WEIDMAN DANCE CONCERT TONITE

Red Cross Drive Starts This Week on Campus

George Graves, Associated Students president, has been named to head the campus Red Cross drive for 1948, according to Dr. William Hayes, retiring chairman of the college committee. The drive will be concentrated on the week from February 25th to March 3rd.

Dr. Hayes, who is scheduled to leave for Korea on a government education mission some time this week, urged that all fraternities and sororities collect contributions from their members and present them as a group donation to Graves.

Non-academic contributions will be handled by Miss Velma Morrell and Miss Jean Hodgkins of the women's physical education department will take care of the faculty donations.

To Replace Hayes

Miss Hodgkins will replace Dr. Hayes as coordinator of the campus groups, according to Stanley Mitchell, Red Cross publicity chairman.

Dr. Hayes pointed out that the Red Cross donates equipment and facilities for the local campus courses in life saving and first aid, and for the downtown classes in home nursing, motor corps training and home nutrition as one of its peace-time efforts.

No Quota Set

Although no definite quota has been set for the campus, the chairman stated that the Red Cross needs all the funds it can raise in order to further its efforts both in training courses and in disaster aid. Local funds will be used also for the veterans' hospitals and for recreation purposes.

Boosted Subsistence Checks Due May 1

After being pigeonholed in Congress for many months, the bill to increase the subsistence allowance of veteran students was passed by the House and signed into law by President Truman on February 1.

The subsistence bill boosts the monthly allowance for single veterans from \$65 to \$75 monthly, for married veterans from \$90 to \$105, and for married veterans with children from \$90 to \$120. The increase will go into effect April 1.

Since the increase of subsistence allowance is effective April 1, the checks will show the increase May 1. The boost in the monthly allowance will be automatic for single veterans and married veterans without children. However, married veterans with children must file a photostatic copy of their children's birth certificates with the Veterans Administration, so as to be eligible for the increased subsistence, according to C. D. Woodhouse, SBC Coordinator of Veterans Affairs.

All veteran book cards must be returned to the Office of Veterans Affairs by March 18, 1948. After that date, veterans may obtain an individual approved purchase card from the VA office for any addi-

The Golden Gauchos thundered over their traditional enemies last Friday night in the Armory before a near-capacity crowd of some 1700 excited fans. The Blue and Gold won going away, 60 to 49, over the Aztecs of San Diego State.

In the first half the visitors

managed to tie the game on five occasions, but they were never ahead. The Hilltoppers held a two point edge at halftime, but soon after forged eight points ahead. After that the Aztecs could come no closer than a four point margin.

Frat Ouster Ruling Cancelled 'Til June

Delta Sigma Phi fraternity members have received permission to remain in their Montecito frat house until their lease expires in June, it was announced recently by the County Planning Commission.

Residents of the area had signed a petition asking that the men be ousted, citing a former ruling which prevents fraternities from existing in the locality without special permission.

When the matter came up before the board the men filed a new petition stating that they could find no other housing and asking to be allowed to remain until the lease expired.

In a reversal of its previous action, the Planning Commission granted permission.

A concert of witty and satirical modern dance will be presented in the Riviera auditorium tonight at 8:30 by Charles Weidman and his company. This is the first of three programs in the Spring Artist Series.

The program will include a series of dance interpretations of James Thurber's "Fables of Our Times," a work which Weidman completed under a Guggenheim Fellowship in 1947. Turning to the serious side, the company will present "A House Divided," based upon the democratic ideals of Abraham Lincoln.

The program also includes "Panamic Suite," "On My Mother's Side," and "Ringside."

Superb Comedian

Proclaimed by critics as a superb comedian of the dance, Weidman is also a noted choreographer, having created more than a hundred compositions. He believes that the dance "should amuse, entertain and astonish" audiences, as well as arouse them. Of his work, the New York Times dance critic wrote, "There is nothing finer, either in this country or in Europe."

Seminars Highlight Of Spring Lectures On Classics, Science

Seminar discussion of classic books and great ideas will mark the Spring semester lecture series, "Great Books" and "The World Today," which will be presented by University Extension beginning on March 3.

The seminars, in which enrollment is limited, will meet from 7 to 9 pm on Monday evenings beginning April 1, and will continue for six weeks. Mr. Douwe Stuurman will conduct one group in the discussion of Homer's "Iliad," Dr. Laurence Willson will conduct the group dealing with Melville's "Moby Dick" and Dr. Stephen Goodspeed will lead the discussion on "International Organization."

