

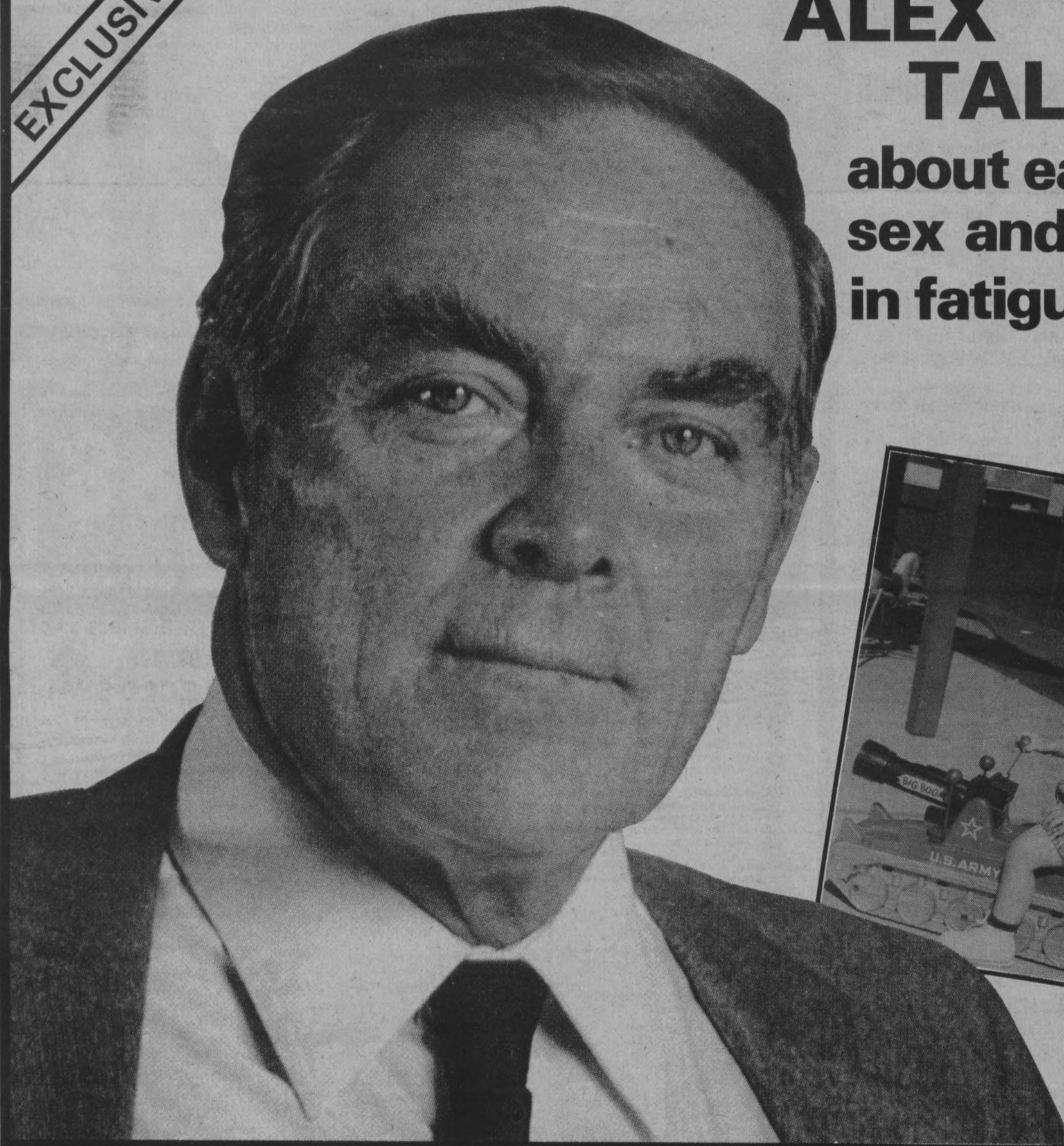

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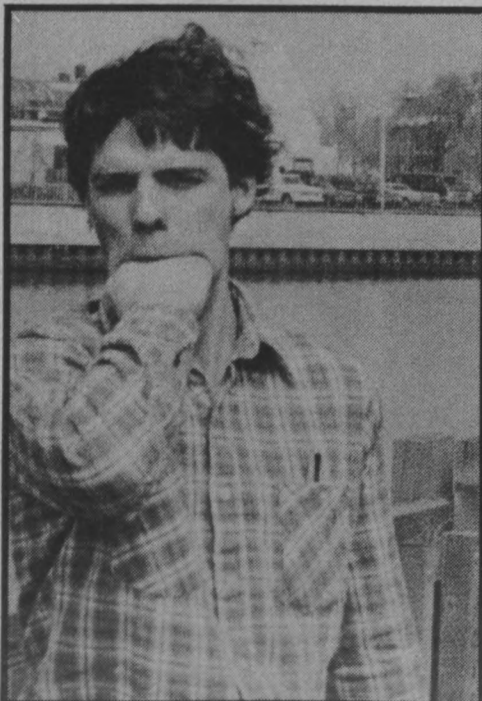

Ex-Girlfriend Releases Pictures of Haig as Youngest ROTC Member

Secretary of State Alexander Haig was the youngest person to ever join the Army ROTC, and participated actively in every war since 1917 according to pictures released by an ex-girlfriend.

The pictures detail Haig as he prepared to drive off to the nearest ROTC station in 1916; Haig as he lined up for a fearsome mug shot to be used on his mercenary resume that was never released; Haig atop a scaled down version of an Army tank of the variety Haig was to drive while leading one battalion into combat (pic-



tured at right). The final picture shows Haig with ex-girlfriend Madame X (pictured at lower right), the woman he adored nearly from birth until he met Marilyn Monroe in 1954.

While the pictures are not conclusive, a scenario can be enacted in which Commander Haig primarily directed surveillance teams from a situation room in his early years, avoiding active combat due to his dwarfed size. He overcame this non-military handicap at age 23 when excessive ingestion of

Deelighted Says He Was Spied On

Head Basketball Coach Eddie Deelighted charged yesterday that coaches of other teams in the conference spied on UCSB's Ouchos this year in a "blatant" attempt to undermine his coaching, and the team's ability to complete fairly in the Pacific Coast Athletic Association.

Deelighted's squad finished in a heap at the bottom of the PCAA conference with an 0-16 league record and 2-24 overall. The squad's two wins were over the Alumni and the Women's Basketball team, in overtime at the season's end. That win snapped a 25-game losing skein.

