MAY QUEEN TO BE REVEALED TONITE

Secret Will Out in Coronation During Formal Dance

The all-college May formal, jointly sponsored by Alpha Phi Omega and Phrateres, starting at nine tonight in the Carrillo Auditorium will feature the coronation of the still-unknown May Queen, chosen by the men of UCSB in last Wednesday's election.

The above seven girls received the largest number of votes in the election. Six of them will be the members of the Royal court at the dance; one of them will be the Queen. Until tonight however, no one but the committee knows who she is.

Witching Hour

The secret will be out at 11:00 p.m. when she will be crowned and the other girls will be installed as her attendants. The coronation will be broadcast over Radio KIST with announcer Jack Colon as master of ceremonies.

The name of the Queen will be engraved upon a perpetual loving cup presented to the college by the Santa Barbara Chamber of Commerce.

Decorations for the evening will be largely composed of fresh flowers. The various sub-chapters of Phrateres are sponsoring colorful concessions which will add to the spring atmosphere of the event.

Further honors will be bestowed upon the May Queen as she is proclaimed Queen of the 2C2A All-Conference Championship track meet which is to be held tomorrow evening, May 8, at La Playa Stadium. Among her royal duties, the Queen will present belt buckle trophies to first place winners of all track events.

Alice Thomas, president of Phrateres, and Henry Westcott, president of Alpha Phi Omega, are joint supervisors of committees for the dance. Dorothy Adameck is coordinator of committees and Iris Moore is secretary.

Provost Tells All in Council Quiz

The "big move" to Goleta, the definition of "liberal arts," the bookstore and the parking problem came under discussion Tuesday night when Acting Provost Harold J. Williams appeared before Student Council to answer some questions that have been troubling the legislative body for some time.

Other topics on Council's list of questions included the possibility of the basketball team's practicing in the Goleta gym next winter and of the student body acquiring a temporary student Union if the campus moves, the feasibility of changing the calendar to include Easter vacations, and the maximum enrollment planned for the college.

Bookstore Transfer

Asked by ASSB president George to explain what qualifications the students must meet before they can assume control of the bookstore, the Provost stated that if ASSB can show that they are willing and able to assume the financial responsibility, there is no reason why the bookstore cannot be transferred to student management. He pointed out that ASSB has never made a formal request to the Regents for transfer, and that University operation was originally meant to continue only until such time as some other plan could be adopted.

Although unable to say what proposition the Regents might offer, Dr. Williams said he believed ASSB would be expected to buy the store and stock at current inventory value. This would probably require a bank loan of \$75,000 to ASSB.

Term "Loose"

"The term 'liberal arts,'" said Dr. Williams, getting on to the next question, "has been thrown around loosely, and I'm not sure

Fall Prices Set For Men's Housing At Village

University Village will be set up to accommodate at least 80 men, all veterans, when school opens in the fall, according to a statement issued recently by the Housing office.

Prices range from \$45 per semester for space in the barracks, to \$65 for a double room and \$75 for a single room. A \$10 deposit, which must be made at time of application for rental, will be counted as final payment on the semester's rent.

The buildings to be used are "94," which is the barracks type, and "92" and "93" with single rooms and a few double rooms. Rentals will be offered first to presently enrolled veteran men and after these are accommodated, new applications will be considered.

Services to be furnished renters include furnishing and laundering of bedding, janitor service, laundry facilities and the use of one room in each building for light cooking. Buildings will be open during the Christmas vacation for students who wish to remain in Santa Barbara.

The Committee voted the ban because of numerous reports of poor student conduct and the resulting reluctance of townspeople to make halls available for the affairs.

It was reported that the costume dances have created an informality leading to excessive student "relaxation," and the Committee expressed hope that the conduct of students would show improvement during the coming months to enable a resumption of the costume-type dance activities next year.

any of us knows exactly what it means. Generally speaking, a liberal arts college is distinguished from those which specialize in certain vocational fields, such as law, medicine, teachers' college and industrial arts."

Describing the new curricular setup which establishes the two fields of liberal and applied arts at UCSB, Dr. Williams pointed out that it is difficult to draw a sharp line between them.

"When Pres. Sproul speaks of us as a liberal arts college," he added, "I believe he means a general arts college with strong liberal arts."

Goleta Growth

In reply to another query, the Provost said the move to Goleta would not affect the liberal arts plan except to permit better development of the college.

As to parking, he declared "the only solution I can see is to move to Goleta."

The Provost stated that he would recommend that one of the buildings now at Goleta, probably the Post Exchange, should be used as a Student Union, but was unable to say whether UCSB could use the gym for basketball practice before the deed of transfer had been completed.

