




Chamberlin Wins by Two, Calls Candidacy 'Only a Joke'

After wrangling a narrow two-vote victory in the two-month long 3rd District election contest Wednesday, Willy Chamberlin announced that his bid for the county seat was "only a joke."

Chamberlin shocked a standing-room-only crowd that gathered to hear a rousing victory sermon by confessing that the knockdown-dragout courtroom drama had been fought simply to collect on a free lunch.

"It was just a friendly gentleman's wager," Chamberlin said. "I bet Bob Lagomarsino a buffalo burger at Cold Springs Tavern that I could get into public office. It's not like I couldn't afford to buy the burger myself, but it's the principle."

According to Lagomarsino, who lost his congressional seat

to Michael Huffington in June, he's disappointed with the judge's ruling but intends to live up to his side of the bargain. "Life is like throwing a baseball," he said. "Sometimes it hits a piece of turf and bounces the wrong way."

Wallace's attorneys were less than amused by the current supervisor's revelation and vowed to fight the unprecedentedly prompt decision in court.

"I think it's an outrage," attorney Fred Woochure said. "The way ... voters were treated was an indictment of the election process and now its an indictment of the judicial system."

"I was pretty disappointed and I guess it's inevitable now we're going to appeal," Phil Seymour said. "Wallace's attorneys will be mad as hell if he doesn't."

Regents Don't Want Cash, But Your Body Will Suffice

Amid student pleas of "Don't take the leg," the University of California Board of Regents late Wednesday afternoon narrowly passed a budget package requiring students to offer the limb to the nine-campus system.

It wasn't pretty when the full board voted 13-6 with one abstention that they wanted the leg to deal with crippling budget shortfalls. The regents, who requested the limb by the beginning of Fall Quarter, made the decision at the future site of a 10th UC campus in Fresno just before rushing to eat cake at a groundbreaking ceremony.

"This leg thing is a one-time measure to help the UC deal with dire straights ahead," President Jack Peltason assured a group of 14 furious students who had traveled to the meeting. "I've seen people with one leg — heck, no legs — go on to live perfectly happy lives."

Though Peltason's original package asked that students give an arm, opponents of this measure maintained that no arm means sloppy term papers. "We want students who can type," Regent John Davies told the board.

Peltason used an elevator metaphor to explain students giving more to the University in tough times. "Sometimes the stakes go down, and sometimes they go up," he said.

Since the regents took tonsils in 1990, students have lost one kidney, half a bladder, a lung and two-thirds of the stomach for "financial reasons." Univer-

sity leaders have maintained that the cost of a UC education is still comparable to other public institutions that have forced students to sign over their first born child.

"If this keeps up, I won't be able to properly digest my food!" one student cried out while the regents were debating the measure.

Another student, who was

Regents Form Self-Serving Activist Group

While denying that ever-increasing numbers of student protesters scare them, the University of California Regents have formed their own group, Concerned Regents, and plan to occupy UCSB's University Center starting Monday.

"If they can take that library, that's our building, so why not take over theirs?" Regent Roy T. Brophy said of the group Concerned Students' occupation of the Main Library last month.

Brophy explained why the regents felt a need to form their own activist group.

"We are fed up with these god-damn students saying we should be elected," Regent Roy T. Brophy said. "They won't take

"Hello Fish"

Uehling Endures Lab Tests to Prove Safety of Research

Acting to quiet charges that cruel animal research goes on at UCSB, Chancellor Barbara Uehling on Tuesday voluntarily underwent a series of tests normally administered to white rabbits.

The tests, designed by biology Professor Joseph Mengle-Garcia, are used to determine how rabbits endure low-oxygen, low-pressure atmospheres like

Venus.

Uehling emerged from the lab seemingly composed, but answered reporters' questions slowly.

"It went fine. Fine. I have absolute confidence that Professor Mengle-Garcia is a marlin or a sailfish," said Uehling, still wet from a submersion in "heavy water" during the tests. "Hello fish," she added.

Uehling was rushed to her private doctor's office after the

Chinese Act to Curb Population, Mandate Homosexuality

BEIJING (AP)—Leaders in the People's Republic of China made a startling announcement Wednesday that, to curb their nation's continuing population problem, homosexuality will be made the law of the land.