These two programs, the lecture series and the seminars are the outgrowth of an idea initiated and developed by Mr. Douwe Stuurman to offer to students and citizens of Santa Barbara the cultural opportunities in which the motivating force is a personal interest in the material presented rather than the obtaining of college credit. The lecture series presented according to this plan in the fall semester proved very popular.

Although final arrangements for the lesson had not been completed by press time, Miss Bellinger was confident that Mr. Weidman would give the lesson if a sufficient number of students indicate a desire to attend.

Arrangements may be made with Miss Bellinger in the Women's gym. The lesson will be given from 1:30 to 3:00 Wednesday. Mr. Weidman will be assisted by members of his troupe.

Students Organize Against Atomic War

With the resolve to assume "unlimited responsibility" for making a real One World, and for preventing atomic warfare, students on several West Coast campuses are organizing to devote all their time and efforts to service abroad and in this country. The group is called "Students Concerned."

Connected to no political party, and with no political axe to grind, Students Concerned plans to send carefully trained college men and women abroad to work where they are most needed, and on their return to have them report their experiences to the college students of the nation. A three-month training for the first thirty will begin near Stanford University on April 1, with emphasis on language and the economic, political and social backgrounds of the areas in which they will serve.

Leave College

The organization was started by 15 Stanford students who felt the need for world peace is so urgent that they left college to devote their full time to seeking the abolition of war. Since then students from other colleges have joined them.

"We are no different from other students," members of the group state. "We too have hopes and plans for normal, peaceful lives. However, we have come to realize that none of these hopes has any chance of fulfillment until the present compelling problem of man's drift toward extinction is solved."

tional books or supplies required.

Veteran students having delays in subsistence allowances should place a complaint with the Veterans Affairs Office as soon as possible. Checks should normally arrive before the tenth of the following month. Because of the break between semesters, subsistence checks for February will probably be delayed two days, according to Woodhouse.

New veteran students should try to obtain their letters of eligibility as soon as possible so that their subsistence checks will not be delayed. Subsistence checks should not be expected by new students or transfer students before April 1.

If any vet student has changed his address he should inform the Office of Veterans Affairs of his corrected address so that there will be no delay in the arrival of his subsistence checks.

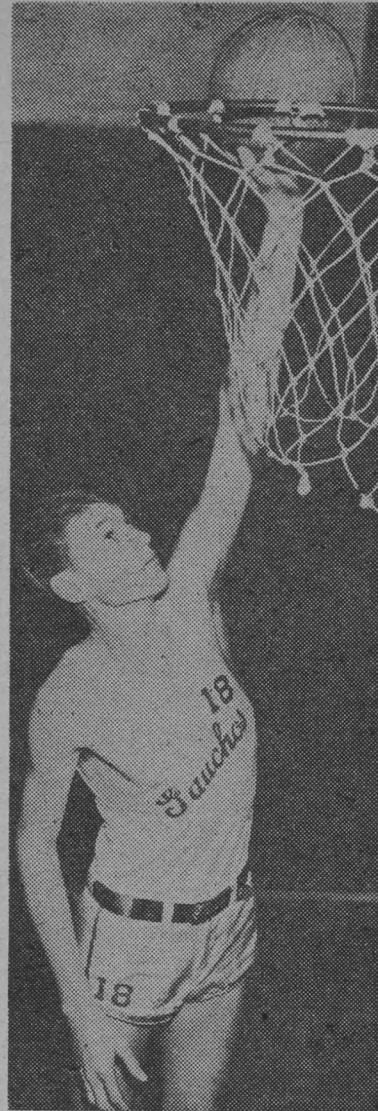

Notes of a Distinguished Visitor

Ed. Note: Dr. Paul Perigord, professor of French Civilization at UCLA and a visiting SBC faculty member this year, has written for El Gaucho the following comments on SBC.

My dear Editor:

You have asked me for some of the impressions of a visiting professor at Santa Barbara College. I comply cheerfully.

Let me first tell you that the experience of this visiting professor from UCLA has proven a very pleasant one. The College is already so truly a part of the large university family that from the very first week I felt quite at home. I sensed a very definite feeling of unity.

