the People's Republic of China, George Bush, as the new CIA Director, replacing William Colby. Also, it's expected that Secretary of State Henry Kissinger will step aside as head of the National Security Council while keeping his post as Secretary of State.

INTERNAL HEMORRHAGING has brought 82 year old Generalissimo Franco of Spain closer to death. Acting Chief of State Prince Juan Carlos de Borbon, Premier Carlos Navarro and other government officials hastened to the presidential palace outside Madrid yesterday at word of Franco's worsening condition.

PRESIDENT ISABEL PERON OF ARGENTINA was hospitalized yesterday for a gall bladder infection. A reliable medical source said the embattled president, under threats of impeachment in the Argentine Congress, may have to undergo an operation. A medical bulletin said Mrs. Peron's condition was not serious.

THE ORGANIZATION OF PETROLEUM EXPORTING COUNTRIES met yesterday in Vienna, Austria. Observers say that the meeting might be the first step toward small cuts in oil prices.

DIPLOMATIC SOURCES say dissident units of the army of Bangladesh rebelled yesterday against that country's eleven-week-old military-backed government.

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'Liquefaction' Problems Geological Phenomena Could Cause Danger On Campus

A couple of years ago, it was feared that an earthquake which had been predicted by some psychics was going to send California sliding into the ocean. Well, perhaps the whole state won't go, but UCSB has a slightly better chance of doing just that.

This is the first in a series of two articles.

Actually, the prospect of an earthquake causing the campus to slide right off into the water doesn't have the architects and engineers too upset; however, the geological fact that brings it to mind does present some potentially major worries that could cause a real disaster in the event of an earthquake. Because of the geological makeup of the campus area, a natural phenomena known as "liquefaction" could be a source of danger.

THE SITUATION

Robson C. Chambers, the campus architect, described the situation; in short, he noted that there is a layer of hardpan

approximately fifteen feet down. Above this, there is a layer of silty fine sands. During the winter, this layer becomes swollen with water (which during the summer drains into the slough and ocean, but not into the Goleta Water basin). This is called a "perched water table."

Especially in light of the 1964 Alaskan earthquake, it is now being realized that, in the event of a major earth movement, this layer of soaked sand can turn to "jelly," to use Chamber's word, a process known as liquefaction. If such should happen, the buildings could settle, and supports could snap.

The University has now become concerned over this, and the consultants - and the architects and engineers - have recommended that some remedial steps be taken. The State must now determine whether, in its

judgement, there is sufficient justification for taking corrective action.

BUILDINGS ON HARDPAN

The standard method of construction of the larger University buildings here, according to Chambers, is to root the buildings on the shale hardpans. Most of the larger buildings have partial or full basements (the Administration Building has a nearly full basement; the new library wing will have a partial basement). These basements rest on the hardpan.

In the case of partial basements, supports are sunk to the hardpan from the building

anyway.

According to Chambers, the type of construction on this campus has these supports designed to take vertical (or downward) pressure, but not lateral (or side-to-side) stress. Called "friction" supports, the surrounding dirt and sand is required for proper rigidity.

When liquefaction occurs — and it is considered a strong possibility in the event of an earthquake measuring 7 to 8 on the Richter Scale — this lateral support is reduced or eliminated. The building could sink, as supports shift or break.

Topside, this could result in the buildings ripping apart at certain junctures — for example, at external stairwells. Collapse could then occur in certain areas — again, such as in stairwells — and injury or death would possibly result. Even a building which, on another type of site, would be structurally sound, could have problems here.

There is a very simple remedy,

although not particularly cheap, said Chambers. Wells could be installed around the area, designed to keep groundwater to a minimum. The water, extremely high in salinity, could be mixed with pure water for use in landscaping (although, if used alone, it would very quickly kill the plants). This is not altogether acceptable; it could also be merely dumped into the existing drainage system, where it would be taken to sea. This of course, is where the water presently goes each summer anyway.

All of this was determined in a study by L. Thomas Evans, Inc., dated January 10, 1974. Professor H. Bolton Seed of Berkeley will be coming in to conduct some additional studies. Seed is considered extremely distinguished in the field.

What remains, then, is approval and money from the state. This can only come if, in the judgement of the powers that be, there is sufficient possibility of liquefaction occurring in the event of a major earthquake, and of that consequently leading to loss of life.

"The University really doesn't care about buildings," Chambers noted. "Why spend \$50,000 fixing up a building that may only suffer \$300 damage from an earthquake? What they are concerned with is human life; that's what this whole re-enforcing project (such as the current work occurring on North Hall) is all about."

