Five of the faculty members at Santa Barbara College this summer are visiting from other institutions. Here they are. with something of their background and experience.

One of the prominent visitors is Dr. Norman Foerster, author of numerous books on literary subjects - 11 to be exact and former professor of English at the

University of Iowa.

He has received degrees from Harvard, University of Wisconsin, University of the South and Grinnell College. He has served on the faculties of the University of Wisconsin and the University of North Carolina before going to Iowa. He was also UCLA Office of Public Information, it Director of the School of Letters at Iowa for 10 years.

Until recently Dr. Foerester resided in Chapel Hill. He now makes Santa Barbara on the Santa Barbara News Press, has

his permanent home.

From the University of New Mexico comes Dr. J. Paul Fitzsimmons where he serves as Assistant Professor of Geology. He received his degrees from the University of Washington.

In addition to his teaching he has served as geologist with the U.S. Geologi cal Survey and the Department of Geology for the State of Oregon. He participated with others in the publishing of magnetic surveys of several locations.

A graduate of Santa Barbara College of the University of California comes back as a faculty member this summer. Howard D. Jolly is his name. He presently holds an Assistant Professorship in Sociology at Reed College up in Portland.

Speech Clinic Gives Hearing Tests. Hearing tests are now being given to pupils enrolled in the College Demonstration School by the Speech Correction Clinic, it was announced by Dr. Edwin R. Schoell, Clinic Director. This is the first time this service has been offered by the clinic and will involve giving audiometer tests to more than 1.00 youngsters.

Dr. Schoel also said that the clinic is working on campus with 18 cases of impaired speech at present. The age range of the group is from two to 67

Scruggs, who was awarded a master's degree this June from Harvard, scored 3095 points in the five-event contest. Defending Champion Brayton Norton took the title with 3129 points.
