'MARCH OF DIMES' SET BY SAE'S TOMORROW

March of Dimes' Charity Drive, sponsored by the UCSB chapter of Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity, is set for tomorrow from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. A tape will be stretched from the campus music building to the Student Union, to which students may attach whatever amount they wish to contribute. The suspended fund will be vigilantly patrolled by fraternity members at all times.

Entertainment will be provided from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. in the patio of the Student Union. It includes music by the SAE combo plus a duet and a chorus line consisting of members of the "Little Sisters of Minerva," described by SAE president Don Leavey as "an organization of girls who have helped out the fraternity."

Research, Hospitals

In addition to the widely publicized work done by the March of Dimes in the prevention of polio, a large percentage of the contributions goes to those who have already contracted the disease, as well as to research, hospitals and welfare homes. Since the Salk polio vaccine is still just 90 per cent effective, there is a great deal yet to be done.

According to Tim Naegele, chairman of the drive, "Many people have misconstrued the idea that the March of Dimes as a charity has completed its aims. This is false because since the March of Dimes is now helping to distribute vaccine, its work has in effect just begun. This drive is unique in that it is the first of its kind to be held at Santa Barbara."

Can Be Annual

This drive has the sanction and approval of the national office of the fraternity, and past national president Edward Hathcock and traveling secretary Albert Scoth will be on campus for the event. Also on hand will be the Santa Barbara representative of the National March of Dimes, J. Jordan. "It depends upon student participation as to whether we will make this a yearly event," states Leavey.

All-Teacher Quintet In Aud. Tomorrow

Six works of contemporary music will be the feature of the California Woodwind Quintet's performance when the recently organized group makes its first local appearance at 8:30 tomorrow evening in the UCSB campus auditorium. Admission is free.

All five members of the quintet are music teachers in their own rights and professional musicians on the side. Clayton Wilson, founder and head of the ensemble, plays oboe. Wilson has taught woodwind and music theory at UCSB for nearly 10 years.

Henri Tomasi's "Variations sur un Theme Corse" is the first selection by the quintet, followed by numbers ranging from traditional sea chanties to ultra-modern.

The group is described as having joined together to show that music teachers can combine high-level instrumental performance with competent teaching.

Robert Armer, flutist, is from Los Angeles Junior High; clarinetist Russell Howland and James Winter on French horn, both are from Fresno State; Sanford Helm, bassoon, is from Long Beach State and Wilson from UCSB.

Springosky Calls Probation Ruling Incredible, Unjust

(Ed. Note: George Springosky is the president of the Delta Tau Delta fraternity. In this interview with *El Gaucho* he gives his version of what happened at "Viva Zapata," and tells why he feels the year's probation penalty is unjust.)

Were the Delts given a fair penalty?

"No. The people here can't believe it. It is incredible to us. We have had parties that were much worse. I know of other parties where drinking took place that were reported to the IFC and I believe the administration had action taken against them, but nothing like this."

Was there drinking at the party?

"There was some drinking outside the house. Maybe some guys carried it in, I don't know. There was no excessive drinking."

What about the fight?

"I wasn't there. I talked to the USC boy the next day at the beach. It was more or less a one-punch deal. There was no provocation for it."

How will the penalty affect the fraternity?

"As it is stated now it practices."

CRAWFORD TELLS ABOUT DELT FIGHT

(Ed. Note: John Crawford, UCSB Senior and Gaucho quarterback, was involved in the fight which constituted one of the reasons for the year suspension of the Delta Tau Delta fraternity. (See Delt stories). Crawford issued the following statement to *El Gaucho* concerning the fight.)

"I was dancing with a girl at the party and he (the man from USC) was standing by the dance floor. We were trying a new step. He made a derogatory remark and I went over and asked him what he said."

"He didn't deny nor confirm that he made the derogatory remark. So I assumed he had made it. I half slapped him, half hit him. I don't remember the remark now."

Then it stopped, and I went on dancing. He continued to talk real loud about it, so I went over and asked him to step outside. He thought I was a Delt, and I told him I wasn't."

"I asked him what he did when someone hit him, so he tackled me and then we landed on the floor. We were wrestling and hitting each other. He tore my shirt off. I looked like Kowalsky (in Street Car Named Desire.) Most people don't realize he hit me too. Then some people broke it up."

