

Sproul Welcomes Alumni of Old | Post Session Prog. Puts Accent Santa Barbara State College

President Robert Gordon Sproul of the University has written Provost Phelps to the effect that all alumni of the Santa Barabra State College will be recognized by the University, and will receive the same treatment as if they had been students and graduates of any other division of the University.

Following is a quotation from President Sproul's letter to Provost Phelps:

"I may say that I am most eager that all these good people shall come to feel that they are regular members of the University of California family, and to that end I shall be glad to work with you and others in any way that seems desirable."

"Since the University of California has welcomed Santa Barbara College into its family of schools and colleges, all former students and graduates of Santa Barbara State College will be entitled to all privileges of former students and graduates of the University, including that of membership in the California Alumni Association.

"It is my continuing hope that all alumni of the University of California may be able to establish relationships of harmony and accord in a single alumni association. This consummation is, of course, one which can be achieved only by the alumni themselves, for our Alumni Association, as we of the University of California are proud to boast, is a self-sustained organization, independent of faculty members and administrative officers of the University.

"Santa Barbara College is now an integral part of the University, however, and I have little doubt that the alumni of Santa Barbara State College will wish to share fully in the University's future by cooperation with their fellows from other campuses."

Menken Announces Delay in Diploma, Credential Awarding

Miss Wilhelmina Menken, assistant registrar, yesterday announced that due to the transfer to the University of California there will be a delay in the issuing of diplomas and credentials.

These will be mailed to the graduates upon receipt of a 50 cent fee, payable to Harold Martin, graduate manager, at his office in the Quad.

There will be no diploma fee but the graduation fee of five dollars plus the mailing fee of 50 cents should be paid to Martin. The mailing fee need not be paid if the graduate calls at the college for his degree near the end of August.

These courses will be given in cooperation with the Santa Barbara Museum of Natural History. Dr. Severy has announced that advance registration indicates a large enrollment for the classes,

Miss Severy also said that in case the enrollment has to be limited, those students who registered first will be given preference over later registrants.

Two semester units of credit are offered to those who complete the courses. Total tuition is \$10.

Courses to be offered are "Weather" which involves meteorology, "Transportation," "War Minerals" which will show the effect of minerals and our natural resources on the war effort, "Birds and Mammals," "California Trees," and "Elementary Methods."

Faculty for the post session will include Dr. Hazel W. Severy, head of the Science department, C. Douglas Woodhouse, assistant professor of science, Maunsell Van Rensselaer, director of the Santa Barbara Botanic Garden, and Egmont Z. Rett of the Museum of Natural History.

Conservation of natural resources during wartime is the integrating theme with which all courses are correlated. school is under the direct supervision of the California State Department of Education. All classes will be held in the mornings at the museum.