Deelighted's charges come at a time when his job security is anything but assured as two Junior High coaches and a former Rugby player are being considered as his replacements according to sources in the Athletic Department. First year Athletic Director Candy Roacher at first denied UCSB is seeking the services of a new basketball coach. Later in a phone conversation he refused to comment on the new lock being installed on Deelighted's door last night.

"At this point in time, and I mean only 12:17 p.m. today, we are not actively recruiting a new basketball coach," Roacher said before boarding his bright red moped. Asked if he was enroute to a meeting with a prospective candidate, Roacher would only say that his lunch appointment would cover more than the quality of the Flautas at Serranitos.

In a brief statement reportedly released to his players only, Deelighted alleged that every other PCAA coach had sent "spies" to the Ouchos practices to "steal" his coaching plans. He concluded that it was this "illegal activity" that was the cause behind the 24 Oucho losses, all by more than 15 points.

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UCSB Gains New Fleet Of Caribous

After a delay of almost two months, final implementation of the A.S.-sponsored UCSB Caribou fleet was begun today. The fleet's mastermind, Lars "Yumpin' Yimminie" Knudsen, told press that "these Caribous are just what UCSB needs."

Originally scheduled to be a fleet of bikes which could be rented out to any student who needed to get across campus, the plan somewhat backfired as, according to Knudsen, "we got the caribous and some eskimos up in Alaska wound up with a bunch of Schwinn 10 speeds."

Making the best of the situation, Knudsen asked Veg Council to approve campus use of the Caribous, and was soon approved. "I mean if we can't have bikes, we might as well have

Delays in getting the Caribous out into circulation occurred earlier this month as the National Society of Caribou and Elk Engineers were called in to make necessary adjustments to make the animals highway safe and conform to California smog emission standards.

