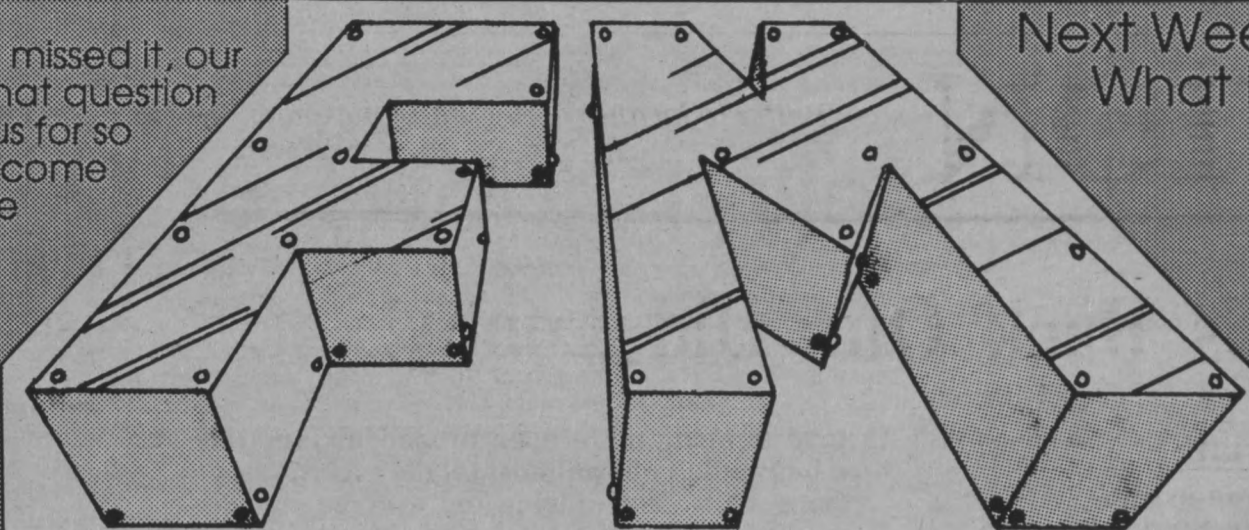

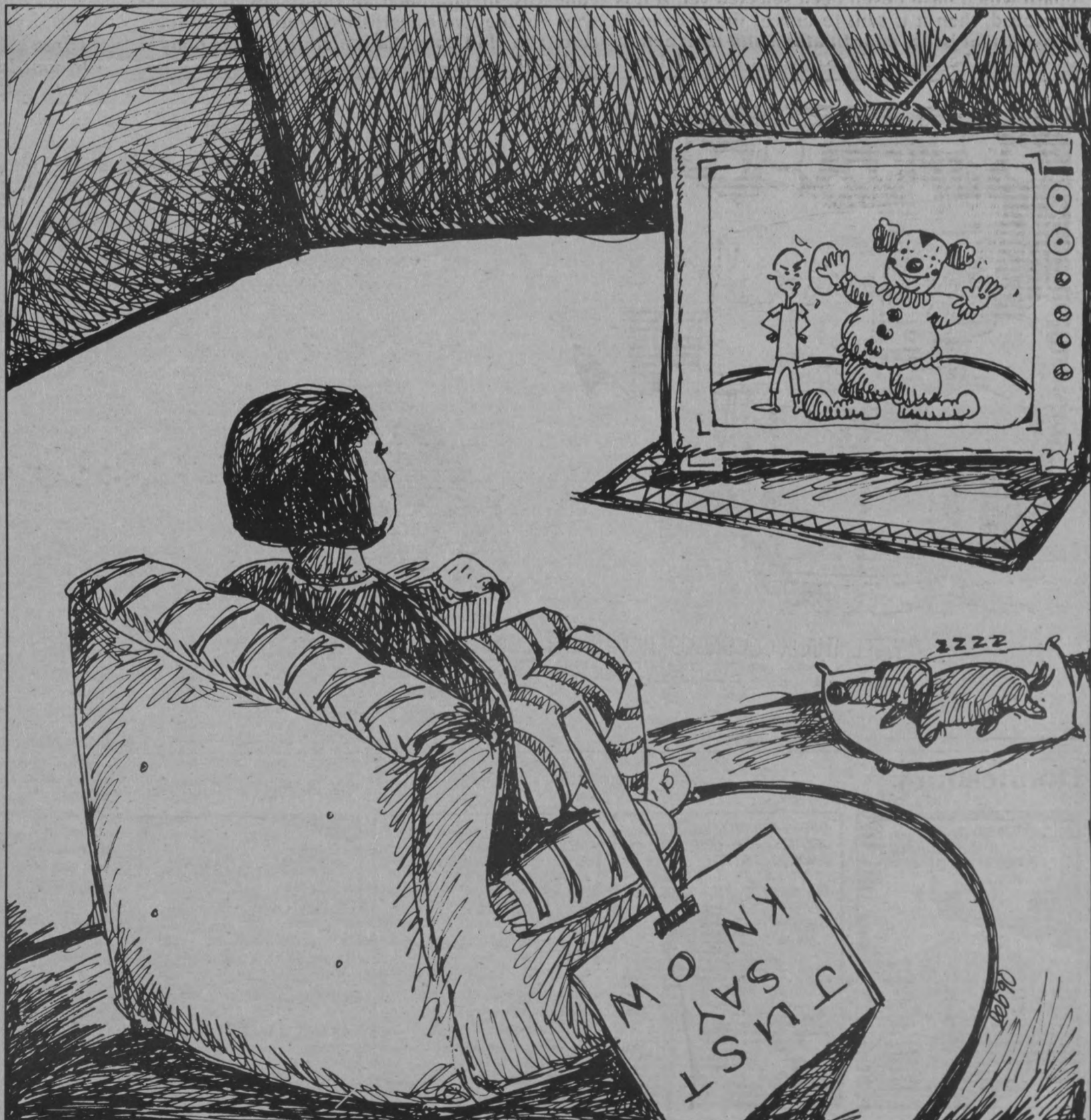
What Should We Do Now?

Can you imagine one survivor, the last human, trying to remember all his or her ancestors, who