SB Wins Record Tenth Game in a Row, 80-68

Smith Scores 19, Aguinaldo Has 18 in Victory

The streaks live!

While the Gaucho men may have had their problems with Long Beach State, the UCSB women's basketball team led nearly wire-to-wire in defeating the 49ers for the second time this season on Sunday afternoon in the Thunderdome, 80-68.

The victory extended the conference-leading Gauchos' (16-5, 12-2 in the Big West) home winning streak to 14 and their current overall string to a school-record 10.

Despite the victory, Santa Barbara has kept everything in perspective. In fact, the Gauchos believe they still have not yet played their best basketball. "What the fans don't see is

how our defense is not going real well and that our offense is under par," said sophomore guard Erin Alexander, who scored 13 on the afternoon. "We know that we need to pick it up

to keep winning."

Without a stellar 40 minutes, the Gauchos still had plenty of firepower to defeat the struggling 49ers (11-11, 8-6), losers of three consecutive conference games. Long Beach's only lead of the day was 3-2, 2:30 into the game. The remainder of the half saw the 49ers starving for points, as pathetic Long Beach shooting placed the 49ers down at the in-

termission, 31-18. The Beach shot a measly 27 percent from the floor in the opening 20 minutes, which is poor, but easy to ignore considering that Long Beach fired blanks from the line. The 49ers were 3-15 from the charity

stripe.
"The big thing for us today was our free-throw shooting," said Long Beach Head Coach Glenn McDonald. "We couldn't drop a free throw in the ocean." The other interesting point of

note in the first half was McDonald's decision to pull back on the full-court press that had gi-ven the Gauchos' some problems in the first meeting between the two teams, an 80-69 victory for UCSB on Jan. 22. LBSU only pressed late in the game - with when they limited success were well behind.

Gauchos Drop Road Game to LBSU; UCSB **Falls to 11-11**

For the first time since it was 0-0, the UCSB men's basketball team is no better than a .500 squad, with an 11-11 overall record, 6-8 (7th place) in the Big West.

Thanks to a season-low 35 percent field-goal shooting per-formance, the Gauchos lost their third straight and seventh of their last nine games with a 75-61 loss to Long Beach State in front of 4,562 at the Pyramid on Saturday afternoon. The defeat dropped UCSB's road record to 2-8 this season.

The victory was the eighth in a row for the 49ers (15-6, 11-3) who swept the season series from the Gauchos for the first time since the 1982-83

"I think our guys were fired up and ready to play and actually played 20 to 25 minutes of pretty good basketball," UCSB Head Coach Jerry Pimm said. "I thought we were doing some good things in the middle part of the game and why we lost our patience and got anxious, I don't

"You really have to give Long Beach credit," he added. "They played with good patience and took advantage of our defense to get good shot opportunities. This is one of the most patient Long Beach teams that I've

Santa Barbara managed only two baskets in the opening 5:05, as the Beach grabbed an early 13-4 lead, which reached double figures at 26-16 on a slam by 49er forward Mike Atkinson. Gaucho guard Lelan McDougal countered with a baseline dunk of his own, but the basket's value was cut in half after LBSU converted on a free throw from McDougal's technical foul for hanging on the rim.

Despite a 12-point LBSU lead with 6:25 left in the half, UCSB went on a 14-5 run and went into halftime trailing 33-32.

The Gauchos took a 36-35 lead 1:37 into the second half on a basket by senior forward Wayne Butts, who started the contest after having missed the previous three with a slight concussion. Long Beach's Joe McNaull re-established the 49ers' lead with four of his second-half 12 points, but Gaucho guard Tecon Madden tied the game at 39-all with a three-pointer.

Aided by 57.7 percent second-half shooting, LBSU poured in 15 unanswered points, capped by a three from Tye Mays. The lead reached 21 on three occasions, the last coming with 3:28 remaining on a dunk by McNaull. The Gauchos scored the game's final five points, including senior center Doug Muse's first career three-pointer.

"We started getting a little impatient with our offense and they got some steals and easy baskets and the lead just started getting further and further away," junior guard Phillip Turner said

Sophomore forward Bakir Allen was UCSB's only doublefigure scorer in the game with 10

"It was really frustrating los-



Baseball Tells No Lies, Cuts Down University of Washington at Home

The University of Washington may share the name of the president for which yesterday's holiday was named, but if George had seen the way the #36-ranked Huskies were crushed by the Gauchos on Monday afternoon 11-3, he would have rolled over in his

Powered by two home runs by sophomore catcher Dave Willis, an additional roundtripper from sophomore second baseman Clark Parker and bolstered by strong starting pitching from sophomore Jorvic Salazar (2-1), UCSB (6-5) coasted to an easy victory over Washington (1-3).

The game marked a turnar-ound from UCSB's previous three games last weekend at Cal State Northridge. The Gauchos dropped all three games at the Matadors' home field, 7-5, 11-7 and 15-7.