The Caribous will also have numbers spray painted on their side to avoid any possibility of confusion with

any privately owned animals, explained Knudsen. For safety the animals will also be equipped with headlights for night travel as well as a bell on the Caribous horn.

Another delay in getting the Caribous onto the UCSB campus occurred when a Camel lobby sprang up and tried to push the Camel as a better form of transportation. "We were really disappointed," said Camels for UCSB club leader Wampus Squiggs, "we really thought that the camel would

be a much better animal to get around UCSB on — I mean there isn't any snow around the campus, how are these Caribous gonna feel at home?"

If this trial program works, there is the possibility that it may be expanded in the future. While more Caribous may be used, other animals including Elephants, Wildebeests and Giant Sloths may be used to round out the UCSB fleet.

Cannons Could Be Condoms

The UCSB Archeology Department announced today that the cannons recently recovered at Goleta Beach are in fact ancient fossilized prophylactics used by the late T.V. personality Jolly Green Giant and his side-kick the little Green Sprout.

The so-called "cannons of inception" have been the subject of an on-going controversy since their discovery two months ago. Until yesterday, the only thing known for sure was that the fossils weigh approximately 700 pounds including tar, sand, rock, and shale casings. The fossils, currently on display at the university, are approximately five feet long.

"We're terribly happy to have finally found the true origin of our discovery," Anthropology Professor Howard Rustybones said. He hopes that the fossils will be

"We want to make a mold of the cannons and have them cast in bronze, and with the university's permission, erect a statue in Storke Plaza," Rustybones said. He also expressed extreme gratitude to I.V. resident Sandy Stroller, who has aided Rustybones in keeping a 24 hour watch on any changes in the fossil compositions. The fossils will be on display Monday through Friday, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Rustybones added that some tours are available.

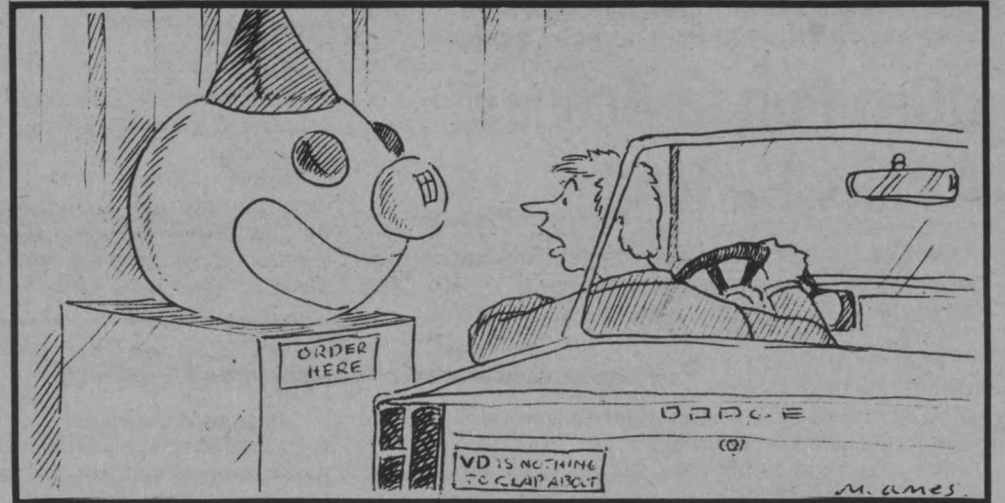

"If nothing else, you have to admit that the service makes it faster to get deferred to Goleta. This way you don't have to leave your car. Just ask for a medical deferment to go."

Nexus Enquirer To be Opposed

It was discovered yesterday that Veg Council through "secret" voting procedures, appropriated \$503 for a "Nexus Enquirer Resistance Day" over the spring break. When asked what about the appropriateness of the secret vote, A.S. President Tabby Hoffman said, "I don't think that students voted for me because they wanted me to make appropriate decisions for the rest of my term."

The vote, it was found, was so secret that only two members of Veg Council were aware that it ever took place, President Hoffman and Off-Campus Representative Gray Benson. Under current A.S. Bylaws, a secret vote can only be conducted under emergency situations such as 1) if there is insufficient time to go through normal voting procedures; 2) if the Russians take over and 3) if there is less than two weeks left till the end of the world.

