Young Freshmen With More Spirit On SBC Campus

Joe College is growing younger again.

When classes at the University of California, Santa Barbara College, met Wednesday to organize, a perceptible change in the average of freshman, as compared with last year, was apparent. This was because this year, for the first time since before the war, high school students entered college with out draft restrictions.

Although the freshman class this year has a substantial number of veterans, many of the GIs have advanced to upper classes. George Graves, president of the Student Body and himself a GI, observed that more of the "rah-rah spirit" of prewar days is returning to the campus, with the advent of the younger element. While most veterans have entered into the swing of typical college extra-curricular activities, it has not been easy for them, he continued.

LARGEST CLASS

The largest class to organize was that of the freshmen who packed the College Auditorium, heard tunes by a college band and engaged in some spirited lessons in Gaucho yells.

More Students, More Cars Add Up to Parking Jams

The parking problem at the University of California, Santa Barbara College, which was a headache last year, hasn't eased one bit with the increase in enrollment this year to a new peak of 2647. And the proportion of cars per student is probably higher this year than last.

The College police force the past week has been making hourly checks of parking spaces along the front of the Administration Building to check on students who have hurriedly parked their cars in spots reserved for the faculty.

PARKING LOTS PACKED

Parking lots are packed full and all legitimate parking spaces for several blocks leading to the campus are taken during peak periods. The one bright spot in the picture is on the Mesa Campus, where ample space is available.

A survey to determine how many students own cars is planned, College Police Capt. Floyd A. Bernard said. Last year an Associated Student survey showed one in every four students had cars and one in every four planned to buy a car this year, so the proportion many now be about one

CHANGE-MAKER COKE MACHINE IN CAF LOBBY

Installed last week just outside the Gaucho cafeteria entrance was a new, large coke machine which has a capacity of holding 116 bottles at one time, with a reserve of thirty, according to Bill Russell, graduate manager.

With the new addition there are now two coke machines, enabling students to obtain iced drinks all the time. During the hot weather recently, students often exhausted the cold supply of cokes in the old machine and were forced to buy warm ones.

Russell stated that the new machine will soon have a new addition in the form of a change making device which at present is being worked out by the Coca Cola Company. The proposed device will enable purchasers of cokes to drop in quarters and dimes, with change automatically coming to them from a slide inside. If and when the change supply should become exhausted, a little red light will flash on saying "Use nickels only" until enough change supply is built up again.

SHARING RIDES URGED

Transportation is important for the students, however, particularly when traveling between the campuses. Buses are used by many, but others prefer to use their own vehicles for convenience in meeting schedules.

A share-the-ride campaign was urged in a late issue of El Gaucho, which decried the passing of ride-sharing after the end of the war.

"It is an insult to pass a fellow student in an empty car without stopping," the paper said editorially. "Yet careless Gauchos are constantly forced to watch schoolmates travel to and from campus with an empty vehicle and a blank expression. Next time you see a fellow student waiting for transportation, 'open the door Richard,' and fill the heap up with bodies."

The advent of a big-time dance band for the University of California at Santa Barbara College is an initial test of the ability of the student body to support such an engagement, both financially and enthusiastically. Expenses incurred by the Sigma Phi Epsilon fraternity to obtain the Brown orchestration are in direct proportion to the degree of popularity that the band leader has attained. Failure of the student body to respond will result in a severe loss to the fledgling Greek group, and will undoubtedly discourage the hire of other big name bands.

However, present indications are that the dance need not worry about attendance for success. Ticket sales have been encouraging, and many students are expected to purchase entrance at the dance itself.

Popularity polls show that Les Brown and his Band of Renown is rated amongst the ten top of the country, and even higher amongst college students. Mirroring the band's popularity was a recent contract placing Brown on the famous Bob Hope Show.

Scheduled to appear as contributing entertainers are vocalists Eileen Wilson and Roy Kellogg, as well as "Stumpy" Brown, comedy vocalist.

The "All-College Kick-off Dance" is open to any collegiate with or without a date. For those who have not purchased tickets as of yet, they will be available for \$1.20 per person at the entrance of the Armory Thursday night.

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Two More Professors Enlist Their Talents In English, Phys. Ed

Two additional appointments to the record-sized faculty of the University of California, Santa Barbara College, were announced today by Dr. J. Harold Williams, acting Provost. One is in the men's physical education department and the other is in the English Department.

Filling a new position is Dr. Joseph S. Stull, English instructor, who is a native of Rochester, N. Y. Educated in the public schools of New York, he received AB and master's Degrees at the University of Rochester and a PhD at the University of Iowa. He was a teaching fellow at the University of Rochester and teaching assistant at the University of Iowa while engaging in graduate work. ENGLISH PROF.