would otherwise pass away into nothingness?

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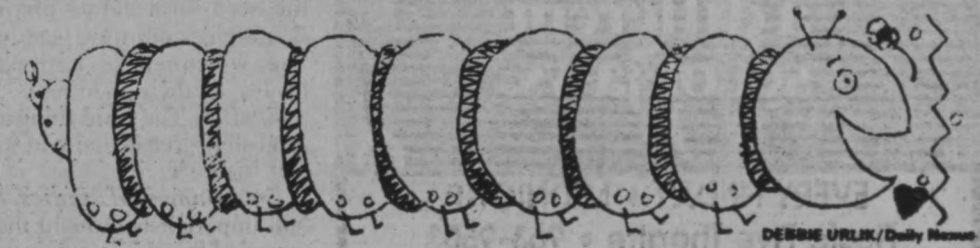
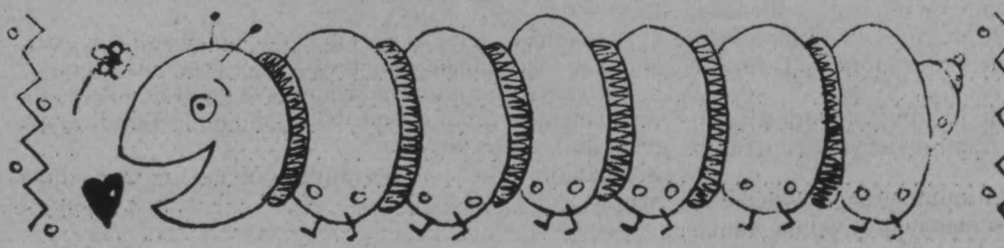