According to Hoffman, a secret vote was necessary because of the shortened spring break so as to avoid a regular Veg Council meeting.

Some students have expressed their concern over whether some of the appropriated funds might go to the digressive students in solidarity, a radical leftist guerrilla organization bent on destroying the Nexus Enquirer. There have been reports that DSS leaders have met with members of Veg Council, causing some to speculate that the organization might conduct terrorist operations against the Nexus Enquirer sometime in the future.

One of the events scheduled for Nexus Enquirer Resistance Day will be a human billboard on Highway 101 just outside of Editor-in-Chief Gary Thornfield's ranch. The protestors involved in the human billboard project will be chanting the slogan "Down with the Thornfield, worst of the editors of Nexus Enquirer history!" (A slogan thought up by a member of the Iranian students club, one of the digressive student organizations).

Other Resistance Day activities will include a hanging in effigy of Nexus Enquirer editors, and a firebombing of Nexus Enquirer offices. Hoffman, who is not only A.S. President, but is also a member of 20 of the 25 digressive student organizations, has said that there will be no violence.

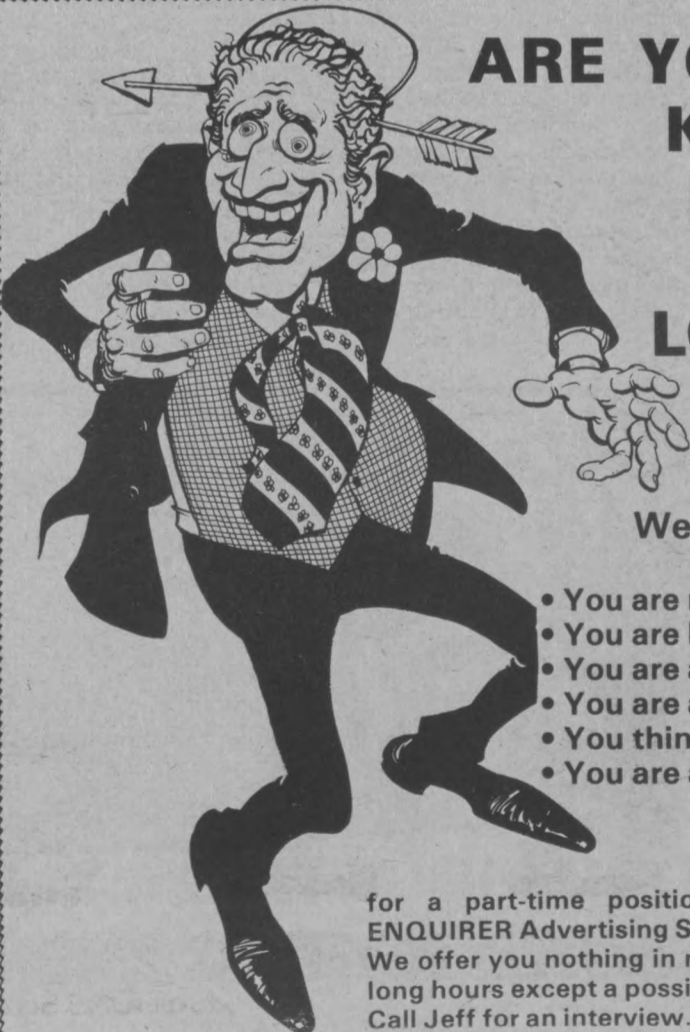

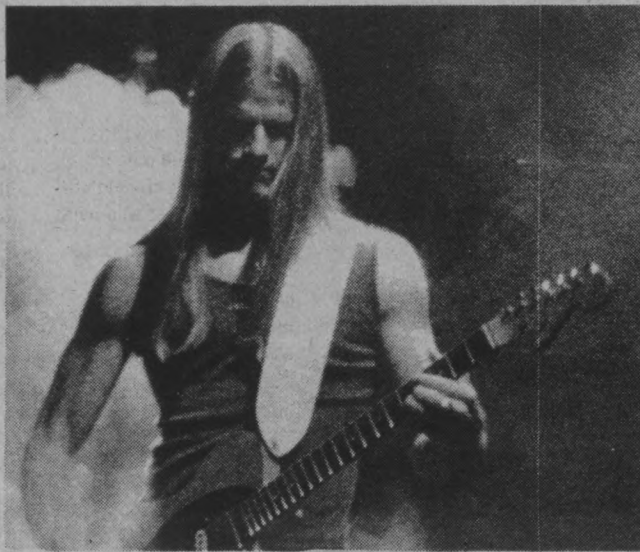

Michael Rogers earned his B.S. and M.S. degrees at
the Juilliard School, studying with Adele Marcus.
While a student he won the LADO Young Artist
Award, the Artists Advisory Council Competition of
Chicago, Chicago's Ravinia Festival Award, the
Concert Artist Guild Award, the Olga Samaroff
scholarship to Juilliard, the Carl Roeder Prize, and
the Morris Loeb Prize. He has performed in solo
recital at Carnegie Hall and Town Hall, New York,
and in concert with the Minneapolis, Pittsburgh,
Baltimore, Chicago, Boston Pops, Denver, and
Winnipeg Symphony Orchestras. He also performs
each year at the Smithsonian chamber concerts.

The California Pools have
achieved the success they
only could have dreamed
about when they started four
years ago in Hemet,
California. These four men
and two women have now
put out their third album,
Dry Humor, and the
response, in both critical and
commercial terms, is
overwhelming. The Nexus
Enquirer talked to the lead
singer/guitarist/charm br-
acelet player, Hang Nail. He
talked about the band's
formation, those first few
hard years, and the
pressures that teen idolatry
have placed on their
musicianship.

Enquirer: Can I call you
Hang?