The policies of the local group form the nucleus of the new national.

Plans for a long-awaited Big Sister program for Santa Barbara College are now being formulated by the Associated Women Students executive board, according to June Rice, AWS counsellor. Suggestions for the mechanics of the program, which is the first of its kind on this campus, were obtained by local delegates from the AWS convention in Seattle several weeks ago.

The purpose of the Big Sister plan is to aid in orientation of new women to the campus. The program will begin this summer, when women who have applied for admission in the fall will be contacted by "Big Sisters"—women already on the campus—and will receive a personal introduction to campus activities and customs through correspondence.

The "Big Sisters" will be on hand when the new women arrive in the fall, to help their "little sisters" get settled in their new home, accompany them to "get acquainted" parties, help in their registration, and in general act as personal counsellors for the rest of the semester.

All women interested in acting as Big Sisters for next fall will have an opportunity to sign up for the position soon in Miss Sweet's office, according to Mrs. Rice, and a more complete list of duties will be published soon for these women's benefit. It is hoped that many women will participate as it is the feeling of the AWS board that this is an important and worthwhile service which AWS can offer its members.

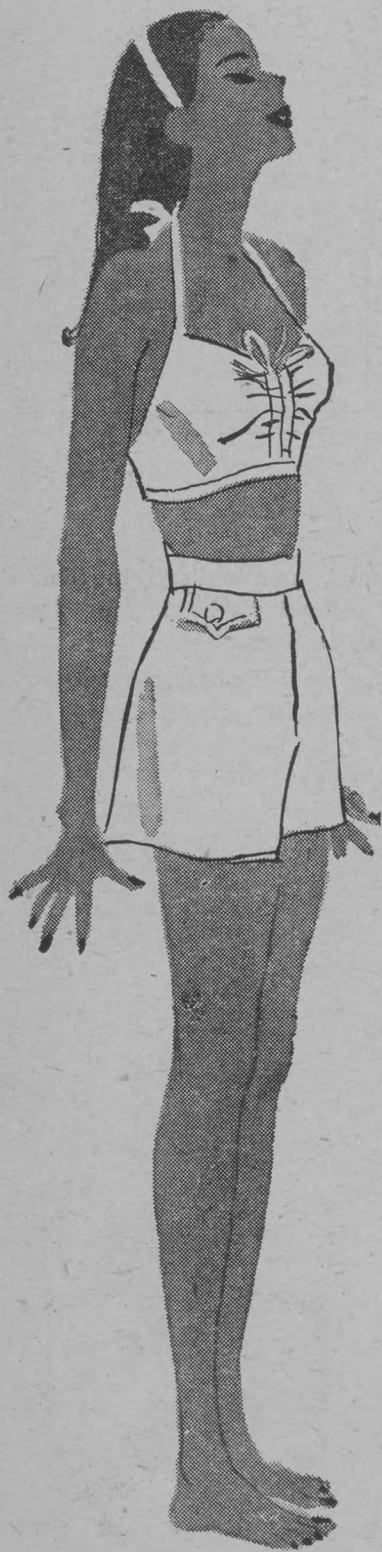
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2C2A TRACK MEET HERE TOMORROW

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Cinder Records May Topple As Conference Trackmen Vie

Santa Barbara's La Playa Stadium will be the scene of the annual 2C2A Conference Track Meet to be held tomorrow night at 8:00.

Defending Champions

Defending champions, the San Jose Spartans, will again rule as favorites in the meet. The Spartans will be paced by several good trackmen, some of them being Dan Smalley, Steve O'Meara, Thelmo Knowles, Bob Likens, Ray and Howard Overhouse, and Woody Lynn. All of these men have marks this year that either equal or surpass the conference records in their events. Either Smalley or O'Meara could break the 100 yard dash record, as they both have better marks this year than the record. Smalley has been clocked unofficially in 21 flat in the 220, four-tenths of a second better than the conference mark. Knowles holds the record for the 880 with a 1:54.9. He set this mark back in 1942. Likens was National Intercollegiate Champion in the javelin in 1946 and 1947, but will probably not break the record set in 1940. Ray Overhouse has tossed the discus over seven feet better than the conference record, while brother Howard has 13 ft. 8 in. in the pole vault. This is but one inch away from the record.

San Diego

The San Diego Aztecs will field a 21 man squad, headed by Willie Steele and Jack Kaiser. Steele, who holds more broad jump records than you can shake a stick at, will be out to better his conference record of 24 ft. 10 in. in the pit event. He will also run the 100 and 220 sprint events. Kaiser could very well top the 120 high hurdle mark, as his 14.6 mark of this year equals the record.