"They say that one in four children being born in the world is Chinese. They also say that one in 10 people is homosexual," said Chinese leader Deng Xiaoping, who did not say who "they" indicated. "We just tried to tinker with that formula and put it together."

"I understand that gays and lesbians may still want children, and that's fine — China still needs children. But maybe this way we can avoid the continuing epidemic of 'herbal tea birth control' babies," Deng said.

Former President George Bush immediately released a statement following the announcement calling for continuance of his administration's policy of granting "Most Favored Nation" status to the world's most

populous country.

At the Pentagon, however, an air of panic is threatening to upset the U.S. defense establishment.

"What? First they're Commies, now they're gay?" said Senate Armed Services Committee Chairman Sam Nunn (D-Georgia). "What if they invade with their gay army? We can't fight a gay army! My morale is really low."

Seh Welch, gay rights activist and member of President Bill Clinton's AIDS taskforce, applauded China's move in that it made a clear statement to the world that homosexuality is an acceptable and normal form of love.

She was disturbed, however, by reports that acceptance of gays and lesbians would not lead to greater civil freedoms in the Maoist People's Republic, which still operates under a command economy.

"Uh, I don't know. Are you serious?" Welch said. Political analysts speculated that Deng's move was actually an attempt to pre-empt his "outing" by journalists who had gathered information rumored to connect the Chinese Communist Party's Central Committee with a barrage of anonymous love tokens sent to "Renegade" actor Lorenzo Lamas.

"This may be just another savvy move by that wily, sexy, virile Deng," said former President Richard Nixon.

Killer Ferrets Eat People a Lot in Terrible Infestation

LIMA, Peru (AP)—Still suffering from years of guerrilla warfare, Peru's government now has a new enemy to contend with: killer ferrets.

A dangerous hybrid resulting from the introduction of stowaway African ferrets, the killer ferret is far more aggressive than its musky northern cousins. Not only are Peru's crops being eaten at an alarming rate, but several field workers caught in the middle of a ferret attack have been devoured as well. The official death toll is currently at 12 workers.

Peru's President Alberto Fujimori called an emergency council session on Tuesday to assess the damage, but the meeting was violently interrupted by a ferret attack that nearly resulted in Fujimori's death. "Our goal is to resolve this situation as quickly as ... ahhh! The little fuckers are everywhere!" Fujimori said.

Crop damage is currently in the millions of dollars, with the cities of Arequipa and Trujillo hit hardest. Although the killer ferrets mostly eat wheat and rice, they are omnivorous and not very finicky. Many small peasant villages are requesting armed assistance in keeping the ferrets at bay.

Many U.S. ferret experts are worried that at the killer ferrets' current pace, they should arrive in North America by 1995, and in the U.S. by 1996, resulting in great potential damage to human life and crops.



Agents Convert to Koresh's Cult; Many Cite Marijuana

WACO, Texas (AP)—The month-long standoff between cult leader David Koresh and federal authorities ended amazingly late Tuesday night when over 90% of police and FBI agents converted to the cult.

Koresh, along with about seven other cult members had invited authorities into the compound to witness miracles and revelations, according to local authorities. Accepting their invitations, about 300 police and agents had entered the compound to be exposed to a spiritual sermon by the cult leader himself.

"He really is the Messiah, the Christ!" said Waco Mayor Clint Bono.

As a result, local authorities have now forfeited all their weapons and ammunition in a gesture of good faith and love, according to police reports.

"I knew he was the One all along," said Chuck Manson, a police negotiator who had been dealing with the cult for a month. "When he told us that we would rule the world forever, living free of rap music and the new administration's tax increases, with a constant supply of marijuana, that really really did it for us," Manson said.

According to enthused members, current plans for the cult will infiltrate the 700 club and win over Trinity Broadcasting Network, and finally give Benny Hinn a hair cut.



Brandon Lee Fakes Death, Hides in Malibu With Dad

MALIBU (AP)—Actor Brandon Lee arrived at his father's secret ranch here Tuesday three hours after faking his own death on the set of a film he was starring in.

