

Del Playa Tumbles into Ocean

A small hurricane which came ashore yesterday in Isla Vista has taken a large toll in damage, including the total disappearance of Del Playa St and portions of other roads.

Although yesterday's rains and winds were great enough to erode all of Del Playa, it is not certain what fate actually befell that beloved thoroughfare. While scores of beachfront homes were apparently destroyed, no deaths or injuries were reported.

Officials from various emergency agencies were baffled by the lack of casualties, normally much larger in disasters of this magnitude. One police officer went as far as to say, "I'm baffled. Normally casualties are much higher in disasters of this magnitude."

The Magic Lantern Theater, formerly almost three blocks from the beach, presently occupies a frontage site along with several other "top-of-the-loop" businesses.

While some business owners were busy shoveling sand back against the tide in attempts to shore up their recently enhanced locations, other began ex-

pansion of facilities to include ocean front decks and dining accommodations.

A request from the Isla Vista Community Council (IVCC) to gain emergency funding from the County Board of Supervisors for clean-up and repair operations is expected to fail today because, as one Supervisor put it, "IVCC just hasn't shown that any real need exists."

That representative went on to say that "every time a couple of buildings fall down out there they come screaming to us for help. This is an election year. IVCC can't expect us to grant money out of our districts under such conditions."

"Hell, we already gave them a whole bunch of shovels. Tractors don't grow on trees you know."

The Supervisors are, however, expected to approve allocations for new tar removal stations to be built on the Sabedo Tarde bluffs.

Geologists on the disaster scene are playing down the idea that Del Playa residents may have detached themselves from the remainder of I.V. in an act of solidarity and independence, although

there is evidence to support this theory.

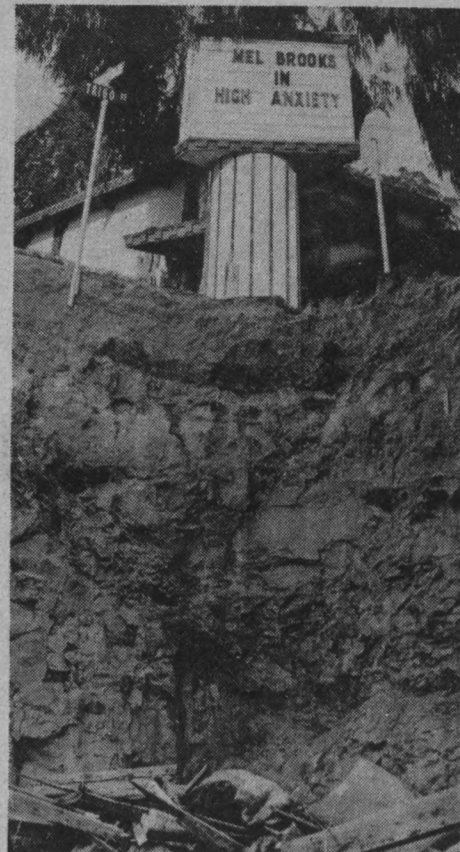
A typed statement claiming responsibility for the disappearance of Del Playa was discovered late last night tacked to the bluff side. The statement was signed simply "Del Playa Liberation Front."

The group claimed it "had broken off to form a new Republic of Del Playa." No indication was given as to where the alleged new republic would finally be located.

While law enforcement officials are generally dismissing the idea as "nonsense," a marine task force from UCSB has been awarded a \$3.2 million grant to "search for any unidentified floating objects which may actually be Del Playa St."

Campus officials swung quickly into action following discovery of the missing street. UCSB's Chancellor Cap'n Bob Huttenback said "I'll do everything I can do to secure the return of cleaning deposits" for residents of missing residences. Informed sources close to the Chancellor's maid told the Bogus yesterday that this action would include "stomping, raging, maybe even a phone

