

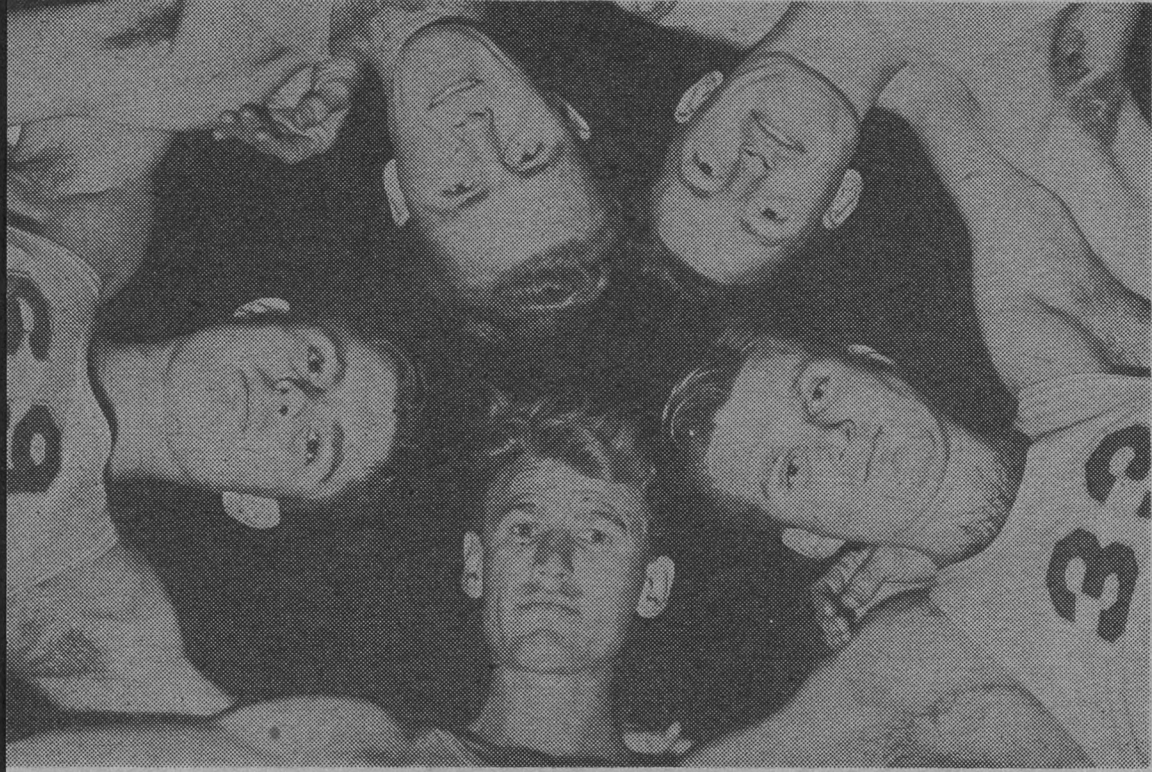

NEW STUDENTS TO GET SAGE ADVICE

Despite persistent rumors to the contrary, "professors are human beings." This and other bits of enlightenment are contained in a pamphlet titled "Some Tips for Scholastic Success at Santa Barbara College." It will be given to all new men registering at the college during the week of Feb. 7. Acting Dean of Men William Hayes, who wrote the pamphlet, said it was designed to help the new student get adjusted to college life without learning everything the hard way—and sometimes not even then. It points to many short cuts, but at the same time issues many a warning or furnishes a bit of down-to-earth advice, such as the reminder that "time spent at East each does not count as credit toward graduation." Students are urged to read the catalogue, which "will be as valuable to you as a compass is to a mariner." They are told that there are some 40,000 books in the library, and although you

won't need them all, you ought to introduce yourself to a few." The admonition to study regularly and attend all classes is accompanied by the sage observation that "a few clock hours with books before an exam more than equal a tearful session with your professor afterward."

Some thought is also given to the welfare of the professor when the student is cautioned: "If you write like most college men you'd better type your reports. Saves wear and tear on the faculty nervous system."

It is suggested that students take the initiative in visiting their professors, since the latter are responsible for many students and can not seek out each one individually. A note of warning is added, however, that "it's wise not to wait until your grades are sub-par before making" the visit.

Dr. Hayes practices his preaching in this case, since he makes it part of his daily schedule to have men students in his office for a chat. Before the school year is over he will have had a talk with every male student at Santa Barbara College at least once. During these talks the student is encouraged to bring up any of his problems or to ask for information and advice.

The pamphlet, Dr. Hayes explains, is just one other means of trying to help the students find their places in the college community and hit their most effective stride without painful delays and confusions.

ARMY OFFERS COMMISSIONS TO SBC GRADS

College graduates who served as commissioned officers in any of the armed forces during World War II may now obtain commissions as second lieutenants in the regular Army, according to Colonel Richard G. McKee, professor of military science and tactics and officer in charge of the ROTC at Santa Barbara College.

Applicants must have at least one year of honorable active service as a commissioned officer in any component of the armed forces between Dec. 7, 1941, and Sept. 2, 1945; have a degree from an accredited college or university; be between 21 and 27 years of age; and meet the physical and other requirements for appointment to the regular Army.

It was pointed out that the maximum age limit may be increased in some cases according to the period of commissioned service in the Army subsequent to Dec. 31, 1947. Also, if the applicant has not been graduated from college, the estimated graduation date may be given on the application, together with a statement of verification by an appropriate official of the school.

Additional information may be obtained from the ROTC office in Elm Hall on the Riviera campus.
