



State Asks Coaches to Be Certificated Instructors


Ted Beckett, football coach, will not be given a contract for next year. This was the definite information coming from the office of President Clarence L. Phelps late yesterday afternoon, confirming previous reports that had stirred the campus.

The administration was satisfied with Beckett's work with the football squad last fall. President Phelps intimated, but the grid mentor's lack of credentials allowing him to teach physical education courses is in Manchuria the stumbling block to his reem-ployment as a football coach.