Boycott Sentiments

Editor, Daily Nexus:

This letter is being written both with reference to the Nexus endorsement of candidates for the 1975-76 IVCC/MAC and my absence at the Nexus endorsement meeting. I am one of the two candidates for District 5 in the election today. On Sunday morning, November 2, there was a gathering of IVCC candidates in the office of the Nexus. The purpose of this meeting was to enable the editorial board of the Nexus to reach a consensus endorsement on candidates.

I have boycotted the endorsement process of the Nexus and have urged other candidates to do the same. I think that I have some valid reasons for doing this. One, the Nexus cannot anticipate forming a sound judgement in endorsing candidates on the basis of a five or ten minute presentation from the candidates to the editorial board. Two, the Nexus has given unimpressive and minimal coverage to the IVCC/MAC election. In that this election represents a popular form of people's government, as opposed to the inaccessible pyramids of bureaucracy that dominates traditional forms of government, one would have hoped that the Nexus would take the IVCC elections seriously. This obligation of the Nexus to the community did not occur.

This conversation leads into my third reason. In discussing community coverage with the Executive Editor of the Nexus, I was informed that the Isla Vista community was assigned the lowest priority in news coverage. This was the determining factor in my decision to boycott the Nexus endorsement process.

If, in fact, the above facts reflect the sentiments of the Nexus towards the community of Isla Vista, then two points appear for consideration. First, the Nexus staff may have to re-examine its position vis-a-vis the community of Isla Vista, students, non-students, minorities, women and street people. Second, it would seem that the people on the Nexus might scrutinize the journalistic role with a critical view; The Nexus is failing to exercise its educational duties by the

failure to integrate the campus orientation of the newspaper with community politics. My absence on Sunday was predicated within the context of the above considerations.

Addressing The Issues

Editor, Daily Nexus:

There are at least three very important issues involved in the forthcoming election for the Goleta Water Board:

(1) Campaign Limits: The "buying" of elections by wealthy special interest groups has been a national problem. Llana Sherman, Jose Martinez and I believe that such abuses of the democratic process should be controlled, and that's why we helped enact a reasonable spending limitation law for the Goleta Water District. Our opponents favor unlimited spending, and they have already spent more than has ever been spent in a Water District election.

(2) Conflicts of Interest: Our opponents have serious conflicts of interest. Weaver owns 25 acres of undeveloped land currently zoned for 44 homes; Paul, on behalf of his company has a \$900,000 law suit against the people of the Water District; the Hove family owns over 150 acres of undeveloped land.

(3) Our Record: As incumbent directors we have: (a) reduced water rates and taxes, (b) cut the District's deficit by 50%, (c) given the voters the right to decide about new water supplies, (d) eliminated the domination of special interests, and (e) protected the water supply of present residents.

Water Board Meets Standards

Editor, Daily Nexus:

Sherman, Martinez, and Wyner are seeking re-election to the Goleta Water Board on an environmentalist platform which has the support of such groups as Ecology Action, Isla Vista Community Council, Goleta Valley Citizens Planning Group, and Isla Vista Association.

In the last days of the campaign their opponents, backed by wealthy special-interest groups, have embarked on a costly advertising campaign which has included many assertions that are totally unfactual or misleading. Since we do not have the funds to match their advertising, we would appreciate the opportunity to at least clarify some of these issues for your readers.

(1) They claim that directors have raised their own pay to \$17,000 per year. The fact is that the state legislature sets the salary, and the maximum allowed is

\$3,600 per director each year.

(2) They claim that the district's legal fees have increased over the 1971 level. The fact is that the district legal fees have increased, but the reason for the increase is the legal harassment from our opponents and their supporters. The district has successfully defended 14 lawsuits for more than \$50 million in damages brought by our opponents and their supporters. These lawsuits have primarily attempted to lift the moratorium which was approved by the voters and endorsed by Sherman, Martinez, and Wyner.

(3) They claim that the cost of operating the district today has increased over 1971 costs. This claim is like the always futile attempts to add apples and oranges. The cost of operating the district has increased because of inflation and, most importantly, because of the fact that unlike 1971 the district now operates an expensive, \$10 million (voter-approved) filtration plant. The district's budget for 1975 is the same as for last year.

(4) They claim that for some reason Goleta water is not good enough to be used on interstate carriers. The fact is that Goleta water meets all federal and state health requirements, and it is Goleta water that is used at the airport.

These are but a few examples of the inaccuracies and distortions which have characterized our opponents' recent advertising campaign. We hope that your readers will not be misled. We cannot let big money "buy" another election. We need your help!

The Marguerite Doe Ravenscroft Foundation provides interested pet owners with a certificate worth \$20 towards the cost of spaying or neutering any dog or female cat or \$10 towards the neutering of a male cat.

It should be noted that the certificates do not cover the entire cost of the operation, and that surgery charges vary somewhat from vet to vet.

