39% of Voters Refuse Fist Fights, Rotten Eggs Mark to Bear Arms in Any Conflict

Say No Blanks on Campus

NEW YORK, May 23.—(CNS)-Returns from 65 colleges and universities participating in the Brown University Daily Herald anti-war poll this week disclosed that 39 percent of the students voting would refuse to bear arms in any war

According to officers of the Intercollegiate Disarmament council, which is cooperating with the Brown Daily Herald and the National Student federation in the poll, 21,725 votes which have been tabulated show that 8415 students would re-fuse to participate in any war, while 7221 others have indicated that they would bear arms for their country

only in case of invasion. Of the total number, however, 6089 declared they would participate in any war involving the Unit-

ed States.

Legislature Adopts Economy Program for Locals

Bill Totals \$282,152.33

Maximum Tuition of \$25 Per Annum Is Set

The signature of Governor Rolph, marking the final legislative step in establishing an economical budget which calls for a sum of \$282,152.33, to meet running expenses of the State college during 1933-35, was announced yesterday by President Clarence L. Phelps. The money for this biennial period will become available 60 days after the governor's

signature. Assuring the college of further unds, which will, in part, offset the budget reduction, Senate bill no. 814, taken from the budget bill, declares that "all fees collected from students in any state teachers college are hereby appropriated for the support of the state teachers college, in addition to such other funds as may be appropriated there-fore by the legislature." This will not affect student body funds, which are collected for student activities and remain apart from strictly col-

lege moneys, President Phelps said. Terminating a long battle by President Phelps and friends of the college to keep fees down to a reasonable level, the president announced that the legislature has definitely set \$25 a year or \$12.50 a semester as the maximum