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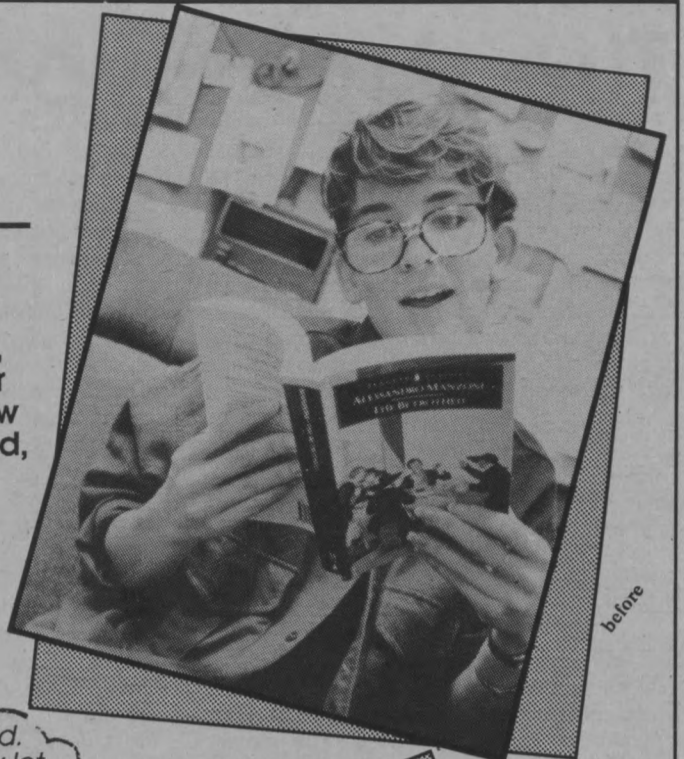
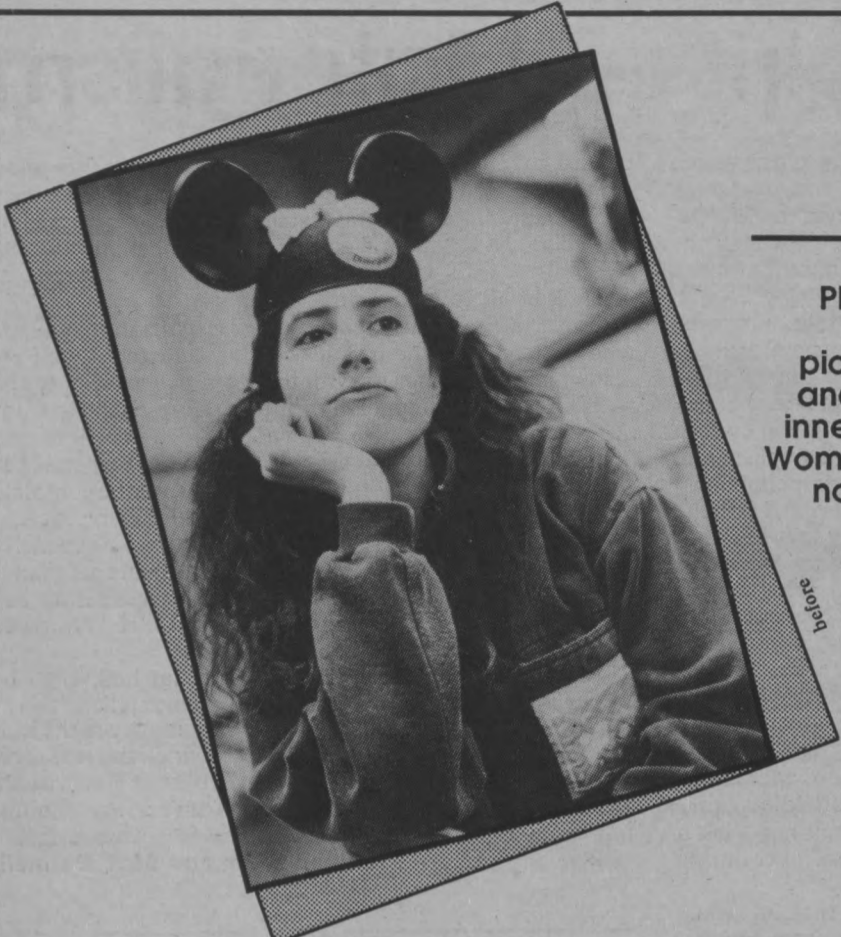

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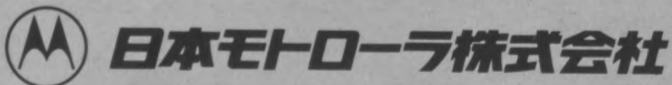