Nail: How many listeners
does your program have?

Enquirer: No...it's a
newspaper for U.C. Santa
Barbara.

Nail: Isn't that the city
that Ross MacDonald sets all
his mysteries in...but he uses
a different name? (In-
terviewer nods). Yeah, I
really like his stuff. I'm
trying to convince Bob
(Boxer-Shorts, keyboardist)
to write an album using his
Lew Archer titles for songs. I
see this really old smokey
blues number, you
know...the kind Dire Straits
writes...or maybe even the
Doors, for *The Blue Ham-
mer*.

Enquirer: But that's for
later.

Nail: Well yeah, right now
the band is working on a
kinda punk tribute to Cheap
Trick. We'll re-arrange all
their songs. The manager
says we'll be the first
Southern California new
wave band to bust open in
Japan, especially among the
13-17 girl set.

Enquirer: But aren't you
afraid that adulation will
interfere with your musical
vision? It must be difficult to
live when people are mob-
bing you on the street.

Nail: ...No, you know, no
one ever recognizes us on the
street. Our first album (*The
California Pools—Greatest
Hits*) didn't have our pic-
tures. Our second album had
a picture, but it was a
heavily tinted blue...and the
latest album (*Dry Humor*)
well...the studio publicist
took us all to this trendy hair
stylist and gave us these

punk elite spike cuts, except
for our bass player who was
given these dread locks in a
wig. Before that, I had hair
to my ass. But the A&R guy
said that hair was important
to our fans, so we cut it. Got
more advance money on the
album for our trouble.

Enquirer: How did you
start?

Nail: Well, I had just
dropped out of Sonoma State
in '76...I had been a
mathematics major with an
emphasis on p/stat...while
all the time I was taking
English classes. I did a
twenty page paper on
Beowulf; that is my all-time
favorite piece of writing.
Confused about my personal
goals, but excited about the
music I was hearing those
days, Ramones, Patti Smith,
Aerosmith, Jimmy Buffet, I
decided to drop out of school
and go back to my parents'
home in Bel-Air. There I
bought a Gibson Flying
V...in fact, I got three, all
different colors, and started
playing in front of the
Dorothy Chandler pavilion.
Just to see if anyone would
jam with me. This guy came
along...it was Frank (Lee
Spoofing) and he dug what I
was doing. Called it spon-
taneous street art. We were
on the same wavelength! He
was from Hemet, he was
there to see Stacy Keach in
some musical, and he
convinced me to move in
with him and his parents. We
started playing in bars
there.

Enquirer: What kind of
music?