Lee, son of martial-arts legend Bruce Lee, was the latest celebrity to take up clandestine residency at the ranch. Some of his more notable company now includes rock legend Elvis Presley, screen legend Marilyn Monroe and rock legend Jim Morrison.

Screen legend James Dean had lived at the Lee ranch for 12 years before dying of heart disease in 1988.

Lee's fake death was performed on the set of the film *The Crow* in Wilmington, S.C., by firing a blank-loaded pistol into his chest. The actor and other conspirators on the set made the incident appear to be a fatal chest wound.

After rushing Lee to the hospital, he was taken via helicopter to a local airport, where he was flown to Los Angeles.

While Lee hid in his limousine when he entered the ranch grounds, Malibu merchant Stewart Thor said the actor's residency in the area could only help the town.

"Everyone knows he's here, so it doesn't matter what he does to hide," Thor said Tuesday. "His presence just means more nosey tourists buying my groceries and more rich producers buying the land, pushing up the values. I love it."

'Rat-Bastards' Boil Acuña's Blood

In a surprising legal move, UCSB pariah and Cal State Northridge Professor Rudy Acuña on Wednesday named the women's basketball team, two professors of particle physics and the janitorial staff of the campus' sister school in Lithuania as defendants in his lawsuit against the university.


"I'm trying to get a good cross-section," said the outspoken, sunglasses-clad Chicano Studies teacher, who is already suing several campus officials and the university for denying him a post here.

"They are creepy, pseudo-intellectual, McCarthyite rat-bastards," a flushed Acuña exclaimed, punctuating his remarks by jabbing the air with a finger. "They're a bunch of corrupt little phonies."

UCSB administrators refused to comment. They have never commented substantially on the case. "We probably never will," said one vice chancellor.

Acuña hinted that he may also sue the staff at Alice's Deli, the cafeteria in the basement of Cheadle Hall. "They serve food to the very same people who denied me that job. They deserve it. They knew what they were getting into," he said.

He also added unexpected new demands to his case this week, asking the courts to officially invalidate the UCSB admi-

nistration's worldview, which he blames for his denial for a professorship.

Acuña further said he plans to keep pressuring the administration. "We'll make East Germany look like a nice vacation spot. I've got friends in the community, and I know this community, because I've been out in the community, working with the community, with the workers out there in the commun-

ity, and my community supports me."

"That's not a threat — that's a promise," he said.

The controversy over Acuña's case has already spanned almost two years. Conservative estimates place its resolution sometime before the Earth crumbles into tiny little bits and scatters out across the galaxy.

CALIFORNIA PUBLIC INTEREST RESEARCH GROUP (CALPIRG) VOLUNTARY FEE

The California Public Interest Research Group (CALPIRG) is a statewide organization funded and directed by students. CALPIRG conducts research, public education, service projects, and advocacy activities on issues of environmental quality, consumer protection, and governmental responsiveness.

CALPIRG is a non-profit, non-partisan organization that is governed by a Board of Directors elected from the student membership at campuses in the UC system. If the CALPIRG chapter is reestablished here, UCSB would elect 5 of the members to the State Board of Directors. The Board hires the Executive Director, adopts the annual budget, chooses issue areas within its legislative program, and coordinates projects statewide and at participating schools.

The UCSB CALPIRG chapter will hold General Interest Meetings each quarter and will encourage students to work on organized projects or start new ones. Some of the current ideas are:

Ocean Pollution- to coordinate a county-wide beach cleanup; to enforce standards established by the Clean Water Act.

Recycling- to promote campus and community recycling; to promote a reduce, reuse, and recycle platform on the state and federal level through advocacy and educational events on campus.

Ancient Forest Preservation- to sponsor educational presentations on Ancient Forest destruction in the United States; to distribute informational leaflets and to generate postcards to Congress, encouraging Congress to act immediately on Forest Preservation legislation.

Endangered Species Protection- to sponsor educational presentations on the Endangered

Species Act, which is slated for reauthorization this year in Congress.

