## NEXT WEEK: "PRIMITIVE MEXICAN MUSIC"

The fourth Spanish Colonial Arts symposium lecturer is a man who has been accorded honors both in Latin America and in this country.

He is Dr. William Berrien, Dept. of Romance Languages, USC, who will speak on "Primitive Mexican Music," Tuesday, July 16, at 2 p.m. in the new Classroom Building lecture hall. Students are admitted free. Auditor's fee for the public is 50¢.

Dr. Berrien is an honorary professor of the faculty of fine arts, University of Chile; and holds the Diploma de Honor, Academia Mixicana de la Lengua; and the Order of Southern Cross, Brazil. Besides being a distinguished scholar, he is the author of several works written in Spanish

## THEATRE WORKSHOP

As its contribution to the Spanish Colonial Arts program, the UCSBC Summer Theatre Workshop will present three one-act plays July 25, 26, and 27 in the campus Little Theatre. Admission is free, and the curtain goes up at 8:30 p.m.

Taking part in "Sunday Costs Five Pesos," a hilarious comedy of small town Mexican folk, are Patricia Bannon, William Covington, Charlene Gant, Joyce Mackenzie, and Lola McFarland. Mrs. Mona Livesey is the director.

What happens when a husband uses his wife's savings to buy a lottery ticket is the basis for the farce, "Tooth or Shave." Directed by Elizabeth Martinson, Miss Gant, Marilyn Kwiatkowski, Richard Leimkuhler, and John Reid have roles in this play.

In contrast to the two humorous productions, "The Ring of General Macias" is a melodrama which takes place during the Mexican Revolution. Those taking parts are Yvonne Bonsall, Covington, Jack Ford, Richard Freeland, and Miss McFarland. Covington is also the director.

Miss Josephina Niggli, a noted Mexican playwright, is the author of all three of the plays. The night of one-acts is under the supervision of Dr. Theodore Hatlen, dramatics professor.