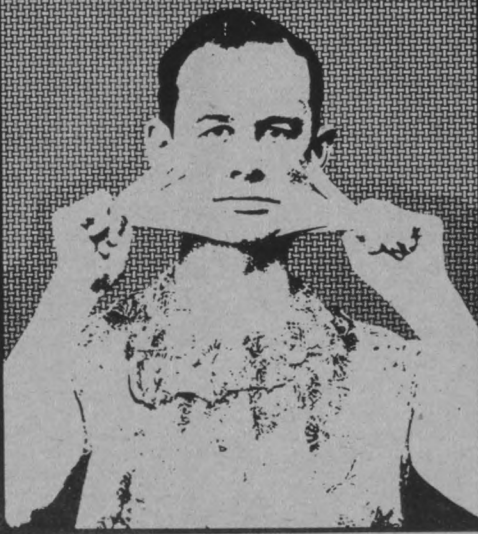
Nail: Well you might not
believe this, but it sort of was
this free punk-like country
sound.

Enquirer: How did the
fans take that?

Nail: Surprisingly well.
You see, country was a lot
looser in those days. Did you
know there was this group
called *Country Porn* that
makes Devo look like
wimps? As long as we did a
few George Jones songs
occasionally, we could mix
in the harder stuff, things
like, "I Want to Drown My
Sister and Save an Auto."
Even then I was playing
weird instruments. I used
my bicycle for one song,
tapping on the frame and
ringing the bell.