Hunger/ Homelessness- to sponsor clothing drives, canned food drives, and fund-raising activities to benefit local, national, and international relief programs; to raise awareness on campus and in the community.

Consumer- to conduct price surveys on bicycle and car repair, school supply costs, and banking services.

Through CALPIRG, UC students have worked towards passing a law establishing stronger safety standards for public beach waters (1992) and strengthening amendments to the Federal Clean Air Act (1990).

CALPIRG was first created at UC Santa Barbara in 1980, when students voted to fund their organization through a per quarter, per student waiveable fee which appeared on the campus billing statement. Students voted in support of this mechanism six times over ten years. In 1990, the waiveable fee mechanism was eliminated by the UC Regents. However, negotiations between student representatives and the UC administration have resulted in a compromise pledge guidelines for voluntary student fees to support registered campus organizations.

After CALPIRG and UCSB administration agree on the terms and conditions, the voluntary pledge mechanism will allow students to again fund the CALPIRG program. No student would be billed for the voluntary \$5 per student per quarter fee unless she/he expresses a desire to do so in writing. The pledge would appear on the student's quarterly billing statement; as with any other fee, the voluntary fee would be assessed every quarter for the duration of the student's academic career. A pledging student may, at any time, submit a form which states she/he does not wish to be billed for the CALPIRG fee in future quarters.

IMPORTANT POINTS ABOUT THE CALPIRG VOLUNTARY FEE

In January 1993, UC President Jack Peltason issued systemwide guidelines enabling campus chancellors to establish a voluntary student fee mechanism. Implementation of the voluntary fee is contingent upon a student election supporting the fee, and the acceptance of a mutually agreed upon contract among CALPIRG, student leaders, and UCSB administration

1. *If the voluntary fee is established, how can students pledge to pay it?*

CALPIRG fee pledge cards will be available through CALPIRG and the Campus Activities Center. Students who wish to pay the fee must fill out the card and turn it in to CALPIRG or the Campus Activities Center, or they may pledge through the Registrar's Phone System Night-time Menu.

2. *How can students who have signed a CALPIRG pledge revoke their pledge to pay the fee?* Pledge reversal cards will be available through CALPIRG and the Campus Activities Center. Students who have pledged to pay the CALPIRG fee and who wish to revoke that pledge must fill out the reversal card and turn it in to CALPIRG or the Campus Activities Center, or revoke the pledge through the Registrar's Phone System Night-time Menu.

3. *When will students who have pledged to pay the CALPIRG fee be billed?* Initially students who pledge to pay the CALPIRG fee will be billed no later than on the Winter Quarter

1994 BARC statement. Students who complete a CALPIRG fee pledge card by established deadlines will be billed on the next quarter's billing statement. If students have pledged to pay the CALPIRG fee but fail to include sufficient dollars with their registration fees, their course registration will not be held up nor will they be dropped from classes.

4. *Is there a minimum number of students who must pledge before any single student is assessed?* Yes. Once established, the CALPIRG voluntary pledge system is activated only if at least 10% of the student body pledges to pay the fee. This threshold will rise to 20% of the student body one year after the pledge system is initially implemented. If the percentage of students pledging to pay the fee falls below the 20% threshold, a new student body election will be held in order to reaffirm the fee for future quarters.

5. *Does Financial Aid cover a student's CALPIRG fee?* No.

6. *Who is paying for the cost of implementing and administering the CALPIRG pledge?* CALPIRG will pay for all administrative costs incurred by the establishment and maintenance of the CALPIRG voluntary fee system.

7. *Where should students go during the election with questions about CALPIRG?* The CALPIRG office on campus is located in trailer 306-B. The office phone number is 893-8319.

Do you support the establishment of a voluntary student fee of \$5 per student per quarter, excluding summer, to support the California Public Interest Research Group (CALPIRG) at UCSB beginning Winter 1994? No student will be billed for the CALPIRG fee unless she/he has requested to be billed and has pledged to pay the quarterly fee for the duration of her/his academic career. A student may, at any time, reverse her/his pledge and then not be billed the CALPIRG fee in subsequent quarters. This measure will be reaffirmed by ballot voting in Spring 1998.