"When I got up off the floor I felt embarrassed about what I did and I wanted to leave. (According to Crawford he was asked to leave in a profane, derogatory manner by "some guy who wasn't even a Delt.")

"We went around over that. I left then. The fellow followed me outside (repeating the profanity)."

When asked if he was invited to the "Viva Zapata" party, Crawford answered, "No I wasn't."

Dr. Reynolds Explains Case; Drinking, Fight Big Reasons

For violation of University Regulation 25, the Delta Tau Delta fraternity has been placed on probation until February of 1960. The action was taken by a joint faculty-administration committee last week as a result of incidents occurring at the third annual "Viva Zapata" party last Saturday night at the Delt House.

Regulation 25 governs social activities of recognized student organizations. The University President's interpretation of Regulation 25 states: "No intoxicating beverages shall be served by such groups at any function, regardless of where it is held."

According to Dean of Students Lyle Reynolds, the major reason for the penalty was a "gross violation of Regulation 25 in the fraternity house." According to Dean Reynolds, other occurrences at the Delt party which reportedly contributed to the penalty include:

1) The beating of a USC student, a non-Delt who was at the party uninvited. 2) A disturbance created by the Delts at the Lobero Residence Hall.

The following is an interview with Dean Reynolds, in which he explains the faculty-administrative action taken against the Delta Tau Delta fraternity:

What were the major reasons for the penalty?

"The most important reason by far was the drinking. Our feeling is that any violation of University regulations deserve similar action if the matter is brought to our attention."

"Since we have Regulation 25 we should either enforce it or get rid of it. It is difficult to enforce, but we have to enforce it when we can. It is comparable to a traffic regulation. As in the case of a traffic violation, the more serious cases are dealt with more severely than the minor violations."

"In any university function public relations are involved. The University accepts responsibility at a function such as this."

USC Man 'Mauled'

"The fight was perhaps a secondary reason for the penalty. They (the Delts) are responsible for what goes on at social functions and the people who attend them. It is hard for me to believe that they didn't want them (Crawford and the USC man) there."

"I don't know if the boy from USC was a Delt. In any event, to have him mauled as he was certainly does us no good in our relations with USC."

"He was beaten badly enough. His lip was cut through. He didn't attempt to defend himself. He didn't want to fight. The only provocation appeared to be the fact that he had USC on his polo shirt."

How was the Dean's office informed of the party?

"It was brought to our attention in several ways:

- 1) a complaint from Lobero Hall about Delts who created a disturbance by the residence hall officials. We know they were Delts; we have their names.
- 2) from the chaperones at the party.
- 3) from students who are not Delts but who attended the party.

Who did the committee question before reaching a decision?

"In reviewing the case the committee talked to the president of the fraternity, various people at the party and the chaperones. Their president didn't deny any of the charges, but he did deprecate the importance of them."

Why wasn't the case given to the AS Standards Committee?

"This question was discussed by the committee. The Inter-Fraternity Council met Monday night and decided on social probation for one month. Standards met Tuesday, but then found that a decision had been reached, so they did not come to a final conclusion of their own. Standards is still investigating various aspects of the case."

Delt Party Chaperones Andron, Magruder Disagree Sharply on 'Zapata' Happenings

(Ed. Note: Dr. Mortimer Andron and Bob Magruder, AS director of publicity, were the chaperones at the Delta Tau Delta "Viva Zapata" party last Saturday night. The two men told *El Gaucho* different stories about what happened at the party.)

Was the drinking excessive at the party?

ANDRON—"That depends upon what you call excessive. According to the law you can't have liquor at all. You have to allow for deviations. This thing seems to work in cycles."

"When you clamp down, everybody behaves for a while, but as the situation gets more loose and somebody gets into trouble."

"Some people can drink and not get into trouble, while some can't handle liquor. At Saturday night's party some could and some couldn't. It is always the minority that causes the difficulty for everybody."

MAGRUDER—"There was no drinking in excess at the party. There was no extraordinary drinking."

"I did see some Delts who may have been intoxicated when I arrived, but I assumed they had been to a pre-party. There was no real drinking at the party itself while I was there (from 10 to 1)."

What about the fight?

ANDRON—"Yes, I saw the fight."

The boy from SC was on his hands and knees when I got there and he was hurt around the eye, mouth and nose, indicating that he had been hit at least twice."