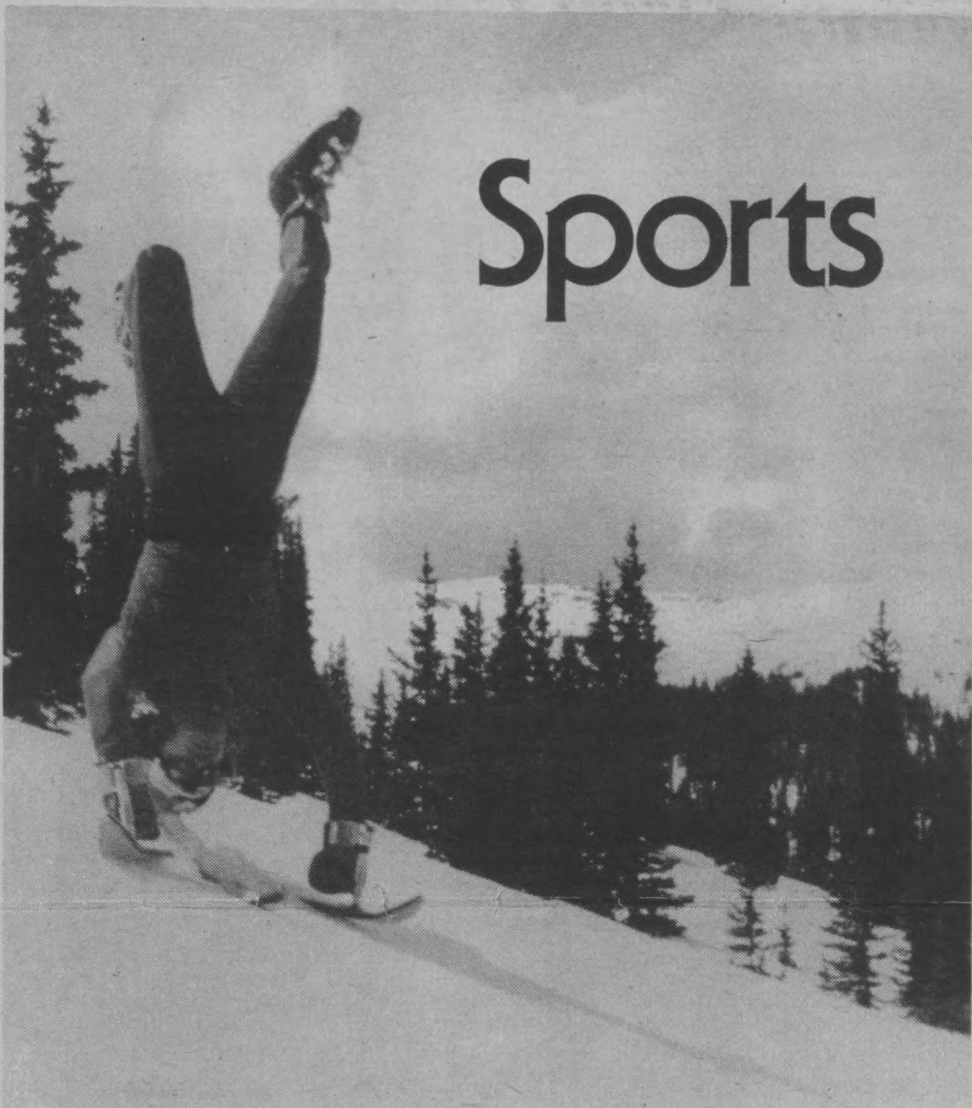

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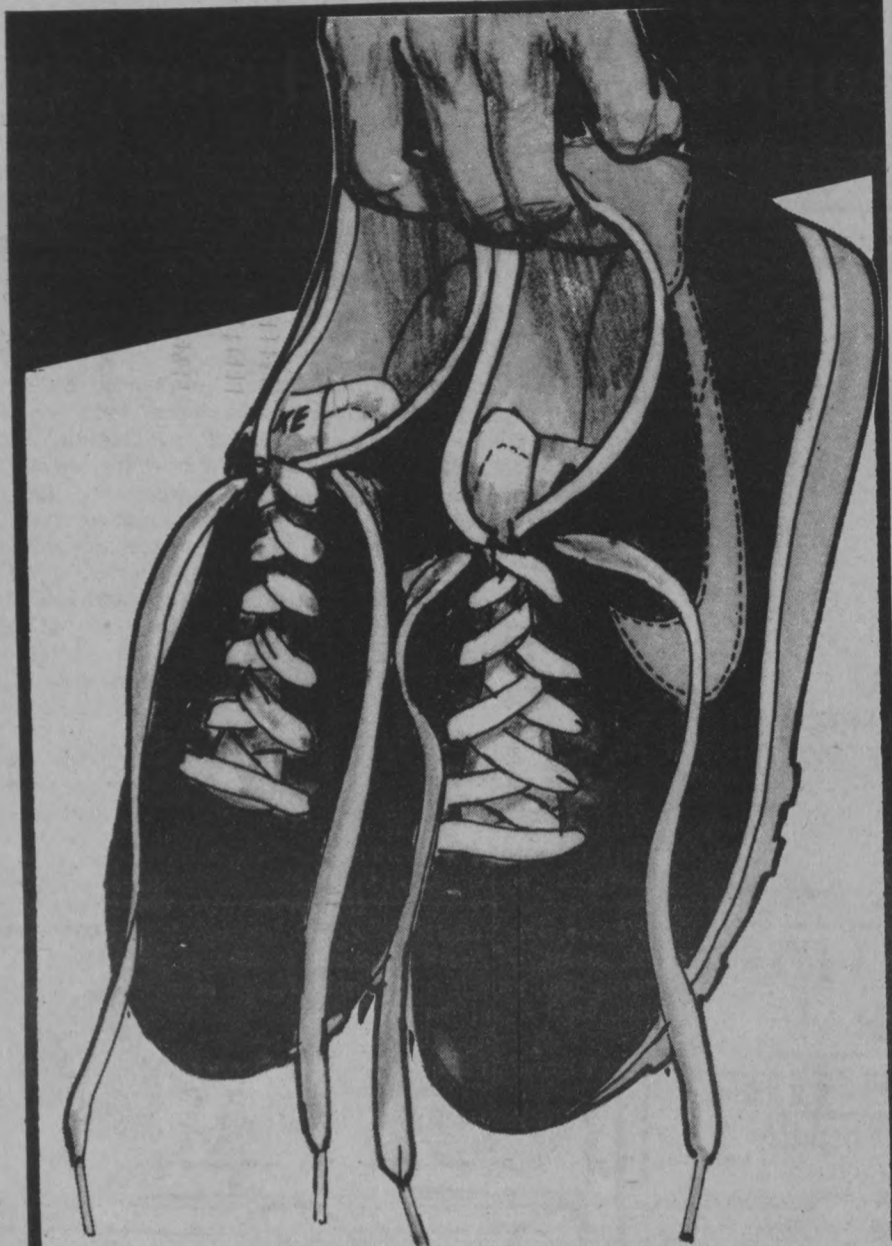