The certificates are good at any of the fifteen participating animal hospitals, and the only requirement is that the dog be currently licensed in the city or the county (not applicable to cats). The program is not limited to one certificate per person, and an owner of several pets can get aid toward altering any or all of them.

So, if anyone out there has been considering spaying or

neutering their pet, the time to do it is now. Obviously, it makes great "cents." 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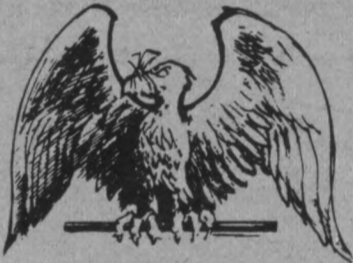

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Pologachos Still Kicking After Bay Area Encounters

UCSB's varsity water poloists lost important weekend games to U.C. Berkeley and Stanford, but came through with a win over San Jose State to keep their hopes alive for a possible invitation to the NCAA championships.

Saturday's game against San Jose was the Gauchos second game of the day. San Jose started the scoring with two unanswered goals, and it wasn't until late in the first quarter that UCSB was able to tally. After their goals in the early stages of the game, San Jose was only able to connect on one more goal, which occurred in the second period. From the middle of the second quarter on the Gauchos took over control of the game.

UCSB water polo coach Dante Dettamanti stated, "Although we didn't score a lot of goals we were able to keep control of the ball and by doing so, we got all

the scoring opportunities." The Gauchos scored four goals in the second half and at the same time totally shut down the San Jose offense. The final score was UCSB 6 and San Jose 3.

Against Berkeley, the Gauchos were unable to mount a consistent offense or defense. Berkeley on the other hand connected 19 times during the game, while UCSB came up only 7 goals. Dettamanti commented, "Berkeley is ranked No. 4 only because, up until this weekend they haven't had their two best players, Svendsen and Belfanti." Against UCSB, Svendsen and Belfanti combined for 11 goals.

Dettamanti felt that it is only a matter of time before Berkeley regains its No. 1 ranking.

Although Stanford out-scored the Gauchos 10-6 Dettamanti was unimpressed. In fact, he stated, "We should beat them when they come here on November 14."

Intramural Department's first-ever ping-pong tournament.

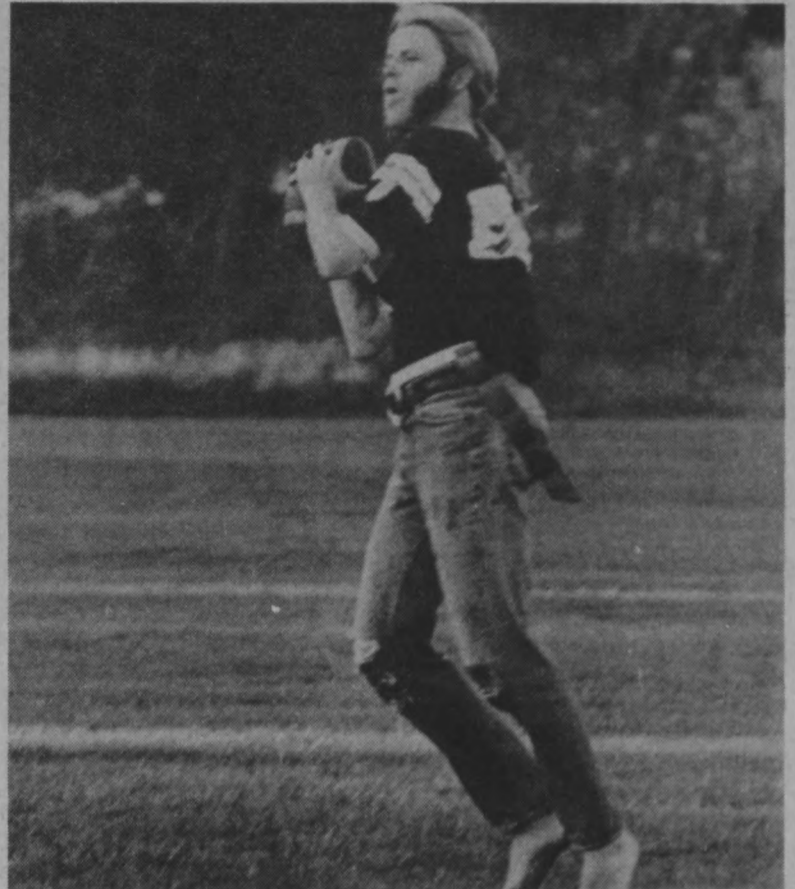

If the Gauchos beat Long Beach it will assure them of a spot in the National Championships.