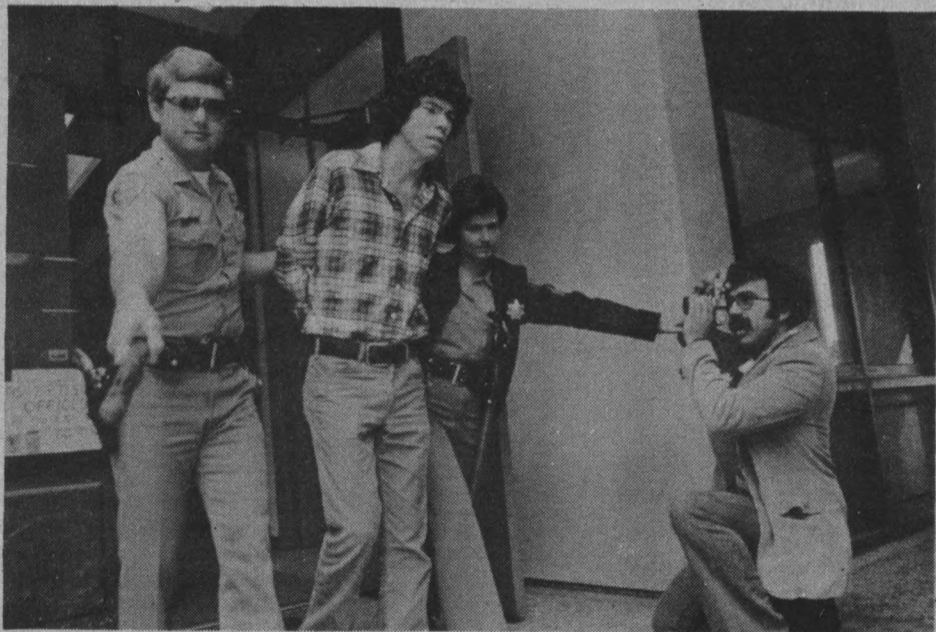

God Warned by Council, Reprimand to be Sent

By a unanimous voice vote, A.S. Vegetative Council moved Wednesday to have A.S. Director Robert Lorden send a letter of reprimand to God, to be placed in His personnel file.

The letter of reprimand was chosen by Council as the more expedient of the two possible punitive actions which they discussed. An earlier motion to have God back to 60 percent time was squelched for lack of a second, as all but one council member were out buying candy.\$

Growing chasms in council members' opinions became evident earlier in the evening, when RHA Representative Mike Stief untabled for the seventeenth time his proposal to increase council members' grants-in-aid to \$10,000 per quarter. "People just don't appreciate how much work we do around here," Stief said. As he and Veg Council's personal CPA went over possible tax loopholes, he added, "Besides, what we're really after is get-

ting good people to run for council. . . this is just an incentive."

Veg Council took a significant step towards ultimately resolving the concert issue, directing Lorden to "string Jim Curnutt up by th toes." Representative Dann Gershon, author of the proposal, claimed "The wording of the motion was very touchy. If we had gone ahead with our original plan to have 'short hairs' instead of 'toes', people might have thought we were being vindictive."

Council retired into executive session about midway through their agenda, in order to discuss whether or not they were justified in going into executive session the previous week. At that time, council members had closed their doors to the public in order to discuss the recent abundance of executive sessions. Arguing in favor of the secret meetings, Executive Vice President Bob Wilkenson said, "Well, heck, why shouldn't we have executive sessions? We're executives, aren't we?"

Editor Charged With Printing Bogus Issue

Vice Chancellor Ed Birch wouldn't comment on the action the administrators might make, but did Chortle, "I don't think I'll comment, if you don't mind."

Tom Bolton, wild eyed editor-in-chief of the widely respected daily who was arrested by Campus Police yesterday, refused to answer specific allegations. Instead he read a prepared statement to the reporters gathered outside his spacious office. The statement claimed;

Not so understanding were the thousands of students who expected to pick up the fine campus daily for their superb news coverage, and ended up with a fistful of old jokes.

"I want my money back," screamed an irate Richard Boornstein. "I wanted to

read something that would help me sleep through my nine o'clock class and I wound up chuckling several times. The prof heard me and through me out of the class. Now I'll never get to med school."

Concern over a truncated medical career was not the only factor motivating angered students. Dave Van Middlesworth and Jorja Van Crump complained that they hadn't realized that what they were reading was in any way different from the everyday run-off-the-mill Nexus. Because they didn't "get the joke," they claimed to suffer acute social embarrassment at not being as "with it" as their friends.

Cap'n Bob said that, if authorized by the Regents, he would take action immediately.

Regents Eliminate UCSB Frosh Class To End Overcrowding

"Through this action we hope to curtail enrollment and thereby improve the caliber of Gaucho graduates," he added.

Chancellor Robert Cap'n Bob Huttenback was irate at the Regents' actions, calling them "an attempt to wipe us off the face of the earth."

