### Roadrunner Revue Begins at 8; Mills, Russell Star in Satire

Centering around a riotous satire on "A College Career," this year's Roadrunner Revue began a three-night stand last night in the Riviera auditorium. The show will appear tonight and tomorrow night on the college stage, with the curtain going up at 8:00 p. m. The Revue played last night before a highly pleased, almost-full-house audience of townspeople, students, and faculty members. "It is hoped that all those who did not have the opportunity to see the first showing of the Revue will be able to see it tonight or tomorrow night," Phil Jacks, Jr., director-producer, said.

Heading the wide range of talent in the show are Don Mills, who plays the male lead in the satire, and Don Russell, who is doing a fine job of emceeing the show. Supporting them will be edge groups from the Alpha Theta, Chi, Delta Zeta Delta, and Tau Gamma Sigma sororities and the Delta Sigma Pri fraternity.

Dick Church and Bill Hardin have both written several original musical scores for the show. In addition to these original pieces, several all-time alltimers are also being presented. Dud Thompson is conducting the eight-piece college orchestra; arrangements and orchestrations are by Bill Persons. Dud Thompson, George Booth, Don Wilson, and Dick Church. The overture is by Warren Baker.

The musical numbers will feature the voices of Irma Tadini, Carolyn Steiner, Dolores Dahl, Pat Ilmor, Don Mills, Helen Hatch, Miss Granata, Joel Andrews, and a pep quartet from the male glee club.

Walter Arndt, Beverly Benedict, Phil Jacks, and Bob Hogan have collaborated on the Revue script. Arndt, a UCSB graduate as of last February, was drafted into serving in the show because of his extensive experience in college productions.

Bob Anderson designed the sets for the show. Violet Hayhoe and Betty Dryden have been in charge of staging and the dance numbers. Tickets are on sale now at the Graduate Manager's office and can also be procured at the box office at show time. Admission will be 50 cents for general admission and 10 cents for reserved seats. ### Initiate Sig Alphas As DTD Local Chapter

Sigma Alpha Kappa fraternity will become Delta Psi chapter of Delta Tau Delta national social fraternity on Saturday, May 21, when installation ceremonies will mark the beginning of the tenth national fraternity on the Santa Barbara campus.

Among the 25 Sigma Alpha Kappa alumni who will be initiated into Delta Tau Delta in connection with the installation are: Dr. Paul A. Jones, Dean of Men; Dr. Lynne C. Monroe, Chairman of the Industrial Arts Department; and Mr. Kermit Seefeld, of the Industrial Arts Department. All are faculty sponsors to the group.

In addition, 34 undergraduates will be initiated by initiation teams from Delta Tau Delta chapters at UCLA and USC. Representatives will also be present from the fraternity's chapters at the University of California, Berkeley campus, Stanford University, and Oregon State College.

The national president of the fraternity, W. Harold Brenton, of Des Moines, Iowa, will be present. Mr. Brenton, an investment banker, is a former president of the Iowa Bankers Association, is at present vice-president for Iowa for the American Bankers Association, and is a member of the Committee for Economic Development. He is a trustee of Grinnell College, Iowa.



### Smoking Survey

### Smoker's Hack Percentage Revealed by Pollsters

Are you an undergraduate student of this college? If you are, the odds are better than 3 to 5 that you are smoking a cigarette right now. How about it? Did we call it right? Let's carry the game a little further. The odds are good that if you do smoke you smoke a little less than a pack per day of a certain brand which has a red circle on the package (no free advertising in this paper!) and that you smoke because of habit.

No, the old Gaucho staff hasn't suddenly gone fortune-teller on you. We are just reporting the results of a campus-wide survey made recently by a few eager students to determine Gaucho smoking habits.

The pollsters talked to 1555 students in all. A representative sampling of the campus population was obtained in spite of the fact that there are but 928 women students compared to 1378 males at UCSBC. The following is a digest of their findings: Of the 1555 students sampled, 61.2 per cent smoked in some form. Of that figure, Gaucho pipe and cigar smokers were found to be in small minority with only 9.9 per cent steering clear of cigarettes.

Smoking is most common among men with 62.5 per cent being smokers as opposed to 59.5 per cent of the girls. Men are also the heaviest smokers; 63.5 per cent of them polish

off a pack per day as opposed to a mere 23.2 per cent of the girls who smoke as much. 80.5 per cent of the 858 cigarette smokers preferred one of the top four brands.

Of the many reasons given for smoking, habit was the most frequent. Three other reasons given in order of frequency were: social, nervousness, and don't know.