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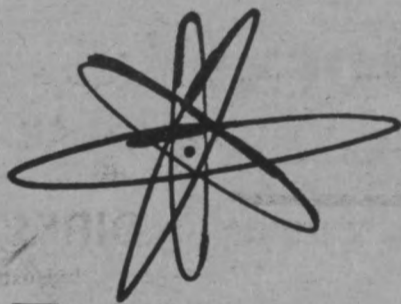

Proposition A would enable the water district to incur a \$2 million bonded indebtedness to pay for facilities to obtain potable ground water from the Ellwood and El Capitan areas of Goleta.

Proponents see this as one possible means to lift the 1972 water moratorium, thus wiping out the current deficit as well as supplying a small water surplus.

Opponents of Proposition A are concerned with both the availability and quality of this water. They have pointed out the possibility of sea water intrusion into these areas due to heavy pumping which would result in the permanent loss of the ground water.

PROP B

Proposition B is concerned with the reclamation of wastewater to replace the water being used for irrigation. Average water consumption is presently greater than the amount of water available, but in the past the deficit has been met with the help of the moratorium, and conservation programs.

Proponents of Prop B emphasize the low tax cost and availability of a permanent source of wastewater in three years. Only enough water would be produced to support the present population, thus limiting future growth and commercial development.

Opponents are mainly concerned with health hazards. Because the salt content of local ground water is already high, reclamation could increase the ratio and risk of contaminating the entire basin.

PROP D

The last ballot proposition, D, would provide the I.V. Park and Recreation District with the funds to purchase up to one-third of the vacant land in I.V. The alternative is to leave the land in the hands of private owners and potential developers.

Although passage of this bond issue would give I.V. government a hand in controlling community growth, it would also possibly tie up most of the community's financial assets for the next 15 years.

An Isla Vista plebiscite will also be held to elect new IVCC members. Three of the open positions are for rep-at-large. There are five candidates, two of which are incumbents. Two current IVCC members, Cindy Wachter and David Hoskinson, are running against Kelly Pritchard, Walt Wilson and Richard Zimmerman. There is only one candidate for the dorms, District 6, Frank Thompson. For District 5 there are two candidates; Shey Kamisky and Matthew Steen. For Districts 4, 2, and 1, the respective candidates are O.L. Scott, Mark Fontana, and Martha Britt.

Goleta Water District has paid attorney \$114,614, records show

Santa Barbara, Calif., News-Press, Saturday, November 1, 1975

ON A GOODWIN statement dated May 10, 1974, a sheet of paper had been laid over the billing information, when a facsimile copy was made. The sheet contained the notation: "All previous statements are marked accordingly "Confidential Attorney-Client Privilege."

This advised the challengers, in writing, that no bills from Goodwin were available from the time of his hiring, to June 26, 1974. Bills from the counsel serving the district prior to Goodwin's hiring were enclosed for the period Oct. 1, 1970, to June 30, 1971. Missing were 35 months of district accounts.

THE COPY received by the News-Press had 27 months of statements missing, and a different notation about the missing months: "Any statements between May 20, 1974 and March 1, 1972, are marked as above Confidential Attorney-Client Privilege."

This would have been 26 months, and these statements, were, in fact, not included in the packet delivered to the News-Press. In addition, there was no statement for August, 1974. However, when the missing months were provided by the district, in Paul's absence, only five had been stamped confidential, and the stamp on one of these had been marked through with a pen.

Goleta campaign

Last July the Goleta County Water District board passed a resolution severely limiting campaign spending by district candidates. The resolution followed up urgency enabling legislation that had been pushed through the state Legislature at the request of the Goleta board.

The water district's limitations were stricter in some ways than those under state or federal law. At the time the Goleta board made this blatantly self-serving and hasty move, three of the incumbents were getting ready to campaign for reelection on Nov. 4.

On Monday, Superior Judge Floyd C. Dodson enjoined the Goleta County Water District from enforcing its campaign spending limitation. The district immediately appealed to the appellate court in Los Angeles for a stay. The appeal was turned down yesterday.

Betty Stephens, prominent Democratic Party contributor who supported incumbents Llana Sherman and Jose Martinez when they first stood for election to the water board in 1971, said that she supported Proposition 9 on which the local law is based.

Saying that while she "welcomes contribution limitations," she added, "I think these people have abused this Proposition 9 for their own purposes."

Their minds seem too made up — as reflected in their outrageously unfair charge that the challengers want to over-draft our groundwater basin "to support 25,000 new people." Water does not "create" people. Many areas of the county that have had surplus water supplies for many years are not overbuilt.

We recommend election Tuesday of their opponents — Allen Hove, Albert Paul and Dr. Donald Weaver — all of whom take a broad, longterm view of the water problem.