"I don't see how we can be expected to improve the caliber of our graduates when we may not exist in three years," he continued. "Since we will no longer have freshman, how can we be expected to attract students to this campus?"

Metropolitan Transit District official Robert C. Yahoo unveiled the new "MTD 100's" yesterday, stating that "they'll be on all routes through campus and Isla Vista once we figure out how to maneuver them out of the warehouse."

The new spring super-long buses will shuttle students from North Hall to Isla Vista 12 times daily with "movie cruises" on weekend runs only.

New routes being considered by MTD officials to service Storke Plaza and Newly Divorced Students Housing were also discussed at the unveiling.

Yahoo explained the motivation behind the design of the "MTD 100" fleet as being "necessitated by the baby-boom of the late 1950's which has quadrupled the ridership since last year."



General Research Corporation executives attested to this finding, recommending monthly demographic surveys to monitor other serious effects of this phenomenon, at minimal expense to the University.

Student voters approved funding of the free bus service in Spring, 1973, at a current cost of

\$125,000. Both of last year's riders were contacted but refused to comment as to whether or not the additional yards of leg room would add to their comfort or merely make their walk to the door longer.

Advertisements for the "MTD 100" will soon appear in bold type along both flanks of the eleven

wheelbus with slogans such as "TAKE THE MTD TO LUNCH. IT'S TAKING YOU!"

Peter Chapperson, Principal Planner at the Campus Architects and Engineers, heard complaints from dorm residents claiming that "last week's maiden voyage of the elongated maxi-bus caused the destruction of the Old Little Theatre," a traditional retreat for degenerate activities. Chapperson ended comments holding that "the theater was simply removed to make way for UCen III."

Associated Student MTD Advisory member, Dennis Shoemaker, announces that "the lock-in funding increase negotiated with the bus company will be subsidized by the Aztec Staging Co." which built the roofs for the new bus fleet.

Isla Vista Planner, Larry Gimmeit, was stunned by the interior design of the new bus charging that "the University's attempt to raise an additional

\$807,000 for seating in the buses is a waste of time and energy." Gimmeit is currently working to erect barricades just outside the East entrance to campus on El Colegio.

MTD engineers have calculated the turning radius of the hundred foot express at just under two Pi radians or 12 trampled pedestrians, whichever comes first.

Another feature of the longer bus will be its ability to transport mopeds to and from Isla Vista with drop-off points all along current bikeways.

Plans for the 1980 "Spruce Boose," modeled after the Hughes Aircraft prototype, were delayed because of a sheet metal workers strike presently under consideration by the Carter Administration's Committee on Taft-Hartley Abuse.

Bozodom's Chief Speaks, Tells it All on UCen Lawn

"America has been through some hard times, and I think that's just great. Now, at long last, they can settle down to some good old fashioned Bozo-ness," said J.Z. Bozo before a large audience on the UCen lawn yesterday.

Bozo's lecture was part of a publicity tour he is doing to "promote high spirits and Bozo times for everybody." Though police had to be called in to control the approximately 600 protesters who stormed the campus to try to stop the speech, Bozo said, "Let them have fun their way, I'll have fun mine."

That seemed to be the main thrust of his speech, as the President of the American Bozo Club (ABC) called for an end to government inflicted stimulation and return to "personally inspired paranoia."

"I'm lucky," Bozo told his listeners. "I can remember a day when you didn't need to fill out a government form before you put

on a pair of size 22 extra wide shoes and had some fun. Today you kids have been cheated out of a lot of the things we took for granted. But no more! Nirvanah is at hand. You can be free if you want to. But remember that freedom is its own prison and in the end, you probably won't like it much more."

The crowd greeted his call for the repeal of all federal antibozo legislation with yelps of delight, and several were seen honking each other's noses. Police made no move to break up an illicit activity, sticking to their non interference pledge.

As the angry cries of the demonstrators outside grew, Bozo told the audience that "the

world is getting smaller, and that means less room for nastiness and more room for Bozodom. Only through learning to live together as Americans can we learn to create better jobs through more work for everybody. And that's not hay."

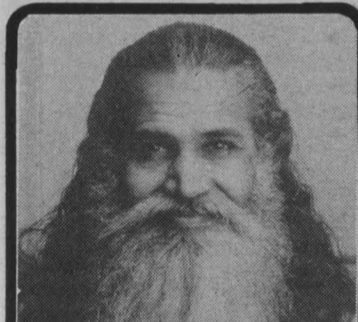

County Fungus Task Force To Combat Campus Menace

The Sheriff's Department has also alleged that the fungi are involved with the Del Playa Liberation Front in the recent disappearance of Del Playa street in Isla Vista. The FBI crime lab is analyzing several patches of slick substance found at the scene of the former street.

