University Village will be set up to accommodate at least 80 men, all veterans, when school opens in the fall, according to a statement issued recently by the Housing

Prices range from \$45 per semester for space in the barracks, to \$65 for a double room and \$75 for a single room. A \$10 deposit, which must be made at time of application for rental, will be counted as final payment on the semester's rent.

The buildings to be used are "94," which is the barracks type, and "92" and "93" with single rooms and a few double rooms. Rentals will be offered first to presently enrolled veteran men and after these are accommodated, new applications will be consid-

Services to be furnished renters include furnishing and laundering of bedding, janitor service, launduring the Christmas vacation for UCSB. students who wish to remain in Santa Barbara.