UCSB Head Coach Bob Brontsema attributed the losses to the team being uncomfortable at Matador Field, where windy conditions led to a three-day offensive explosion by both teams.

"It's a different environment [at UCSB]," Brontsema said. "It's good to be home. Obviously we felt a little more comfortable being here than what we had over the weekend.

"We played more relaxed, we played more of our game. We just got out of our game on the weekend. We refocused and did the things we did when we were successful.'

UCSB got on the board with two runs in the second and third innings when Husky pitchers couldn't find the plate. In the first four innings, Washington hurlers walked nine Gauchos.

For Santa Barbara, Salazar began the game with control problems of his own, but quickly found his zone, giving up only one run in six innings of work to earn his second victory of the season.

"He's kind of what we call a gray-hair pitcher," Brontsema said. "He needs to nibble to get guys out on balls out of the zone — that's how he's effective."

Junior right-hander Dax Groves pitched well in middle relief, and sophomore righty Clint Pearson closed out the

UCSB Breaks Out of Slump, Posts Two Home Wins Vs. Santa Clara

The UCSB softball squad came out of its slump last Saturday, taking two games from Santa Clara at home.

The Gauchos (4-6 overall, 0-2 in Big West) staved off a 12-hit Bronco (2-11 overall) attack in game one to win, 6-5. Santa Barbara sophomore right-hander Megan O'Brien broke out of her own personal lapse by pitching a five-hit gem in game two to anchor UCSB's 5-1 victory.

"I'm feeling stronger and better and I was able to last the whole game," O'Brien said. "I had a little fire in me because we were ready to play and ready to win."

Santa Clara opened the scoring in game one with a big second inning at the plate. The Broncos didn't hit UCSB junior Stacy Atwood hard, but were able to capitalize on two infield hits, two bloop

singles and an error, taking a 3-0 lead. However, the Gauchos, who got key hitting from slumping sluggers in the third and fourth innings, were also able to take advantage of their opportunities, scoring five runs on six hits and an error in those two frames.

A triple to right center by freshman Tracy Nelson (.100) sparked the offensive onslaught for UCSB in the third. She was singled in by junior center fielder J.J. Cannon (.059) to put Santa Barbara on the

nervous," Cannon said. "You just gotta do it and not think about it."

UCSB senior Annjanette Vitulli, Atwood and sophomores Johnna Mike and Danelle Lovetro all punched out hits in the third and fourth innings to key the

come-from-behind win.
"We looked good today. Everyone was

contributing and everyone came through when they had to," Mike said.

UCSB's Atwood (2-3) pitched a complete game, scattering 12 hits with five strikeouts and a walk to get the win. She

also went 3-6 on the day with an RBI.

Most of the action in game two occurred in the first inning for both teams. The Broncos led off the game with a triple from freshman outfielder Elisha Previte and scored on a fielder's choice.

UCSB stormed back in the bottom of the inning with a walk and stolen base courtesy of sophomore catcher Michelle Ray. Atwood then reached on an error, followed up by a walk to sophomore Jessica Montgomery. A wild pitch and double by Nelson broke the game open for Santa Barbara, taking a 3-1 lead the squad would never relinquish.

O'Brien (2-3) pitched solidly for the Gauchos, allowing only five hits and one run, with five strikeouts and a walk, to record the complete-game win.

We improved on the little things and hit the ball well," UCSB Head Coach Liz Kelly said. "We scored some runs and it took the pressure off the pitchers."





In the second game, in which UCSB played fivetime defending champion Northern California Club, the team managed a 6-6 tie. In its last game, the women lost to Vanderbilt, 5-3. With an overall record of 0-2-1, UCSB did not make it to the second round which was held on

Although the women's team finished without a win, first-year coach Alana Wolownik was still satisfied with her team's performance.

"We have a lot of young players who haven't had time to really work together," she said. "We weren't sure how we would fare against the competition since we really didn't know them, but I was glad to see that we never gave

Gaucho junior midfielder Erin Cook, who led all UCSB scorers with 11 goals, was somewhat disappointed with the team's overall performance.

"I felt we had a good second game, but in the first and third games I thought we could have played a lot better," she said. "We need to improve the transition game and basically work together as a team, to help establish a trust."

The five-time champion All-Star squad from Northern California won the tournament again this year by de-feating UC Davis in the final game.

UCSB's B team took third place in division IV action. The team's only loss of the weekend came in a narrow 6-5 de-

feat at the hands of Pepperdine.

The Shootout served as a good, early-season event which the women's lacrosse teams used to sharpen their skills and help prepare themselves for the impending season.

The Gauchos hope to use the experience gained from the Shootout this Thursday, Feb. 23, as Santa Barbara hosts Bates College at Harder Stadium in a nonconference matchup.






