## Mrs. Croswell Art Dept. Head Addresses Club

"Greater cooperation between the Industrial Arts Department and the Art Department will mean much mutual benefit to both departments," said Mrs. Mary E. T. Croswell, head of the Art Department, to members of the Squabble Club Wednesday evening. "However," she continued, "our people must speak the same language. Industrial Arts men must understand proportion, harmony, and color. Art students must get architectural and mechanical drawing, be able to read plans and know the construction of a house. Art is for life's sake and should be of a practical nature. Industrial Arts work needs beauty as well as fine technique."

The speaker went on to speak of the course given in the Art Department, Design and Color, which is the basic work of all art knowledge and which should be fundamental in the work of both departments. Every piece of woodwork, wrought iron, or art metal should be carefully designed. Those things which have fine lines and are beautiful are those which we treasure, and, again, anything which is not useful lacks the great element of beauty."

Many articles of craft work done by the students of the Art Department in basketry, pottery, toy making, and jewelery were displayed to the large group present, as were problems in Design and Color, Interior Decoration, and Public School Art, the latter being a course for elementary teachers especially.

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## Industrial Education Examination Outline

Students in the Industrial Education Department who plan to apply for examinations of one kind or another during the present Summer Session should make the necessary applications at once according to an announcement made by Mr. Ericson in the assembly last Thursday.

Examinations may be taken for the purpose of establishing equivalents of a high school graduation and thus receiving status as regular college students or candidates for an Industrial Arts credential.

Another type of examination which may be authorized is one covering technical requirements in shopwork. This type is made possible in cases where the applicant appears to have had practical experience in the work covered in the college course or courses offered in such technical subjects.

The procedure to follow in connection with any type of examination is first to go to the department head and discuss the feasibility of attempting the test. If the result of such interview is favorable, blanks are obtained from the office of the Registrar with instruction for paying fees, and getting further signatures and authorization from the department head and the credentials committee.

After all these necessary steps have been taken and the committee has approved the examination, dates for administering the necessary examinations will be arranged.

With more than two weeks of the session already past it will be well for all applicants to make their wishes known without delay in order that full consideration may be given each applicant.

## Dr. Jacobs Outlines Special Credentials

Dr. Jacobs outlined the two types of general credentials issued by the college. General Junior High and General Elementary.

In addition to these the Santa Barbara State College issues the following special secondary credentials: Homemaking, Art, Physical Education and Industrial Education.

Dr. Jacobs stated that in a survey of the Los Angeles schools, he found that one-third of the secondary schools are strictly junior high, while only nine of them are of the old four year type.

Dr. Jacobs also stated that the Junior High Credential has been enlarged by the state to embrace the sixth, seventh, eighth and ninth grades.

Miss Hazel Severy, in charge of evaluation, answered the following concerning units.

Must have high school credits with other credentials to determine high school standing, recommended and provisional.

Must have two years high school math. Must have two years high school language (if over 21 excused from this.) Thirty units must be completed at Santa Barbara 18 have to be at the college. 12 may be Santa Barbara extension.

"How many more units will an Industrial Education General need to get a General Junior High?" Miss Severy, "Presuming they have an accredited classroom teaching minor they will need: three units of Junior High Procedure, three units of Junior High Principles, two units of Introductory Teaching, four units of Supervised Teaching (must do two units under Santa Barbara State College.)

Teaching Minors: 21 History, 18 English, 18 Art, 18 Math, 18 or 19 Science (Biological or Physical) six of these upper division, except History, which requires nine upper division.

Mrs. Price, head of Elementary Department, outlined the course in Supervision to be given in Los Angeles this fall, and asked all who are interested to make a written request for same.

the Junior High Credential.

Mr. Ericson, Head of Industrial Education Department, in reply to the question "Why teachers holding Industrial Education credentials had to take more subjects than elementary or junior high, when getting a general at U. S. C.," said "If the full program for an A.B. degree has been completed, the degree is accepted and recognized by the graduate college, but that additional accredited subjects of upper division type may have to be completed before receiving full candidacy for M.A. degree at U. S. C."

All requests for extension work in Los Angeles and vicinity should be made out, carrying full name, address and school, and given to Effie Jane Leatart to assemble. All the remaining subjects needed are to be listed, this will help to determine the greatest need for classes.
