Tuesday Assembly Features Craven on Conservation

Santa Barbara college will play host Tuesday to Marcus Cravens, former president of the Men's Club and Gauchito Student Body president in 1934. Mr. Cravens will speak in assembly fourth hour on Conservation Activities. The objects of the California Conservation Council and Cooperating Agencies, which sponsors Conservation Week, March 7 through 10, are to stimulate conservation education and those conservation activities which will best serve the interest of the state and nation in war and peace, and to encourage cooperation and correlation of efforts between public and private agencies, schools and war emergency committees in the fulfillment of similar aims.

Teaching Positions Open In Arabia

A call for 30 instructors to go to Arabia at top salaries, with traveling and subsistence expenses paid while teaching—together with a substantial bonus—was considered a high mark in requests until a week ago. Then came a demand for 300 teachers for schools in Hawaii.

Teachers are demanded for all grades, with the greatest demand for art, music and physical education instructors.

Oren E. Long, superintendent of the Hawaiian schools and employer of many Santa Barbara college graduates, announced that the three-year residence requirements previously in force would be suspended for instructors who accept the teaching posts.

On every campus of the University events are being planned to celebrate the granting of a charter to the University in 1868. For the first time Santa Barbara college will take part in observing the founding of the Mother University at Berkeley.

All entries in the name contest must be handed in to Dick Struck, publicity director of the affair, by 4 p.m. next Tuesday afternoon. Winner in the contest will be awarded a free copy of La Cumbre, college annual.

"This promises to be one of the biggest events of the year here at college. We'd like to see every student submit a name and thereby show that they're behind the program being planned," Struck stated.

Invitations to the event have been extended to high ranking student officers on the Berkeley and Los Angeles campuses of the university.

Bobby Berry, general chairman, announced that nominees for the title of Campus Queen will be introduced at the rally. All students wishing to nominate a woman for

this honor should hand in their nominations to her by Monday, March 19. Winner will be crowned at the A.W.S.-Pan Hellenic dance in April.

Following the torchlight processional on the Mesa campus students will gather at La Playa field for the rally.

Student body presidents from the three campuses will speak at the rally. Santa Barbara song leaders will lead the audience in songs representative of Santa Barbara, Berkeley and U.C.L.A.

Reminiscent of Santa Barbara Fiesta days, a Latin orchestra will play and provide accompaniment for Spanish dancers.

EDITORIAL

The importance of conservation as an educational principle is of course recognized by parents, students, and educators throughout the state. All agree that future citizens should be led to an appreciation of the enormous intrinsic value of our natural resources. Instruction in conservation is a continued process, constantly being interwoven into the curriculum at all grade levels and in all teaching situations.

Superimposed upon the normal program is the added stress of wartime conservation. Production is a California byword. Exports of crucial materials such as cotton, petroleum, lime, cement, borax, potash, magnesium and molybdenum are vital endeavors. Conservation through intelligent exploitation is the theme of public school education in California as it is in industrial planning.

In the schoolrooms and lecture hall of our educational institutions, students are being trained in participation through an understanding of the principles involved in democratic government. Health as a highly desirable objective, is taught through streamlined programs of physical education. Recreation now has a purpose other than idle pleasure. Thrift, through war stamp and bond purchases, wise buying under stamp rationing, personal savings and care of clothing and equipment is a factor in conservation education. Use of water and electric power are watched, as in gas consumption in school and at home through unnecessary overheating of rooms. Salvage of usable clothing, metal scrap, and all manner of materials which may be helpful to the war effort is common practice in school rooms as it is in the community.

College newspapers throughout the state are campaigning this week in a concerted effort to bring these important matters to the attention of students through undergraduate channels as well as in the lecture rooms. Motion picture programs, students' discussion forums, and assemblies are being held on many of our college campuses.

The eleventh California Conservation Week will be March 7 to 14. Such subjects as Fire Prevention, Soil and Water Conservation, Use of Natural Resources, and Food For Victory will be discussed.

Bakaleinikoff Directs Concert By All-California Orchestra

With the exception of selecting the members of the orchestra, plans for the fifth annual All Southern California High School symphony concert are nearly complete. This event, sponsored by the college, will be held on May 8 at Lobero Theater.

Edwin Jones, chairman, announced early this week that Vladimir Bakaleinikoff, assistant conductor of the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra and an internationally known musician, had accepted the offer to be conductor of the high school orchestra.

Jones was elated over Bakaleinikoff's acceptance. The guest conductor has a national reputation as a teacher of young students. For eight years he was identified with the National Music Camp at Interlochen, Michigan.

In 1926 Bakaleinikoff toured America with the Moscow Art Theater. Dr. Fritz Reiner, the conductor of the Cincinnati Orchestra, saw some of Bakaleinikoff's performances. He was so enthusiastic that he immediately engaged Bakaleinikoff as assistant conductor and first violist. They worked together for ten years in Cincinnati and later became affiliated with the Pittsburgh Symphony, Dr. Reiner as musical director and Bakaleinikoff as assistant conductor.

In recent years Bakaleinikoff made several appearances as guest conductor and devoted considerable time to the composition of original scores for Hollywood pictures. In the summer of 1942 he was guest conductor with the Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra with Rachmaninoff as soloist. In 1943 he conducted the Los Angeles Orches-

tra in ten concerts at Hollywood Bowl.

Jones announced yesterday that announcements concerning the concert plans had been sent to 150 high schools in Southern California. Last year 150 applications were accepted from 40 schools. A capacity crowd attended the concert.