"One blow was not enough to cause the damage. At least three men jumped on him (John Crawford), otherwise he would have pulverized the boy (from SC). He (Crawford) was completely uncontrollable."

"As far as I was concerned he was drunk. I don't think he would behave that way sober. There was no provocation for his action at all except liquor."

MAGRUDER—"Nobody got battered. No more than one punch landed. I was the first one there to break it up. Crawford wasn't drunk, just belligerent. In fact, he was using some pretty philosophical arguments as to why he shouldn't be thrown out."

"The SC man laughed at him and he hit him. He landed a good blow; it cut the SC boy's

lip. He wasn't bleeding badly, and he wiped it off. He was jovial afterwards—he thought Crawford was a Delts."

Is the penalty too severe?
ANDRON—"My feeling is that it is a difficult problem. I think the Dean of Students is doing a good job under difficult circumstances. There is no point in second-guessing."

"The situation is unfortunate. It reflects badly on the University and the students. It is an old problem that goes back to the Bible in time. It has been with us since we have had young people."

"They have to work out a balance between their privileges and their responsibilities. In the process of growing up they occasionally get out of balance."

"The law against drinking in this case is a state law, and the University's hands are tied even if they wanted to change it."

MAGRUDER—"I think it was based on incomplete evidence. The action at the party was not sufficient for a year's probation."

"The liquor problem was not as bad as it has been or as bad as it could be. From what I saw of the party and what I have seen in the past, I don't think it is a fair penalty. I really don't."

"It is one of those borderline cases. The Delts went over the border a little, but not far."

Witchcraft Subject Of Sociology Meet

"Witchcraft for the Novice" is the subject of a lecture scheduled for 7:30 p.m. tomorrow at 1250 Cliff Dr., Santa Barbara. Admission is free and everyone is invited.

felt it would put too much pressure on the students on Standards. We felt it would be unfair to ask a student group to render a decision on this case. We felt it was our responsibility because of the difficulty of the pressure. It was too hot an issue."

How will the penalty affect the Delts?

"They can't have any social activities, and they can't rush in the fall of next year. Some fraternity people feel that the penalty will destroy the Delts. This is not so."

"In 1955 a similar action was taken against the SAEs. They came back stronger than before after self examination. Incidentally the National also forbids the consumption of alcohol in a chapter house."

"The National will be informed by the University. No action from them has been requested. It is just a notification of the situation and the action taken. It is very possible that they will take further action."

"In the past the Nationals have taken further action, but here they may not. I feel it is an adequate penalty. Stiff, but fair."

What is the duty of the chaperones at a party like this?

"I don't think it is their duty to stop or break up the party. They should inform those in authority if someone gets out of line. The responsibility is the organization's, not the chaperones'. They are there as advisors."

Would the committee take similar action if it was found that drinking took place at a TGIF, for instance?

"Undoubtedly they would act in the same manner."

GAUCHOS EASILY DUMP LONG BEACH TRACKMEN

The fast-improving University of California, Santa Barbara track and field forces did it again Saturday.

Coach Nick Carter's Gauchos loom as a threat to be reckoned with in the small-college division of the approaching Easter Relays as they pranced past host Long Beach State, 81 2/3 to 49 1/3, in a dual California Collegiate Athletic Conference meet.

Santa Barbara, which tunes up for its annual Relays pageant this weekend at Los Angeles in a triangular match against both UCLA and Cal Poly (San Luis Obispo) on the Bruin oval, was paced by the performance of sprinter Dave Boraker.

Boraker steamed to a 10.1 victory in the 100, followed by a sizzling 21.7 triumph in the 220, then capped perhaps his best showing of the season by running a leg on the winning relay team.

Frank Carl of the 49ers pushed Boraker for the meet's top honors, however, as the Long Beach State weightman hurled the discus 151 ft. 2 in. before returning in the shot put to outdistance UCSB's George Chappell with a winning toss of 49 ft. 1 1/2 in.

Rival Westmont Nine Invades Today, UCSB Looks for Fifth Straight Victory

Westmont's baseballing Warriors have slumped off to a somewhat slow start for the 1959 campaign.

And things don't figure to get much better for the Westmonters this afternoon when they leave their reservation and travel across town to invade the University of California, Santa Barbara to test the fancy-stepping Gauchos.

UCSB, hoping to corral its fifth straight victory and maintain an unblemished record, will be a slight favorite at the opening pitch in the 3 p.m. non-conference tussle.