On Tuesday, the fungi released a statement declaring Isla Vista, "a province of the fungus empire." Lord Glicch has been named imperial fungoid governor. Yesterday, the IVCC responded to the fungoid statement charging that the space fungus was a plot by the University to subvert IV community government. A town meeting has been called for next Tuesday night to give IV citizens a decide whether they wish to be fungoid subjects. Representatives from the IVCC and the fungi will be present to discuss the issue.

Local officials still have not arrived at a definitive plan for combatting the slimy menace. The Santa Barbara County Board of Supervisors has called for Federal aid to fight the fungi. A

Supervisors Bored by Relief Ordinance for I.V. Typhoon

In the wake of the horrendous Del Playa calamity in which all the apartments apparently slid off the storm-ravaged bluffs of Isla Vista to devastation Thursday, a grim Board of County Supervisors held an emergency meeting yesterday.

The board voted 4-0 to approve the calamity ordinance Supervisor Harrell Fletcher proposed. Fletcher's ordinance will relieve ranch owners in his Santa Maria district who sustained nasty financial losses on the storms' anvil. Supervisor David Yager abstained, citing the "spuriously misleading" punctuation of the document. "I just can't get past the first comma," whined Yager.

The supervisors also voted unanimously to write a letter to Governor Jerry Brown requesting the 6000 block of Del Playa be designated a state calamity area. Sources in Sacramento expect Brown to "go with the flow, mostly because elections are imminent."

"I really do feel for the elderly, students, and the poor tenants too," said Fletcher. "It really bothers me that something like this could happen in Wallace's district, but compared to problems in mine, the loss of a few apartments and tenants is mere peanuts."

"The sacred preservation of life is more important than property, I understand a whole yelping pack of I.V. doggies got washed out to sea!" Supervisor Yager appeared visibly moved as Hodgett was dragged from the board room.

An unperturbed Fletcher continued, "I mean in Cuyuma, about 1,000 square feet of ranch washed out to sea resulting in the destruction of numerous lovely grasshopper oil derricks, not to mention the demise of several sheep. "Don't mention it," Bopard Chairperson Robert Kallman spat mirthfully, "does that complete your sermon?"

Helen Norris, who co-owns an apartment which plunged over the bluffs voiced indignation over the loss of her property and 24 prize tenants. "I'm skeptical about that B.S. Fletcher just

trotted out about his concern for elderly and renters," she snarled. "If Fletcher is so concerned about us elderly, why isn't he giving us some relief? Geritol just don't cut it, Toots."

Matt Steen of quasi-anachronistic IVCC was ecstatic over the collapse of the apartments. "Sure it's slightly unfortunate, especially for all those tenants who were not in the buildings," admitted Steen. "But the wreckage will serve as an instant seawall to prevent further erosion of the bluffs."

"It costs \$300 per square foot to build a seawall. Imagine all the money the County just saved!" The air in the board room was charged with avarice as supervisors contemplated money. "I hope Mayitas restaurant falls off too. Then we can install a nice picture window in the side of our Town Hall with misappropriated CETA funds," concluded Steen.

Film Review/'Lollypop'

"Lollypop Girls," currently running in brutal 3D at the Twin Drive-In no. 2, is truly watershed in America cinema. A yardstick for future erotic-art films to be measured by. A peak of perfection for post-"Tango" protagonists to pursue. A milestone for militant moviemakers to—well, you get the idea. Fo with a single, stark exploration into what drives three orphaned, teen-aged girls to a life of vice and sweets, director London Perenski has squirmed his way into a club exclusively previously limited in membership to Welles, Kubrick and Disney.

Our story centers around three comely adolescent sisters. Eve, Candy and Trixie are played by Sally Field, Lucille Ball Arnez, Jr. and in her acting debut Susan Ford, respectively. The girls inherit their guardian aunt's South Bronx candy shop, "The Al Day Sucker," when Aunt Hazel (played with understated passion by June Lockhart) falls into a vat of molten peanut brittle. This scene, like nearly every one in "Lollypop," is handled with a tender, tact and gentleness that nevertheless drives Perenski's underlying message of food's inhumanity to man home to heart.