As might be expected, the jokester popped out in many a Gaucho when questioned in this survey. There was one soul who replied to the question "why do you smoke?" "Because I'm too green to burn." Then there was the thrifty soul who replied, "I enjoy lighting them and once they're lit there's no sense in throwing them away." Other comedians replied, "People think you're dead if you don't," and "gets that — toothpaste taste out of my mouth."

In conclusion, the hearty souls who undertook this Herculean task would like to qualify their findings by saying that they apply particularly to this campus, although indications seem to be that conditions are similar elsewhere. ## Seniors to Accept Navy Commissions

The Navy is now accepting applications of graduating seniors for direct commissions in the regular Navy with active duty following completion of the requirements for a Baccalaureate degree. Men currently completing at least 60 semester-hours or more may apply for the Naval Aviation Cadet Program.

Applicants may apply for post-graduate training and duty either as pilots or supply officers in the Navy.

Applicants that are accepted will be commissioned as Ensign in the Regular Navy. Flight training applicants will undergo 18 months of training at the "Annapolis of the Air," Pensacola, Florida. Upon completion of training they will receive their coveted "Navy Wings of Gold" and will then be assigned to duty as pilots with the fleet.

Supply corps applicants will receive a 9-month course at the Navy Supply Corps School, Bayonne, New Jersey, and further duty as supply corps officers either at naval bases in the United States or with the fleet. Naval aviation flight training means that in 18 months from entry a successful candidate will be a trained Naval Aviator at the controls of a combat aircraft over the world's mightiest fleet. He will have the know-how of a Navy Pilot; carrier tactics, aerial gunnery, dive bombing, and torpedo warfare. The Navy's flight training program is complete, intensive, and tough.

Graduating seniors are offered immediate commission in the Regular Navy. Men completing 60 semester hours of college are enlisted as Naval aviation cadets and after the 18 months of training are commissioned as Ensigns in the Naval Reserve or Second Lieutenants in the Marine Corps Reserve. A limited number of qualified cadets will be selected as officers in the Regular Navy.

Eligibility requirements are:

A. Ensign (flight training): 1. Age: 19 to 25. 2. Have completed or be completing a 4-year course in an accredited college or university.

B. NavCad (naval aviation cadet): 1. Age: 18 to 27. 3. Have completed or be completing two years of a 4-year course in an accredited college or university. 3. Be unmarried and agree to remain so during training period. (All flight training applicants must meet physical requirements and pass aptitude tests for military flying.)

C. For Supply corps: 1. Age: 21 to 25. 2. Meet physical requirements for the Navy Staff Corps. 3. Have completed or be Baccalaureate degree.

Officers from the local office of Naval Officer Procurement will be on campus next Tuesday, May 24, from 10 a. m. to 3 p. m. to interview and answer questions from applicants and interested students.


Students deficient in any section of any division of the test must re-take the entire division, and will be held responsible for any part taken whether passed formerly or not.

This announcement was made yesterday by Dr. E. Allan Williams, chairman of the Faculty Committee on Honors and Scholarships.

The two senior women receiving the Panhellenic scholarships of \$100 each are Marjorie Cuthbert, of Auburn, California, who is taking a group major, and Loris Leedy O'Farrell of Long Beach, who is majoring in Social Sciences.

Dr. Helen E. Sweet, Dean of Women and also secretary of the Faculty Committee on Honors and Scholarships, said that the awards, as well as all the others made by the committee, are made on the basis of scholarship, leadership, personal character, and need.

These differ from scholarships in that the student receives pay in proportion to the amount of time spent on a specific assignment. The awards were made as follows:

## Professors Offer Fall Program Advice

Dr. Jerry H. Clark, Registrar, stated today that mimeographed copies of the schedule of classes for the Fall semester 1949 have been placed in the hands of all faculty members. For purposes of program counseling for the Fall semester, this is a final draft of the schedule. Each student must see his adviser in order to plan his fall program, as copies are provided only for faculty members.

It is hoped that beginning Monday, May 23rd, until the end of the semester a large percentage of students who plan to return next Fall will take advantage of this opportunity for program advising. Each student has been assigned to an adviser by the chairman of the department in which the student is majoring. A student may report to the office of the department chairman or to the Registrar's office in order to learn the name of his adviser.

At the time of the interview with his adviser, the student should complete a Counseling Card, which may be obtained from the student's adviser or from the window at the Registrar's office. This card will provide a record of the interview, and should facilitate the registration procedure during Fall registration week.

Dr. Clark also pointed out some changes in the registration procedure for the Fall, in that the payment of fees and signing up for classes is to be completed on Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday, September 14-16, rather than upon the first three days of registration week. This calendar of events will be found on page 6 of the General Catalog and will appear in the printed schedule of classes and directory to be published in August.

All students are strongly advised to take advantage of this opportunity to get better acquainted with their advisers in order to plan properly their future college program.

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