Corporations Ready to Run University


Declaring the era of state-subsidized higher education at an end, Chancellor Barbara Uehling today unveiled plans to turn the administration of several campus departments over to large retail corporations.

If the chancellor's plan is approved, the UCen/RecCen building will be renamed the McCen as part of an agreement with the McDonald's corporation, which will operate the building.

"This is a win-win situation," Uehling said, flanked by McDonald's officials and restaurant mascot Ronald McDonald at a contract-signing ceremony Wednesday.

"This project is an example of an effective partnership between the private sector and higher education, which will continue to provide an excellent level of service to UCSB customers — I mean, to UCSB students, for many years to come," Uehling said.

The McCen will feature a food court with several franchise restaurants such as McDonald's, Depue Chicken and Salmon Ella's Seafood, and a bookstore operated by B. Dalton, which has begun branching out into the educational market after getting its start in shopping malls.

"Our research people have found that the changing demographics of the consumer population have created a university market that has been under-utilized by the publishing industry," said B. Dalton Marketing President Roger M. Shue.

"Textbooks sold in college-run bookstores are priced at an inefficiently unprofitable level, and we feel that we can provide books to students and at the same time allow the university to recoup its investment 10-fold," Shue said.

In a cost-cutting measure, full-time staff at

Cheadle Hall will be replaced with KellyGirl temporary workers, who will be known as Kelly Women after officials received complaints from several students opposed to using the term "girl" to identify adults.

In other developments, the Chemistry Dept. will be administered by Dow Chemical, while the Economics Dept. will become a subsidiary of Shearson Lehman Brothers.

Several students were unhappy with the proposed changes, however. "They should have brought the Grimace in-


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


Many students ignore the pain or try to relieve it through the use of painkillers and drugs. However when your head aches, it does so because something is wrong - perhaps something quite simple.

Beside the obvious causes of headaches (hangovers and head injuries) the vast majority of headaches that students suffer from usually are tension headaches. While tension may be a factor, the term tension headache implies that psychological stress is a major factor. Physical stress such as poor posture, spinal misalignment/immobility can often result in tension also. For example, when the muscles at the base of the skull fatigue, spasm or contract due to hours of bending forward over a desk it can result in a tension headache.

An I.V. parade is in order. In fact, we call on Willy to marshal it.



This ethnocentric, homophobic and SEXIST class is Auto History 101 (I suppose the word "auto" should have tipped me off to the single-mindedness





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

Continued from p.1 this fee increase and 5% faculty pay cut lying down — well, too bad!"

Concerned Regents' goal is to intimidate students into either paying increased fees or dropping out so that they can be replaced by wealthy students who can afford it, Brophy said.

A few days after the meeting, Concerned Regents sent out a statement announcing their first move — to take over the UCen next Monday and close all of its student services for one day, except the Deli. If any students dare protest after this, Concerned Regents will shut down the UCen for

good, the statement says.

Concerned Regents deny that they feel threatened by student protesters, although students statewide at the Student Summit in Sacramento last March 6-8 called for regent reform, meaning the elimination of most of the current regents.

"These kids can't do anything to us. We have the support of the governor," Head Regent Meredith Khachigian said in a phone interview.

Regent Khachigian insisted that Concerned Regents is not copying the successful occupation of the Main Library by Concerned Students, but that Concerned Regents are originals.


"Those students compromised with UCSB offi-

cial," she said. "But we are the officials, and we don't compromise."

Concerned Students member Sara Seiberg said Concerned Students was sent a copy of the statement.

"We had a great time with it," she said. "I read it out loud, and everyone had a good laugh over it."

Seiberg said the Concerned Students would host a UCen occupation starting at 12:01 a.m. the morning before the Concerned Regents arrive at campus. She was confident Concerned Students would have the upper hand because of its allies in Associated Students, which has keys to the UCen. The Regents do not.



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Library Card Catalogue Infiltrated

Library officials are blaming a misdirected computer for recent discoveries that UCSB's entire card catalogue has been replaced with over 2 million Desert Storm Playing Cards.

