# Fighting Illini Are No Match for Run and Gun Gauchos

It took two years, but the win was just as sweet. #15 UCSB The women's basketball team was pitted against #12 Illinois in the semi-finals of the Preseason Women's Invitation National Tournament, the same Illinois team that knocked it out of the NCAA Tournament two years ago in Illinois' Academy Hall, the same site that the two teams were at Sunday.

The Gauchos (3-0 overall) jumped out to a 15-0 lead and never looked back, taking the game 71-61 and moved on to today's game vs. #5 Georgia, who beat #20 Boston College, 78-70. The winner of tonight's matchup will be crowned champion of the WNIT.

"Before the game [junior forward/center Nicole] Greathouse told us in the locker room that we haven't won a big game since we beat Florida," junior guard Erin Buescher said. "That was my freshman year. We thought about that and we really wanted to win this one."

In the Gauchos' opening 15-0 run, they were led by senior guard Tawnée Cooper's four points and junior Rachelle Rogers' five in the six-minute, 38second stretch. But, Santa Barbara let Illinois creep back into the game, getting outscored 25-19 to close out the first half, still carrying a 34-26 lead into the half.

"I think it's very difficult to spot a team that good that kind of a lead and then come back and play catch up," Illinois Head Coach Theresa Grentz said.

But, the Gauchos could not bandage the bleeding that Illinois had caused. The Illini opened up the second half on a 15-9 run that tied the game at 41 and then took their only lead on Tauja Catchings, older sister of Tennessee All-American Tamika Catchings, back-to-back baskets, 47-46.


"We realized that if we wanted to win this game, we needed to pick it up," said Buescher, who led all scorers with 21 points to go along with eight rebounds. "We relaxed a little bit, but we picked it back up when we needed to in order to pull out the win."


However, Illinois' lead was short-lived. Buescher hit a free throw, Rogers converted a three-point play and UCSB was back in the driver's seat.

Santa Barbara, who was miserable from the line throughout the game (13-22), hit its free ones when needed: down the stretch, nailing eight of 10 to help put the Illini away. But, with the Gauchos' offense in sync, the free throws weren't exactly needed.

"Our offense was good because of our defense,"

### victory over Illinois. UCSB takes on Georgia tonight in the WNIT championship game. Stanford Tree Remains Upright Despite Santa Barbara's (Mis)Fires

They chopped and chopped, but the great Stanford tree just wouldn't fall.

The UCSB men's basketball team opened its season against the #9 Stanford Cardinal in front of a sellout crowd of 6,031 rabid fans at the Thunderdome Saturday evening. Unfortunately for the Gauchos, neither their offense nor their fans were enough to take the Cardinal down, as they lost 62-49 in a less-thanThunderdome faithful.

• "I was fearful of this game," Montgomery said in reference to the Gauchos' notorious fans. "One is the atmosphere that existed in Santa Barbara, the buildup. I knew they were going to play really hard, and they did. They really played hard. Boy, they just came out and were very confident. They thought they could make plays and got up, and they were very well prepared."

Ahead 13-12 in the first half, the Gauchos connected on their only threepointer of the half after junior forward

pretty offensive performance by both squads.

"We've played uglier," Stanford Head Coach Mike Montgomery said. "We sure didn't shoot the ball very well. If you look at the first-half stats, we're two for 16 from [behind the three point line], and shooting 20 percent, and yet we're up. So from our perspective, its like we can't shoot it a whole lot worse."

On the game, both UCSB (0-1 overall) and Stanford (3-0) shot poorly from the field. The Gauchos shot 28.9 percent from the floor, with the Cardinal only at 26.3 percent. Despite the shooting troubles, Santa Barbara jumped to an early lead behind the cheers of its crazed Juliano Jordani dished a pass to senior guard Derrick Allen, who spotted up behind the arc and nailed the shot for a 16-12 lead. A free throw from junior forward Adama Ndiaye made it 17-12, and then a put-back off of an Allen-missed layup by freshman forward Mark Hull gave the Gauchos their biggest lead of the game at 19-12. However, UCSB went into an offensive drought, scoring just two more points in the first half to trail Stanford 25-21 at the intermission.

"The difference in this game was the last eight minutes of the first half," UCSB Head Coach Bob Williams said. "That



last eight minutes, we did not play. Outside of that, I'm very proud of how we played."

In the second half of play, the Cardinal continued where it had left off, going on a 5-0 run in the opening minutes after halftime. The Gauchos stayed within striking distance for most of the second half, as they went on a run of their own – scoring eight unanswered points to trail Stanford 30-29. The shooting woes continued for both teams, though, as

Santa Barbara finished the V game making only two of a 15 from behind the arc b and Stanford making only to four of 25 threes. Shooting th was not the only thing that hampered the Gauchos' w chances of defeating the C ninth-ranked team in the S nation, however, as Allen b fouled out of the game after just 19 minutes of U

play. "It was more of an emotional game than we've ever played," said Allen, who finished with seven points to go along with five boards, two steals and an assist. "So we were more physical than we are usually. I was too aggressive on the court, trying to set an example and I did too much."

Freshman guard B.J. Ward stepped in and impressed in place of the fouled-out Allen. With Santa Barbara down 39-34, the 6'1" Ward drove in from the wing and elevated for a dunk over the Cardinal's Julius Barnes.

Ward's jam rimmed out after Barnes fouled him, bringing the Thunderdome to its feet. Ward's two free throws brought UCSB to within three, but that would be the closest the Gauchos would get as Stanford continued to build on its lead.

Hull led the way for UCSB, scoring 13 points and pulling down seven boards. Jordani had a team-high in rebounds with eight to match his eight points. Ward finished with six points, all of which came from the charity stripe. Stanford's junior forward Jarron Collins led all scorers with 21 points, and added 12 boards as well.

"I think it was a great experience playing against Stanford," Hull said. "I learned a lot of lessons and the team learned a lot of lessons. We played pretty tough. I think overall, it was a great opening experience." **All Heart**





said senior point guard Stacy Clinesmith, who had six points, five assists and six boards in a game-high 37 minutes. "Our pressure defense enabled us to run. That's why our offense was effective."

us toward that goal of being a good team as well as a talented team.'



Susan Blauser and Allison Curtain led the Fighting Illini with 16 points each while Catchings added 15 points and 11 rebounds.


