Faculty-Staff Softball Team To Test Student Squad In Titanic

Tomorrow afternoon at Oak Park the first social event of the Summer Session will be held beginning at 4 p.m. This is the "GAU-CHOW", a student-faculty gettogether for food, fun, and frolic. The extravaganza is a family affair, with the families of all faculty and staff members as well as students' families cordially invited.

The festivities will begin at 4 p.m. when a softball term composed of students will meet in a "friendly" match with a faculty-staff squad. The faculty team is managed by "Peppy" Pop Wells, who is busily lining up a potent array of softball players. "Pop" has already received signed contracts from Larruping Lester Sands, Gritty Glenn Durflinger, Galloping George Obern, Bashing Bill Davis, and Krafty Kormit Seefeld. Many other faculty and staff members are on the verge of signing up, with only bonus prices holding up the deals. Many students have expressed the hope that while they don't want to see any permanent injuries come out of the game, they would not be adverse to having the faculty members forced to miss a class or two because of sore muscles.

While the softball game is going on, there will also be volleyball competition for those who can't stand the sight of blood. For the younger set there will be a supervised wading pool and a sandpile where the children can get wet and dirty to their hearts' desire.

At 6 p.m., what is loft of the faculty and staff will serve the food. Berbecued franks, tossed green salad, frijoles, toasted buns, coffee and ice cream will be on the menu. Milk will be provided for the children. Enterprising students will watch to see which faculty and staff members will be unable to eat their food, and thereby get extra chow.