Dr. Stull has been an instructor in English at Butler University, going into the Army from 1943 to 1946, then returning to his position at Butler. He is a member of the Modern Language Association and the American Association of University Professors

Taking over the work of Joseph E. Lantagne, who is on leave to complete work on his doctorate, is Richard Caywood in the men's Physical Education Department. Originally from New Jersey, Caywood holds a Bachelor of Science Degree from the College of the City of New York and an MA from Columbia University. He has been a PE teacher in various schools of New York, and during the war was director of physical education for the Army Air Corps at Deming, N. M. Following release from the Army in 1946, he was assistant wrestling coach in the College of the City of New York and teacher of health education in Brooklyn, and has worked with the Westchester County Recreation Commission.

Pomona Team Once Joined Claremont

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NATIONAL STUDENT ASSOCIATION ORGANIZES AT WISCONSIN LOBBIES REPRESENTATION ON UNITED NATIONS COMMITTEE

MADISON, WIS.—The National Student Association (NSA) launched at a constitutional convention on the University of Wisconsin campus from August 30 to September 7, gives the American college student unprecedented representation in the the educational world.

Some 700 delegates officially representing 1,100,000 students in 351 leading colleges and universities throughout the United States worked day and night in Madison to write the NSA constitution and plan a dynamic and comprehensive program of activities to improve education and promote friendship and understanding among students both at home and abroad.

GREAT SUCCESS

Observers characterized the convention as a "tremendous success" and praised the "maturity and intelligence" shown by the student leaders in their deliberations.

UN REPRESENTATION
The convention voted seek representation on the United States Commission for UNESCO (United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organizations). It was also voted that the NSA be a sponsor of the World Student Service Fund.

MANY PLATFORMS
Among the aims of NSA as enumerated in the preamble to the constitution are to "secure and maintain academic freedom and the rights of students; stimulate the development of democratic self-government; have neither voting nor advisory representation in the National Student Association. Only the officially constituted student governing bodies on the respective campuses will send representatives to the national congresses to be held each summer.

The convention authorized the executive committee to begin negotiations for NSA affiliation with the International Union of Student (IUS), with reservations which will preserve the purely educational nature of the NSA and prevent the NSA from being

The Chicago conference established a "national continuations committee" which laid the groundwork for the NSA constitutional convention. Jim Smith, former president of the student body at the University of Texas, served as president of this committee and provided much of the leadership at the Wisconsin convention.

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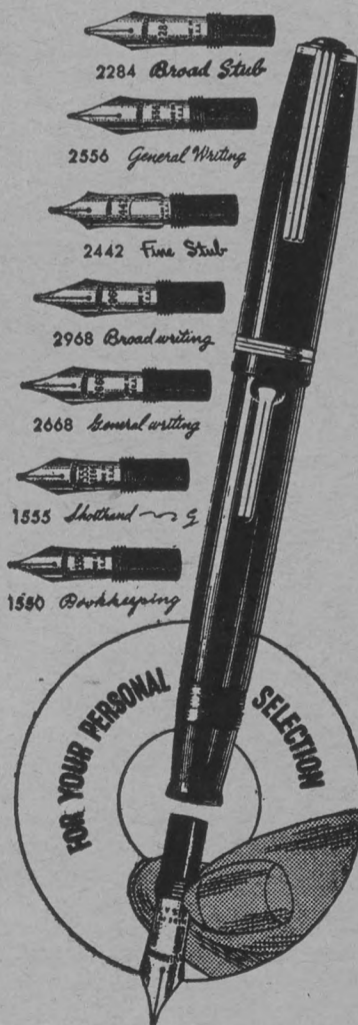
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Homecoming Plans to Be Made at Alumni Meeting

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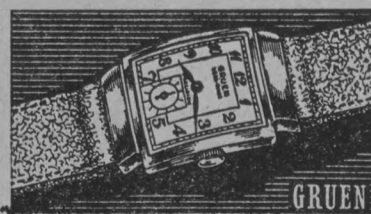
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Pomona Plans Unfold To Locals Prove Big Threat

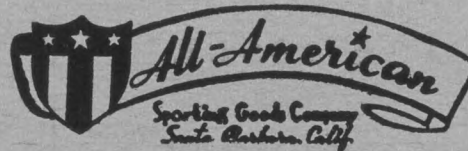
Admission for the dance will be 60 cents per couple upon presentation of a student body card.

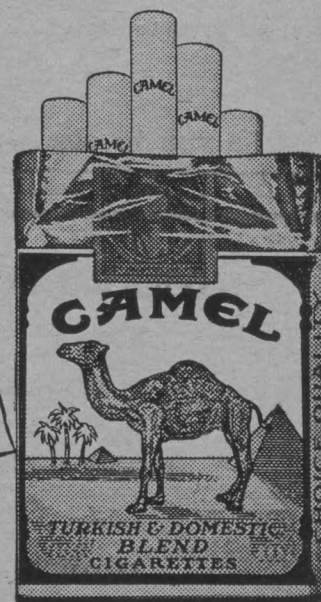
