HISPANIC MEET SET

ONE ACT PLAYS JULY 25-27 OFFERED FREE ON CAMPUS

Three Mexican folk plays, "Sunday Costs Five Pesos," "The Ring of General Macias," and "Tooth or Shave," will be presented by the UCSBC Summer Theater Workshop on July 25, 26 and 27 at 8:30 p.m. in the campus Little Theater, located near Santa Rosa Hall adjoining the Home Economics building. Admission is free.

The author of the plays, Josephina Niggli, comes from northern Mexico. Her characters contain the essentials of any Mexican small town folk attitude towards life. Her one-act plays are noted for their popular, clean-cut dialogue, and innocent plot.

Two of the plays are comedies and one is a melodrama which takes place during the Mexican Revolution. The production is under the supervision of Dr. Theodore Hatlen, associate professor of speech.

NEXT SPANISH ARTS LECTURES ANNOUNCED FOR JULY 23 AND JULY 25

The next Spanish Colonial Arts lecture at 2 p.m. Tuesday, July 23, will bring the Rev. Maynard Geiger, O.F.M., to the lecture hall podium in the new Classroom Building, for a discussion of the literary and historical aspects of the California missions.

Rev. Geiger is a veteran of 24 years of active research on the missions, twenty of them at the Old Mission here. Soon to appear is his most recent work. "The Life and Times of Junipero Serra" in three volumes. He will illustrate his lecture Tuesday with original documents and significant books that have influenced California history.

SESSIONS ON AUG. 1-3 TO INCLUDE LECTURES, TOURS, SOCIAL EVENTS

The Hispanic Society Conference on Colonial Arts will be held in Santa Barbara and on the campus Aug. 1-3, as a climax to the program on Spanish Colonial Arts being offered this summer. The three-day event includes papers to be given by authorities in the field, as well as a full slate of social events.

Summer students enrolled in certain symposium classes will be admitted to all conference meetings without charge.
