AS President Attends Meet At Yosemite

Santa Barbara College is represented by Frank G. Goodall, student by Frank C. Goodall, student president elect, and Robert L. Hartzell, present president, at the 25th Annual Convention of the Pacific Student Presidents Association ending today in the Yosemite National Park.

The student leaders have taken part in discussions of problems of student government with campus leaders from 11 western states, British Columbia, Hawaii, Alaska, and Mexico.

Fresno State College of Fresno, California, is the host school for the 1950 convention and chose the nearby national park as the convention site. Danny Coelho, student president at the University of California and president of the P.S.P.A. and Warren Kraft, Fresno State College, are in charge of the arrangements for the conference.

Student Role

The general topic of the meetings this year will be "The Role of Student Government in Democracy." In group discussions and general meetings the students will discuss a wide variety of problems arising from college activities.

Special speakers will be Richard Heggie, vice-president of the United States National Students Association, Raymond Cope, and Cornelius (Dutch) Warmerdam, Fresno State College coach and world pole vault record holder.

Governor

California's Governor Earl Warren will join the convention leaders in welcoming the delegates from the widely scattered P.S.P.A. area.

More than 250 colleges and universities are represented in the student presidents organization, which is the only one of its kind in the country. Representatives of ten major universities from other parts of the country have been invited to the convention to observe the P.S.P.A. in action and possibly take home ideas for forming similar organizations in their own areas.

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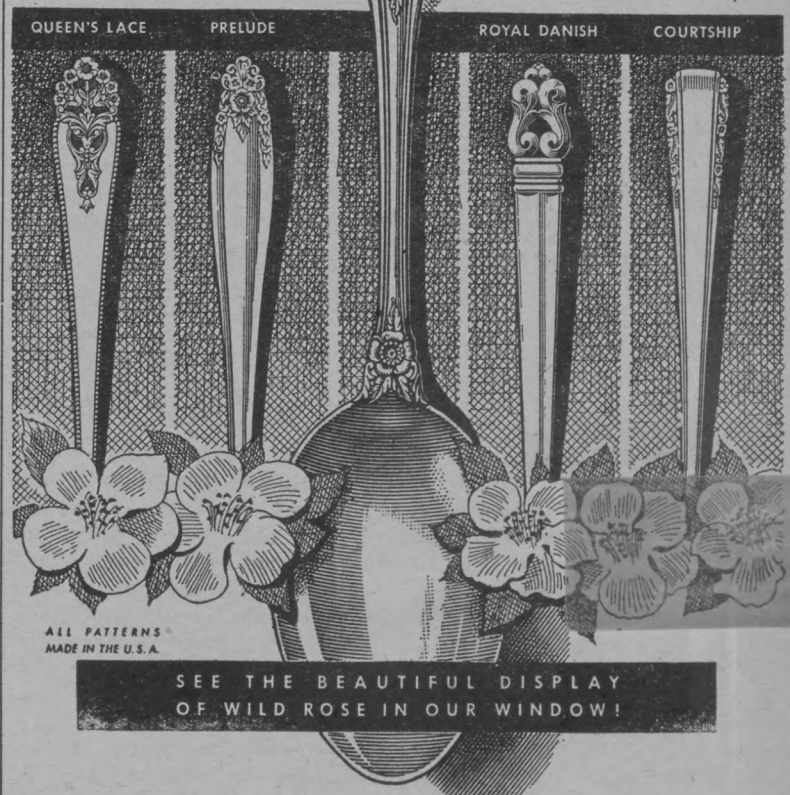
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NEW GAUCHO STAFF APPLICANTS INVITED TO PARTY THURSDAY

Although Bobby Johnston pitched his usual sensational game to win Monday, there was no one left to stop the ringing Fresno bats on Tuesday.

FRESHMAN CO-EDS SPONSOR SYSTEM FOR TO BE INAUGURATED

AWS has decided to use the sponsor system in welcoming new girls to this campus next fall. The sponsor system will replace the more cumbersome and less successful big and little sister program.

Alan Cox scored the first Santa Barbara run in the first inning of Monday's game. He walked to get on base and advanced on Dan Kutch's infield out. Huntsinger then batted him in with a single.

In the same inning Fresno took advantage of two walks to score twice on a pair of singles. The team from the valley scored again in the fifth to gain a three to one lead.