However, Coach Rene Rochelle is not taking the Warriors lightly, and is by no means resting comfortably for today's horsehide war. "Westmont always gives us a handful," commented Rochelle. "They're like the Yankees when they play us."

The Gauchos, averaging 8.25 runs per outing, have compiled a lusty team batting average of .315, including sizzling marks

from Rich Gunner (.533), Ron Williams (.462) and Frank Stevens (.365).

Rochelle will open with Jim Escareno (3-0) on the hill, with Jim Hezlep and Bill Wetzel following "Eskey" to the firing line. Lefty Freddie Warrecker may see action, but is still nursing a slightly sore arm.

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Prof. Mead Outlines 'New Competition' In SB All-College Talk at 4 Here Today

This afternoon Dr. Walter Mead of the Economics Department of UCSB will lecture on the "New Competition" in the fifth of the spring series of All-College Lectures. It will be held in the classroom building auditorium at 4 p.m.

Mead will give a statement on what competition is supposed to do for the public and will discuss old and new competition and what is happening to it in the United States.

Best for Least

"I'll discuss how we benefit from the competition which is resulting from growing economic concentration in industry," says Dr. Mead.

"Specifically, the problem is whether big business is giving the public the lowest possible prices in return for the best possible products," he added.

New Here

Mead is new to the UCSB faculty, coming to Santa Barbara in the fall of '57. He is presently doing research work on the Douglas fir lumber industry.

Before coming to Santa Barbara, Mead was on the Committee for Economic Development in New York. He received his AB in 1948 at the University of Oregon, his MA from Columbia University in 1950 and his PhD in 1952 at the University of Oregon.

—well half-way. A Delt told me to come."

When asked why he started the fight Crawford replied, "I figure that you're either not going to just stand there and take some guy saying that or you're going to walk away. To walk away is the right thing to do I guess, but if you walk away all your life, you're going to be 'nothing'."

Did he think the Delt should be punished for something he did? "I didn't think they were being punished for what I did. I thought it was because they were drinking."

When told that his fight was one of the underlying reasons, Crawford answered, "I don't think they should have been punished for my fight. There was liquor there, but I didn't even drink any of their liquor. I was sober."

Will you appeal the case?

"If I felt we had anything to gain I would appeal. We are going to have a meeting Monday of the faculty and alumni and see what happens."

What will your National do?

"I really couldn't say. There is a good chance that they will send a representative here to uncover the facts. I think they will deal with us fairly."

What about the disturbance the Delt made at the

Lobero Hall?

"We didn't know a thing about this. We called the president of Lobero Hall and she didn't know anything about it.

"The only thing we can figure is that when about 12 Delt picked up their dates at Lobero they were noisy, and the manager did tell them to be quiet.

"For this we are accused of breaking into the place."

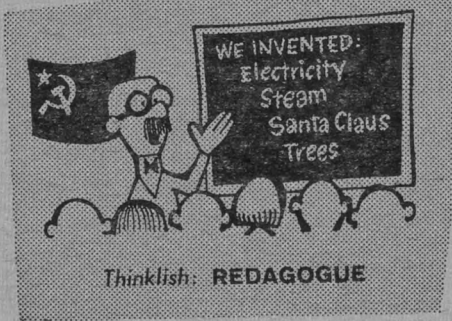

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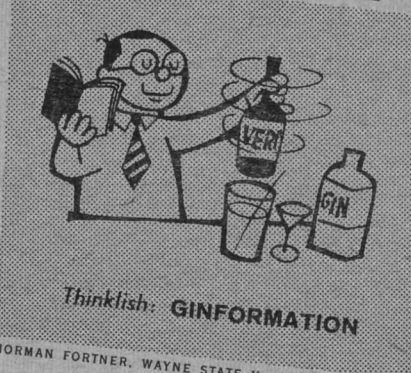

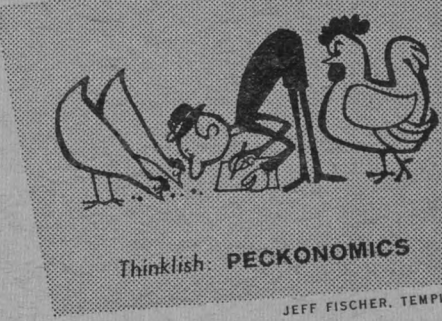