The girls soon find that the confection business isn't all sugar and suckers. To make financial ends meet they give in to the plans of a wily mortgage agent named Sid (Jerry Van Dyke) and turn the shop into a bordello. Many will no doubt miss the socially conscious point Perenski is making here. Some will view the action as simple sex-ploitation. Well, go ahead. If you don't see the surrealistic beauty and significance in Van Dyke's dynamic right to left movement when he approaches the girls with lease in hand you're beyond my help. Kissinger Joins List Of Political Exposés

The World and I: "Memoirs of Power and Pleasure," by Henry A. Kissinger

Henry Kissinger's long-awaited memoirs are going to shock and disturb many people, and make others very, very angry. There has already been an outcry from the publishers, who are enraged by copies of the book leaking out four months in advance of the official publication date.

"The World and I" is divided into two sections, entitled "Years of Power" and "Years of Pleasure." The first covers Kissinger's experiences at Harvard, the Council on Foreign Relations, the Rockefeller Foundation, and in four presidential administrations; and the second section deals with his legendary social and private lives.

In an introduction, Kissinger tells the story of his early years, first in Nazi German Franconia, then in America. It seems that he became aware of his "ugliness, pudginess and general physical inferiority" in his early teens, but compensated by "developing my great intellectual gifts so that everyone had to recognize my genius."

This modest claim hints at the theme of the book: the greatness of the author. In the "Years of Power" section, Kissinger takes credit for being "the greatest theoretician of foreign policy in this century." Single-handedly,

he writes, "I taught four successive presidents how to conduct foreign relations."

The second part of the book, "Years of Pleasure," begins: "From humble origins I became the most admired and glamorous man in the world, welcomed everywhere, knowing everyone, using my charms to conquer socially as well as strategically."

Kissinger is more than candid about his romantic life and sexual prowess. He claims to have slept with Barbra Streisand, Karen Quinlan, Gloria Steinem, Jane Fonda and Bella Abzug, among dozens of others, and describes many of his liaisons in graphic detail.

Perhaps his most startling confession is of an urge to seduce members of presidential families. Alice Longworth Roosevelt, Margaret and Bess Truman, and Caroline Kennedy have all yielded to his charms, he claims, and he details a steamy orgy with Pat Nixon and Julie Nixon Eisenhower, "the best mother-

daughter team in Washington." Sex makes up only a small part of Kissinger's revelations about famous people. Disdaining tact, he calls John F. Kennedy a "conceited half-bright rich brat," and Spiro Agnew "a moronic petty mobster."

Those who Kissinger likes are a select few, including, surprisingly, former President Nixon. "He was a cuckold, yes," Kissinger writes, "and not smart, but he had the sense to leave foreign policy to me, and I am proud to be responsible for the only true accomplishments of his presidency."

This is a fascinating, revealing book which everyone interested in recent history ought to read. Unfortunately, it is written in a style one would expect from a German political science professor. But then one would hardly expect to be able to follow the lofty thoughts of a man who knows he is "without question, the greatest international figure of my age."



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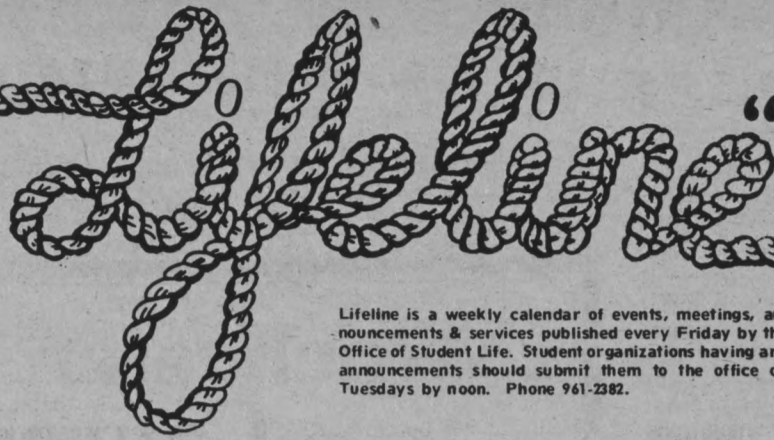

There's a Bit of UCSB In Satellite Up Yonder

A UC Santa Barbara research team headed by Geography Professor John Estes has been working closely with NASA on research developments for the land satellite launched March 5 from Vandenberg Air Force Base.

