Gauchos Cruise to Wins Over San Jose, New Mexico at Home

Business as usual.

That just about sums up the weekend performance of the UCSB women's volleyball team. Santa Barbara showed nothing unusual in winning a pair of conference matches: The Gauchos hit well, showed a decent block, played their usual strong defense and even threw in some tough serving. In short, it was the kind of weekend people have come to expect from UCSB.

Friday night, the Gauchos disposed of San Jose State, winning 15-10, 15-4, 15-8 to drop the Spartans to 4-5 in conference play. Santa Barbara tore out to big leads in each of the games, but its opponent crept back into the match at times, a phenomenon that has been occurring frequently this season.


"The only thing that was a little disappointing was, we relaxed a little," UCSB Head Coach Kathy Gregory said. "Every time I subbed, it wasn't really the subs that played poorly, but the team gave up four or five points, and I didn't like that."

Even so, UCSB's tough serving effectively kept San Jose State's offense under control for the entire match. The Gauchos scored eight service aces, including three from sophomore setter Chrissy Boehle, and came up with numerous other difficult serves that forced the

Spartans out of their offensive rhythm.
"We got into some passing problems, and that's been a problem for us all year," Spartan Head Coach John Corbelli said. "Our defense and transition game are pretty good, but we can't get out of the blocks on that first pass.'

At the same time, Santa Barbara's offense showed some life, as blocker Ana Elisa Franca (10 kills, .563 percentage) and hitter Julie Pitois (10, .529) crushed balls from all angles. Freshman middle blocker Tammy Stiner also bolstered the middle attack with a pair of kills in limited action. Overall, UCSB hit .292 to San Jose's .026.

"Ana should have no problem with [San Jose]," Gregory said.

Unfortunately, things didn't go according to plan. The Gauchos (9-7-0) were physically pounded by the Bears en route to losing a 4-1 decision, and hopes of making the NCAA tournament may have gone with it. Cal was 5-8-2 going into the match after losing four out of its last six games, but the Bears literally jumped all over Santa Barbara from the opening whistle. Cal was called for 19 fouls during the physical game.

After only three minutes of play, Berkeley was already on the scoreboard. Alexia Thompson took a cross pass from teammate Devon Fitzpatrick, who was planted to the left of the goal, and headed it in past sprawling Gauche goalkeeper Dana Visse.

Okada Qualifies for Second Competition

When the dust had settled at the UCSB stadium courts on Sunday, one UCSB women's tennis player was lucky enough to make it through the grueling Riviera All-American Pre-Qualifying Tournament.

Santa Barbara freshman Jean Okada gave up only nine games in six sets while on her way to straight set victories in her three matches over the two-day tourney. As Okada indicated after the match, staying cool under winning.


"After the first-set jitters I was able to concentrate on hitting with more margin, putting the pressure on my opponents," she said.

Luck came into play when the Tournament Referee Jane Goodman had to fill three extra singles slots because players had dropped out of the qualifying round, which is the next phase of this three-tournament event. Three fourth-round singles matches were drawn out of a hat to select automatic qualifiers, and Okada was one of those selected at random to bypass the

"I decided not to pull the top seeds in because of the difficulty in seeding players all over the country," Goodman explained.

Okada indicated that because of tendinitis in her elbow and a slight thigh pull, she was thankful to bypass the final round.

"If it wasn't for my coaches and teammates I probably wouldn't have pulled through the way I did," Okada said. "And when I heard that my name was drawn, I was pumped with a major adrenalin rush."

Out of the eight Santa Barbara players in the pre-qualifier, only Okada made it past the second round. Kelly Spencer, Shannon Martinoff, Jennifer Myers, Amelia White, Courtney Strauss, Lynn Coakley and Suzy Drage were eliminated early in singles play, while doubles teams of Drage-Strauss and Spencer-White also lost early in the draw.

UCSB Head Coach Chris Russell indicated that despite the early exits, he wasn't disappointed with his players' finishes.

"This was Kelly's first tourney

since surgery, Amelia lost to the eighth seed and Lynn lost to an eventual qualifier," Russell said. "I think that proves our players can hit with anyone."

Automatically drawn quali-fiers included: seventh seed Jenny Graf (Florida St.), Joanna Feria (Northwestern), Cory Crigger (UCI), Paula Hansen (USD), Kristie Smith (USD) and Okada. Up and Down Weekend Leaves SB 2-2 in MPSF Tourney

Poloists Beat Air Force, UCLA; Lose to Cardinal, Waves

LONG BEACH -To say that the UCSB men's water polo team had an upand-down weekend would be an understatement.

The seventh-ranked Gauchos opened this weekend's Mountain Pacific Sports Federation Championships with a win, then suffered a loss in the second round, followed by another win and another loss. The 2-2 weekend gave the Gauchos a sixth-place finish in the elite group of squads at the tournament.

Nine of the top-10 teams in the nation were present in the 16-team field, including top-ranked Cal and #2 Stanford. The Bay Area rivals met in the tournament finale Sunday evening, fighting into overtime before the Bears were able to pull out

a 11-9 victory over the Cardinal.