I cannot but be grateful for the friendliness of the Administration, the warm fellowship of the faculty, a faculty which has impressed me with its enthusiasm and its scholarship. So richly endowed a faculty is bound to attain the goal of distinction set forth by President Sproul.

Students Gratifying

I have found the students courteous, cooperative, eager and industrious, and it has been a real joy to work with them. I would like to tell them how fortunate they are to be in this college. The physical setting cannot be surpassed in beauty. As to the academic facilities, they may not be entirely adequate as yet, but they will soon match those of the finest

institutions in the country.

I would like to remind them that every opportunity is a responsibility. This nation which, in a very short time, has grown from a few scattered colonies to a position of world leadership stands increasingly in need of men and women who have reached a high degree of intellectual development. We will not be able to retain our prestige, our influence, perhaps even preserve our independence, unless the present and succeeding generations are properly trained in the liberal and practical arts, unless they have noble, clear, cultured minds and are in possession of the best scientific techniques.

Must Reconcile Ideologies

Finally, if our students wish to help to usher in the world of the dreams of the ages, there are several things which must engage their attention. They must work tenaciously and bravely for social justice, for peace, for international cooperation. And, as a most immediate duty, they must help to reconcile the conflicting ideologies which presently divide humanity, vividly aware of the fact that the alternative will be the destruction of civilization.

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Guesses Grow as UC Eyes Former Airbase in Goleta

Rumors were flying last week as the Regents of the University of California toyed with the idea of exercising their priority to obtain the mesa of the former Goleta Marine Corps Air Station from the War Assets Administration at one hundred percent discount.

The University plans maybe an agricultural college in Goleta? A flying school? The entire SBC plant will be transplanted there? The Mesa campus is up for sale?

All wrong. At the present writing the SBC administration has no idea what the Regents intend to do with the erstwhile Leatherneck base, and there is little indication that the Regents themselves are too sure. Furthermore, it is by no means certain that UC will obtain the property at all. Residents of Goleta have entered a bid for the station's water and sewer services, and the WAA appears to be unhappy and confused.

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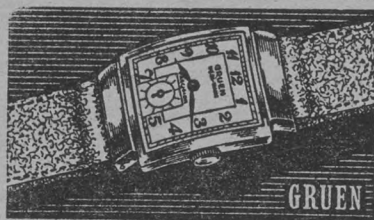

4-Day Fairy Tale

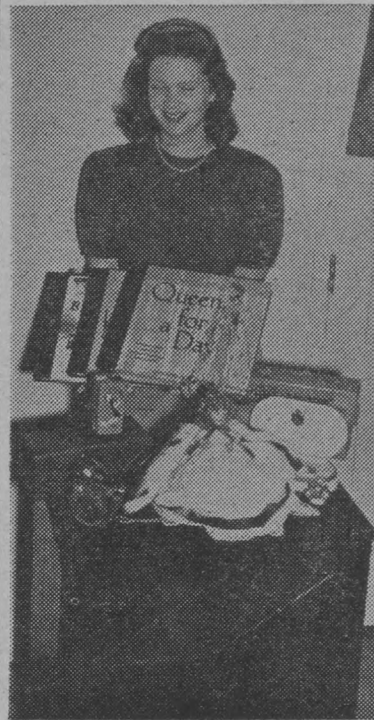

The University of California at Berkeley boxing squad will meet the UCSBC Gauchos in the National Guard Armory on Saturday evening, February 28.

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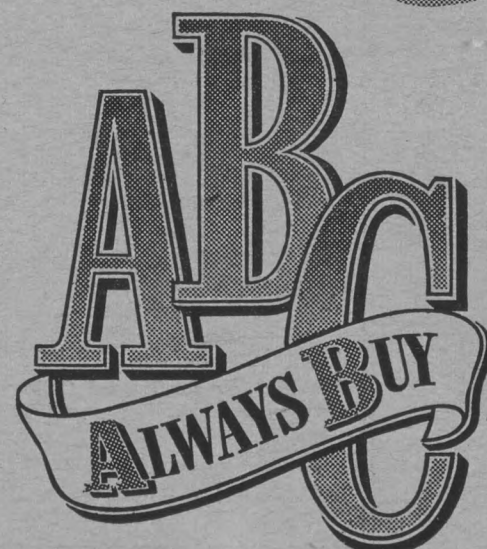
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