The switch, estimated to have taken place unnoticed three years ago, was discovered last week by members of student activist group LIBWATCH who were investigating rumors that library officials planned to make each volume radioactive to better track down negligent borrowers.

LIBWATCH head Parker Roadhead, who had not used the library before the incident, opted to bypass the facility's computer locating systems, terming computers "Techno-tyrants" and "the font of all evil."

Boisse attributed the mix-up to the Melvyl computer system. "Melvyl's been depressed for some time over his career stall in the face of the younger, flashier Pegasus," Boisse said. "He somehow managed to order the Dewey Drones to make the switch."

The Dewey Drones, or cyberstampers, are the android workers the library considered to replace student employees. Library officials abandoned the idea when they discovered that, after four years of fee hikes, students were willing to work for less than the monthly oil-can costs for the Drones.

The Drones, which are now stored in the caverns beneath the library, are only used now to announce the imminent closure of the library at appropriate times.

Boisse plans to make

the most of the card situation, however, and is developing a plan to augment the library's finances. For a \$5 fee, students will be able to select a category out of the drawers and collect prizes for winning hands.

First prize, a lifetime supply of Bageldogs, will go to anyone who draws five aces, each featuring a photo of George Bush in an F-15 over Baghdad.

The activist group Lucerne Students, seeking to emulate Switzerland's nonparticipatory approach to war, has expressed its disapproval of the plan, however, and called on library officials to remove the cards.

"Dessert Storm Cards in the library only serve to perpetuate the kind of white, male, heterosexist thinking responsible for the world's ills," read a statement released by the group.

Unnamed sources in the group hinted that a takeover of the library may be in the works unless officials meet their demands that the Desert Storm cards be replaced by Malcolm X Playing Cards and that guarantees be made that clubs and diamonds receive equal representation in each hand.

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
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


Salad Bar Creating

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Fee Increase Goes to Football Stadium

Kasser Says Lack of Team Not a Problem as New Project Unveiled


At last, the truth comes to light.

Speaking before a standing-room only crowd at a press conference in the men's bathroom at Snidecor Hall, UCSB Athletic Director John Kasser admitted that the bulk of the funds that will come from the recent University of California fee hike will be appropriated to build a new sports complex at UCSB, complete with a football stadium and an ice hockey rink.

"We are proud to announce ... that within three years, UCSB will have a brand new football stadium to show off to the rest of the collegiate world," Kasser told a stunned crowd of reporters, photographers and various small farm animals. "The new sports complex and football stadium will be the envy of schools across the nation."

The complex, which will be dubbed the Norbert Q. Funj Sports Complex, after the late Norbert Q. Funj, will also feature a table-tennis arena, a drawing room and several mud baths. The stadium, which will seat 78,000 fans, and the hockey rink, which will hold 23 spectators, will be erected adjacent to each other at the east end of Storke Field.

When reminded by a farm ani-



mal that UCSB currently has no football or hockey teams, Kasser shrugged off the question. "That doesn't matter one bit," he said. "It's important ... to have a ... football [stadium] in this day and [age]. At such a [fine] university as UCSB, we ... don't want to ... be ... [outdated]."

Campus reaction was mixed. "I think it's great," said senior Leopold St. Jimmy. "We need a new stadium." When reminded that UCSB doesn't have a football team, St. Jimmy persisted, "I still think it's great. Leave me alone."

One student, who wished to be known only as "Scott," was also happy. "I used to play football in high school," he said. "I was pretty good. I'd play here,



but we don't have a team. Plus, I'm going to die at 50, and I want to enjoy life."

Not every student was as elated at the developments. "I don't see why we need a stadium," said graduate Ryan Schrempf. "I don't think we really need one. The more I think about it, the more I'm sure we don't need one. This whole thing kind of pisses me off."

Because of the presence of the new stadium, Kasser indicated that Harder Stadium will be destroyed, most likely within three days. Kasser said that the men's and women's soccer teams will heretofore play in Storke Plaza. When asked about the playing conditions in Storke Plaza, Kasser became irritated, saying

simply, "A little concrete won't hurt anybody."

