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

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
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Look Mom, No Ice

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
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Spring at the Beach

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
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



ponds of Canada and the Eastern United States, because people have learned that a comparable version of the game can be played on concrete. Heck, there is even a professional roller league that took the country by storm. The Anaheim Bullfrogs took the championship last year because they were a stacked team made up of mostly Canadians that played in major and all I can afford.

Although you can't stop as fast and the puck isn't as hard, you can still get an exhilarating, fast-paced, stick-handling, goaltend-ing, defensive battle as seen in the NHL (well, I'd like to think so). I know you ice guys are probably saying how stupid I sound, but the concrete is all I got

Ice rinks did exist with league teams back home, but the price was so high my parents couldn't afford to put me in. And now that I can buy it for myself, there is no rink in Santa Barbara to play at. This could change in the near future, as there are hundreds of people lobbying for a an ice rink to be built.


now offering a sandcourt league for the outdoor

Intermural teams are one way of enjoying flying saucers, however a game of frisbee between friends is always fabulous.

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
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