In recent years, says Prof. Estes, the UCSB geography department has always had four or more land satellite projects going on and new ones are starting all the time. At present, they include:

— The topography and run-off potential of the snow pack in the Sierra Nevada to determine snow-water content and how much water can be expected in agricultural regions

— The relationship between agricultural crops and the agricultural water those crops will need. (This study is being done in conjunction with the Kern County Water Agency.)

— The combination of Landsat data with other geographic information for assessing the environment and facilitating the writing of environmental impact reports. (Resource information on potential disaster areas is then done in conjunction with the Ventura County Flood Control Agency.)

— Vegetation mapping for forest management applications in Northern California.

In conjunction with the National Aeronautics Space Administration (NASA), Prof. Estes and his unit of 27 researchers at UCSB, many of whom are undergraduate students, have been working primarily on satellite research related to remote sensing — an area in which Prof. Estes is a specialist.

Remote sensing research instruments are used in satellites to gather information via visible and infra-red photography as well as thermal infra-red and microwave imagery including radar. The new satellite is of special interest, according to Prof. Estes, because it will carry the first high resolution energy thermal system in the world to be used on an earth resources satellite.

"Thermal infra-red imagery presents us with something like a heat picture," Prof. Estes explains. "Producing the imagery with the satellite is like taking the temperature of the earth."

Infra-red imagery indicates changes in the circulation patterns of earth resources which can be mapped and measured. This information can then be used to show snow distribution, volcanic activity, water pollution — and even oil spills.

The satellite will be circling the earth every 18 days gathering data which is also useful in the prediction of agricultural water resources, crop productivity, flood control, regional land-use analysis, soil moisture experiments, and oil-spill clean-up.

The satellite's research instruments will gather information for current and continuing studies expected to have a number of practical uses in industry, government, and environmental agencies. And, says Prof. Estes, "the information gathered by this satellite will be useful both nationally and internationally."

Most Complete Oil Pollution Reference Work Edited Here

The world's most comprehensive bulletin of information on oil spills and other forms of oil pollution on water and land operates out of a small office tucked away in the Science-Engineering Library at UC Santa Barbara.

Here three members of that campus's Marine Science Institute cull thousands of journals, abstracts, articles, monographs, reports, patents, symposium proceedings and other sources of information from throughout the world for reference to any aspect of oil pollution. The emphasis is on pollution which endangers the marine environment.

The bulletin's staff summarizes the articles and organizes the material by means of a key-word index, producing an easy-to-read reference volume and bibliography for professionals in government, science and industry who deal with problems of oil pollution. In addition, they summarize available information on current research projects and conferences dealing with oil pollution.

The bulletin is published quarterly by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and is available to the public through the National Technical Information Service in Springfield, Virginia.

Prepared since 1974, the Oil Spill and Oil Pollution Reports resulted from the concern felt by members of UCSB's Marine Science Institute that there was no single reference source available on oil pollution. A proposal by UCSB to provide this service won funding from EPA's Industrial Environmental Research Laboratory.

The bulletin's present editors are Helmut Ehrenspeck, Elizabeth Sorenson and Jim Cook, whose backgrounds encompass geology and remote sensing, biology and environmental education, and journalism and technical writing, respectively.

"There have been enormous increases in the scale of oil operations as a result of ever-increasing demands for energy," says Chemistry Professor Henry Offen, Director of the Marine Science Institute, who is named co-principal investigator with Ehrenspeck of this EPA-funded project.

"A question arising in the minds of many is to what extent petroleum recovery, transport

and use are having a deleterious effect on the environment."

The 300-page quarterly bulletin is designed to help investigators address this question.

"Our project fulfills many needs," says Ehrenspeck, "but in order not to disappoint or mislead anyone, we must emphasize what it does not presently do."

It should not be confused with the defunct Oil Spill Information Center, he says. Established by the UCSB Library immediately after the big Santa Barbara offshore oil spill of 1969, this center collected an enormous amount of

information, including photographs and newspaper articles, on oil spills around the world. It opened its files to visitors and responded to all inquiries. Unable to secure continued funding, however, the center was closed in 1972.

"Unlike the center, we do not store, lend or duplicate materials, nor can we perform research services," Ehrenspeck explains. "However the reports do offer a comprehensive guide to what has been and is currently done, said and written on oil pollution, and what is being planned."