The Gauchos won the game in the seventh after two men were out. At this point Cox got on with a fielder's choice and Gil Rayburn and Kutch walked. Huntsinger was the big man again as he singled to score two runs. Two more walks forced across the winning run.

The Santa Barbara team had won on only three hits from the Fresno pitching. Johnston's win was all his own as he threw a six hit masterpiece. Huntsinger's two safeties gave him an important assist in the win as his continued improvement finally earned him a regular berth on the team.

After working well for two weeks Coach Spud Harder's strategy finally failed in the first game on Tuesday. He had let Paddy Hill go as far as he could and then called in the much used Johnston with the score three to two in favor of Fresno. However, errors cost the Gauchos another run and a Santa Barbara rally failed to materialize as Fresno racked up their first win.

The Santa Barbara pitching staff of Corky Johnson and Thad Picketts were faced with the job of stopping Fresno in the third game. Wildness caused a 19-3 debacle as the Gauchos were never in the game after the fourth inning.

Stan was an All-American at USC and is a fine coach. Doc Kelliher is a fine backfield coach and can give the backs the information and training they need. This staff will take a back seat to few in the country in football lore and the very necessary personal qualifications.

Of prime importance, of course, is the material these men will work with. The Gauchos will be neither loaded with stars nor deep in reserves. They will present, however, a well rounded organization with plenty of potentialities. They will be bigger and faster than the men Engle had last year.

For the Peasants

Sports for the less athletically endowed is receiving a good deal of attention. Dick Kaywood, Coordinator of Intramural Athletics, is working now with a student committee which is drawing up plans for a broader program of intramural sports.

The committee is now perfecting a constitution to add efficiency to present intramural activities. This will provide for student administration of the program and will add clarity to rules of eligibility.

The whole setup will be managed by a council of students with faculty supervision. Immediate plans are aimed at broader participation in the program. With little interest shown by independent teams, the fraternities on campus have made up the majority of those taking advantage of the present setup. Plans are being incorporated for attracting more entrants.

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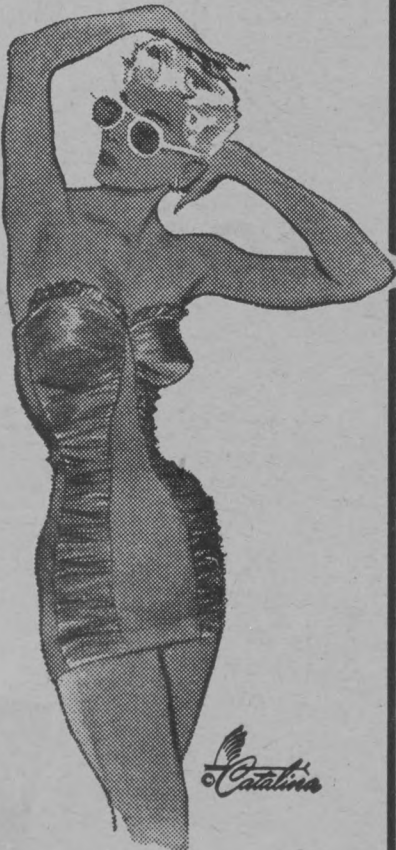

Hard times are those periods when the right to strike seems less important than the right to work.

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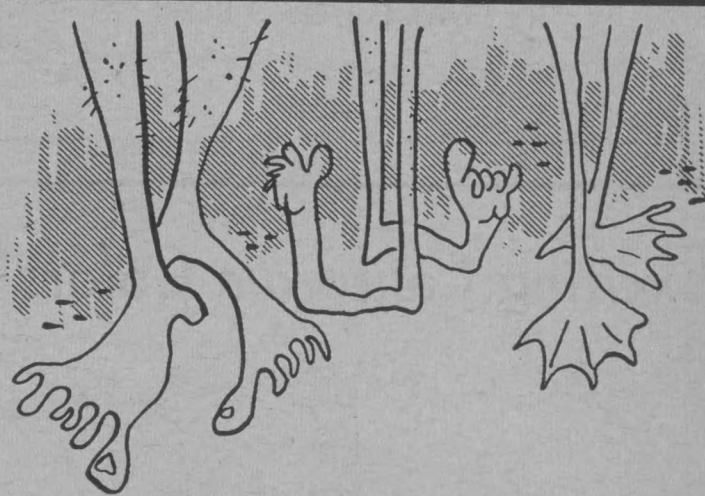
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
