

dashing young man on the library lawn is lost in conversation with an attractively dressed, slender woman in her 20s — when abruptly and without warning, the woman turns and runs. Without even time to blink, our hero rushes off in pursuit of the distressed woman, when a loud voice suddenly pierces the air: "Cut!" With the cry of the director, we realize this is the set of the syndicated television series *High Tide*, which chose to shoot scenes for its two-part episode "University Blues" at our own Davidson Library.

The syndicated series, now entering its third season, focuses on private detective brothers Mick and Joey, respectively played by former '70s daytime hunk and '80s pop-rocker Rick Springfield and Yannick Bisson.

Although it bears more than a striking resemblance to both Magnum, P.I. and Baywatch, co-producer Bob Kro-

novet objected to High Tide being associated with David Hasselhoff's scantily clad show.

"The show occasionally profiles the beauty of the human form," Kronovet begins. "But it's always been strange to me that you get great artists that promote the human form like Michelangelo and Leonardo da Vinci, but shows that portray health, fitness, beauty and exciting lifestyles are [ridiculed]. I see no harm in portraying a fit lifestyle on the

UCSB was chosen as a location for the filming of the show because of the university's excellent geographical loca-

tion, according to Kate Chester, High Tide publicist. "Part of what makes the show appealing is natural

scenery, [and UCSB] is right on the water," Chester said. "In that particular episode there's a lot of college-age actors and actresses.

Although the UCSB population has been shown to have a significant problem with eating disorders in recent studies by Student Health Services, Chester expressed her confidence that the show, featuring many thin young people in beach attire, would not become a

factor in the problem.

"I don't think [the] two-part episode will have a detrimental effect to UC Santa Barbara to that respect," she

On the contrary, Student Health Services Director Cindy Bowers, who at press time had not seen an episode of either High Tide or Baywatch, noted that media programs starring attractive, fit people can have an effect on eating disorder-related issues.

"Certainly the prevalence in the [film] industry of the thin woman has an impact. ... It does contribute to generally publicizing that women need to be thin," Bowers said, adding that she felt the effect of magazines was more detrimental than film.

In addition to any negative effects on students' body images, the appropriateness of having a show that compares itself to flesh-bearing programs like *Baywatch* and its possible ramifications for UCSB's reputation was given consideration before the university granted permission for the film crews to arrive, said Vaughan Boyle, administrative analyst for business services.

"Public Affairs looks at the appropriateness of the shooting and any image concerns that may be involved with the film," he said.

According to Joan Magruder, UCSB's director of news and media relations for Public Affairs, the campus is not in any danger of tarnishing its growing academic standing.

"If they are not going to use our name, it doesn't have much influence on our image. How could it? Unless everyone knows it's UCSB, it can't hurt us," she said.


Despite Magruder's confidence that UCSB will not be

seen in connection to the show, Marie Mercado, computer resource manager at the Center for Quantized Electronic Structures disagrees. QUEST staff members got a close-up look at the filming since part of it took place right outside their main office.

"I think it's a waste because the associations with a show like that and a campus like this are not a good example of what might transpire here," she said. "We're trying to get away from the stereotypical image of UCSB as a recreational type of place. Allowing that kind of event to happen here makes the wrong sort of association for UĈŜB's academic profile."



Pet / Pet / TAG

Lisa Papineau, vocalist for L.A.'s Pet, has one of the most versatile voices in the amorphous, undefinable and mostly crappy world of rock/ alt music. In fact, it is not a stretch to say that she has the widest and most able vocal range of any of her contemporaries. Papineau easily moves from whispery Tori Amos-like sopranos to stretched-out guttural howls, from rumbling growls to the thin heights that only women or castrati can achieve.

The comparison to Amos is predictable since she is the executive producer of Pet's debut album and apparently played some sort of mentor role, but in no way is Papineau worshiping at the feet of Tori — the two women have very different styles.

Papineau reaches deep down and explores not-so-pretty sounds in favor of their raw power, something Amos doesn't attempt too often, except arguably on "Professional Widow" from Boys for Pele. Although the songwriters share lyrical beauty, Papineau stays away from Amos' trademark airy-fairyness and sticks to a relative straightforwardness

with a central focus to her lyrics. All praise due to Papineau.

Yet this album has an unsatisfying taste to it. The rest of the band is the real problem: guitarist Tyler Bates overemphasizes linear, repetitive chord structures that sound too much like early Pearl Jam, muted and slightly distorted. Unfortunately, Bates is structured as the band's centerpiece, and as a result of his songwriting being so narrow, he pigeon-holes bassist Justin Meldal Johnson and drummer Alex LoCascio.

Making these problems even more apparent is the poor mixing of the record, which creates a ramshackle hierarchy of mediocre guitar front-and-center, coattails bass playing second and "where's the drummer?" percussion last. Papineau's vocals, luckily for Pet, make the band sound better than they actually are. Hopefully the rest of Pet will improve by the next album, or else Papineau should say her goodbyes.

Pluto / Pluto / Virgin

Clocking in at a little over 30 horrible minutes, the self-titled release from Pluto offers fans of mindless, listless pop music 12 new reasons to celebrate.

Pluto is swollen with the unchallenging sound that has sent naive pre-teens into a veritable nirvana. Complex yet unsubstantial three-minute arrangements with obligatory pseudo-punk, threechord choruses abound.

Frontman Ian Jones offers hopelessly romantic, cheesy dime-store poetry in a



nasal whine, as in the anthemic Black Lipstick, in which he muses, "She's special as special gets / Like snowflakes and cigarettes." Meanwhile, guitarist Rolf Hetherington noodles along in a pained, droning fashion, and the rock-steady performance of drummer Justin Leigh (who picks a beat and sticks to it - for the entire album) strategically lends the album a sense of solidarity, as he helps make the songs as indistinguishable from each other as possible.

In this sense, *Pluto*, the album, is a swell representation of Pluto, the band, for the latter is indistinguishable from throwaway pop ilk like Everclear and the Flaming Lips.


Yeah, but the aid packages are getting smaller while the financial aid workers are