The big day is also the homecoming for UCSB alumni with several events scheduled for them including class reunions.

UCSB will throw open its thousands of doors so that parents, alumni, neighbors, high school students and all comers can see what's "inside" the university while enjoying tours, science demonstrations, exhibits, lectures, multi-media shows, music and dancing, outdoor barbecue, a craft faire, sports and more.

Headquarters for the day will be in the Library Mall, near the Arbor, where information tables will be set up. Events are scheduled from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Chancellor Robert A. Huttenback will greet the visitors from his traditional special umbrella from 10 a.m. to noon.

Students will lead tours through the campus and take visitors to points of interest, exhibits and special events.

Everything, including parking, is free that day except a \$2.50 barbecue and admission for athletic events.

A new feature for the day is "UCSB Insight," a special program for prospective students and their parents. New Fellowships For Grad Students

Initiation of the Graduate Opportunity Fellowship Program at UCSB aimed at increasing the enrollment of qualified graduate students from underrepresented ethnic and economic groups here was announced this week by Dean Robert O. Collins of the Graduate Division.

Effective in the fall quarter, the fellowships provide a basic stipend of \$3,200 a year and fees, including the nonresident tuition fee, if required. Applicants must be U.S. citizens or permanent residents.

Since the funds have just been allocated, the normal fellowship deadlines and announcements date are not applicable. Interested persons are urged to contact the Graduate Division, Adm. Bldg. 3117 as quickly as possible to obtain forms and complete information.

\$2,500 in Prizes for Playwrights, Composers

Prize money totaling \$2,500 is available to UCSB students for the Sherrill C. Corwin-Metropolitan Theatres original writing and music composition awards. The deadline for entries is March 31, 1978.

The drama writing awards offer \$500 for best full-length state play, \$250 for best one act stage play, \$500 for best full-length screen play and \$250 for best short film or television script.

The music composition prizes are \$300 each for the best orchestral composition, the best chamber music composition and best vocal composition. An additional \$100 will be provided to help defray performance costs.

The competition is open only to UCSB undergraduate or graduate students who are registered for academic year.

the house with no television, radio, food, or toys.

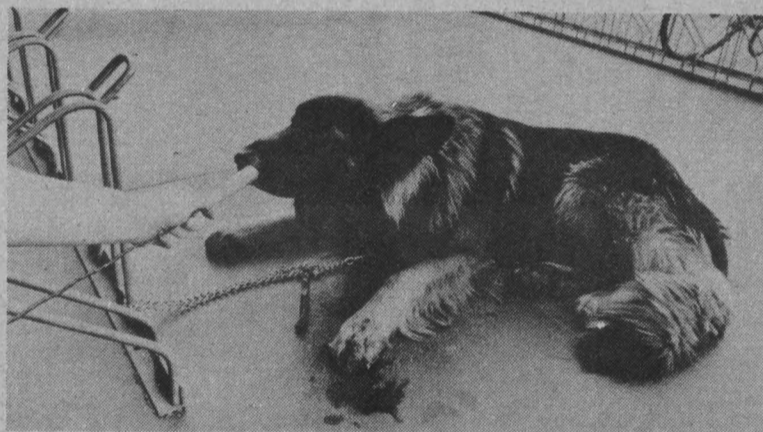

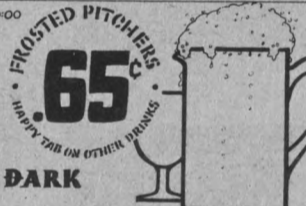
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Athletic Programs

Guard 6' 5", 185, Junior,

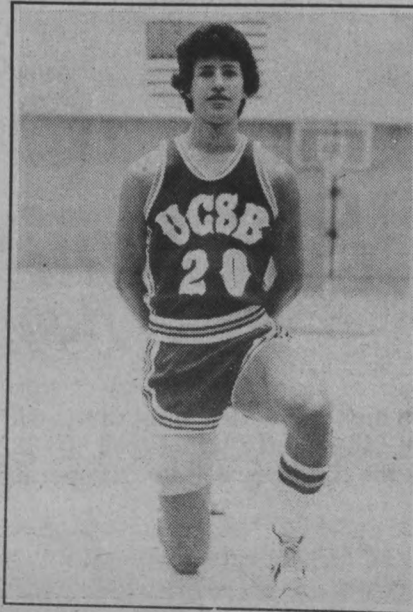
Majoring in Business Economics from Chico, California