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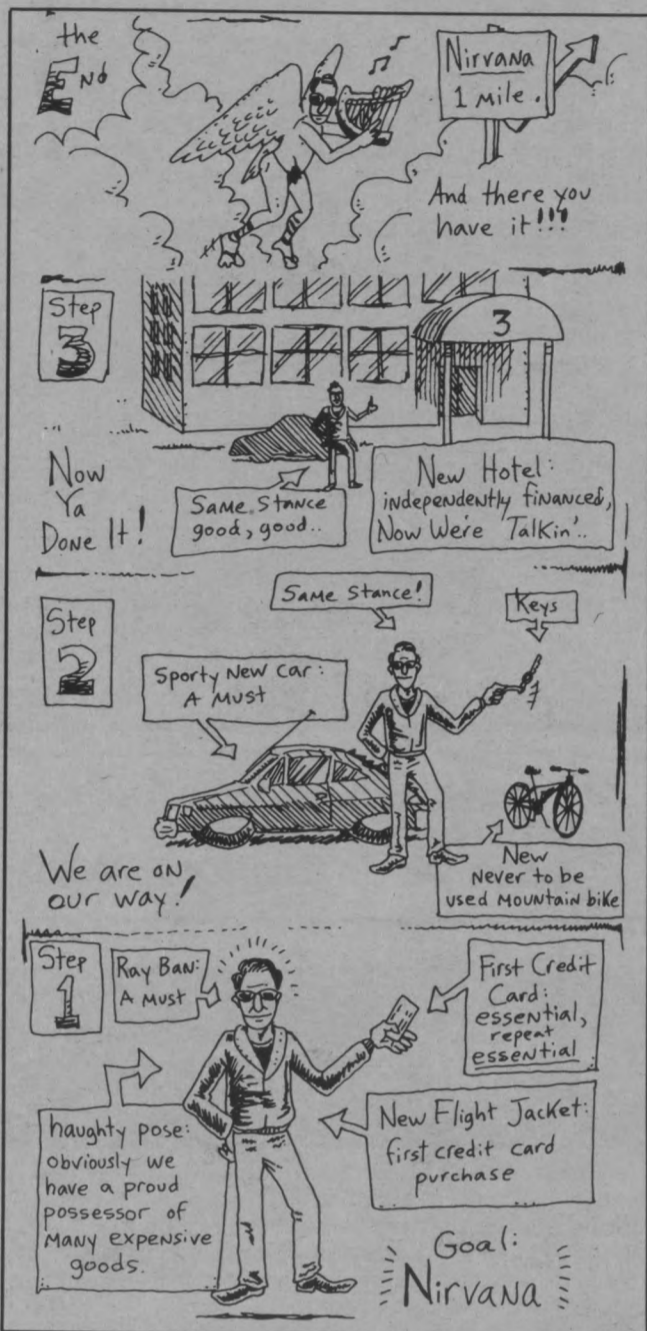
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The Low Road of the Spirit — Materialism