Associate Athletic Director Jim Romeo followed Kasser to the podium to speak about the name of the stadium. In an unprecedented move, Romeo said that UCSB would follow the precedent set by the University of California at Berkeley, which gave several names to its basketball complex. Where the Berkeley basketball arena is named "Newell Court at Harmon Gymnasium," Romeo indicated that the UCSB football stadium would be called the "Stank End Zone on Girth Field next to the Stolpa Sidelines in Funj Stadium on Storke Field." Romeo said that the name could be

simply shortened to "Girth Field in Funj Stadium on Storke Field" if someone doesn't have time to say the whole thing.

At least one person didn't like the name. "I think it's stupid that you try to copy Cal," said Berkeley graduate Brian Dumpy. "You always try to copy Cal. You can't be Cal, so stop trying. We are THE University of California. That's why we're called Cal. Quit trying to copy us."

"I like the name," added senior Andrea Jelly. "I can't wait to go to the stadium. It ought to be fun." When reminded that UCSB doesn't have a football team to play in the stadium, Jelly said, "I don't care. I still have fun going to stadiums."

Women Defeat Men in Basketball Battle

As Expected, Lady Guacho's Win; Pimm's Program Cut From Budget

When the UCSB men's and women's basketball squads squared off this week to decide which Goucho program would survive Athletic Dept. budget cuts, the results were predictable.

After advancing to the semi-quarterfinals of the NCAA Tournament again last month, the Guacho women capped off their postseason by overcoming a severe height disadvantage and defeating their male counterparts, 85-67, at the Blunderdome. For the men's squad, which had ended its extremely brief postseason with an NIT loss, yesterday's defeat means that the team will now be dropped in order to make room in the budget for an upcoming football-hockey complex (see related story, in this newspaper, on this page, over there somewhere).


"I think we just wanted it more," women's coach Mark French correctly stated after his squad's 18-point win over the Guocho men. "We did what we normally do — we ran the fast break, played good man-to-man pressure defense and rebounded well. I think that's a real credit to the women in our program. The men just couldn't keep up."

Although the average height on the Lady Nacho squad is 5-foot-9 — a full 11 inches shorter than the men's squad, which averages 6-foot-6 — the women were able to dominate on the boards, out-rebounding the men 58-28 overall and grabbing a team-record 30 offensive rebounds. All 32 offensive boards were put back in for two easy points.

"We've had problems giving up rebounds all year," said men's coach Jerry Pimm, shaking his head. "Thirty offensive rebounds is too many. It's just way too many."

The women received an early setback when starting center Becky Brown picked up her fourth foul only 47 seconds into the game and was forced to the bench. However, women's forward Christa Gannon was able to pick up the slack, scoring eight consecutive points to lead the Lady Geauchos to an early 12-0 lead.

The men were finally able to get on the scoreboard five minutes into the game when guard Idris Jones connected from long range behind the three-point arc somewhere near half court. The Gowcho offense suddenly came to life, and for about six or seven minutes it looked as if the Goucho's were the greatest basketball team in history, surging ahead to a 26-15 lead.

But their shooting suddenly went ice cold, and the Lady Goocho defense was able to force lots and lots of turnovers. On the night, the men turned the ball over 46 times, with all 48 turnovers being converted into two easy points for the women.

"We've had problems against the trap all year," said Pimm, still shaking his head. "And they really made it tough on us with their man-to-man defense. Or is that woman-to-woman? No, wait — shouldn't that be woman-to-man? Whatever."

"Anyway, 46 turnovers is way too many," Pimm added.

The men were never able to get back on track in the second half, and the women coasted to victory on the strength of their free throw shooting. For the game, the Lady Guachos were 28-for-29 (97%) from the line, while, the men could only hit one of their 16 free throw attempts (6%).

"I think they've had problems shooting free throws all year," French said of the men. "But that's always been one of our strengths. I think that's a real credit to the women in our program."

Gannon recorded a quadruple-double on the night,

"It's really a shame that we trained all year for the meet and then they won't let us do what we worked for," Caswell said. "I was walking at a moderate pace, not a brisk one like they said."

Despite walking a faster pace, Caswell did not win the race. "I just never found my rhythm," he explained.
