In the late 1970s, the ever optimistic Ernie Banks was asked why he still had hope for his team after the Cubs lost 10 of their first 12 games.

His answer: "You have to back up before making a running start."

Much like last year, when it began the season with a 1-2 record, the UCSB football team backed into the 1990 season with a 42-10 loss to the Sonoma State Cossacks last Saturday at Harder Stadium. The season opening loss ranked as its worst defeat since the program was brought back in 1986.

"This feels a lot like the San Francisco game last year. We have to turn it around. It's like a 180 degree turn from top to bottom (from last year)," Gaucho wide receiver Brian Fleming said after the loss. "It seems (the youth of the team) could be part of it, but I'm not making any excuses. They were a good team, we just didn't execute and have our good stuff on every play. It's a new season with new players so we've just got to adjust."

new players so we've just got to adjust." The likenesses between Saturday's contest and last year's 32-14 loss to the Gators are notable. The Gauchos turned over the ball eight times in each game, with five coming on interceptions Saturday. In 1989, Santa Barbara let the Gators gain 453 total yards, while the Cossacks gained 315 to the Gauchos' 177 on Saturday. Finally, the Gauchos used three quarterbacks in '89, while Head Coach Rick Candaele called upon junior Rick Wildt and senior Mike Curtius against SSU.

"To be honest, with the young team that we have, I wasn't quite sure what to expect," Candaele said. "What it looked like when we started defensively was that we were playing eight new starters. We didn't play well defensively right at the start and offensively the big key was that they dominated the line of scrimmage. Then we








## **Gaucho Football Wins** Div. II Status for 1991

UCSB football's drive to step up in division classifica-tion ended this summer when the NCAA announced the Gauchos will have Division II status in time for the 1991 season.

The announcement comes four years after the school's Division III gridders regained intercollegiate status in 1986 following a 15-year hiatus, and three years after the program began actively seeking Division II membership.

UCSB Athletic Director John Kasser said the automa-tic approval means UCSB will not have to petition the Division II convention in January for reclassification ef-

threw five turnovers for three touchdowns and you can't do that to sustain."

Of course there is a happy ending to the 1989 story, after losing to the Gators, Santa Barbara embarked on a seven game winning streak and ended the season with an 8-2 record. Is it possible again?

"We have to play better than that," Candaele added. "They were definitely more physical than we were. We just have to play with a little more effort and a little more precision.'

Youth and inexperience are most likely the team's worst enemies, as Candaele noted.

Missing offensively is quarterback Steve Armstrong, last season's leader of the Gaucho "air show" which was grounded last Saturday. Wildt (6-17, 41 yards, 3 int.), a junior-college transfer from Long Beach who redshirted last year, started the game and Curtius (10-22, 104 yards, 2 int.), who has seen playing time in each of the last two seasons, ended it

"I couldn't see that either quarterback stood out, to be honest," Candaele said. "I will have to look at the film to evaluate it, but it really doesn't appear that either was better than the other."

The two found preseason All Americans Johnny Ace and Fleming a total of just four times each — Ace for just 39 yards (one TD) and Fleming for 49.

In Candaele's eyes, how-ever, the game was lost in the trenches. "Offensively it looked like they dominated

the line of scrimmage the whole game and we never could generate any running game. We turned the football over five times — three picks for three touch-downs," he said about his team which returned just two starters at offensive line this season, center Lance Comes and tackle Greg Hirschler.

"Defensively we put out as good a performance as I've seen," said Sonoma State Head Coach Tim Walsh, whose unit held the Gauchos to just 32 yards rushing. "It was an unbelievable performance. We've always had problems with Santa Barbara every

year we've played them and defensively we took them out of the game.

"We were (expecting a little bit more from UCSB), they've always given us a lot of problems. We were expecting it to be a real hard battle," he added.

Although Santa Barbara's defense was run over by the Cossacks early in the game — Glen Campbell scored on a 38-yard run and Shelton Trosclair ran 10 yards for a TD in the first quarter — it solidified after that, allowing just one more offensive touchdown. However, it was still outshown as SSU returned three interceptions for TDs.


"We've just got to play better as a team, we have to condition a little bit harder and we've got to come on to the field more ready to play," Gaucho cornerback Kurt Bomke said after the loss. "Game-wise I don't think we were quite as intense and enthusiastic as we should have been and ready for this game, on the other hand we pretty much got out manned by the other team."





fective next year.

"I was surprised we got an automatic approval and I'm glad we don't have to go through the appeals process," Kasser said. "It's appropriate because we've been playing by Division II rules and that's the main issue " NCAA rules state that teams seeking reclassification must be in compliance with the rules of the desired division for two years prior to the effective date of reclassification.

NCAA Membership Coordinator Shirley Whitacre said UCSB has certified its compliance with Division II rules last season, adding that the school plans to comply with the rules again

# le Task Awaits Draeger

he had coached men's soccer since 1982. During that time he built a 101-36-21 overall record, reached the playoffs seven out of eight years and won three league championships.

"He was a well-respected coach and we were sorry to see him go," said DeAnza Physical Education Dean Tom Banks.

Prior to that, Draeger had been the head soccer coach at Saratoga High School since 1971. However, his route into the world of soccer was different than many coaches'. Unlike most of his counterparts, he had never played the game.

"The sport I really loved to coach at that time was basketball. I had been coaching basketball when the soccer thing came up," he remem-bered. "It was an afternoon sport, and I was getting home to be with my family. ... We had a little success the first year and I said 'Hey, this is great. It's afternoons, I don't

have to scout much and I'm having a P.E. period.' I just got involved with it and it went from there. It just took off."

To say it "took off" is being modest. In his 12 years as head coach there, his young-sters won 10 league champ-ionships, won their section eight of the 10 times, reached

eight of the 10 times, reached the final four six times and the finals twice, winning the state championship in 1982. "I had a lot of help there. A lot of people in the youth groups did an awful lot of work," he said. "What we did was to keep the youth prog-ram just with Saratoga High School players. It was the School players. It was the community of Saratoga only. We didn't allow other people into it. It was ours.

"Our soccer players on the high school team played as many as 60, 70, 80 games a year," he added. "So when we got into season we were really ready."

Draeger's lack of playing experience doesn't faze him. "I think my backgrounds in the other sports, particularly basketball, helped me immensely in coaching, some-times more than the 'pure soccer coach' who is a soccer player," he said. "I think my variety of athletics is a big plus over someone who has been brought up on soccer alone, because tactically I think I'm very sound, and I can adjust quickly to the game and get players doing things quickly and easily."

It's this cerebral aspect of the game that appeals to Draeger, and convinces him

Coach's Comments: Dolan is equally excited about the season after his team's first win, which he attributed







**Runners** to watch:





State/Hollister Local to UCSB. This route provides continuous, two-way, notransfer, seven day per week service from Santa Barbara through the campus to West campus housing and on into Ellwood and Winchester Canyon areas. **LINE 19** 

DPHS/GVJHS Booster. This school booster service runs to both the Dos Pueblos High and the Goleta Valley Junior High from New Family housing and the Isla Vista, El Colegio and Storke Road areas. LINE 25