After opening tournament play on the upswing by defeating #10 Air Force 12-7 on Saturday morning, the Gauchos were brought down hard by Stanford, 17-6, a few hours later. Saturday's game was the Gauchos' third loss to the Cardinal in as

many tries this year.

"We didn't shoot that well against [Stanford]," UCSB assistant coach Rob Boyd said. "We played a flat game, and it seemed like we didn't play with a lot of heart. We didn't take it to them."

The Gauchos found themselves on the

upswing once again Sunday morning, as Santa Barbara came back with a convincing 12-8 win over sixth-ranked UCLA. Gaucho senior Scott Taylor was outstanding in the net, making several key saves and steals.

"We were pleased with our effort," UCSB Head Coach Pete Snyder said of his team's second win of the weekend.
"Our defense was confident and we were able to outscore them in the second half."

The Gauchos' fourth and final game of the tournament turned out to be the most exciting match of the season, but UCSB wound up losing to Pepperdine, 11-10, in the Sunday afternoon contest. After the Gauchos went up by two goals at halftime, Pepperdine surged ahead 10-9 in the closing minute of play. A great pass from UCSB's Dave Madison to teammate Sam Allevato resulted in the tying goal with 43 seconds remaining, but Pepperdine answered with the game-winner with only :20 left on the clock.

"They're a very good offensive team," Snyder said of the Waves. "We tried various defenses, but we went out of our game too much. We needed to swim more and cross pass more."

Despite closing the tournament with a loss, Snyder was pleased with his squad's sixth-place finish. "We've never put together two solid games back-to-back [this season], but today we did," he said

The Gauchos were led offensively in the tournament by junior Steve Kunst and senior Tony Litwak, each with seven goals on the weekend. Freshman Kevin Eggert, sophomore Doug Wierenga and Allevato each added five scores. Taylor and junior Matt Flanders were both impress-

ive in the net, each playing two games and

recording 12 saves.

Next up for the Gauchos will be a match with USC at Los Angeles on Saturday, followed by the first home game in over a month for Snyder's squad, a Nov. 7 rematch with Pepperdine.

WESTWOOD -The UCSB men's soccer team came here looking to become giant killers. However, the squad will have to settle instead for merely a moral

The Gauchos turned in one of their finest performances of the year against UCLA on Sunday afternoon, but it wasn't enough to keep Santa Barbara from losing 2-0 to the #7 Bruins. Although the loss was the eighth in a row for UCSB (2-12 overall), Head Coach Mark Arya was pleased with his squad's performance.

"As far as overall team effort, this was without question our best game of the year," Arya said.

Defense was the highlight for the Gauchos on Sunday, as the team successfully dropped back to protect the net while surrendering the midfield. While the conservative game plan kept the Bruins off the scoreboard during the first half, the defensive posture also made scoring opportunities few and far between for the Gauchos. The visitors were

outshot 25-4 on the afternoon.

With eight minutes remaining in the first half, UCSB goalkeeper Tim Cooney made the first of several outstanding saves on a UCLA breakaway. Three more Cooney saves closed out the first half and sent the teams to the break with no score.

'Tim Cooney was awesome," Arya said. "There's no other word for it. He was good on cross passes, and his sense of position was phenomenal."

The teams battled through the opening

minutes of the first half on even terms, and it appeared that the underdogs from Santa Barbara might send the game to overtime. But the Bruins were finally able to beat Cooney in the game's 62nd minute. The UCSB net-minder couldn't cover a rebound, and the ensuing scramble in front of the goal mouth resulted in a UCLA goal.

The Gauchos were finally able to create scoring opportunities in the final 20 minutes of the game, but couldn't get a shot past Bruin goalie Brad Friedel. The final good opportunity of the match for UCSB was squandered with five minutes re-

The Bears weren't finished there. In the 68th minute, Thompson passed the ball to Hinton in front of the Gaucho goal, and Hinton put the ball into the back of the net for her noon. Hinton now has 11 goals and 23 points on the season. Thompson had entered the game with only one goal to her credit for the year, but left increasing her total to three scores and an assist, giving her seven points. UCSB was outshot in the contest

Santa Barbara finally managed to get on the scoreboard in the 88th minute. Freshman Rachel Romano, who had been the only Gaucho not to score a point this season, put in a shot that had rebounded off Bear goalkeeper Jennifer Netherwood, eliminating Berkeley's bid for the shutout.



On Saturday, it was New Mexico State's turn to take a shot at the Gauchos, and the end result was similar. UCSB cruised to a 15-9, 15-3, 15-9 win that upped its record to 13-5 overall and 8-3 in conference play. The Roadrunners saw their conference record drop to 5-6 with the loss.

As before, it was Pitois leading the way on offense, racking up 11 kills to go with her two solo blocks. Freshman Kim Keys added 10 kills, while Franca notched eight. On the other side, Jonna Steffens and Maria Roth led NMSU with 11 kills apiece, but UCSB dug almost twice as many balls as the Roadrunners were able to put away. Boehle topped the squad with 16 digs, while senior Kristie Ryan added 10 to pass a major milestone.

Ryan, whose father Tom passed away in June, has shown a unique combina-

Next up for the team will be a contest this Wednesday at Cal Poly San Luis Obispo.

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
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