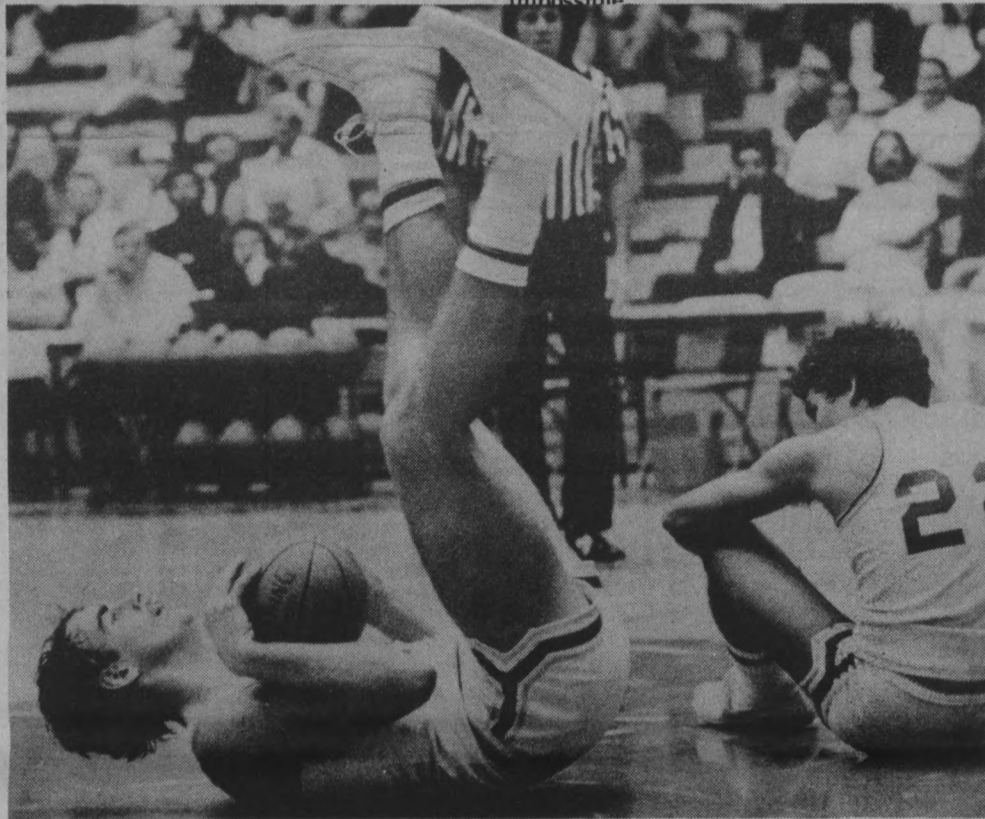

In the A.D.'s only game of the year against the powerful Nexus Enquirer squad, Winner raised a few eyebrows when he said, "We're going to murder those pencil-pushing geeks." Although the opposition plastered that quote all over their locker room wall, the well drilled Retreads easily won their only game of the year 43-31.

Trouble followed Winner on the road also. The last straw came when the A.D. team was in Columbus, Ohio for a pre-season contest with the U.S. Olympic Team. Reportedly, Winner received a death threat which read, "you won't make it back to the West Coast alive!!" Philadelphia where they crunched Indiana 95-66 for their fourth straight NCAA title.

The pair are both expected to go high in the upcoming draft, with Andersing foregoing his senior year to reap the monetary benefits. Events, a 6-3 guard, averaged 43 points per game last year and is said to be demanding a 17-year, 2 billion dollar no-cut pact.

Andersing, who was one of the nation's tallest guards last year at 6-10, averaged 15 points an outing, 31 rebounds and 15 steals during his career as a Groucho. Avid Oucho followers are not jumping at Deelighted's comments knowing that in his three year tenure the squad has won only five games — three over the Alumni (i.e. the previous year's team in each instance) and twice over the women's squad. Last year the women won the heterosexual battle by a 64-58 margin.

Deelighted pointed to the

list of hopeful recruits who are committed for next year as reasons for a dramatic turnaround. Included are three sleeping giants from lower State Street who are described as muscular with little actual talent or academic expertise but who will be able to earn the Ouchos "respect" on the court next season.
